



California now has a law for whipping, with the cat o-nine-tails all brutis convicted of wife-beating. In so far the establishment of the whippingpost may prove a good thing. The Governor signed the act last Thursday. It received a considerable majority vote in the Legislature, and is approved by most of the California press.

It is said that Mr. Fair, the principal owner of the Consolidated Virginia Mine, has made a proposition to furnish the Treasury with \$60,000,000 worth of gold and silver within eighteen months, and to take bonds for the same. The proposition is under consideration.

DETROIT, March 25. - The Fort Street Presbyterian Church burned from an accidental fire this morning. It was one of the most beautiful structures here, and cost \$63,000, to which \$35,000 were added in improvements five years ago. The insurances, in ten companies, aggregates \$60,-500.

United States Grange Commission er, Mr: Wright, has made an extended tour throughout Continental Europe, and has returned to England, where he will remain until after the session of the Industrial Congress, which assembles April 15. He reports gratifying success on the Continent, where he gathered much valuable information, especially in Germany. Mr. Wright thinks that the Grange system may not be introduced in England at present, but is hopeful that a union will soon be formed between the British co-operative societies and American Granges.

CONGRESSIONAL, SENATE, March 23 .- Mr. Jones introduced a bill to prohibit the transportation of liquid nitro-glycerine, and to regulate the transportation of dynamite. Two more amendments were offered to the bill for counting presidential votes, but were voted

ers of idle greenbacks to invest them in these bonds; whereupon the green backs so invested will be destroyed forever. It is estimated by the friends of the measure that the funding prosess will be moderate, as nobody will care to purchase four per cent. bonds if he can use the money in any other safe way which will bring him a larg-

er interest than four per cent. The advantage of such an investment will be that the bonds can be, at any time, sold for par and accrued interest, in case the holder of the bond wants to get his money for other use. By this funding and destroying the surplus and idle greenbacks in the country, there will be a smaller amount left to redeem in coin. And, as the greenbacks become scarcer, they are expected to increase in value, carrying the National bank currency with them up towards par. At the same time the friends of the measure expect the process to be self-regulating—that is, no more greenbacks will be funded than the business of the country can easily

spare; because, if business revives, so that money is worth more than four per cent. interest, people will keep their greenbacks for business uses instead of funding them. Besides, National bank currency, and, after a while, coin, are expected to supply any demand that may arise for more currency. One paper-the Chicago Tribune-







The Lansing Republican announces that the Michigan editors who wish to go to the Centennial this year will have to pay as much as fare anybody. All the trunk lines between the East and West have agreed on a scale of rates reduced only 25 per cent. From Detroit a ticket for the round trip by any route will cost \$26.25. Furthermore, unless some definite time is fixed for a large party to go, so that the sleeping car companies can be informed which roads the party will patronize, it will be impracticable to secure sleeping cars at any reduction of prices. These are the official replies of railroad magnates to inquiries carefullyumade by the committee appointed at the annual meeting of the press association in February, to arrange, if possible, for a Centennial excursion.
