May Get Mail at Postoffice. The postmaster general has ruled that the patrons of the city and rural free delivery routes may have their choice, call at the postoffice for their mail or have it delivered, but the postmaster is not required to go through the carrier's case in his absence to hunt out mail for anybody, nor are the carriers required to stay at the postoffice after making their trips to wait on their patrons. Therefore, patrons desiring service both by the carrier and the postoffice will be required to rent a box at the post of fice in which the postmaster may put the mail which accumulates during the day, and such renter may call and get the mail at any time during office hours.

Poking the grass away he uncovered the bleeding and lifeless remains of a little rabbit. It was too bad—but then, you know, rabbits will chew the bark from the nursery and orchard trees and work great havoc in clover fields when



## BIGBLAZEATGAYLORD

Does \$20,000 Damages in the Town and Is a Difficult Fire to Fight.

ALL LOSSES FAIRLY INSURED

Aunt Maria Hixson, Lewance County's Oldest Pioneer-Husband Shoots His Wife.

Gaylord, Mich., July 1.-This city was again visited by a series of disastrous fires yesterday almost as serious as that a month ago, the total loss being about \$20,000. About 1 a. m. the department was called out to a blaze in the grocery store of Nelson Woodruff, where a blaze was started in the upper part of a two-story structure, and was not gotten under control until the entire stock was ruined. The loss will reach \$800.

#### Called Out to Another Blaze.

Scarcely had the department returned to their quarters when the alarm was sounded for one of the largest fires ever seen here right in the heart of the business section. This started at Chase's grocery store and spread rapidly until the entire block to the Michigan Central railroad was burned with the exception of E. F. Meston's saloon which stood a little from the rest of the doomed buildings. Fire Was Too Hot to Fight.

As the fire proceeded it go so hot that it was almost impossible for the department to get close enough to fight with good results. From Chase's store the flames jumped across a narrow space to Mark Demerest's saloon and barber shop, which building was formerly used as a court house. This was also a frame building and went rapidly. From this the fire swept to the building occupied as the Exchange hotel. For a time it looked as if this building could be saved, but a strong breeze fanned the flames, and it was doomed.

Summary of the Damages. The Chase building was valued at

\$1.500, with insurance of \$800; stock, \$1,200, almost entirely destroyed. The Gaylord Cigar Co.'s stock was valued at \$1,800 and was insured, together with the grocery stock, for \$1,800. The Mark Demerest building was valance. The Exchange hotel, valued at \$3,000, was burned to the ground. All the guests were got out safely.

IN HER 105TH YEAR

"Aunt Maria" Hixson Can No Longer See Nor Hear, but Has a V onderful Memory.

Tecumseh, Mich., July 1.—Mrs Maria Hixson, Lenawee county's oldest pioneer, has entered her 105th year, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. G. Kedzie, Tecumseh. The usual birthday party was postponed on account of sickness, but she received many calls from relatives and friends.

"Aunt Maria" was born June 28. 1800, at Armenia, N. Y., was married to Daniel Hixson in 1826, and moved to Tecumseh. Later she moved to Clinton, which has been her home until the past year, which has been spent in Tecumseh. Although Mrs. Hixson can no longer see nor hear well, her memory is wonderful.

Ivan Redmond, aged 22, and Herbert Bailey, aged 24, were arrested and have made a partial confession and will be bound over to the circuit court.

Two of the Injured May Die.

Hastings, Mich., July 1.—Two of the six persons injured when the Dowler school house, north of here, was blown down by a cyclone, George and Sylvia Walters, are thought to have received fatal injuries. Stella Heiser and Ruth and Geo. Hoffman received severe injuries from which they will recover.

Consumption Wiping Out the Tribe.

Bay City, Mich., July 1.—Miss Ida Nockchickme, granddaughter of the famous old Chippewa chef, Nau-quachick-a-a-ming, is dead at the family home near Kawkawlin, of consumption. This disease is rapidly wiping out the remains of a once powerful tribe of Indians.

## SKRYDLOFF AGAIN **GOES ON A RAID**

Two Vessels for the Japs---Then Sails Away.

MISSILES DO LITTLE DAMAGE

Russian Destroyer Runs the Port Arthur Blockade.

Reaches New Chwang Looking Like She Had Been in a Hot Fight— Officers Tell Many Stories.

Shanghai, July 1.-A battle has taken place about ten miles north of. Port Arthur. The Japanese have occupied the Wolf mountain after desperate fighting. A Russian regiment was almost annihilated.

Chefoo, July .-- From an authoritative source it is learned that the Japanese now have 180,000 men in the field, BOBBY WALTHOUR BADLY HURT including General Kuroki's army.

London, July 1.—An official dispatch from Tokio says that the Japanese consul at Gensan, Korea, dating June 30, reports as follows: "Early this morning six Russian torpedo boats entered the port, fired about 200 shots upon the settlement, sank a steamship and a sailing vessel, then rejoined their ships outside the harbor and disappeared. Two Koreans and two soldiers were slightly wounded. The damage done to buildings is insignificant." The ships sunk, according to a dispatch to the Central News from Tokio, were the steamer Koun, of 2,876 tons, and the little coasting vessel Seitsu.

Tokio, July 1.--A report received from Gen. Oku says that after the fighting at Telissu (Vafangow) on June 15 he buried 1,854 Russians. The trophies taken by the Japanese at this engagement consisted of fifteen guns, fortysix wagons, 958 rifles, and other war material.

Atlanta, July 1.—Bobby Walthour, champion bicycle rider of the world, was very seriously injured in a threecornered twenty-mile, motor-paced, cycle race here between Walthour,

Monroe and DeGuichard. Walthour was "pocketed" by the other two riders in the fourth mile and while going at a terrific speed, thrown against the railing, his body striking .two posts 3x6 inches with such force as to snap them in two, he being left hanging insensible over the railing. He has two ribs, an arm and a collar bone broken, and may be injured internally.


