Gordon Smith, only four-year member of the Buck first team, was named on the honorable mention list. He was an outstanding player during all four years.

Other honors accorded to members of Big Four teams were Nate Duncan of St. Joseph, third all-state team, Jim Scott of Niles on honorable mention list. Congratulations go to all these boys and also to the local Coach, Ray Steffn, for his very fine work in producing the 1953-54 team, which had a record of 15 victories and only five losses. They lost one in contests with Niles and New Carlisle, lost two to the phenomenal South Bend St. Joseph team, and finally to Plainwell in the regional. They defeated St. Joseph, Dowagiac and Berrien Springs twice, won once from South Haven, Watervliet, Three Rivers, Vicksburg and East Grand Rapids.

Officially Declared Missing In Action On Feb. 15, 1951

Cpl. Jack David Howe, 21, husband of Mrs. LaVerne Howe, 125 W. Chicago street, who was reported missing in action in Korea on Feb. 15, 1951, has been officially presumed dead by the War Department.

Cpl. Howe was serving with the 2nd Division of the infantry when declared missing. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Howe, Range Lake Road, and was born Dec. 13, 1929. He attended North Troy high school and on June 10, 1950 was married to LaVerne Swann. He served one year in the army and as a reservist was recalled to duty Oct. 13, 1950.

Besides the widow and parents he is survived by a daughter, Deborah, age 3, four brothers, Robert, with the army in Korea, Raymond, with the Air Force, and Ronald and Gordon at home, four sisters, Mrs. Hilda Leidy of Buchanan, Mrs. Shirley Dewey of Linda Vista, Calif., and Linda and Jenny at home.

Buchanan Steel Gets Award For Safety Practice

A year-long record of excellence in safety practices was rewarded today with the presentation of the Drop Forging Association's Certificate of Award for Safety to the Buchanan Steel Products Corporation. Elmer W. Cress, president, received the award which was given by Raymond M. Seabury, secretary-treasurer of the Drop Forging Association with headquarters in Cleveland, O.

One of the more hazardous industries, a forging business must be extremely safety conscious to guard against ever-present dangers in hot-working steel. Many types of occupations are involved, including die making, trimming, machine shop work, forging with steam and board drop hammers, heat treating, and maintenance. Workers in each department are subject to many hazards. A careless move or unsafe practice could result in severe burns or maiming accidents. This achievement in safety for 1953 is a noteworthy accomplishment as only 31% of the approximately 130 plants in the industry received such awards.

Buchanan Co-Ops Holds Its Annual Members Meeting

Michigan Elevator Exchange Representatives Are The Speakers

Five hundred stockholders of the Buchanan Co-Ops, Inc., and friends, attended the annual meeting of the organization Wednesday afternoon in the high school auditorium.

President Jesse G. Boyle presided, and A. Glenn Haslett and Clarence Ehninger were re-elected to the board of directors. In his annual report Manager Robert Koenigshof stated that although the dollar volume of business during 1953 was down, it exceeded \$1,500,000. The 4% interest dividend paid on outstanding stock in 1953 totaled \$15,000. He announced that there was an increase of 25% in the number of bushels of grain handled by the corporation since the new grain elevator was put in operation 8 months ago, over the corresponding period of 1952.

They gave the history of the exchange, and told of plans being made to build a terminal elevator in Battle Creek. Gambles Get First Shipment Of Fish-Button Outboards

The first shipment of a push-button outboard motor, a 25 h.p. model equipped with built-in electric starter, has been received in Buchanan by Sullivan Brothers, and may be viewed at the local Gamble store.

With such a motor, the local dealer explained, an outboard boat can be operated fully from the driver's seat in the same manner as the family car. Starter and choke are operated by push-buttons mounted in the dashboard panel and the outboard, the Sea Horse 25 produced by Johnson Motors, is equipped with all fittings for steering wheel and throttle-and-shift control units.

The new electric-starting outboard, Sullivan Brothers said, retains the ready-pull hand start, or intact for optional use. He said the Johnson 25 also will continue to be available in the standard, non-electric version.

Buchanan Lags Under Quota In Red Cross Drive

The Red Cross board members were host to the city and rural fund campaign chairmen at 3:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon, March 21, at the Youth Memorial on the Youth Fair grounds, near Berrien Springs. One hundred and fifty were in attendance.

