

National Standard Reports Strong First Quarter

A 22 percent increase in earnings on a 32 percent sales increase was part of the record first quarter financial results announced January 27 by Board Chairman T.H. Pearce at the National-Standard Company annual stockholders' meeting.

For the three months ended December 31, 1974, net sales were \$62,244 million compared to \$47,173 million for the comparable period a year ago. Earnings were \$3,120 million or \$0.72 per share, compared to last year's first quarter earnings of \$2,564 million or \$0.59 per share. Mr. Pearce indicated the company had adopted the last-in, first-out method (LIFO) of valuing a major portion of its inventory for fiscal year 1975 and the first quarter figures reflect this change. He also reminded stockholders that last year's first quarter results included a non-recurring gain of \$0.12 per share.

National-Standard's wire and metal products divisions operated at a satisfactory level in the first quarter, according to Mr. Pearce. However, he indicated that late in the quarter they began experiencing a decline in new orders due to inventory accumulation of these products by customers. Pearce indicated it was clear from the latest economic indicators that they would undoubtedly be facing cutbacks.

Sales of radial tire machines and other types of equipment have slowed, Pearce said, which is in line with many other kinds of capital goods.

"In light of the total economic slowdown, we are reducing our 1975 capital expenditure budget from \$25 million to \$17 million," Pearce said. The company's capital expenditures totaled \$15.5 million in 1974. The major cutback in 1975 will be the delay for six months of further expansion of the company's new steel tire cord plant in Oklahoma.

Although the initial construction phase of that facility has been completed, and early production has met customer specifications, the tire companies recommended the delay in expansion, according to Pearce.

"While we are not immune to a recessionary economy," Pearce told stockholders, "there are a number of positive forces working in the company's favor." He cited the elimination of certain loss operations in 1974; the consumable nature of many N-S products; the improved availability of raw materials and components; the broad diversification of N-S products and customer markets; and additional capacity coming onstream in the second quarter for wire products that have been on allocation.

In summary, Pearce said, "We should continue to perform better than the general economy in 1975. Beyond that, our modern manufacturing facilities, research and development projects and strong financial position should enable National-Standard to continue to grow and prosper."

In other business, three directors were elected to the board for three-year terms. They are T.H. Pearce, Chairman of the Board and a director since 1956, John E. Guth, Jr., Vice President of Field Operations, International Business Machines Corporation and a director since 1972, Samuel G. Creden, former Chairman of First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan and a director since 1972.

National-Standard manufactures a wide range of wire products, fabricated metal products and specialized machinery, with 24 domestic and eight foreign plants. For the year ended September 30, 1974, the company reported sales volume of \$219 million.

Plan To Sell Part City Budget Has To Be of Camp Madron Revised

In 1973, three Boy Scout councils were merged into one, the Southwest Michigan Council with headquarters in Kalamazoo. This council inherited land and campsites and also considerable financial problems. In 1974, the council ended with a deficit of \$68,645.

A select committee had been studying the problem of property and financing for three months, and last week gave their report to the Executive Board.

It was decided to sell approximately eighty acres of scout property at Camp Madron. This area lies north and west of Madron Lake and is separated from the main camp site by Burgoyne Road. This is about one quarter of the total property.

It was also decided to sell the scout service center in St. Joseph and a portion of Rota-Kiwan Camp property and two residential rental homes on Bass Lake. A twenty-acre strip of land at Camp Ben Johnson will also be sold.

Proceeds from the sale will be placed in a trust fund and will be used to upgrade the rest of the property of the camps.

Camping will be alternated between Camp Madron and Rota-Kiwan with Madron in operation in 1976 for its 50th anniversary. It is hoped that major sewage problems of Camp Madron may be solved in this year when it will be operated as a specialties camp.

In all cases the land being sold at the camps is considered periphery land not being used for camping and originally purchased as a buffer for future expansion.

Ray Suabedissen, financial director for the city, asked the city commission for budget revisions and predicted that he might have to ask again before the end of June. He said that he now doubted if there would be any surplus as originally anticipated. Anticipated income from investments are expected to be down from a year ago, and costs continue to rise.

An increase in expenditures of \$141,450 is expected over the original budget, but \$94,000 of that was borrowed from other city funds and can be paid back. There is about \$17,460 expected increase in income, so the whole budget had to be increased \$30,000, which the commission approved.

The Board of Education had written the commission requesting a meeting to discuss traffic problems at the new middle school. The commission suggested February 6 for that meeting. It was decided that there should be another hearing on the sidewalks in the middle school area even though the hearing isn't necessary.

Members of the 1975 session of the Board of Review, scheduled to sit March 4, 5 and 17, will be Leo Slate, Rudy Rodighero, Maurice Nelson and with Betty Wilcox as an alternate. It was voted to raise the daily pay of these members from \$20 to \$30.

In anticipation of applying for federal funds after the hearing of February 3, it was deemed necessary to appoint a citizens' advisory council. The commission approved the council and indicated that members of the plan commission should be appointed to it, but tabled a

resolution appointing the members.

An invoice from Yerington for \$11,108 for installation of a storm sewer line in Barton Acres was approved for payment.

The fourth quarter water report from Neal Burks showed that total pumpage of water decreased in 1974 from 924,865,600 gallons the year before to 876,172,100 gallons.

