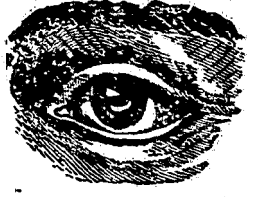

TURNING THEM OUT

County Jail is Being Emptied of its Many Prisoners

After one of the heaviest seasons in its history, the Berrien county jail is being rapidly emptied of its many prisoners. For weeks at a time it was filled to overflowing with prisoners of all classes and with criminals held on all conceivable charges, but of late these have been taken to Jackson, released or discharged and now that few prisoners are left are serving short terms for violation of local ordinances.

"Salvy" Dick, who is being held on the charge of larceny and who is a paroled convict is spending his time weaving small mats of silk. "Salvy" is an artist at this, more of an artist than he was as a common thief for the officers had no difficulty in capturing him. There are only a few prisoners who are awaiting trial in the circuit court.

SCHOOL FUND A GRAFT

Department of Education Finds Shortage and Misuse of Funds

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 20.—The Department of public instruction has invoked for the people's benefit the enactment of 1906 giving it authority to scrutinize accounts and records of school districts. In 35 cases coming to its attention, books have been examined and either a shortage or a misuse of public funds has been found.

It was found that two districts in Clinton county had used primary money for other purposes than for teacher's wages, which the law stipulates. In these districts a tax to meet the deficiency of the teachers' fund was required. In Otsego a defalcation of \$3000 was discovered and this was made good. In a number of cases treasurers had loaned the public funds and pocketed the interest. The department will continue the investigations and assist the school officers in straightening out their accounts.

The investigation into the matter of bonds was very fruitful, as in 1,500 districts treasurers had given no bonds whatever, and in 4,000 more the bonds were either valueless or insufficient. Thus it was found that treasurers in only about 1,700 of the 7,200 districts were complying with the law.

YOUNG COOK WILL LIVE

Lad Who Attempted to Commit Suicide Tuesday Recovering

Frank Cook, of Benton Harbor, the 17-year-old boy who attempted to take carbolic acid Tuesday, after he had been accused of breaking into Brammall's plumbing shop in an attempt to rob it of valuables, will recover from the effects of what little acid he succeeded in getting into his throat. Yesterday afternoon the boy

was very low, but last night he recovered enough to sit up and talk, although he has not entirely recovered his vocal powers.

Cook was heartbroken to know that the officers suspected him of the offense and as soon as they released him, pending a further investigation he attempted to swallow the acid, being saved from a suicide's grave by Mr. Brammall who had followed him.

The lad stated Tuesday night that as soon as he recovered he would leave Benton Harbor and start anew somewhere with a clean name and record. The boy has never had a fair chance in the world, being compelled by necessity to spend the greatest portion of his life on the streets, and it is unfortunate that suspicion was indirectly directed against him.

ENTERTAINED BY TEACHER

Rev. F. C. Watters Entertained the Members of His Class, Wednesday Evening

Fifteen members of the Berachah class were entertained by their teacher, Rev. F. C. Watters, Wednesday evening at the home of Miss Sadie Pangborn.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather, only a small portion of the class was present, and they all report a more than enjoyable evening. The time was pleasantly passed in games, repartees and music, both vocal and instrumental, after which refreshments were served by the host, the menu consisting of two kinds of fudge, stuffed dates, lemonade (flavored water), apples (nature's remedies) and vanilla wafers.

The party broke up in the wee hours of the morning and the young people vote Rev. Watters, a very able and royal entertainer.

LAST PENSIONER IS DEAD

Vermont Woman was Remnant of the Revolutionary War

Washington, Nov. 20.—There was great excitement in the pension office this week, when the news sped from division to division that the pension list of the Revolutionary war had been wiped out by the death of the only surviving widow of a soldier of that great struggle. The widow was Mrs. Esther Summer Damon of Plymouth Union, Vt., and she succumbed to senile debility at the age of 92 years. Nothing, probably, for years has occasioned so much of a stir in the pension office.

BABY CYCLONE HIT TWO TOWNS

Benton Harbor and St. Joseph in Path of Great Storm Wednesday

The wind gained the velocity of a cyclone in the vicinity of Benton Harbor Wednesday afternoon and the damage to property will run up into thousands of dollars in Berrien county. Benton Harbor and St. Joseph were fortunate to escape without any loss of life or personal danger.

At 8 p. m. the wind was blowing at 58 miles an hour and Lake Michigan was the roughest that was ever known at St. Joseph. A large number of citizens of the twin cities were gathered on the lake front to keep watch for the steamer Frontenac, but the wind drove them from their post.

