Bucks Whip Eastern Suburb

Thank goodness for brothers Buchanan, fans crowded into every available bleacher overflowing to the doorways and walls to watch the annual duel. The starting line up for the Bucks was Gerald Busby, Gary Jones, Walt Vanderbush, Ken Garrett and Mike Busby.

Ken Garrett center started the game off right by controlling the beginning tip, which gave Buchanan the chance to take an early 5-0 lead on Niles. Although the Bucks played a very poised game, it was to become a game of fouls, Garrett acquiring three in the first quarter. Coach Bill Wilson, seeing things weren't going as they should, began to substitute. Pulling out several members of the team he replaced them with Kevin Vanderbush and Greg Frazier, giving him time to talk to those pulled to adjust the offensive and defensive arrangements on the floor.

Buchanan found success in their defense by holding Niles outside and not letting them in close to the basket. The first quarter ended in favor of the Bucks 18-9. But a determined Niles attempted to make a comeback. Pressuring the calm Bucks led to two fast turnovers early in the second quarter. Recovering quickly to set up their offensive drive was no problem, just waiting for the opportune moment to break to the basket, seldom rushing themselves, for the assuring points. This was how the second period was played, hard, fast controlled action, giving Buchanan a 37-29 score over Niles at the half.

The third quarter started as any other, although it did not end up that way. It could almost have been called the quarter of turnovers, that would have explained it better. Things just were not going right for the Bucks as Niles had changed their defensive play during half time. The Vikings came out with a trap press which temporarily disturbed the Bucks. Most of the 12 turnovers committed by Buchanan were in this quarter, as Niles had the same trouble committing 13 over all.

But it was the fouls that turned the tide of the game. The Bucks, who had never been behind were tied with 137 to go, in the third quarter, 41-41 as the Vikings made their comeback. A foul and technical sent Walt Vanderbush to the line with three shots, all of which he made. Niles, having failed to score, had given the ball up to Buchanan when Vanderbush again was fouled, hitting both shots. Once more before Niles could score Vanderbush was fouled and again made both shots good, to set the Bucks back out in front 48-41. "This was the turning point of the game for us," said Coach Wilson.

Niles was never to come close to taking the lead again as the Bucks controlled the whole fourth quarter. A super effort both offensively and defensively gave Mike Busby three fast baskets to start the final period. Attempting another comeback the Vikings were foiled when Kevin Vanderbush forced several turnovers while team mates Ken Garrett and Mike Busby blocked shots. "Gerald Busby played an excellent game," commented Coach Wilson on the young Busby's performance. Nothing went wrong for the Bucks as they put it all together to finish the game with the score of 80-61. High point men were Walt Vanderbush with 22 points, Mike Busby and Ken Garrett with 20 and 18 points respectively. The next game is at River Valley Friday night at 6.30.

She can file for and get unemployment compensation and receive unexpected pin money for most of the following year.

In Buchanan, a teacher may leave because her personal situation requires her to leave town. She can file for and get unemployment compensation.

Who pays for all this? The poor employer keeps paying more and more to the state to keep his own required fund replenished. The taxpayer is confronted with the ever increasing costs of paying for salaries in their schools.

Employers in other states think you're kidding if you try and explain this latest unemployment compensation law in Michigan. There are those who were let out of their work who need financial assistance during their unemployment. There are those who are desperately trying to find work so they won't have to receive help from anybody.

But there are those who when forced to go through the motions of seeking employment will go to an interview in dirty tee shirts and with their hair in curlers simply to say they tried to get a job. There are those whose family income is in the higher brackets who shamelessly receive their unemployment checks.

Is it any wonder then that even the automobile companies locate new plants in other states? Can you blame a company for going to a place where the industrial climate for doing business is more favorable?

There should be a fair employment law for employers. At the moment in Michigan they are the victims of the biggest rip-off in the history of this nation.

Letters To The Editor

Letter to the Editor
This year the Buchanan High School will be evaluated by a team of teachers representing the North Central Association, which is the accrediting body for all high schools and colleges within its jurisdiction. This visitation occurs every seven years for our school.

The accreditation of any school is of major importance to the graduates of that school. Because of this, your teachers and administrators are spending many long hours, extra hours outside of the regular school day, preparing the reports that must be submitted before the visiting team comes in March, 1976. Of course, the purpose of any evaluation is basically to determine how well the educational process is meeting the needs of the particular community which the school serves. This would suggest, then, that every evaluation undertaken would have to have as a basis an understanding of the philosophy and objectives of that school and community, and so no two school visitations would be precisely identical.

