The signers of the Declaration of Independence were violent men. They were convinced of the justice of their cause, and they knew that the consequences of their action could be that they'd be hanged for treason.

They were courageous men. They were willing to go out on a limb for what they believed. They had no real hope that their poorly equipped armies could prevail against the well trained invaders. Yet they signed their names to a dangerous document.

Too few of us are willing to go out on a limb in support of what we believe. For fear of criticism, for dread of losing prestige or status, we fail to get involved. It is easy for us to criticize the establishment within the tight circle of our own friends, but we hope that somebody else will do the actual fighting of our battles.

Those men who led the colonies ninety nine years ago provided leadership. Such diverse personalities as Jefferson and Hamilton, Sam Adams and Patrick Henry, John Adams and John Hancock were able to compromise and adjust to each other's divergent views. When they finally agreed, they were able to present a united front to the colonies.

Presently, in a vacuum of leadership, the nation flounders under a Congress in which one party has a great majority but has no singleness of purpose. They are divided, confused, and ineffective and seem to have no idea how to lead us out of our present difficulties.

If ever we needed leadership it is now. If ever we needed violent men who were able to put personal gain and political ambition second to the need of the country it is in 1975. We need men who have the courage to stick their necks out, men who will get involved in battling for what they think is right.

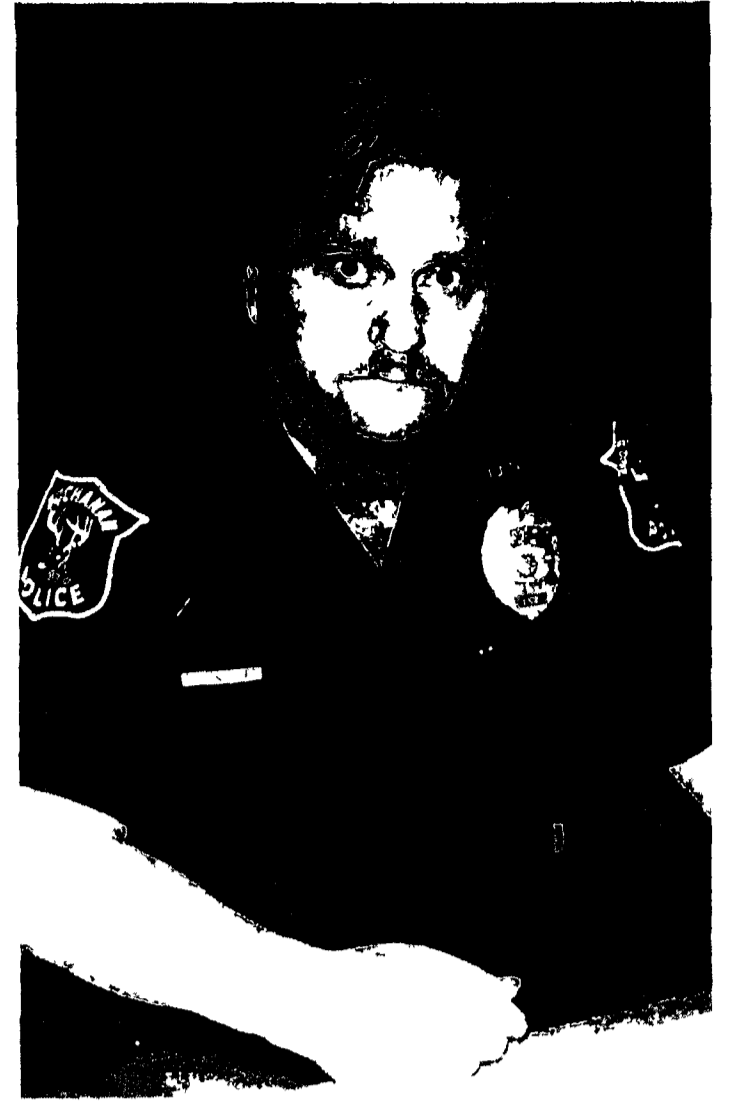
Dr. Roti Roti Given Grant

Mr and Mrs Don Roti Roti have returned from spending a week visiting their son and his wife, the Joseph Roti Rotis in Utah. While there they were shown by friends an article published in May in the Salt Lake Tribune telling of a grant their son had received.