Richard Peters, campaign chairman, presided at the meeting and the reports from all areas were given.

Coffee and tea were served Mrs. F. W. Farquhar of Hagar and Mrs. Robert Holt of Niles, poured Refreshments were in charge of the Canteen Corps, Mrs. Ralph Ashley, chairman, and Mrs. Rex Wynkoop, co-chairman.

The only communities which had reached their quotas at that time were Niles, Niles township (north), Coloma, Hagar township, Lake township, Three Oaks, and Watervliet. The city of Niles achieved its quota by simply writing a check for the \$8,000 allotment from their one-drive United Fund Buchanan, with a quota of \$2,183, had collected \$1,735 at that date.

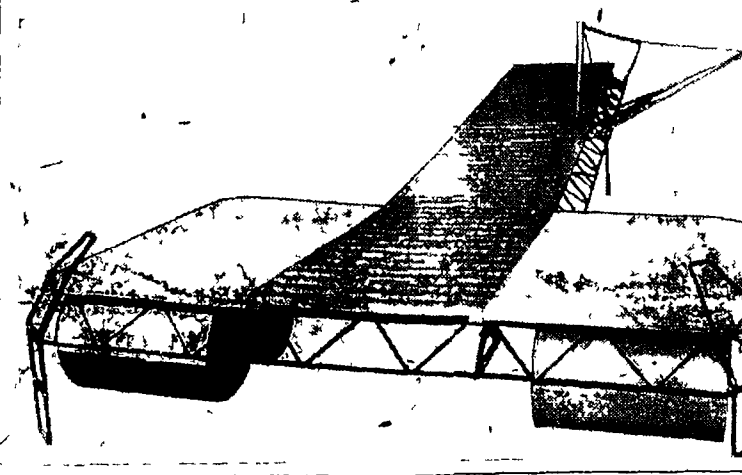

Features Start Red Cross Water Safety Program

In the picture to the left you see three objects, one man-made and two very much animated. The man-made object is the raft engineered by the Bal-Craft organization at 130 Main street and made just down the street from the Record on Days avenue by the Buchanan Machine Shop. State Representative Don R. Pears (R-Buchanan) will appear on "The Lawmakers" program over WKQO-TV (Kalamazoo) next Monday, March 29. The program is telecast from 5:30-5:40 p.m. and is directed by Dr. Willis Dunbar, station advisor on Public Affairs.

Rep. Pears, who is chairman of the Michigan House of Representatives Committee on State Prisons, will discuss matters pertaining to prisons and the proposed new penal institution expected to be built during the next year.

At the regular meeting of the city commission Monday evening, that body agreed tentatively on a 1954-55 levy of 14.7 mills, subject to a public hearing to be held on May 10. If finally agreed on, this levy will be a 2.3 mill reduction from the 17-mill city rate for the year now ending.

The 17-mill rate had been set last year to discharge \$20,000 remaining city indebtedness and to further build up an emergency fund. The actual budget figure tentatively arrived at is \$221,945, compared with a budget of \$227,464 for 1953-54. The budget figure is based on anticipation of 99% tax collections and on an optimistic anticipation of city income from other than property tax sources.

The reduction was made possible by good management, extending from careful operation by the city commission down through all city departments, all of which conscientiously heaved to the line in keeping their costs within departmental budget estimates.