The chairman of the visitation team that will visit us in March, met with the Steering Committee and the Principal of the high school a short time ago. He seemed pleased with the progress we had already made in preparing for the visitation, and he made several suggestions that were valuable as guidelines in putting together our report.

For the first time, in preparing for the visitation, the various departments of the high school will have the privilege of presenting their reports to a group of parents, board members, and administrators. It was felt that involving such a varied group would serve the purpose of not only informing this group of the conclusions of each departmental study, but might also bring out some positive suggestions that would be an asset to the report before presenting it in its final form.

The criteria for reporting have been established by a large group of distinguished educators and have been tested sufficiently so that the outcomes of the visitation itself serve as a valid report for either continuing or discontinuing the accreditation of a school.

The purpose of studying the various departmental reports is not to criticize the criteria or format of the reports, but rather to have an exchange of ideas and suggestions relative to the actual content of the report as written by the staff of the various departments.

These meetings are being held on Wednesday afternoon. The first one was held on November 19 and dealt with the basic philosophy and objectives of the school, the school and community, and the Art Department. It is needed to have three areas presented at each of the following meetings.

A word of thanks is due the parents and board personnel who have attended and are planning to attend these hearings. We believe this is an excellent way by which faculty and community can exchange ideas and can work together for the best interests of the young people we are here to serve.

Health Quackery -- Alive and Well
Health quackery did not ride off into the sunset with the last horse-drawn patent medicine wagon of the Old West. It is alive and flourishing here and now, its thousands of practitioners always on the alert for the unwary consumer.

Health quackery takes many forms, all of them based on misinformation about health. Quackery can often be recognized by certain common characteristics. The consumer who spots one of them should be wary.

-If the product or service being offered is a "secret remedy" not available from other sources or available for only a short period of time or to a select few.

-If the promoter claims he is being persecuted by medical or scientific experts who will not accept his wonderful discoveries and let mankind benefit from them.

-If the product is being sold door to door or promoted in lectures or sensational magazines, by a faith healer's group, with testimonials or case histories of cures or by a crusading organization of untrained laymen.

-If the product or service is claimed to cure or prevent a wide variety of unrelated ailments such as cancer, arthritis, bunions, "female complaints", sinus trouble, backache, etc.

-If the seller claims you'll see miraculous results overnight.

Common examples of quackery include cures for baldness, face peels that promise a beautiful new complexion, drugs that melt away fat without cutting down on calories or stepping up exercise, "miracle" health foods to supplement the American diet and gadgets to vibrate or make you sweat weight away, cure arthritis, prevent cancer or develop your bust.

Many mistaken health beliefs and practices - such as wearing a copper bracelet to ward off arthritis - may seem harmless in themselves, but all worthless remedies, treatments and gimmicks can be dangerous if they are used as a substitute for the care of a qualified physician.

To avoid the quicksand of health quackery, watch out for the warning signs. Take your questions about doubtful practices, products or devices to:

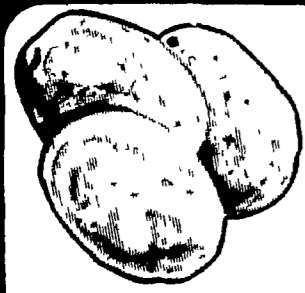

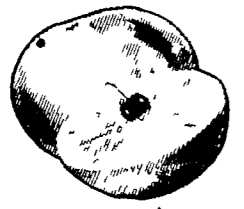

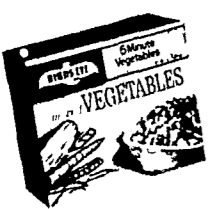

There will be prizes and a special drawing along with special reduced prices on many appliances during the grand opening sale which is designed as a prelude to the Christmas season.

