Memorial Day Program

The pictures above and to the left epitomize the observance of Memorial Day in Buchanan Monday, May 31.

5 Inches Of Rainfall Saves Crops From Threat Of Serious Drouth

Three days of rain and one day of summer during the past week did much to bring field crops, including winter wheat and recent corn plantings, out of the doldrums, according to farmers of the Buchanan area.

The heavy soaking of wheat resulting from favorable winter and mid-spring weather had seriously sapped the ground of moisture during the nearly four weeks of drouth in May. During that time very low averages of precipitation were reported, averaging about .2 of an inch here for the month. Then last Friday the entire area was blanketed with rain the reading by Floyd Fedore at the Buchanan Co-ops weather station being 1 inch. This was followed by .20 of an inch Friday. Rainfall over the weekend here totaled 1.25 inches. Precipitation on Tuesday at the Co-ops station was 2.5 Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, making a total of approximately 5 inches in a 5-day period.

With the possible exception of strawberries, generally estimated at about a half crop over the county, fruit reports the first of this week were generally optimistic in this area.

J. G. Boyle, who has a large cherry and plum orchard northwest of Buchanan, states that there are good prospects for about 75% of a crop in both cherry and plum acreages. Prospects in the Boyle apple orchard range from 40 to 50% at the present time, states Boyle. However the picture will not be clear until the June drop is completed and present estimates are tentative to an extent at least.

Glenn Kinney reports that the apple crop on his farm near the Mt. Tabor Grange hall on the upper Berrien Springs Road varies in prospects according to variety and time of blossoming. On the whole the prospects are quite satisfactory. His Jonathan, old-style Delicious and Golden Delicious are very well set, especially the latter. On the Golden Delicious trees from four to five of the normal five blossoms per cluster have developed into fruit, which means that half of the apples will have to be thinned by hand, unless the June drop or high winds chance to take care of the surplus. The center blossoms of the cluster of five comes into bloom first and usually produces the largest and most perfect apple, states Kinney. However, all the cluster may produce fine fruit under good conditions for their development.

The more modern Double Red Delicious and Staymens are not so heavily set in the Kinney orchard. On the Boyle farm this condition is reversed as far as the Delicious varieties are concerned, the Red Delicious having the heaviest set. However on the Boyle farm the old style Delicious plantings are 20 years old. Air draining in draws and hillsides also affect the amount of frost damage done, the frost killing being heaviest in the lower branches.

Police Arrest Man On Charge Of Family Desertion

The Buchanan police received word in April, 1953, that the sheriff's department of Manistigee were holding a warrant for desertion and non-support for Francis L. Baker, 23, of Buchanan, charging him with desertion and non-support of his family. The local police inquired at the former home of Baker here and found that he was living and working in Chicago. On Monday, May 31, the officers saw Baker driving through town. He was arrested and held here until the Manistigee sheriff arrived yesterday.

Pleads Not Guilty Of Driving While Drunk

While Patrolman George Albrecht was patrolling the north end of Buchanan Sunday, May 30, he saw a black Cadillac being driven in an erratic manner on Bluff street. He stopped the car and found the driver to be one Willie Gilmore of Buchanan. He was arrested for driving an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. He was arraigned Tuesday in the court of Justice Lamb, where he pleaded not guilty. He was released under his own bond of \$100, to appear in that court for a jury trial later.

Impressive Memorial Day Rites

Ray E. Conlon, Grand Rapids, past commander of the Michigan department of the American Legion, speaking to a crowd of some 1,000 persons gathered at Soldier Circle in Oak Ridge cemetery Monday morning to honor the city's war dead, told his audience that "We are observing this Memorial Day 1954 to pay tribute to those men and women who served their country so that we may live in freedom, because of an historical order given by General John A. Logan in 1863, designating May 30 as Memorial Day."

"It is a part of our national heritage," he said, "that on this 86th Memorial Day that we pay homage to the thousands of Americans who in the past few years gave their lives to preserve freedom in the world. Because of certain principles and the belief in the inalienable right of freedom for all peoples that our boys died on Bataan, Guadalcanal, Okinawa and other islands in the South Pacific and in the European countries. They were not fighting for more land or possessions, they believed that a country worth longing for was worth fighting for. In honoring our heroic dead today we have affectionate memories of these dead, for these men we must resolutely and determinedly carry the meaning of our flag to the four corners of the world. If we fail to do this, these men and women have died in vain. Let us also give tribute today to the Gold Star Mothers whose sons and daughters we are honoring."

