Tuttle says that Sawalk marketed some ginseng at his place of business last Friday, and it is presumed that after leaving town he got off the train at Pokagon by mistake, and started to walk to Dowagiac. He is charged with having placed an abstruction on the track at a point about three miles this side of Dowagiac. Joseph Sawalk says he has learned at the local Michigan Central depot that his brother was seen there in a drunken condition.

The penalty of selling liquor to a red man is very severe, and Mr. Tuttle has written the Cass county authorities, asking them to bring the prisoner to Niles that he may point out the place or places where he got his drinks. The Michigan Central Railway company may also take a hand in the matter, as scores of lives were imperiled by the drunken Indian's alleged act. "An attempt was made Friday night to wreck the fast passenger train on the Michigan Central, which is due in this city at 6:55 on its way to Detroit. But for a freight train which went ahead of the passenger, the attempt would have been successful. It was made about three miles west of Dowagiac, and a drunken Indian was responsible.
