With perhaps one exception the Republican press of this district is in favor of the return of Hon. J. C. Burrows to represent this district in congress. He has made a good representative and there appears no good reason for making a change until there is a place vacant where he can be more useful, which does not appear now.

Here is an example for you. Senator Fair says the Chinese on the Pacific slope send home from \$40,000,000 to \$45,000,000 annually. There are 100,000, making an average of \$400 to \$450 for each Chinaman, and they are accused of degrading labor by working for 50 to 60 cents per day. The query is how a Chinaman can live and save these amounts on the wages received.

A Washington correspondent has taken pains to compile a bill of particulars for the Grand Traverse Herald. It contains an outline of the business done by its favorite candidate for Senator Ferry's place. Less than one page of the Congressional Record would contain his whole session work. The Herald has probably seen the "bill of particulars" ere this.

Hon. J. C. Burrows recently made an excellent speech in Congress on the tariff question, favoring a tariff commission. He kept the house in a roar of laughter, while showing up the Democratic inconsistencies on this question, by quoting the speeches of their prominent men made on the floor of the House before the last campaign, and the remark of General Hancock, that "The question is solely a local one. It arose in my town once."

The strike at Muskegon is assuming a political turn, some of the desperate ones seeking office by the mangement of the mob. All such should be forever defeated. It is the acknowledged right of any American citizen to work or not upon terms offered by his employer, but he must not interfere with any other man who is willing to take his place, and any man who attempts to ride into office, or any other position, by such interference should be forever kept in the back ground. The free institutions of this country are in danger when such principles can be made to win.

The Greatest City in the World. The last English census shows that London has been gaining rapidly in population during the last ten years. It now contains 3,814,571 inhabitants, or 560,341 more than 1871. Its in-arease was only a little over 17 per cent., and yet so vast was its popula-tion in 1871 that, during the ten years it has added more to that total in actual numbers more people than our thriv-ing city of Chicago now contains, and nearly as many as are included in Brooklyn, the third city of the Union in

size. During the period from 1870 to 1880, New York increased 28 per cent. ; but it gained only 264,285 inhabitants, not half gained only 205,285 innabitants, not half so many as were added to London be-tween 1871 and 1881; and its population last year was considered less than a third of that of the English capital. If our proportionate increase continues to be so much larger than that of London, of course we will in due time catch up with the older city, and put it in the second place as to size; but that day is still far off, and as New York grows more populous it may show a smaller more populous it may show a smaller rate of increase. The remarkable thing about London is that a city of such un-paralleled magnitude, in the midst of an old civilization, has been growing at a rate which, if continued, will give it double its present population less than a century hence. Since 1S61 it has conned over 38 per cent. If it keeps ou gained over 38 per cent. If it keeps on increasing in that proportion, by the end of the first quarter of the twentieth century it will contain about 7,000,000

of people. But such estimates of what will hap-pen in the future have only a curious interest. Many causes may contribute to make the growth of London much less proportionately during the next fifty years than it has been during the twenty just passed. It is an impressive fact, however, that so vast a capital, already far ahead of any other city in the world in population, should have increased one-third in twenty years, and that it should be now three times as large as it

was sixty years ago. The population of London was 1,378,-000 in 1821. It has, therefore, gained nearly 2,500,000 inhabitants since then. The population of New York was 123,-706 in 1810, and in 1880 it was nearly ten times that. During the twenty years from 1860 to 1880 it gained about one-half, against the increase of one-third in London between 1861 and 1881. It is safe to estimate that at the begin-ning of the next century we shall have made another gain that would give us 1,800,000. Reserved Power. It is not wise to work constantly to the rate of which we are capable. the engineer of the railroad were to keep the speed of his train up to the highest rate he could obtain with his engine, it would soon be used up. If a horse is driven at the top of his speed for any length of time, he is ruined. It is well enough to try the power occasionally of a horse or engine, by putting on all the motion it will bear, but not continuously. All machinists construct their machines so there shall be a reserve force. If the power required is a four-horse, then they make a six-horse power. In this case it works easily and lasts long. A man who has strength enough to do twelve hours hours of labor in twenty-four, and no more, should do but nine or ten hours' more, should do but nine or ten hours work. The reserve power keeps the body in repair. It rounds out the frame to full proportions. It keeps the mind cheerful, hopeful, happy. The person with no reserve force is always incapa-ble of taking on any more responsibility than he already has. A little exertion puts him out of breath. He cannot increase his work for an hour without the danger of an explosion. Such are genanaly pale, bloodless, nervous, irritatle, despondent, gloomy. We all pity them. The great source of power in the indi-vidual is the blood. It runs the machinery of life, and upon it depends our health and strength. A mill on the stream where water is scanty, can be worked but a portion of the time. So a man with little good blood can do but hittle more that the stream whether little work. The reserve power must be stored up in this fluid. It is an old saying among stockraisers that "blood tell." It is equally true that blood tells in the sense in which we use the word. If it is only good blood, then the more of it the better. When the reserve power of an individual runs low, it is an indication that a change is necessary, and that it is best to stop expending and go to accumulating, just as the miller does when the water gets low in the poud. Such a course would save many a person from physical bankruptcy.

The following illustration of this is literally true : Herr M-, of We erstrasse, Bonn-on-the-Rhine, has four sons, each of whom has passed through the Gymnasien course and matriculate 1 at the Bonn University. Adolph, the education of a Landgerichts-Referendar (a sort of County Court Judge); Lorenz holds the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, and is a professor in a public school; Julius is an "advocat," and Theodore holds a Government appointment at Berlin. Adolph and Julius know French and English almost as well as they know their own language, and they both have such knowledge of Latin as to be able to write it. In one of his examinations Adolph had to write an account of the Punic wars in Latin, without the aid of a dictionary or any other book of refer-ence. Lorenz has a knowledge of English enabling him to read Shakespeare in the original, and he has ablished a number of essays on the poet's works. He likewise knows French, reads Italian and Spanish, Hebrew, Anglo-Saxon, and is the author of a Latin treatise on Greek verbs. Theodore speaks with facility English, French and Spanish, and has published a work on political economy. I entered Herr M—'s school in May, 1871. One day when I had been there about six weeks, our class had for trans-lation Grimm's fable of the Wolf and the Man. The Western Reserve.

Several of the seaboard States et an early day, when, in fact, they were col-onies, acquired claims to lands extending westward practically to the utmost limit. among this number were Connecticut, Virginia, New York, and Massachusetts.