In closing Mr. Conlon said, "Let each and every one of us assist in the American Legion's 'Back To God' program by attending the church of our choice and say kindly prayers for the safe-keeping of the souls of our honored dead and for the peace of our country."

Rev. W. Robert Palmer of the Church of Christ gave the invocation to open the service and Arthur Johnson introduced the speaker. Rev. Palmer gave the benediction. Just before the salute and taps, a large wreath was placed at the foot of the flagpole on Soldier Circle by the women's patriotic organizations, with Mrs. Olin Summerill of the Legion Auxiliary and Mrs. Dale Hanover of the Navy Mothers Club in charge.

The colorful parade to the cemetery was led by the American Legion colors and color guards. Participating were veterans, the school bands, National Guard, women's patriotic organizations, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts and Brownies. William Esker was the parade marshal and Dean Swann was chairman in charge of arrangements for the observance.

Lions Club Hears Roy Worden Talk On City Planning

Roy Worden of the architectural firm of Roy Worden & Associates spoke before the Buchanan Lions club Thursday evening on "City Planning."

Worden stated that Buchanan is situated in a 100-mile-wide zone of land, circling about half the world, across the United States and into Germany, in which the key heavy industries of the world are located. It includes the Chicago area, the great steel mills around the south end of Lake Michigan, the areas of Buchanan, Niles, South Bend and Elkhart (where many heavy industries are seated) and on through Detroit, the northern Ohio cities, Pittsburgh, Pa., the New York City area and the manufacturing cities of lower New England. Climate, water supply and other factors favor such development here.

Location in this area means opportunity for growth for any city which takes advantage of its opportunities, particularly if the city plans for the future.

City planning is no work for an amateur, he said. South Bend and towns of that size may employ city planners. Smaller localities as in Buchanan, may employ city planners from the University of Chicago and other sources at a cost of something like \$25 per day. These experts will act as consultants to local planning groups for one or any number of days per year that they are desired.

Worden stated that South Bend has a committee of 100 organized for city planning, with a budget of \$30,000. A professional city planner may be secured at from \$4,000 to \$6,000 per year, but a small city may formulate plans with the aid referred to above, as their organization is not so intricate as that of a larger city. A "master plan" for a city should include the community around the city and consider all possibilities of long range expansion, so that the growth will not be accidental.

Commencement

There will be one thing about the 1954 high school commencement this year that will be different from preceding commencements for many a long year — there will be plenty of room for all. Wednesday, June 9, 8 p.m.

Commencement will be held this year in the new high school gymnasium with a seating capacity of 1,700, as compared with a total capacity of 640 in the auditorium. In the past most of the seating capacity of the auditorium was reserved for the junior and senior classes and the families of the graduates.

Several features of the new arrangement are novel. For the first time in the history of local commencements the speaker and the senior class will face each other. The speaker will stand at the north end of the gym, about where the north-end free-throw circle is located. Behind him, seated on the gym floor in chairs, will be the school board and school administrative officials. In front of the speaker and toward the center of the gym floor the members of the senior class will be seated, facing north. In the rear of the seniors and also facing north will be the members of the junior class. This will complete the elements of the audience seated on chairs on the floor. The audience will be seated entirely on the bleachers. Over 1,000 bleachers are available to the south of the speaker, although the remaining bleachers could be extended in the event they are needed, up to a total seating of 1,700. The fine public address system installed by Electro-Voice will bring the commencement address and other parts of the program to all.