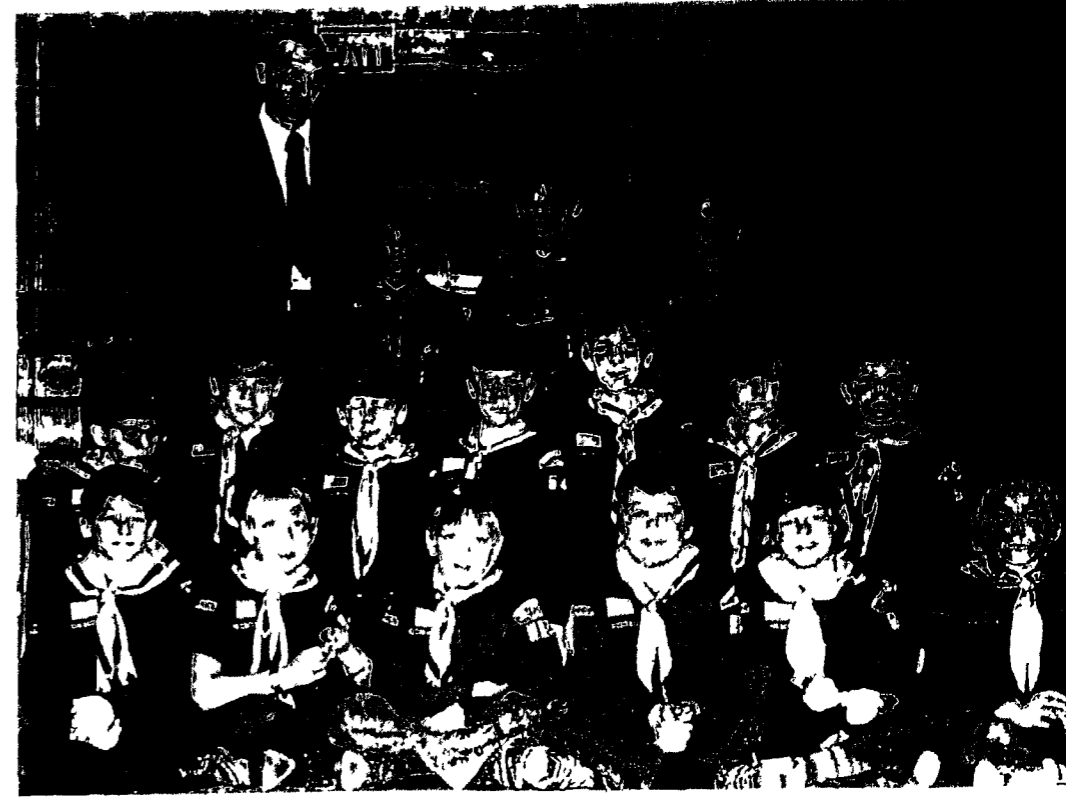

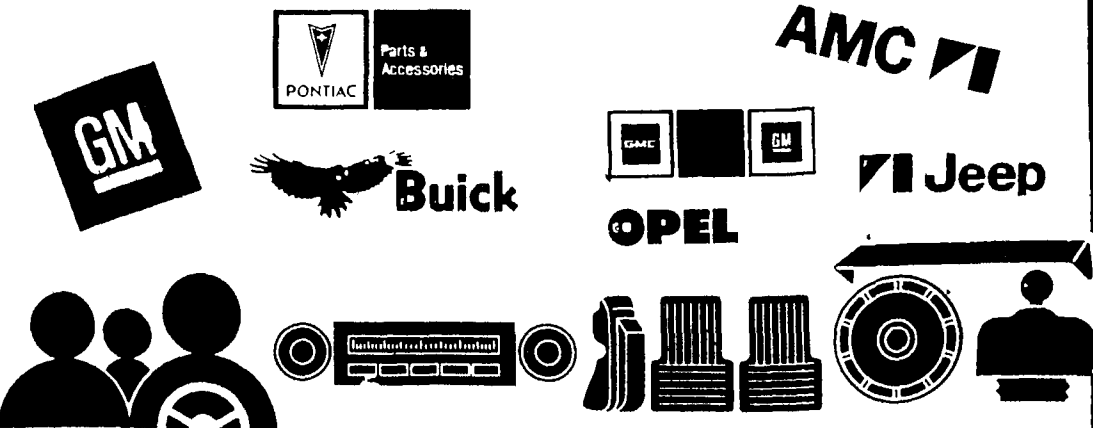

Board Of Education Minutes

The Board of Education, Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan, held its regular monthly meeting Monday, November 17, 1975 at the high school building. Members present: David Hanson, William Moon, Richard Rossow, Jeannette Mahan, Mary Beth Larson, Paul DeVos, and Robert Luke. Members absent: None.

