TOUGHENED GLASS.

The new process for making a tough or unbreakable glass has been greatly improved since its first announcement, and the material, in the form of lamp chimneys, tumblers, etc., is now offered in commercial quantities. The success attending the experiments already made have inspired further research in the same field, and a number of new processes, of more or less value, are reported. In the original process, glassware, raised to a red, or melting heat, is plunged into a bath of oily and fatty matter, and the result is to give the glass an entirely new character. Instead of breaking with a star-like fracture under a slight blow, it resists serious blows, and besides a certain amount of elasticity about that it had before, displays a toughness and cohesion many times in excess of its ordinary.

ONE ADVANTAGE OF LARGE HANDS.

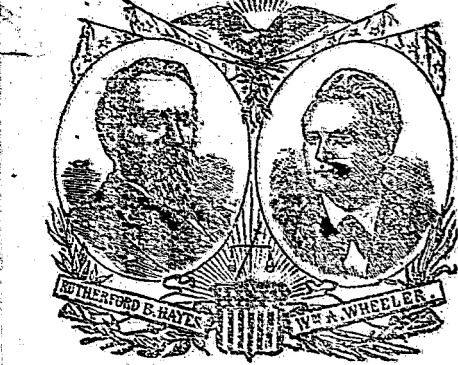

FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

- NEWPORT BLANC MANGE.—To one quart of milk add one ounce or half a box of gelatine; soak until dissolved—no less than two hours—add a small cup of white sugar, and place over the fire. When the sugar and gelatine are mixed with the milk and the blanc mange is gently boiling, remove and add one wine-glass of sherry wine and half a teaspoonful of extract of lemon. Stir while cooling to prevent the cream rising to top. When cool pour into moulds and set on ice.
- RICH APPLE PUDDING.—Pare, core, and chop five or six apples, or enough to make half pound of shreds; a quarter pound of sweet; blanch and pound one dozen almonds; half a pound currants, a small cup of sugar, in a nutmeg, equal quantities of bread crumbs and flour, a teaspoonful of salt, the whites of three eggs beaten to a stiff froth; just milk enough to mix, a wineglassful of brandy the last thing. From ten to twelve ounces of bread crumbs and flour make a good size pudding, but if more flour is liked add a teaspoonful of baking powder, sifted dry in flour.
- GERMAN POTATO CHEESE.—Boil sound white potatoes, peel and wash them perfectly smooth; to five pounds of the mashed potatoes, when cold, add a little more than a pint of sour milk; season it with salt and knead it well; cover it and let it remain, according to the season, from two to four days, then knead it afresh and make it into small cheeses; hang them up in a basket in the shade to dry; when they are sufficiently dry put them up in layers in large pots or kegs, and keep them closely covered. It will be fit for use in three or four weeks, but become finer the longer it is kept. It must be kept in a dry place, well covered.
- PINEAPPLE PRESERVE.—Twist off the top and bottom of pineapple, pare off the rough outside, then weigh them, cut them in slices, chips, or quarters; to each pound of fruit allow a teacup of water, put in a preserving kettle, cover it and let it boil gently until it is clear and tender, then take it up and put into the water a pound of white sugar to each pound of fruit, stir it till the sugar is dissolved, then put in the fruit, cover the kettle and let it boil gently until transparent throughout, take it out then and let it cool, put it in glass jars; as soon as the syrup cools a little pour it over the fruit and let it stand until the next day before sealing up the jars.
- ORANGE PUDDING.—Mix two ounces of fine Scotch oatmeal in a quart of a pint of milk; add it to a pint of boiling milk; sweeten to taste, and stir over the fire for ten minutes; then put in two ounces of sifted breadcrumbs; stir until the mixture is stiff; then add one ounce of shred suet and one or two well-beaten eggs; add a little lemon flavoring or grated nutmeg. Put the pudding into a buttered dish, and bake slowly for an hour.
- The Virginia way to cook chickens: The fowl to be killed, plucked and eviscerated in the shortest possible time; on no account is it to be washed; but must be wiped dry with a clean napkin and cut into six parts—the breast, the two wings, the back and the two legs. The whole is then to be thrown into a frying-pan with butter, cream, small (small cakes of Indian meal dough); the whole to be done before the flesh loses its natural heat, and the frying-pan and contents must be heated in advance to receive the chicken.
- INSULATING BEDSTREDS.—An Englishman who insulated his bedstead by placing underneath each post a broken-off bottom of a glass bottle, says that he had not been free from rheumatic gout for fifteen years, and that he began to improve immediately after the application of the insulators. A local paper, quoting this item, wisely adds: "There's many a fellow who could cure this gout, if he would break off the bottom of his bottles in time."
- PEACH PUDDING.—Heat one quart of milk, mix three tablespoonfuls corn starch with a little cold milk, add two eggs, six even tablespoonfuls sugar, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoonful lemon or vanilla, and stir in the hot milk. Let it cook until it thickens, stirring constantly. Prepare peaches as for the table, and put in a deep pudding dish. Sprinkle sugar over them, and pour the pudding over the fruit. Best when eaten cold.
- APPLE SNOW.—One pint bowl of the pulp of roasted apple, strained; one half pint of pulverized sugar; whites of three eggs; beat the eggs, to a stiff froth, then add the apple and sugar alternately, a spoonful of each, and beat altogether until it stands perfectly stiff on the spoon; it will swell immensely; serve this sauce on a custard made of the yolk of the eggs, one pint of milk, two tablespoonfuls sugar, and flavored with vanilla.
- CHARLOTTE RUSSE FOR DYSPEPSIA.—Line a dish with sponge cake, heat to nearly the boiling point one pint of milk, and stir in briskly half a cup of corn starch dissolved in three tablespoonfuls of cold water; cook for a minute; then add half a cup of white sugar, and pour the mixture into the dish; serve hot.

