Old Aunt Sally Simrall, as she had been familiarly known in Shelbyville, Ky., for many years, died on Thursday of last week, aged about 19 years. The foundation for a first-class romance in real life is connected with the old wo man and her descendants:

She came to Shelbyville some sixty or seventy years ago, as the slave of a man named Neel, who went into the hotel business. At that time she was a brilliant quadroon, and was the mother of a daughter as fair and lovely as any who boasted of Caucasian blood. The daughter attracted the attention of a wealthy Southerner who sojourned for a few days at the hotel kept by Neel, and though but a child in years, he conceived the idea of becoming her owner, with what motive The

The wealthy Southerner then married her, and we next find her in St. Louis, moving in the best of society, with two lovely daughters as the result of her marriage. These daugh-

ters both married rising young lawyers in that city, one of whom afterwards became a member of Congress. The Southerner died many years ago,

A Pensylvania member of Congress called upon President Arthur and proposed to have a certain postmaster in his district appointed forthwith, as his constituents were becoming of the opinion that he did not have very heavy influence with the President, and it was hurting him at home. The President very kindly told him that in the future he should be guided in his appointments by the merits of the case, and should consider recommendations of Congressmen the same as those of other public men.

President Arthur has vetoed the anti Chinese bill, giving as his reason that it is in direct conflict with the agreement of the United States in her last treaty with China, in which there was a special stipulation that the Chinese immigration should not be prohibited, although it might be suspended for a reasonable length of time. He holds that a suspension for twenty years amounts to a practical prohibition. The talk in Washington is that this veto will place the next congress under the control of the democrats by its influence on the Pacific coast. This may be, nevertheless we are of the opinion the veto was right and should be supported.

Congressman Lacey, of this State, has secured a favorable report of the committee on post offices, on a bill to change the postal exchange business. His bill provides for postal notes for sums under \$5, payable to bearer; these notes shall be good at any time under three months from date of issue. After that they will be irredeemable and void; a fee of three cents is to be charged for each note; the holder of the note, if not able to present it in person, must send it for collection and payment through a money order office, for which a fee of three cents must be paid; the charge on money orders under \$10 is reduced from 10 to 8 cents; the maximum sum for which orders may be issued is increased from \$50 to \$100. There is serious objection to the first provision, in that there is to be a short life to the notes that is liable to lead to the loss of amounts invested in them, yet an unlimited time for redemption, if the notes were to be used as currency, would lead to a dangerous inflation. To the other provisions of the bill there appears to be no serious objection.

Consistency is not a part of the makeup of the human family. It has for years been the wish that a successful attack might be made upon the James boys. 




