It all began in early May.

It was then that Sidewalk Days committee Chairman Keith Welsh went before the City Commission to present plans for the annual event and to actively seek the Commission's approval in roping portions of streets off, of clearing out halves of streets for dancing, for clearing the city parking lot for carnival rides, and getting special permission for the placement of an organist on Front street.

On Saturday evening, the young people of the Youth Council committee will be sponsoring a dance on the high school tennis courts from 8:30 to 11:30 p.m. Playing for the special dance will be the "U.S. Mail", of Wabash, Ind. Admission for the affair is \$1.

The Youth Council It's Now or Never

A meeting of the Teen Age Youth Council supporters was held Tuesday night in the vocal music room of the high school. 28 teenagers felt enough interest to show up.

For the last two weeks, this reporter has been hearing such figures as 100 to 150 interested young people. In fact, there are supposedly so many young people interested that a splinter group is already forming, has looked at a place to rent and is all set to speed off into oblivion on its own.

It boils down to this, in this reporter's opinion — if Buchanan teenagers want the adult community to accept them as responsible citizens, they had best start showing some responsibility. If they want the community to be interested in their projects, then they had best engender enthusiasm and interest in their own ranks.

The time is NOW for this project to either get underway or be tucked away, labeled "Flash in the Pan".

We think it is more than that — we feel there is strong merit in a plan which young people propose, outline and carry out. But unless young people in our community want this and "get with it", our energies can be used to answer the daily demands made from other areas of community life.

A meeting for those "interested" teen-age citizens will be held Sunday, July 21, at 1 p.m. in the vocal music room of the high school to discuss and begin making solid plans for the reopening of the Youth Council. David Handley and Hayward Miller, interim co-chairmen, say that unless 150 young people attend the Sunday meeting, the project will be dropped.

We agree. As I said recently in this column, the time for "fritterin'" is past — the teen agers in our community had better get moving and get this worthwhile program off the ground to successful completion.

Fruit Crop Off As Harvesting Gets Underway

The production indicated for the seven major fruits for 1968 is three per cent below last year's, according to the Michigan Crop Reporting Service.

Michigan's fruit crop got off to an early start and most areas were a week or more ahead of normal by the end of April. Freezing temperatures plus some poor pollinating weather sharply cut the potential fruit production.

Much of the damage was done on the night of May 5, when temperatures from the mid-twenties down to the high teens were recorded in most fruit areas. Berrien county was among the hardest hit.

Tart cherries Michigan's tart cherry crop is much larger than the small crops of the last two years but still much smaller than average. The expected crop of 75,000 tons for 1968 would be 25,000 tons above the average for 1966 and 1967, but still nearly 29,000 tons below the 1962-66 average.

Tart cherry production for the Southwestern counties has been conservatively set by the Michigan Crop Reporting Service at 10,000 tons. This compares with a six year low of only 5,000 tons.

Crafts Bring Reward Of Sharing At Kathryn Park

While they learn the skill of a simple craft, children participating in the recreation program at Kathryn park this summer will be given an opportunity to know the pleasure that can be derived from sharing.

The park recreation program will be learning to use an uncomplicated basic loom for the making of woven squares—commonly used for pot holders— from colorful nylon loops.

It is planned that the children will sew a number of these 5"x5" squares together to form both rugs and blankets which can be used by convalescent patients in either a rest home or hospital.

Under the direction of park supervisor, Miss Beth Wessendorf and her assistant, Miss Rickie Post, children taking part in handicraft sessions of

the park recreation program will be learning to use an uncomplicated basic loom for the making of woven squares—commonly used for pot holders— from colorful nylon loops.

The children are currently working on the squares during the handicraft periods which are a feature of the afternoon sessions of the full day Kathryn park summer recreation program, which is offered for children daily Monday thru Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

According to the park supervisor, a favorite craft offered during the afternoon sessions is braiding, with one whole week having been devoted to this activity. "Everyone wants to

braided", she said.

Plastic lacing is used for the braiding, with children choosing to most often braid the lanyard, which is worn around the neck and from which can be attached a variety of ornaments including whistles, keys, watches or knives for camping.

Other braided items, which the children most popularly choose to make, are key chains, dog leashes, bracelets and belts.

During the morning sessions, in the relatively cool atmosphere of the heavily shaded park, children are given a period of free recreation. Available for use of the children, in attendance, are a number of pieces of permanent play equipment including slides, swings, monkey bars, teeter totter, maypole, sand box and similar equipment.

Children also have the use, at this time of both active and passive games. Active games offered include croquet, badminton and volleyball, and more passive games and activities include checkers, chess, pick-up sticks, dominoes, card games and paper and crayons for drawing.

A group of picnic tables is available for use for the more passive activities and games and materials are distributed from the craft building under the supervision of Miss Wessendorf and Miss Post, with children encouraged to return them to their proper places.

Miss Wessendorf, the supervisor, is a graduate of Northwestern Michigan Junior college. She will enter Western Michigan university at Kalamazoo this fall, where she will major in speech pathology and audiology.

100 tons in 1963 and the six year high of 57,500 tons in the southwestern counties in 1964.

The apples appear to have come through the May 5 freeze with the best prospects. The indicated apple crop of 555 million pounds, or 12 million bushels is the same as last year's production, but still below the five year average.

In 1966, total apple sales amounted to 14 million bushels, or 647 million pounds and sold at an average price of 390 cents per pound in 1967, quantity was down, price up with 11 million bushels sold at an average price of 506 cents per pound.