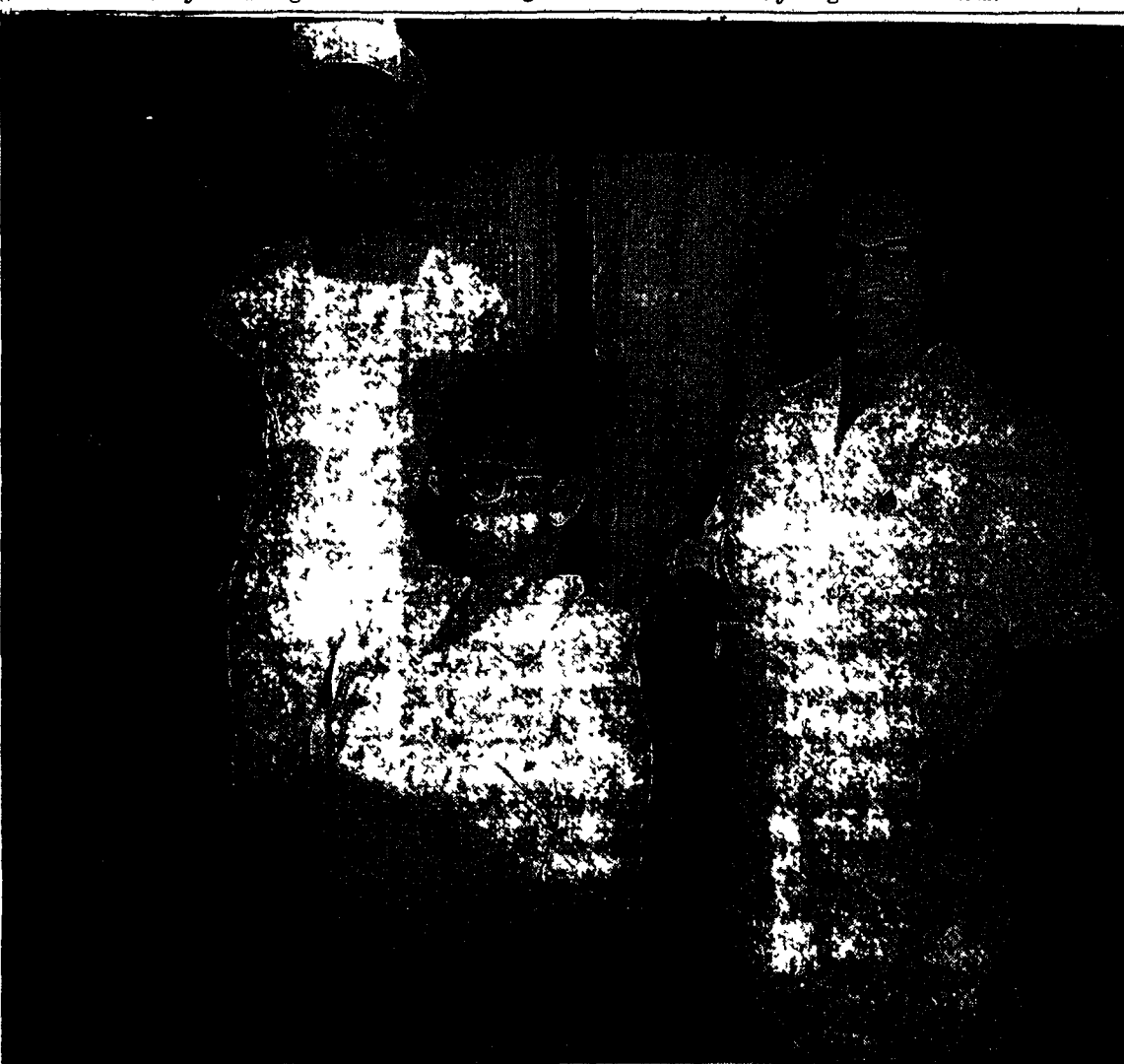
Reports that the 1954 class is unusually large is not borne out by the facts. Other large classes for the past seven years being as follows: 1947, 86; 1949, 83; 1951, 73; 1952, 75; 1953, 75; 1954, 76.

The speaker will be James Barclay Edmonson, Dean Emeritus of the School of Education of the University of Michigan. The theme of his address will be "Improving Human Relations." Dean Edmonson has had a distinguished record in the field of education, practically all of it in the secondary schools and universities of Michigan.

He received his A.B. degree from the University of Michigan in 1906, and his M.A. degree from the same school in 1910. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago in 1925.