The President hereby declares that all members are present. Also present: Administration, members of the press, and 24 visitors. President Hanson called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m., welcomed the visitors, and asked if there were questions from the audience. Dan Cronin, President of the Buchanan JC's, requested the Board's permission to work with the school in renovation of the public address system at Memorial Field, with financial assistance from the JC's. The Superintendent recommended that an evaluation be made of the sound system and someone chosen to work with the JC's. Three other visitors spoke in behalf of continuation of the present strings program, as did Janette Brakmsma, the strings instructor. The Superintendent indicated that a determination of available candidates is being made, which is difficult because of the mid-school year time. After determining if there are qualified candidates, a decision will be made as to whether the position will be filled in its entirety or if the string portion only will be filled. A third visitor-initiated item concerned the offering of school farm land, not used by the FFA, on a bid basis to the public. All visitor suggestions will be taken under advisement by the Board Minutes of the regular meeting held October 20, 1975, were approved as presented.

Correspondence was received from Miss Toni Robarda requesting waiver of graduation requirements. This was referred to the Superintendent for recommendation.

Motion by Member Rossow, seconded by Member Mahan, that bills in the amount of \$253,181.35 (of which \$174,286.82 is for two payrolls) be approved for payment. Unanimously carried.

Under Old Business, there was nothing new to report on Middle School Traffic Study, Rynearson Road Traffic Study, or written board policies. Regarding the Ottawa road repair item, there has been correspondence with the bonding company. The Activity Bus project, sponsored by the Community Education Advisory Board, was dropped for lack of support.

The Business Manager indicated that four bids had been received for the purchase of Howe School building. \$25,855 from Carl Koenigshof, \$13,028 from Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Stelter; \$21,750 from Maranatha Baptist Church; and \$10,500 from Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah Kline. The bids were opened by the Board Secretary at 7:30 p.m. November 10, 1975. Motion by Member DeVos, seconded by Member Moon, that the Board accept the bid of Carl Koenigshof in the amount of \$25,855 with closing within the 45 day period as established by prior resolution. AYES: Members Rossow, Larson, Hanson, Moon, DeVos, Luke and Mahan. NAYS: None. Resolution adopted unanimously.

Motion by Member Mahan, seconded by Member Rossow, that the resignation of Jeannette Brakmsma be accepted, effective November 30, 1975, as recommended by Superintendent Dougherty. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Rossow, seconded by Member Larson, that a leave of absence be granted Mrs. Carol Seif for one calendar year beginning December 20, 1975, and extending to the same date in 1976, contingent upon the stipulations as outlined in the Master Contract of the Buchanan Education Association and the availability of a position upon her return. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Larson, seconded by Member Mahan, that Lawrence Edward Framp-ton, a member of the 1973 senior class, having successfully completed graduation requirements, be certified for graduation and granted a Buchanan High School diploma. Unanimously carried.

This information is available for Board study, a special meeting will be called. Principal Richard Proud presented the annual Middle School report to the Board. Meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Buchanan Township

The Buchanan township board meeting turned into a relaxed bull session Monday. There was considerable discussion about the new ambulance authority to which the township will contribute. Dr. Jones said he was pleased at the speed and efficiency with which the municipalities got together and organized the authority.

A resignation from building inspector Robert Mitchell had been announced earlier, but there was no action on getting a successor.

Galen Weaver reported that he had been to a meeting of the county drain commission at which it had been announced that anybody disturbing land for leveling or grading will need a permit especially in connection with land near rivers, streams or lakes.

It was announced that the planning commission is going to have a public hearing on Wednesday, January 21 for the purpose of discussing land use and zoning in the township. It is planned for 7 p.m. at the township hall, but supervisor Ivan Price anticipates a large crowd at this meeting.

The board voted to spend some of its revenue sharing money for a flag pole and a flood light so that the flag could be flown at all times. They also voted to buy Christmas decorations for the interior of the hall.