Dr. Roti Roti, research instructor in the Department of Radiology at the University of Utah, received a \$105,594 grant to study biochemical mechanisms that mammalian cells use to repair radiation damage. The grant came from the National Cancer Institute.

His research focuses on the study of chromosomal proteins that may play an important role in gene expression and the cell's progress through the division cycle. The article quoted Dr. Roti Roti as saying, "radiation of cells is known to delay the cellular progress through division, but we don't know how this occurs."

A graduate of Buchanan High School, he graduated from Michigan Technological University, studied a year at Vanderbilt University and four years at the University of Rochester where he earned his Ph.D. in biophysics. He was at the University of Florida at Gainesville for two years and is now in his second year at Utah. Along the way his wife Linda has also earned her Ph.D. in biophysics.

He's been with the Buchanan police force since 1952, serving 11 years with the Berrien Springs department and returning here in 1969. He and his wife Geraldine have three sons and three daughters.

HERE ARE SOME RECOMMENDATIONS, FOR HIGHWAY EXERCISES, FOR A SAFER 4TH

Here are some "sitting" calisthenics designed for the driver.

1. WIGGLE YOUR TOES. Seat-pressure blocks circulation. Wiggle your toes every 15 minutes. This flexes the leg muscles, restoring the blood flow.
2. GRIP THE WHEEL. Grip it until the knuckles whiten, then let up. Repeat 10 times every 15 minutes.
3. MOVE YOUR EYES. Since you can't stop looking at the road, you accomplish this by moving your head. Starting with your chin at 6 o'clock move it around clockwise, then counter-clockwise.
4. PIVOT YOUR HEAD. Move your head to the extreme left and right, keeping the eyes on the road.
5. BREATHE DEEPLY. Take a deep breath and expel it. Repeat six times. Deep-breathing revitalizes your senses.
6. ENGAGE IN SEAT ACTIVITY. After six deep-breathing exercises, change the pace. Do something - anything. Remove each hand from the wheel in turn, and flex it.
7. IF ALONE. Talk to yourself, or sing.
8. CHANGE SEAT POSITIONS. If you've been driving well back in the seat, move forward for awhile, then back to your original position. Move slightly to the right and left, then forward.

The Board of Education Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan, held its regular monthly meeting Monday, June 16, 1975, at the High School building. Members present: David Hanson, William Moon, Richard Beistle, Jeanette Mahan and Richard Rossow. Absent: Vernon Lubben and Gerald Moulds. Also present: Newly-elected Board Members, Mary Beth Larson and Paul DeVos, Superintendent Dougherty, members of the press and six guests.

President Hanson called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. and appointed Member Moon as Acting Treasurer for the evening in the absence of Treasurer Lubben.

Minutes of the official Board meeting held May 19, 1975, were approved as presented, minutes of the special Board meeting held May 23, 1975, were approved with the addition of the total ruling on graduation requirements.

The Secretary read a letter of resignation from Board Member Moulds effective June 30, 1975. Supt. Dougherty indicated that an appointment must be made within 20 days, according to State Law, which will necessitate a special meeting of the Board. 

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
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

These calls will then be processed through the Berrien County Sheriff's Department and Galien Fire Chief Robert Klingerman anticipates results will be quicker and more firemen will be reached.

If an emergency caller uses the old number by mistake after July 15, a recording will give the new number. However, the department is making a tremendous effort to publicize the change through the media and the distribution of easily visible stickers to place on or near phones. The firemen are out canvassing the area of the village and township during their free times these days.

The plectrons now on hand are distributed among seven key firemen who are always available for response, they in turn have several calls to make, alerting the department within minutes. The department has a good sized roster with the firemen divided into night and day shifts for quick accessibility.

In addition to Chief Klingerman, who is in his second year as chief, having served four years

as assistant chief, the leaders include Phil Germdier, assistant chief, Robert Roundy, captain, and Randy VanLue and James Hoffman, both lieutenants. Others on the roster are Terry Boyle, Ron Carpenter, Lloyd Cowles, Bob Dubois, Bob Huss, Denny Geik, Robert Klingerman, Bobby Lozmack, Mike Mav, Allen Trapp, Jim Trapp training officer, Ellis Shepherdson, dispatcher, Dean Shepherdson, Richard Schrumpt, Mike Raymond, Paul Warner, Jack Willard, a new man Mike Cantrell who is still on the honorary list for another thirty days of his trial period and Don Kanous, a semi-retired member with many years of service who is now an honorary member.

