

Hon. Buren R. Sherman, the present Governer of Iowa and recently re-elected, has been identified with the political affairs of Iowa since his boyhood. He was born in Phelps county, New

York, May 28, 1836. In 1854, his parents removed to Tama county, Iowa, to which place the son, Buren, accompanied them, and began an earnest and presistent study of the law. In 1859, at twenty-three years of age, he completed his preparatory




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he abandoned has profession, in which he had made a creditable start, and entered the army, soon becoming the second Lieutenant or Co. G., of the 13th Iowa regiment of Volunteers. At the battle of Pittsburgh Landing, he was severely wounded, and was honorably discharged from the service in 1863. During the same year, upon his return to Iowa, he was elected Judge of Benton county, and in 1865 was re-elected. From 1866 to 1874, he was elected Clerk of the Courts, and his election would have been repeated as Clerk in 1874. had he not accepted the nomination of Auditor of State, to which office he was elected and proved as popular as in his former capacity, keing continually re-elected until 1881, when he was elected Governor.



HON. GEORGE HOADLY. GOVERNOR ELECT OF OIIIO.


After one of the closest contests on record. the Hon. Geo. Hoadly has been Governor of Ohio. He was born at New Haven, Conn., July 81, 1826, of which city his father was at one time Mayor. He received his ele-mentary education at Cleveland, O., and was graduated from the Western Bergery College of Windson O in Reserve College, at Hudson, O., in 1844. After a year of study at the Cambridge Law School, he entered the offices of Chase & Ball, in Cincinnati, and admitted to the bar in August, 1847. In 1849 he was admitted as a partner in the firm. He was elected in 1851 as Judge of the Superior Court of Cincinnati, and was City Solicitor in 1855. Two years later he succeeded Judge Gholson on the bench of the new Superior Court. Gov. Salmon P. Chase, his friend and partner, offered him a seat upon the Supreme Bench, which he declined. In 1862 the offer was again made by Gov. Tod, and was again declined. In 1866 he resigned his post in the Superior Court for the purpose of establishing the law firm of which he is still the head. He was an active member of the Constitutional Convention of 1873-74, and gave, willingly, eight months of his time to the service.

He has taught in the Law School at Cincinnati, and has been University Trustee for many years.

Judge Hoadly was one of the counsel who successfully resisted the effort to compel the reading of the Bible in the public schools. He was originally a Democrat, but his abporance of slavery led him naturally into the Republican ranks, where he remained until the close of Grant's first term. In 1876, his opposition to Mr. Greeley's protection principals threw him into the Lib-beral party, and he did efficient service under the Tilden and Hendricks banner. He appeared as counsel for the Demecratic Electors in 1877. Since

that time he has devoted himself to his

BACHELORS IN HISTORY.

NOT SO APT TO BE SUCCESSFUL AS THE MARRIED -A FEW NOTABLE EXCEP-TIONS.

In antiquity it was considered unpa-triotic to remain unmarried. Hence bachelors were subject to peculiar dis abilities in the Spartan and Roman code. They were obliged to pay extra taxes, and under Augustus they were barred from the inheritance of real estate except from their nearest relatives. Only one of our national presidents was a bachelor and he was a failure. Bachelors generally speaking are not as successful in life as married men. It is said that not one of Washington's associate leaders in the revolutionary struggle was a celibate. All had the influence of marriage and social life. Hence that tendency against wedlock which marks the present day is among its worst features. Speaking of marriage, it should be a complete union of affection and in-tellectual powers. It may be added that a man's wife should be to a certain degree his business partner. Sho should know something of his risk and financial difficulties, and in this way the burden of life is often divided. Walter Scott concealed from his wife his connection with the Bannatynes which caused his ruin. This was a great mistake.

On the other hand, one of the most successful business men in this city has always made his wife a confident in his schemes, and found her advice advantageous. To return to our rich celibates, it may be said that the Chemical bank was once considered a sort of bachelors' hall since its stockholders, directors and president included a rare quartette of opulent celibates. Peter Goelet was one of its directors; James Lenox and Alexander Stuart were leading stock-holders, while its president, John Q. Jones, was also a bachelor. A writer describes the peon system of Mexico. The Mexicans, he says, especially the less favored classes, are inveterate gamblers, who risk nearly every cent they can get in games of chance. This failing results in many of them becoming virtually serfs. A man borrows a small sum-say \$3 or \$4-with which to try his luck at the gaming table. He loses and is unable to repay the money. He is arraigned, the debt is proved, and he is sentenced to work for the lender till the amount of his obligation is paid. By the time he has liquidated the original debt, he has contracted three or four others, and he belongs to his creditor almost as much as the creditor's horse or cow. His death does not cancel his debts: his wife or children must labor till the money is returned. This is said to be the reason why peons do not run away after contracting debts.





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