More damage is reported in Benton Harbor than in St. Joseph. Captain James McDonald suffered the heaviest loss of any one person, by the complete destruction of his lumber sheds on South Pipestone street. His loss will be in the neighborhood of \$600, covered by insurance.

Electric wires were down all over the city and Superintendent Mason had electricians out at work all night to prevent damage to citizens. On Pipestone street one wire was down and was run into by a large number of people but all escaped without harm. Near the Hotel Phoenix another loose wire was suspended from a pole and emitted sparks of fire all through the night.

The telegraph companies suffered great damage by the breaking of their wires. At 8 p. m. the Western Union reported their last wire down and it was impossible to get a message over them. The Postal also suffered loss, but one wire was kept in working order. The telephone company operated their wires in the twin cities with difficulty. The long distance wires were out of commission and there was danger for a time that the city would be entirely without connection with the outside world.

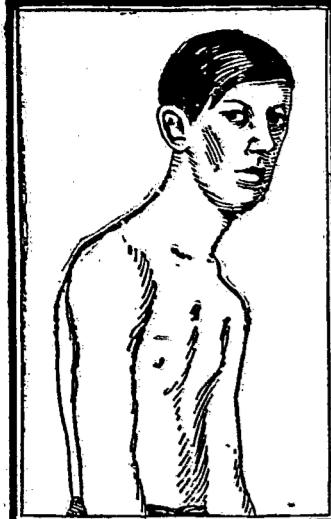

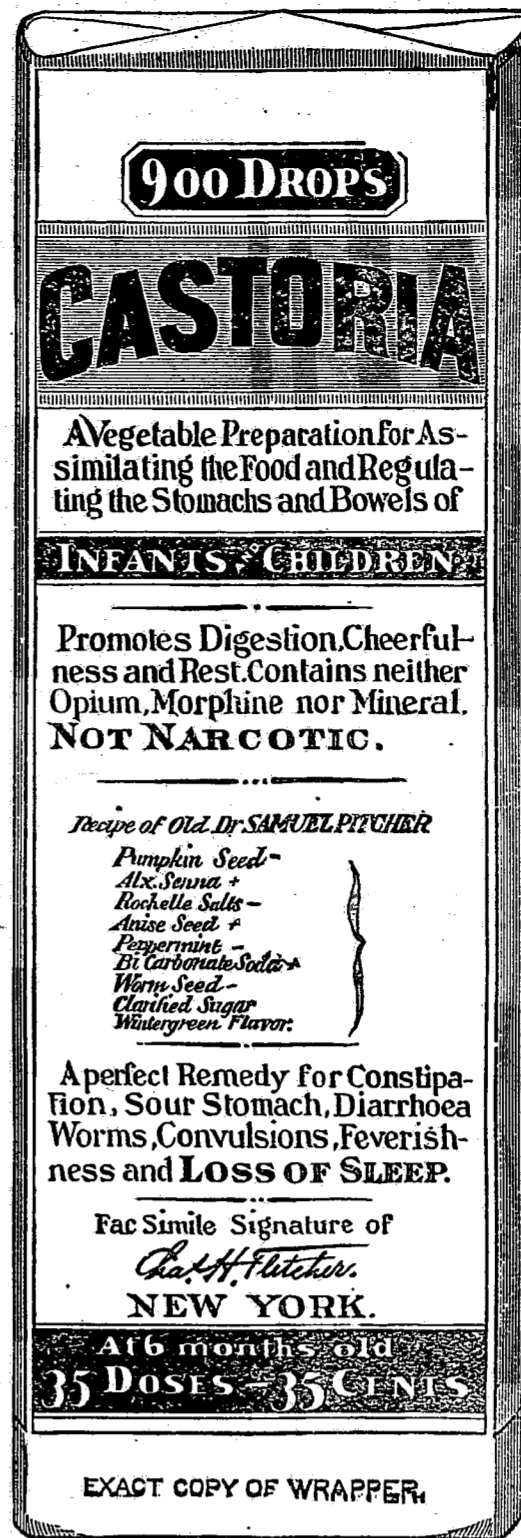
ORPHAN AND FRIENDLESS CHILDREN

Find Good Homes by the Aid of The Michigan Children's Home Society

The Society has outgrown its Receiving Home and Hospital at St. Joseph, and seeks to double its present capacity.

To this end the Society is trying to raise Ten Thousand Dollars for extension purposes.