As we go to press this morning, the returns are not all in, so that it is impossible to give the results to a certainty, but sufficient is known to warrant the assertion that Ohio has gone Republican by from 6,000 to 8,000 majority, and elected twelve Republican Congressmen.

Indiana is so close that nothing but the official count will determine the result on the State ticket. The majority will be very small either way, with the chances in favor of the Republicans. Sufficient is known, however, to warrant us in saying that the Republicans have elected eight, the Democrats four, and one Congressman doubtful.

West Virginia is, as usual, Democratic, but by a reduced majority. The returns received are very meager, but, as far as received, show Republican gains. The Democrats claim the State by 5,000 majority.

OHIO. COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 11.—While it is impossible to-night to send the official figures by Congressional districts, sufficient have been received here to make it certain that the Democrats have elected the following Congressmen: Saylor in the First District, McMahon in the Fourth, Rice in the Fifth, Dickey in the Seventh, Ewing in the Twelfth, Sutherland in the Thirteenth, and Fry in the Fourteenth.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 11.—The most reliable returns indicate the following result: For Congress—First District, Butler (Dem.); Second District, Cobb (Dem.); Third District, Becknet (Dem.); Fourth District, doubtful; Fifth District, Brown (Rep.); over Holman by 1,500; Sixth District, Robinson (Rep.); re-elected; Seventh District, Hanna (Rep.); over Landers; Eighth District, Hunter (Rep.); probably re-elected; Ninth District, White (Rep.); Tenth District, Calkins (Rep.); Eleventh District, Evans (Rep.); Twelfth District, Hamilton (Dem.); re-elected; Thirteenth District, Baker (Rep.).

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 11.—From all returns received up to this hour the indications are that the entire Democratic State ticket is elected by a small majority, but it may require the official vote to determine the result. The Democratic State Central Committee claim Williams majority to be 2,000 to 3,000. Hunter (Rep.) for Congress in the Eighth District, is elected by 500 majority.

GREENBACKS IN INDIANA. Mr. Walcott, nominee of the Independent Greenback ticket for Governor of Indiana withdrew from that ticket in the following letter to the Chairman of the Independent State Central Committee:

WALCOTT, Ind., Oct. 4th, 1876. DEAR SIR:—My most recent observations have confirmed me in the belief that the sacred cause of the people in the work of financial reform cannot at the coming State election be materially advanced. Party prejudices yet have more control over the people than their reason, quickened, as their reason should be, by their great sufferings.

WEST VIRGINIA. WHEELING, W. Va., Oct. 11.—The ticket voted is a long one, and in most places the count was abandoned until this morning. The returns are very meager, but, as far as received, show Republican gains.

OHIO AND INDIANA. "The returns from Ohio and Indiana come in slowly. There is sufficient data from Ohio, however, to determine the fact that that State has gone Republican. The majority will probably be about 7,000. The Democrats give up the State. There is also a certain gain to the Republicans of four Congressmen, and possibly five.

THE "INDEPENDENT" GREENBACK PARTY OF THIS COUNTY held their Convention at Berrien last Thursday. About three-fourths of the members were Democrats, and of the fifty-one voters, thirty-two were Democrats who of course nominated Democrats to the most important offices.

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INDEPENDENT ORGANIZATION, so that the Independent party as now constituted consists mostly of men who, aside from the financial question, have been, and are, Republicans. It is true there are many Democrats in the Independent organization, but the number is comparatively limited.

ON MOTION the vote to leave the balance of the county ticket blank rescinded, and the county committee authorized to fill out the ticket with suitable and proper candidates.