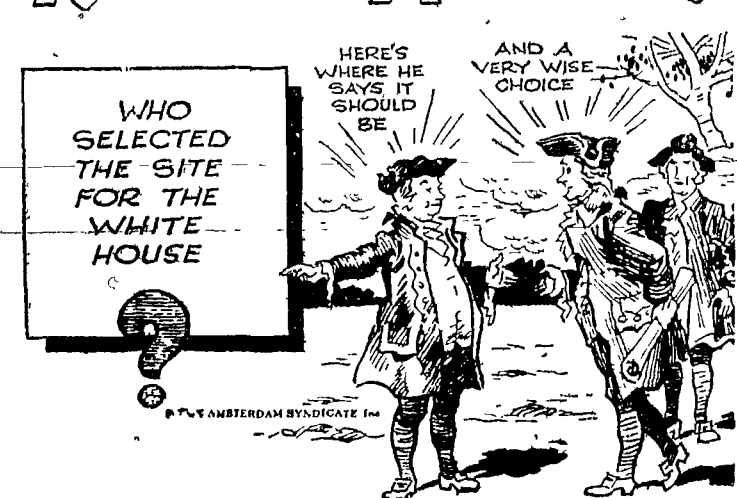

Teen-Agers Ask Stiff Codes For Driving Safety

Buchanan Youth Take Part In State-Wide Move To Promote Road Safety

At the state-wide Michigan Youth Safety Conference held recently at Lansing, with Janet Sexton and Charles Nichols as representatives of Buchanan high school, the gist of the resolutions passed by seven groups of the 175 young people attending were as follows:

Group I—"What Makes A Good Driver?"

A good driver concentrates on driving, maintains good driver attitudes, manners and habits, governed by the spirit of the "Golden Rule." Youth should be taught to keep their cars and emotions under control at the same time. To prevent hot-rod "drag races" by young people on the highways such contests should be held off the highways on measured strips, in co-operation with local authorities and on the honor system. A drag race is a contest to see which driver can get off the fastest and attain the highest acceleration in low, second, and high gear for a measured distance. On the authorized measured strips such spaces as unused parts of airfields, the drivers will race against time instead of the dangerous practice of racing against each other on the highways.

Teen-agers should have expert instruction on how and when to drive at high speed.

Group II—"Driver Education"

Courses in auto driving should be given and the minimum standards should be 30 periods of classroom work and 6 hours behind the wheel, as defined by the National Conference on Driver Education held at Michigan State College. When included in high schools, credit should be given on the same basis with academic

subjects. Commercial driving schools should be licensed and regulated by a state agency. A "violators school" should be established in every community. In the public school an extensive traffic safety program should be taught in the elementary grades.

Group III—"Traffic Law Enforcement"

Officers of the law should have more extensive training in driving for the sake of their own efficiency and to promote greater public respect. This training should be uniform, with definite universal standards.

Students Councils should be encouraged to promote better attitudes toward law enforcement and enforcing agencies by the formation of council committees, student courts, or other safety organizations. All persons 16 years of age and older having an unlimited license should be tried in the same court of justice for violation of traffic laws.

Group IV—"Traffic Legislation"

The New York law on chemical tests for intoxication should be adopted in Michigan, results to be admissible in evidence, with loss of driving privileges for those who refuse to submit to such tests.

Present laws on use of restricted driver licenses for 14 to 16-year-olds should be more strictly interpreted and issued only for proven necessity. Traffic laws enforcement and court procedures should be uniform in Michigan. Appropriations should be made for more traffic patrol officers. The Indiana traffic code for school buses should be adopted in Michigan.

Group V—"Family Car and Family Attitudes"

Driving instructors should invite parents to attend sessions of youth driver education. The instructors should keep parents informed of their children's progress. Parents should be encouraged in active interest both during the courses and afterwards.

More stress should be placed by all driver education agencies on the legal responsibility of the teen-ager toward parents, as well as the responsibilities parents

assume for the teen-agers.
Group VI—"Driver Licensing"
Pre-dated legislation should be enacted requiring every Michigan high school to provide driver training, and to require each applicant for an original Michigan driver license should have successfully completed an accredited driver training course. (To be passed in 1955, to become effective in 1957.)

Group VII—"Problem Drivers"

Both licensing of new drivers and examination for renewals should be more rigid and complete, and license examiners more serious in their attitudes. The youth attending the conference should return to their schools and help set up an organization to promote relationships between police and young drivers and to discuss problems concerning school and drivers.

They should promote "Economy Runs" and "Roadies" should be set up on a competitive inter-school basis with competitors selected on the basis of driving skill alone.

Reckless and irresponsible driving should be made unpopular through discouragement of unsafe driving attitudes and encouraging of safe driving attitudes.

