Letter From San Francisco

Dear Mother and Sister:

Well I suppose by this time you have received our telegram and learned that we are both safe and sound besides saving our home and Michael's shop. The day I sent the telegram, I also wrote a letter, but I have felt a little doubtful since about it, for there was no possible way of buying stamps, as everyone was mailing them unstamped, as I did mine, but I was sure that the telegram would reach you at any rate I suppose they collected, at your end for it, but it was beyond our power to send it otherwise.

Well mother and sister, I hope that neither of you, or your loved ones will never experience the ter,rible disaster that befell our city. It occurred just one week ago yesterday, April 18, at 5:13 p.m. I guess the greater part of the people were in a sound slumber, but it soon awakened all of us. It lasted for fully one minute, which seemed like five, but that wasn't all of our misery. It no sooner stoped shaking the city, than a terrible fire started, which swept away about two-thirds, or three quarters of our beautiful city. We have lost all of our main stores and buildings and there is not a theatre left in the whole city. It started on one of our middle streets

and burned in all four directions. It cleared away, the whole district which we call south of Market, North Beach, Hayes Valley. Chinatown, the Mission and Knot hill, also our main streets from beginning to end. It was a most pitiful sight to see the city burning, and to watch the poor people fleeing from their homes in every direction. More than half of

our buildings were destroyed by dynamite, so as to permit the fire from wiping out the entire city, but even then it burned steadily from a quarter past five Wednesday morning until about noon the following Saturday. The reason being that there was not a drop of water to be had. The earthquake caused a break in the water pipe. We have had no

running water since, no gas, no electric or telephone service, which is a great draw back ior everyone. For four days and nights we could not have a light of any kind in our houses. All those that are in tents had to make up their beds before dark, but for the last three or four nights we are permitted to burn candles uptil ten p. m. No one is allowed to cook induors except one bakery called, Young & Swam's and that is in order that we may have bread,

Michael has been tacking on shoes for emergency horses, but did not have a fire in the shop until yesterday. He had to procure a permit before having one. As far as I understand he is the only one yet that is allowed one, that is, the only horse shoer, Our city is under the marshall law, and there has been quite a lot of shooting and killing of those that disobeyed orders or attempted to do wrong.

The "Golden Gate Park" and nearly every vacant lot is occupied by those that lost their homes. They are dwelling in tents, furnished by the government. There are a number of places that one can go to for free supplies, but you have to stand in line and await your turn. The greater part of the United States has been and are very generous to our needful city, so there is no fear of anyone going hungry. In front of every home or tent there is a little camp fire so that we may do our cooking. Some of the people have moved there coal stoves out into the street, so that they may cook without danger. Nearly every house that remains has a couple of families living in it. We have my two sisters, brother-in law and his little boy with us. His home and place of business was blown up.

I am writing this letter by a candle light, and it is fluttering so that it is almost impossible for me to see, so kindly excuse all errors.

Now dears, I have related all that we have gone through since that awful morning, excepting to say that since then we have had two or three shocks, but we do not fear those for they are very light We only pray to God that the worst is over.

Mrs. Axford was eating dinner with her family and piece of beefsteak became lodged in her throat. Her son ran to the Whitfield home for assistance and Mrs. Whitfield responded. The victim was black in the face by that time, but Mrs. Whitfield opened the mouth and poked her finger down the throat until the beef was dislodged and dropped downward toward the stom ach. Mrs. Axford caught her breath and vows she will hereafter chew her food to a pulp before she attempts to swallow it.

During the heavy fog Thursday evening the steamer F. W. Hart the Gilchrist fleet in on the rocks at Mission point, Mackinac island. The boat was proceeding under check at the time of the accident, but struck with sufficient force to drive her bow out five feet. The bow is resting on a shelving ledge of rock, strewn with boulders, and the stern is in deep water. The forward compartments are full of water, and it is probable that at least 1,000 tons of the cargo will have to be lightered before the big boat can be floated. The Hart lies in a dangerous position, as she would be fully exposed to an east or southeast storm. The wrecking tug Favorite is now on her way to the wreck, and a lighter has been crder ed from Sault Ste Marie. The Hart has a cargo of iron ore and was bound from Superior to South Chicago.