His first teaching experience was in Michigan high schools. He taught first at Ionia in 1906-1907. He was high school principal in Hillsdale from 1907 to 1909 and at Benton Harbor in 1910-11. He entered the University of Michigan faculty as professor of secondary education in 1914, and continued in that position until 1927. He returned to the University of Michigan as Dean of the School of Education in 1929 and remained in that post until 1952. He has authored several textbooks on instruction and administration of schools. His most recent publication was "Civics For Youth," written in collaboration with Arthur Dondineau and Mildred Setton, in 1946.

The Story Of Desenberg's 1-Price Store

In this week's "Meet Your Merchant" feature the Record tells the story of the B. R. Desenberg & Bro. store, synonymous with the sale of men's clothing in Buchanan for 62 years. The story of the business affords an interesting blend of business and family loyalties.

The store is now owned by Atty. Bill Desenberg with Harold Smoke in active operation as manager. Shown in the picture is Manager Smoke against a background of gentlemen's haberdashery.

The B. R. Desenberg and Bro. store was opened April 21, 1892, by two brothers, Ben and Louis Desenberg. The two brothers had previously opened a drygoods store in the store room to the east, now occupied by the Betsy Ross Shop. They continued the operation of both stores.

Louis M. Desenberg, the father of Atty. Desenberg, came in 1909 from Los Angeles, Calif., where he had been employed in the Central Department Store. He bought into the partnership. At once he insisted on operation as a "one-price" store, with a plainly discernible price mark on every piece of goods governing the sales. This was an innovation in Buchanan as well as in the business country-wide. Bartering between merchant and customer had been universal until that time.

Ben Desenberg, the oldest brother, died in 1910. Louis and Sig continued in partnership for 24 years, until 1934, when the former's son, Atty. Bill Desenberg, opened a law office in Buchanan and also bought out the interest of Sig Desenberg in the men's clothing store. Louis M. Desenberg died Dec. 2, 1934, and his former partner, Sig, died only six weeks later.

The problem of continuing the business was discussed and a decision was made to continue it in some manner in the family name.

In 1936 Mrs. Louis Desenberg took over the management and continued in that capacity for 15 years, until about six months before her death in 1951. Since then Atty. Desenberg has continued the operation through managers. The Desenberg men's clothing store has become through its more than six decades a real institution in the business section of Buchanan, synonymous with dependable brand merchandise.

In 1946 Atty. Bill Desenberg streamlined the salesroom, with a new interior, and an attractive interior equipped with hand-picked modern furnishings. Something would be lacking from Buchanan-A zone if the name of Desenberg should be removed from 107 E. Front street.

Harold Smoke took over as manager on Jan. 15, 1953. He came to Buchanan in 1941, working as a smelter's helper in the foundry until he entered the army on Aug. 5, 1942. He served as a sergeant in the heavy automatic equipment division in both the Asiatic and European theatres until his discharge Nov. 13, 1945. He had worked at Clark's and in Electro-Voice until he undertook the management of Desenberg's.

Experimental Corn Plots On L. Babcock Farm

The plots for the southwestern Michigan Corn Field Day have been planted on the Leonard Babcock farm, two miles north of Gahen, on Cleveland avenue.

James P. Hoekzema, county agricultural agent, says that many different plots have been arranged. One series deals with tillage. On one plot the land was plowed and the corn was planted in the wheel marks of the tractor. On another a clod-buster was used but no additional tillage was given. On one plot the land was fitted twice to see what the effect of a high amount of fitting would be as compared with a minimum of tillage. Twelve rows were planted with a new machine that is so arranged that the corn can be planted in the field with no plowing being done at all.

During the past few years many questions have been asked about the rate of planting. Tests with different varieties are being made. Some of the corn was planted very thin, others very thick, with some

in between. Total yield as well as size of ears will be taken next fall to see which rate is the best. Fertilizing corn is gaining in importance. Tests with fertilizer plowed down, with other applied

to the surface of the soil and disked in, with fertilizer applied when the corn was planted, and with different amount and different analyses are all being tried. Tests will be made with controlling weeds with sprays and with sowing seed with nitrogen. Other plots have had seed corn treated to control diseases and insects. Curiousities were also planted. The Farm Crops, Soils and Agricultural Engineering departments of Michigan State College are cooperating with the local county extension service, with Mr. Babcock, and with local implement and fertilizer companies. Local farmers also helped in this project.