Other Fruits Peaches and pears were hardest hit by the May 5 freeze as most of these fruits are grown in the Berrien county area.

The first prune plum forecast of 10,000 tons is 33 per cent smaller than the 1967 crop.





Bertrand Accepts New Fire Truck Delivery

The Bertrand township fire department recently accepted delivery of a new \$26,000 fire truck, described by Bertrand Assistant Chief Wilmer Baker, as a "modern wonder". The Model 850 Ford truck chassis was fitted by the John Bean Body company at Tipton, Ind., and includes both high and low pumping capabilities. It is capable of pumping more than 750 gallons a minute at 800 pounds pressure and has an on-truck capacity of 500 gallons. It is equipped with 1,200 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and more than 400 feet of 1 1/2 inch booster hose. In addition to the regular equipment found on many trucks used for firefighting, the new Bertrand truck carries



"wet water," a heavier-than-regular-water solution which has extra penetration power, and is especially helpful when fighting fires in haystacks or homes where mattresses and overstuffed furniture are ablaze. Often smoldering furniture, apparently out on the surface, have rekindled blazes which required a second appearance by the fire department. "Wet water," said Bertrand Fire Chief Adam Kuntz, "will eliminate that possibility." The truck, equipped with automatic transmission, is also equipped with its own foam-making device for petroleum and electrical fires.

In the event of a power failure, the truck can provide its own 110 volt, AC power. It is equipped with smoke ejectors, resuscitation equipment, smoke masks and equipment regularly found on fire-fighting apparatus.

The arrival of the new truck, brings to four, the number of vehicles in the Bertrand Baker-town garage. Two other trucks

have pumping capabilities and the fourth, a van, will be used for fire police activities. The new truck replaces a vehicle which had seen more than 19 years of service with the department.



"Plants of the Prairie" Friday at Fernwood

Ray Schulenberg, curator of native plants at the Morton Arboretum, Lisle, Ill., will speak at Fernwood Friday night, July 19, at 8 p.m. on a subject of particular interest to conservation enthusiasts—"Plants of the Prairie."

A native of Falls City, Nebraska, Mr. Schulenberg has spent much of his time since 1963 in the restoration of a 25-acre plot at the Arboretum to a self-maintaining prairie, typical of the virgin areas which once covered much of the Midwest.

With the advance of cultivation, according to Schulenberg, species of weeds, mostly Eurasian in origin, have crowded out America's native prairie plants to the point where ecologists and conservationists fear they may become extinct. Schulenberg's work at the Arboretum, and similar projects at other preserves, are aimed at establishing small communities of true prairie for study and for seed propagation.

The tedious task involves a one-year soil preparation designed to remove existing weeds, collection of seeds from surviving prairie plants in the Chicago area, hothouse care of the seedlings, and the mixing and planting of grasses and non-grassy species to form a self-perpetuating community of weed-free plants. About 90 of the 140 species that once made up the true

prairies of this area are now established at the Arboretum with plants blooming from late April through October.

Many are suitable for incorporating into the man-centered landscape and Schulenberg will discuss some of these at Fernwood Friday night.

His lecture, set for 8 p.m., is the first of two arranged by Fernwood's native plant committee featuring plants for varied habitats. The second is set for Tuesday, Aug. 27, when Fred Case will discuss "Plants of the Bog and Marsh."

The native plant committee includes Mrs. Bruce Cook, chairman, Mrs. John Painell, Mrs. Samuel Creeden, Mrs. Thomas C. Clarke, Mrs. Richard Stoll, Mrs. Lloyd Krueger, all of Niles, and Mrs. Oia Nightingale, Lakeside.



AGRICULTURE in ACTION by M.L. Woolf Michigan Farm Bureau

Then As Now "Frontier Farmers Cleared the Way" — is the theme of a float planned by Chippewa county farmers for entry in summer long parades and celebrations to be part of the "Tricentennial" programs at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

This year the "Soo" celebrates its 300th birthday commemorating the arrival from Quebec in 1668 of Father Jacques Marquette, and the founding of the first permanent mission to the Ottawa Indian tribes.

The log cabins erected as part of the mission were the first substantial buildings in what was to become the state of Michigan and marked the founding of the city of Sault Ste. Marie.

At first there were no real farmers, although all lived close to the forest and soil. Food was plentiful from hunting and fishing but limited in variety — especially during the long, hard winter months. Vegetables other than occasional dried beans and peas were largely unknown. Grains were not grown and flour for bread and refined sugar were costly trade commodities usually in short supply.

But the woods were full of blueberries, currants, wild raspberries, gooseberries and "choke-cherries" (so named by the settlers because of their gagging bitterness if eaten when not fully ripe), and sugar could be had by boiling the sap of maple trees.

Fur trading helped maintain contacts with the outside and furs were valuable trade goods which bought the flour, guns and powder, axes, and other tools which provided protection from attack or forest fire. In

time gardens were a natural addition, and fresh corn and vegetables were welcomed to the menu.

Hunters became farmers almost by accident, first among the tree stumps and rocks and then in fully cleared fields, with the pioneer farmer equally handy with ax, plow or gun.

That's the scene members of the Chippewa county Farm Bureau are planning to depict on their Tricentennial float, reminding everyone how then, as now, agricultural production clears the way for roads, schools, shopping centers, leisure time for arts and science, and other attributes of civilization.

Before concluding, Miss Moyer modeled three dresses which were part of the wardrobe she purchased with her prize money.