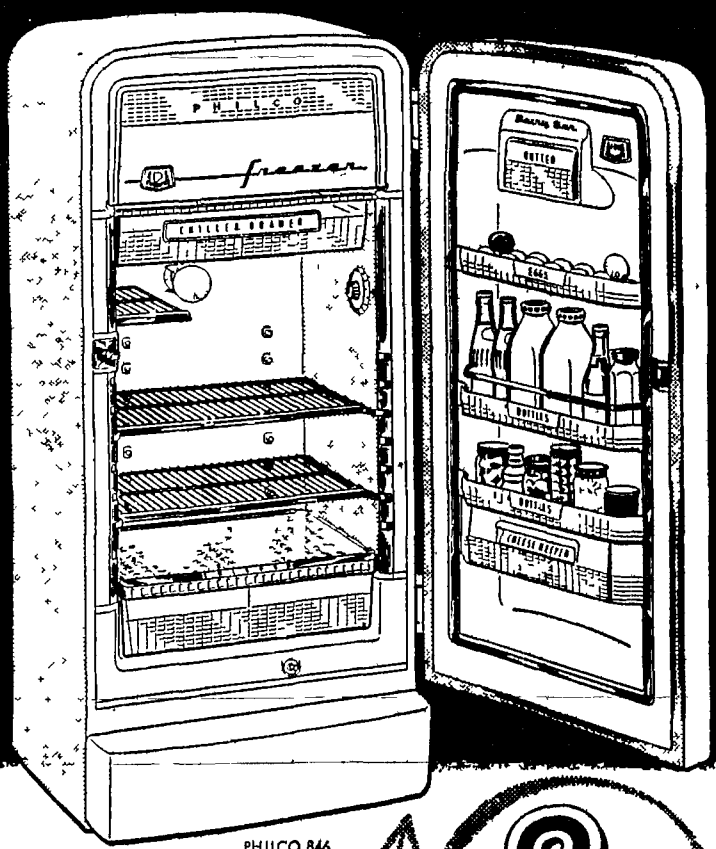

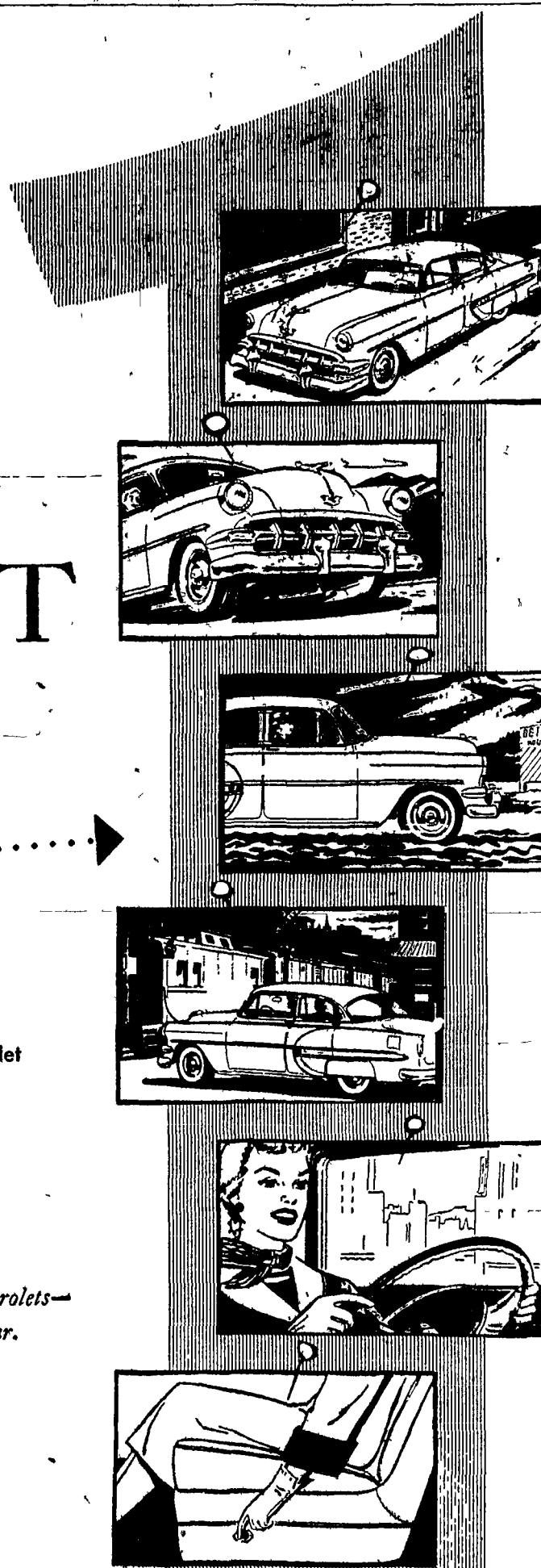

Burning Fields Same As Heaving Money In Fire

Farmers Burn Nitrogen In Corn Stalks And Grass

In spite of widespread publicity against the burning over of fields in the spring, many farmers will still practice the evil, says J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent.

Frank Trull, soil conservation extension specialist at Michigan State College, is equally emphatic in opposing the practice. Burning over land is the same as throwing money in the fire, he insists. Farmers are burning nitrogen whenever they set fire to cornstalks, straw, grass, leaves or organic matter.

The nitrogen destroyed in burning cornstalks from a 60-bushel

crop was worth up to \$8 per acre. Fire also destroys organic matter in the soil, wrecking the moisture-holding capacity.

Organic matter returns plant food to the soil with it and creates a favorable condition for earthworms and bacteria. After it is burned the runoff of rain from the soil increases greatly.

Fire is one of the worst enemies of wildlife, destroying food, cover, nests, eggs, and young birds and

animals, adds Trull. Animals will stay away from burned over places indefinitely.

Many miles of wire fences are ruined every year by burning off the galvanizing and wooden posts. Fires, even the small ones, are expensive and dangerous. It is often the small ones that get out of hand and cause damage to buildings and forests, sometimes even death, the conservationists emphasize.

United Fund "One-Drive" Campaign Is Urged For Buchanan

Niles UF Heads Explain Reasons Of Success There

Large Fund Drives, Except Anti-Polio, Included In One Campaign

The idea of the organization of a United Fund organization in Buchanan which would as far as possible unite all fund drives in one single campaign, such as was adopted in Niles in October, 1953, was introduced to a meeting held Thursday night at the UAW-CIO building, with Henry Murfield, chairman of the Community Services Committee of South Berrien county.

Mr. Murfield had sent invitations to 45 representatives of all elements in Buchanan, of whom about a dozen were present, including representatives of management, labor, business and the churches.

Mr. Murfield had present the three top leaders of the Niles United Fund organization, which has had a brilliant success in its first year of operation. They