The vacation Bible school will be held in the church daily from June 14 to June 18 inclusive.

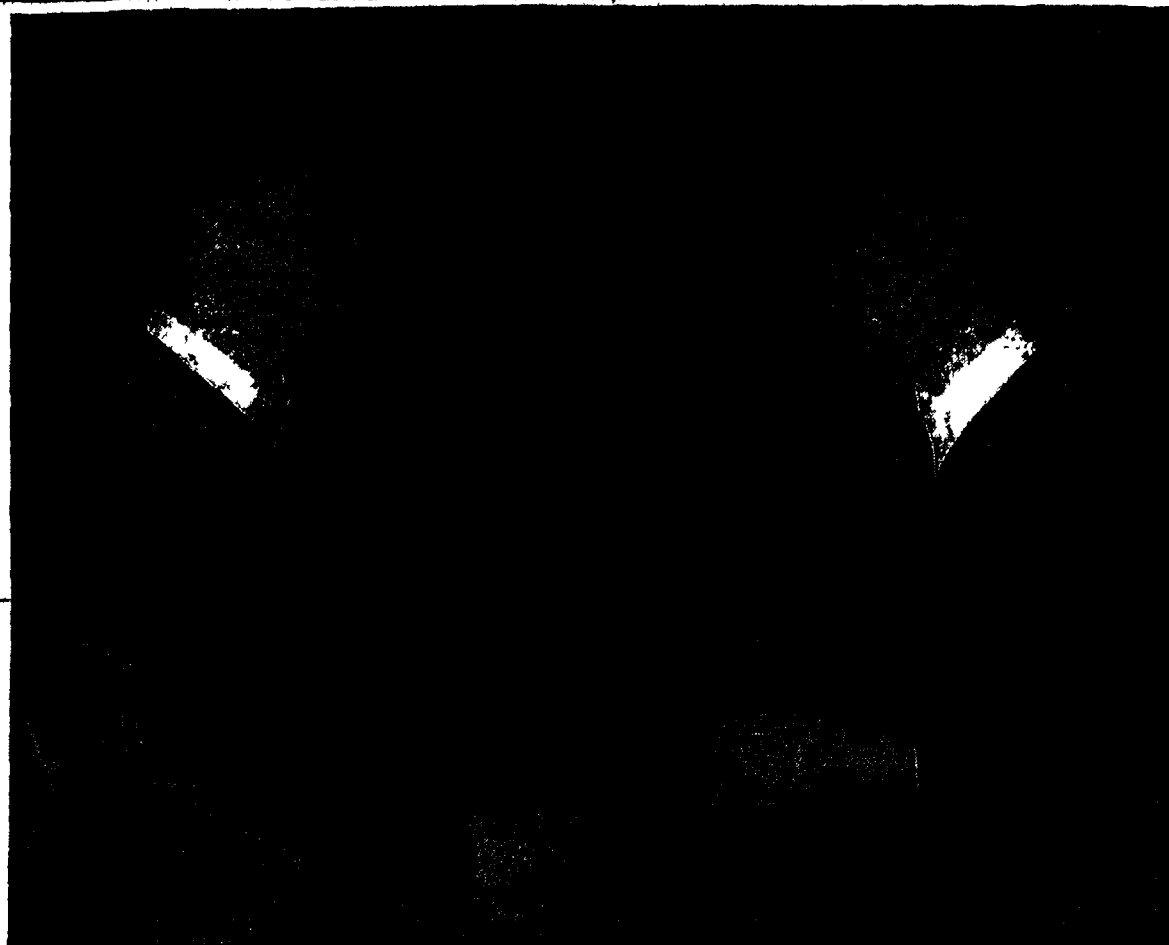

Buchanan To See 87 Pct. Eclipse Of Sun, June 30

Solar eclipse, official opening of summer and Mars' close approach to the earth — this is the lineup of stellar attractions for the month of June.