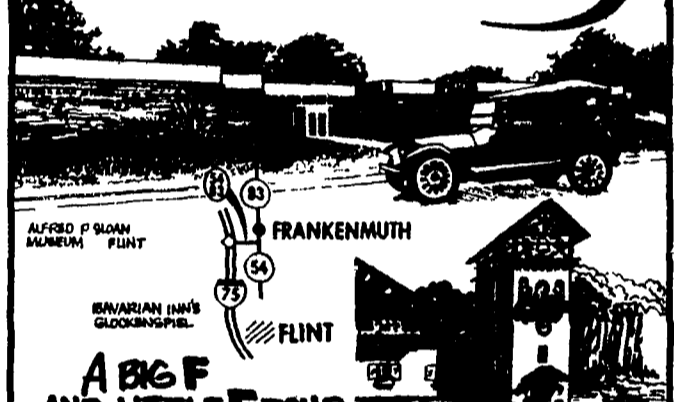

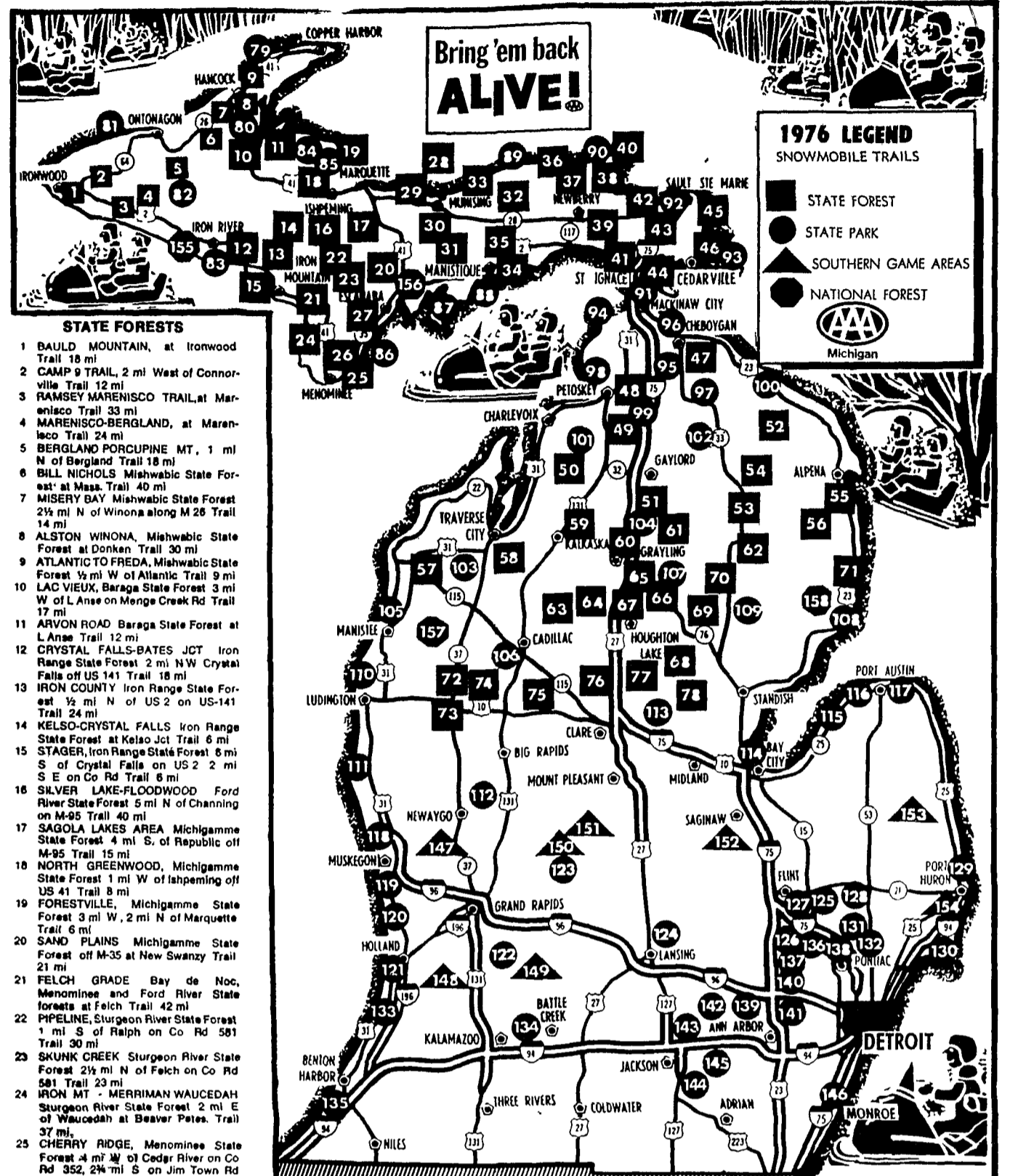

The Michigan Mirror

To the Ice!
 Good news for Michigan anglers who plan to set up shanties and fish through the ice this winter. The Department of Natural Resources scheduled early December for the first sales of 1976 fishing licenses. About 1.5 million licenses were to be in the hands of 2,800 local dealers by then - along with some 350,000 salmon and trout stamps. The licenses will cost a bit more this year: \$5.25 for residents, \$10.25 for nonresidents and \$5.25 for the salmon and trout stamp. But, says DNR official Robert D. Burke, "the fee increases - the first since 1968 - are needed to offset inflation and rising costs in order to maintain current program levels."

