Ninety-nine samples of creamery butter were received for the Michigan educational scoring test held on October 27 and 28 at Detroit, Mich. The average score for butter was 93.7. Buchanan Creamery Co., of Buchanan received the highest score, 97. C. M. Churchill, of Hillards and Frank Janoski, of Wayland, were tied for second place with a score of 96.3. Mr. Sam Miles, manager of our local creamery is to be congratulated upon receiving the highest honor, as well as to his ability at butter making.

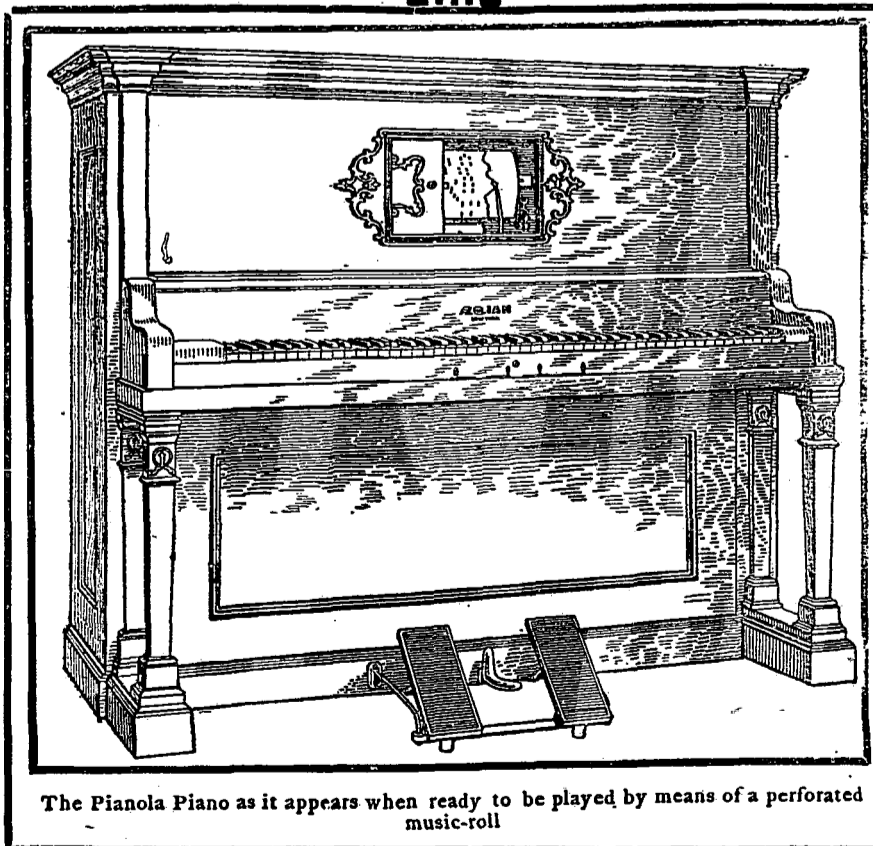

## AT BERRIEN SPRINGS

The Citizens are Much Pleased With Contractor Townsend

Berrien Springs, Nov 3.—Contractor George Townsend has won a place in the hearts of the citizens of this village by more than fulfilling the promises made by the McM. Smith road when they were given a franchise to run through the city on one of the principal streets. The railroad company agreed to leave the street in good condition so that teams could cross at even grade at any point. The citizens expected that they would simply fill the track level with the rails with dirt or some hard substance and fix the street at the side of the tracks in a similar manner. Here is where they are happily disappointed for the street is graded from curb to curb and put in as good a condition as it possibly could be without being paved. Beginning at the grove where the road crosses the St. Joseph river and up the hill to the heart of the village the street is now the best in the place. The same condition prevails through the entire village to the corporation limits. Where the street has been filled, the cross streets have also been filled and the approach is made easy, and where a cut has been made, the cross streets have been cut down to an even grade. The citizens are grateful to the railroad company for this improvement, which is one that the village would not have made for several years.

The bridge will probably be completed this week, the poles are set as far as Hinchman.

### State Items

Bert Love, porter at the Michigan Central station dining room, at Jackson, stabbed and seriously wounded his wife, a waitress in the dining room, when he met her on the street, last Friday. She received a bad cut in the neck, which may not prove fatal. The cause of his murderous assault is not clear, but it is thought to be jealousy. He was arrested.

Albert Earl, a prominent citizen of Battle Creek, has been missing since noon Thursday, the police suspecting suicide. A search of the woods and rivers was begun Friday by the police,

assisted by scores of Earl's neighbors. Earl, who is heavily interested in the United States Register company, has been somewhat despondent of late and his health had been bad. His family is prostrated by the shock of his disappearance.

Earl Hunt, of Grand Rapids, 22 years old, employed at a furniture factory, was crossing the Pere Marquette track, Friday, when he was run down by a freight engine, his head being crushed to an unrecognizable mass under the wheels. His brains were scattered along the track for 100 feet. A mother survives.

Burglars dynamited the safe in the postoffice at Ludington, Mich., Wednesday night and stole \$800 in cash and stamps, but overlooked \$1,000 more in cash that was of easy access. The burglars left without leaving any trace and it is supposed that it is the same gang that has recently cracked safes at Pentwater and other towns in western Michigan. The postoffice was left a complete wreck. The burglary was not discovered until Thursday morning.

While a company of glassblowers were preparing for their first performance in Woodmen hall at Eslie, last Thursday, a large gasoline lamp exploded, burning one man severely. In the excitement that followed the women of the company became frightened and one jumped to the ground, fourteen feet below. She received no serious injury.