The department had 19 fire calls in 1974 and has had 13 to date this year - none however serious as several that plagued the Galien firemen a few years ago.

The men also look forward to putting another piece of apparatus into use about the same time the new communication system is adopted. A newly acquired 1800 gallon tanker will take its place with the existing two pumpers and renovated arm tanker.

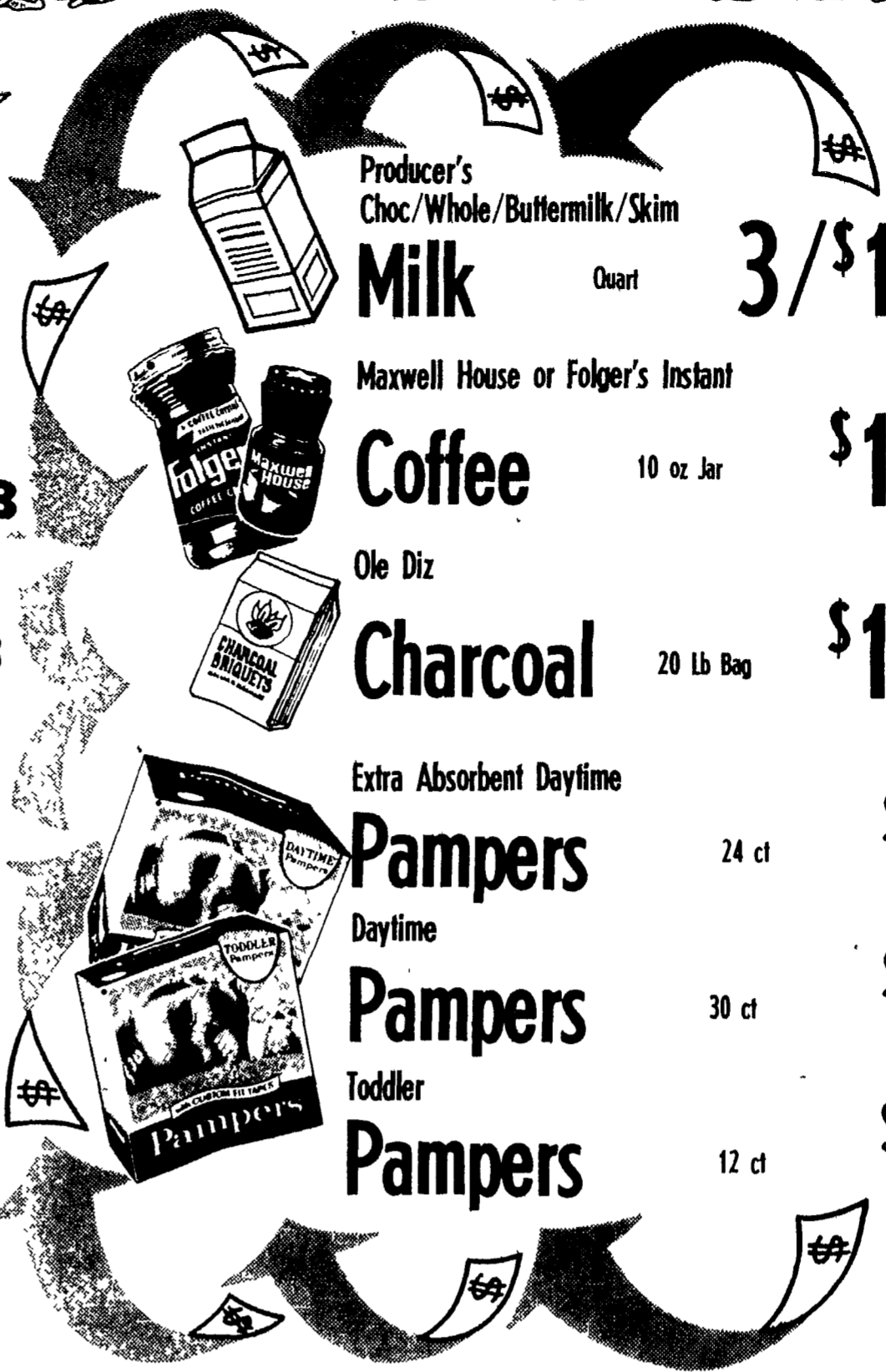