were: Fred Vandenberg of the Niles Federal Savings and Loan Association, president; Muriel Gorton, president of the United Steel Workers in Niles, vice-president; William Botts, secretary of the Niles Chamber of Commerce, executive secretary. These three men then took the program over, explaining its organization and successful operation in Niles.

The central idea is to work toward the union of all fund drives in one, thereby eliminating wasteful expenditure of time by successive drives which ultimately tire out leadership as well as the public. The United Fund organization in Niles followed the collapse of the Niles Community Chest in 1952, when it was found impossible to secure a drive manager for the Cancer Fund, and the city fell short of several goals.

At that time William Botts was sent to Chicago to attend a national meeting of community fund raising organizations. On the information he brought back it was decided to adopt the United Fund type. This is an entirely independent organization with no national connections, which works on its own to simplify fund raising in its own community. It has no connection with the Niles city government.

FRED HAGLEY ENDORSES COMMISSION-MANAGER FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Fred Hagley, well-known Buchanan man who has had a year of experience on the city commission, expressed his unqualified endorsement of the manager-commission form of government in the following statement given to the Record.

"When I was elected a year ago I would not have been able to express a fully-considered judgment on the form of government we now have. But after I have been a part of it for a year I can say without any qualification that I think it is the ideal form for the city of Buchanan.

"I was amazed when I heard of the movement to abolish it. For I am thoroughly sold on it. I have witnessed firsthand the progress that the city has achieved, which would not have been possible under any previous form. And I can say further that a number of men who served on the commission under the old mayor-commission form have come to me voluntarily to tell me that they considered the old form inefficient — not because the men in government then were not competent men, but because they did not have the time, the experience or the technical knowledge to do what a trained and experienced city manager can do. They all gave their hearty endorsement to the present form and the progress that has resulted from it.