On June 30, northern Michigan will have an opportunity to ob-

serve that rare event, a total solar eclipse. The width of the eclipse's shadow is narrow and this time will cover the following Michigan cities: Ironwood, Bessemer, Wakefield, Ontonagon, Houghton, L'Anse, Calumet, Laurum and Eagle River. Because the path is about 70 miles wide, several other Michigan towns will be included. A partial eclipse may be observed from the Arctic Circle to Mexico and approximately 87% of the sun will be covered for southern Michigan viewers. The eclipse begins around sun-

rise, on the morning of Wednesday, June 30, with the middle of totality at 6:09 a.m. It will end a few minutes past 7 a.m., but the duration of the totality phase is only 1 minute and 22 seconds. Summer will officially arrive at 5:55 p.m. Monday, June 21. This will be our longest day, although probably not the warmest. Among other June stellar attractions will be the close approach of Mars to earth. Every two years, Mars lines up on the same side of the sun as the earth, and some years the distance between is shorter than others. On July 2 at 3 a.m., Mars will be a little less than 40 million miles away, although it can come as close as 35 million miles.

St. Lawrence Seaway To Have Big Effect On Michigan Cities

Plans to encourage Michigan cities and villages to study the effects of the St. Lawrence Seaway upon their economy are under way currently as a result of a report by John Beukema of Muskegon, chairman of the Michigan Economic Development Commission's Transportation Advisory Committee at the Commission's May meeting.

Mr. Beukema declared that the Seaway would eventually have as great an effect on Michigan's economy as the invention of the automobile. Among the principal benefits which Michigan might achieve would be the addition of many types of industries to the state's economy, which are now located on the Atlantic seaboard. It is estimated that 25 to 30 types could easily be added. "Since raw materials can be shipped cheaper by water than finished products by rail, many industries will locate here to be nearer their markets," Mr. Beukema said. "Because of the cheap transportation afforded by the Seaway, I believe Michigan will attract many more chemical companies." Also foreseen is a boom in Michigan shipbuilding because of the Seaway. Most of Michigan's future shipbuilding industry, however, would be restricted to smaller ships—principally small naval vessels.

The Economic Development Department is undertaking to assist Michigan towns in attracting industries which might result from the Seaway's completion.

Announces Support Price 1954 Corn

The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that minimum price support rates for 1954 corn in commercial and non-commercial corn producing areas will be based on \$1.62 per bushel which is 90% of the February 15 corn parity price.

The price support program for the 1954 crop will be carried out through Commodity Credit Corporation loans and purchase agreements. These will be available from time of harvest through May 31, 1955 in most areas and will mature on July 31, 1955.

In announcing the basis for support rates at this time, the USDA is giving producers an indication of corn support prices in advance of the planting season in accordance with the "forward pricing" provisions of the Agricultural Act of 1949.

To be eligible for corn support in the commercial producing area, producers must be in compliance with corn acreage allotments. The producer must plant within the acreage allotment for the farm to be eligible for price support.

Allotments for the 1954 corn crop in the commercial area were announced on January 20, on the basis of corn supply and consumption estimates. The allotment calls for a decrease of about 17.4% from the acreage planted in the commercial area in 1953.

A total of 29 counties, of which Berrien county is one, are included in the commercial corn-producing area in Michigan.

Malathion To Replace DDT As Killer Of Flies

The age-old battle against one of man's greatest enemies — the fly — will continue unabated this summer. The fight this time will put many of the newer weapons to the acid test.

Michigan State College scientists are almost sure that none of the weapons scheduled for trial will be as effective as DDT — at least against the chemical in one time the hydrogen bomb of the fly world. Flies have become their many generations since DDT's development.

Malathion, however, the nearest approach to DDT's former power, will be on the market in plentiful supply this spring and summer. This chemical won its spurs in tests at M.S.C. and other agricultural experiment stations across the country last summer.

It's used both as a bait and a spray. Dr. Herman L. King and Gordon Glynn, the entomologists who tested it at Michigan State, call Malathion the best insecticide for general use against flies today. Dairy farmers can use it with safety with the right care.

Another recent development,

Diazinon — also tested at M.S.C., has been cleared by the Federal Food and Drug Administration for use around sheep, horses and hogs but it hasn't been okayed for use in dairy barns.