Room for Beauty
 Office buildings should be more than just office buildings, piles of brick and mortar. They need art and beauty too. So declared Gov. William Milliken as he addressed yet another special commission - this one dealing with "art in state buildings." "I believe that if ever there was a time when we needed things of the spirit, things that inspire people and help them cope with the problems that face them - art - it is right now," the governor said.

Birthdays Plates
 Some Michigan motorists are "getting with it" in the spirit of the Bicentennial. You'll see it on their license plates. One clever car owner ordered a 1976 "vanity" plate - the kind that bears a name or special message and costs \$25 more than a regular plate - with a comment from Paul Revere's time: 21FBYC (As in "—, two if by sea").

Others chose TPARTY, IALL76, 7DSIX and LXXVI. A spokesman from the Department of State, which handles license plates sales, reports some 317 car owners asked for special Bicentennial messages on their 1976 red-white-and-blue plates.

Nearly 15,000 personalized plates were ordered this year, compared to one-third that number last time around. Those orders are carefully screened to keep obscenities and vulgarities off the fronts and backs of vehicles on Michigan highways.

"There are only about half a dozen rejections per year," says the spokesman. "And about four of those are obscenities in foreign languages." The department uses language experts to check out requests for plates with messages in other tongues.

Folks who don't bother with personalized plates will get the more common version, with three letters and three numbers. But all the car owners in one community won't necessarily have the same - or even similar - letter combinations. That's because the department sends all plates starting with B, C, and D, for instance, to one area. But if plate sales offices in that area run out, they in charge simply call around to other areas to see who has extras. Thus a driver in Detroit might wind up with a plate beginning with an M, while most other Detroit area motorists have B, C, or D plates.

Romney for ?
 Does the name still hold a sort of "magic"? Could George Romney, former governor of Michigan, former president of American Motors, former Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, win election? A small batch of Michigan's state senators - six out of 38 - say yes. They're urging Romney to run for the GOP nomination for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Democrat Phil Hart.

"Dear George," says their letter. "The people of Michigan are still benefiting from the leadership you provided as governor. Your honesty and integrity are beyond reproach. Your overwhelming popularity with the Michigan electorate are beyond reproach."

Those senators signing the letter include Senate Minority Leader Robert W. Davis of Gaylord and Sens. Charles O. Zollar of Benton Harbor, John Toepp of Cadillac, Alvin DeGrow of Pigeon, Richard Allen of Alma and Robert Young of Saginaw. All, of course, are Republicans. At this point, however, the former governor indicates that he is not interested in making the race. His supporters show no sign of giving up their urging, and time will tell if they are successful.

A Plague of Frogs

We wish Congress could repeal "Murphy's Law" - that humorous, tongue-in-cheek rule which says, (1) nothing is as easy as it looks, (2) everything takes longer than you think, and (3) - if anything can go wrong, it will.

But then, expecting Congress to tackle Murphy's Law may be expecting too much, for it is in Congress where Murphy's Law seems most deeply entrenched.

Take the matter of inflation control. Since Congressional overspending is a prime cause of inflation, it would seem easy and reasonable for Congress to do something about it. Instead, Murphy's Law takes over. Here are some examples.

Because of inflation, the members of Congress raise their own salaries to solve that problem for them. Raising the size of the debt limit takes care of those increasing deficits. Instead of seeking new revenue, tax cuts become the political thing to do.

In observing all of this, John E. Sheehan, who returned to private industry last June after three and a half years as a member of the Federal Reserve Board, says the growing federal bureaucracy has become "like the third curse of Moses - a suffocating plague of frogs brought forth from out of where they belong, into the villages and very houses of the people..."

The Wall Street Journal reported recently that 19.3 percent of all employed Americans are government employees. Of course, many of the government's workers are essential to all of us - schoolteachers and policemen, to name just two groups. But there must be a limit to the growth of the government payroll. The basic question is one which a farmer or rancher can understand very easily. It's not how many hired hands would you like to have. Instead, it's how many hired hands can you afford.

Most federal employees are hard-working people whose efforts are useful and productive. This makes it somewhat difficult for Congress to limit their number - much less cut it back. But if the Senators and Representatives are ever going to deal effectively with the year-in, year-out growth in the federal budget, they'll have to think about dealing with Uncle Sam's payroll at the same time.
