It is high time that something is done toward renovating the place, either by cleaning up the building or removing it, and one or the other should be done at once. Will the Council or the proprietors attend to it?

SEVERAL attempts have been made to have our streets lighted on dark nights, but thus far with very little effect. Some lamps have been posted at a few of the most public dark corners, but to see a light in one of them is one of the wonders of the age. A committee has been appointed by the Common Council to investigate the light question, and while they are thus engaged, would it not be well for them to spend a little time in inquiring into the practicality and expense of lighting our village with electricity? THE contractors who have the job of building a new bridge across the east side of the river have torn up the old bridge, so that it is now impassable. The contractors now have about forty days in which to complete the new bridge. In the meantime, business between the two sides of the river will be at a stand.

The subscription to the stock was solicited by Mr. Wm. Osborn, then in the drug business, who, upon its organization, was elected its secretary and business manager, which position he holds in the Company at the present time.

The property, they now occupy was purchased, a fifty-horse power engine put in the building, and machinery necessary for the manufacturing of bedsteads. The building was by the one they are now using—100 by 40 feet, three stories, but without the additions which have since been added as room was wanted.

Their business has been prosperous from the first, and with the exception of a year or two after the panic, has paid its stockholders regular dividends. They have been paid back in money more than they invested in the beginning, and now hold one dollar and seventy-five cents in stock for each original dollar invested. The capital has been increased from eighteen to forty thousand dollars from earnings, not paid in cash.

During the year 1832, the Porto Rico (Spanish) privateers having upon several occasions interrupted our commerce...

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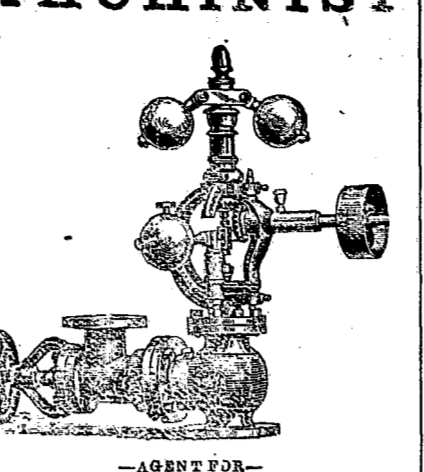