"As for myself, when I think of what has been accomplished in the enlargement and improvement of the physical assets of the city, most of it done under the commission-manager form, of all the advantages which we have received as a result, it seems to me most foolish to even think of its abandonment.

"There is one very great advantage that I do not believe many realize who do not have first-hand knowledge. That is that in our city manager we have an accredited engineer licensed as such by the state of Michigan, who lives with us — and also has to live with his mistakes, if he makes them.

"The fact that he himself is a resident of the city he serves, always within reach of everyone, gives him more compulsive reasons for thorough and sincere work than any hired engineer would have, brought in from another town. That was the way we used to do it. When the commission had a project that needed engineering, they employed an engineer from the outside. He came here, gave his estimates, collected his fee and went away. If he made mistakes, we merely paid for them without his being much concerned. It is not like that now.

"Of course there has been a raise in taxes. But I feel that the city is doubtless better off financially than it has been for years. If more money was spent we have received good values for the expenditure.

"I cannot believe that those who would abolish this form know the full picture. They probably have some dissatisfaction because some problem which affected them was not settled to their liking and they are taking this means to express their dissatisfaction. No one has ever come to me with such complaints who had any constructive plan of their own for a better solution.

"I am heartily in favor of keeping the form we have."

board of 15, selected as follows: 7 from employees (including all types of labor); 7 from industry; 1 from the public at large. It has united all but three drives, Anti-Polio, Anti-Tuberculosis, and Crippled Children. They induced the Red Cross, Cancer, and Heart to join in the United Fund. They are hopeful of gradually drawing in the remaining three independent fund-raising organizations.

Their success was demonstrated in the first year of operation when they raised \$97,000, as compared to \$32,000 in the last Community Chest campaign, oversubscribing their \$86,271 goal. Their success was due to the great appeal which the one-drive-for-all held, also in a more complete community coverage. They hold their drives Oct. 10-20 annually. They have no house-to-house canvassing, relying on one contact of both industry and business (management and employees), plus a Special Gifts committee which canvasses people who are not included in either business or industry, such as the wealthy retired people, or employed independently in enterprises of their own, and also the adjacent farming community. All are canvassed on the basis of a yearly contribution paid either by cash, payroll deductions, or personal pledges. During the first year they secured over 2,400 subscribers, compared with only 650 in the last Community Fund drive. The Niles leaders said that they found practically all contacted in business or industry were much in favor of the yearly pledge, and generally gave larger subscriptions on that basis. They stated that if the three fund organizations who remained outside would enter the United Fund, they would pledge that their allotted quotas would be raised.

Three of the major fund drives, including Red Cross, Cancer and Heart Diseases, are already included. Also included are Boy Scout, and Girl Scout support, Leader Dogs for the Blind, the Salvation Army, Christmas funds and other which have been carried on separately in Buchanan.

It is required that every bene-

ficiary group on the receiving end submit its budget. Each group must include a certified public accountant. Each must meet with the United Fund leaders and prove the need for the budget asked for.

It was agreed at the end of the session that another larger and more representative meeting would be held in April to consider the adoption of the program here.

Legislative News Letter

(Furnished by State Rep. Don R. Fears, R-Buchanan)

Following last week's hectic rush to clear our calendars of House bills, we enjoyed a few days' relief with small calendars, but committee activity resumed again this week, is building up the calendars and the peak will not be reached until the March 24 deadline for clearing House Committees of Senate Bills will be met.

Considerable feeling has been stirred up by the Civil Service Commission's action in ordering salary increases for all classified state employees at this late hour in the session. After two months of hard work on the part of the appropriating committees of House and Senate to whip into shape a balanced budget for legislative action, this last minute increase is viewed unfavorably and with some bitterness by many of the members. The actual amount involved by the raise is unknown, but an estimate runs all the way from 6 to 10 million for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1954 and ending June 30, 1955. To further complicate the situation, a breakdown on the additional amount required for the various institutions, departments, boards and commissions in State government, is not available now and will not be until after the next meeting of the Civil Service Commission on the 8th and 9th of April. Sentiment is against repeating last year's action when faced with a similar situation, we passed a bill providing for a lump sum of money from which the increase would be paid because it can lead to favoritism toward certain agencies and within agencies. The appropriating committees of both House and Senate, in a letter to the Governor, requested that he "submit revised and corrected figures incorporating the effects of the Civil Service Commission's salary mandate into the State's fiscal structure." The committee further requested the Governor to show how he would balance the budget in view of the addi-

tional mandated expenditures. The Civil Service Commission's action was responsible for introduction in the Senate on March 18 of SJR "E" proposing an amendment to the constitution to remove the salary fixing power of the Commission. The amendment would remove the present limitation of two non-civil service employees per department, commission, board and elected officer, and set it at not to exceed 1 for each 100 employees. The Commission would retain the power of protecting employees in their jobs, and would allow them to recommend salary rates. Two-thirds vote of each house is required to place this proposal on the ballot.

The House postponed consideration of a \$44,457,325 social welfare appropriation bill, which was set up for final passage on March 18.

HB 434 was passed by the House without argument, providing an appropriation of \$11,857,272.39 for school aid. This is a constitutionally mandated appropriation because of the sales tax diversion amendment and is approximately 10 million higher than last year's appropriation. Such changes as were necessary to make the bill conform to the new school code, were made.

It is questionable if any action will be taken on the other budget bills for awhile, as they must be corrected to include the money for the pay increases.

SB 1082 which would permit an additional \$20 a day to be paid circuit judges while on an assignment in another circuit, was passed and returned to the Senate.

SB 1116 aimed at hot-rod operators of watercraft by putting a "hit and run" clause in the Marine Code, was favorably acted upon and given immediate effect.

SB 1017, introduced to take date of circuit court stenographers' pay in two circuits, was amended in the House to increase the pay of stenographers in several circuits, and after the usual lengthy debate, on bills of this nature, was passed.

The Dope Addict bill (SB 1255) which recognizes addicts as sick people and not criminals, met no opposition whatever and was passed. The intent of the bill is to provide for the hospitalization of addicts until they are rehabilitated.

SB 1120 authorizing the use of blood tests in determining the paternity of a child, ran into stiff trouble on the floor and after debate was sent back to committee. Constitutional questions were raised, and it was argued that requiring a defendant in a bastardy case to submit to a blood test would amount to forced self incrimination. It was also argued that the tests are not conclusive as to whether a certain man is the father, but they prove he is not.

SB 1103 prohibiting an adult from purchasing alcoholic beverages for a minor went back to committee and is now dead. The law already prohibits the furnishing of these beverages to a minor. The House passed SB 1243

which would require persons receiving sentences of less than a year for any crime to be sent to county jails and the House of Correction rather than to state prisons.

Deferred until next week is SB 1150 increasing Workmen's Compensation payments. SB 1042 extending full unemployment compensation benefits to Great Lakes seamen, came out of committee without recommendation and was tabled. It may be taken off the table whenever proponents can muster up enough support to pass it.

The Great Baby Boom

A recent issue of Time magazine carried a feature article which began "The U. S. which was buying baby food at the rate of 270,000,000 cans in 1940, this year is buying it at the rate of 1,500,000,000 cans. In the same period, the U. S. toy industry has grown from an \$84,000,000-a-year strippling to a \$900,000,000 giant, and the sale of bicycles has almost doubled. These are the measuring sticks of the Great Baby Boom."

Time then dealt at some length with the far-reaching significance of this. One paragraph said: "By 1975 the U. S. will need to set a 'fifth plate' for every four persons now consuming. Setting this fifth plate will demand an increase in cattle production, for instance, equivalent to all the present production of Texas plus Oklahoma and Minnesota, and enough more lambs to match the great production of Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Nevada combined. To produce this much food, every five acres of U. S. land must produce as much as six acres today — creating a tremendous need for more tractors, fertilizer, soil conditioners and other means of increasing food production."

We all know that mechanized farm equipment has created an agricultural revolution in the

space of little more than a century. (What fewer of us realize is that this revolution is still in high gear and gaining momentum. For this equipment, allied tools and techniques, not only makes greater and more economical production possible — but it also is the means of conserving and improving the land for future generations. The Great Baby Boom is a living illustration of the vital importance of farm machinery.)