Police chief Dan Moore gave the annual report for his department which showed that complaints have increased steadily each year to 1901 in 1974, and that criminal arrests rose from 222 in 1973 to 381 in 1974. Traffic arrests were up from 884 to 1393. Of the 381 criminal arrests, 152 were juveniles. Moore noted that burglaries increased in number with a major portion being residential entries to homes and garages and many committed to school buildings, especially Moccasin School.

A Service Project

As part of his community service for merit badge requirement, scout Wayne Sumerix of Troop 541 did a comprehensive study of all the signs within the city. On Monday he appeared before the city commission to present the report to them.

City manager Robert Faulhaber said that the report will be extremely useful in checking locations and conditions of signs in the community so that they can either be repaired or exchanged.

Special Hearing Set For February 3

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 apparently has money to give away to various communities. The city of Buchanan figures that, if there are funds available, they might as well apply for them. A community development consultant has been retained for the purpose of properly applying for the money from the federal government.

There'll be a hearing at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, February 3 to decide on what basis to apply for the funds. The hearing's been changed to the high school auditorium because it's hoped that there will be a good crowd. Members of the Buchanan plan commission will be in attendance.

Purposes for which the anticipated funds could be used include recreation facilities, historic preservation, senior citizen centers, public works, code enforcement, community development planning and administration and acquiring and clearing blighted, deteriorating or underdeveloped areas.

Mrs. Miriam Ohmann from Kistler and Associates, the consulting firm, says that there is a fairly good chance that Buchanan might get these federal funds. She said that the federal government will look upon the applications from cities whose plans are most innovative. The application for the grant will be in two forms, one for a year's plans and one for a long-term five year plan.

Mrs. Ohmann said that, for the government to look favorably on

Buchanan's application, it is necessary that a good cross section of the community be consulted and allowed to offer their ideas. Mrs. Ohmann will be on hand at the hearing to explain the law and to indicate different approaches Buchanan might make to it.

Band Concert Tuesday Night

The annual Winter Concert of the Buchanan High School Symphony and Concert Bands will be Tuesday, February 4, at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium. There will be an admission charge of \$1 for adults and \$0.50 for children.

The Concert Band will present four numbers - Totem Pole March by Eric Osterling, Hebrides Suite, Clare Grundman, Meditation and Festiva, Jared Spears and Mancini! arranged by Alfred Reed.

The Symphony Band will then take the stage to open with The Southerner, a march by Glenn Cliff Bannum; Preludium and Fugue by Girolamo Frescobaldi, arranged by Louis Brunelli; Symphonic Suite, Clifton Williams, Mercer and Mancini's Days of Wine and Roses and Compendium by Forsblad and Livingston.

The bands are directed by Michael Morse.

Four Perform With All Star Band

The Southwestern Michigan Band and Orchestra Association All Star Band presented its 1975 concert in the Bridgman High School Auditorium Sunday.

The All Star Band is made up of ninety-two musicians from Southwestern Michigan High Schools with each member gaining his position through audition, open to students in 26 high school band programs.

Four Buchanan students who have earned seats in the band took part in the Sunday concert - Laurie Nelson, Kyla Newsom, Lisa Swem and Jane Montgomery.

The band rehearsed weekly through the month of January at Bridgman High School where band director Perry McCarty is chairman of the event. Rehearsals were under the direction of Jeff Cole, band director at River Valley High School. Guest conductor for this year's performance was Edward Downing from Ann Arbor, director of the Ann Arbor Huron High School Symphonic Band, a group noted for its excellence throughout the Midwest.

The All Star Band is organized each year to give outstanding young musicians from area high schools the opportunity to perform with fellow students who have also attained a high degree of proficiency on their instruments.

LMC President Addresses Lions

Dr. James Lehman, president of Lake Michigan College, was the speaker at Buchanan Lions Club last week. He reminded his audience that eight years ago he had spoken in Buchanan at the dedication of Ottawa School.

Lehman said that the institution has developed into a truly comprehensive community college with a fall enrollment of 3470. He said that the interconnected buildings on the 259-acre campus will be valued at \$16 million. Some of the features include a 22-acre lake on the campus and a library, free to anybody in the area with 56,000 volumes and 470 periodicals. Free tuition is now offered for all senior citizens. Lehman said that people of all ages have been

attending Lake Michigan, many of them taking advantage of the cultural and enriching programs offered at the college. Lehman praised the college's faculty as outstanding, mentioning briefly the labor difficulties of last year. He predicted further growth and development of the whole community college concept.

How About It, Buchanan?

We've heard a lot about what Buchanan doesn't have, but we often forget all the assets. So many occur off-hand, but the list is impressive when they're written down. How many of us have ever been to Fernwood? The beauty there at any time of the year is something which outsiders appreciate and talk about. How many are taking advantage of the many cultural opportunities at Lake Michigan College where free courses are offered and where art shows and concerts are top-rate? How many persons realize that parts of the St. Joseph River can be rated as the most beautiful anywhere? How many people have fished it or hiked along it or merely gazed at its beauty in fall or spring? How many people have driven the back roads when the blossoms are out or in the fall when the trees are heavy with fruit? How many have seen the nationally famous winery at our back door? How many skiers or non-skiers know of the beauty of Royal Valley? How many parents have experienced a thrill when their child came home with vegetables he had raised and cared for at the school-farm? How many understand that Buchanan's outdoor education program is rated as one of the finest? Our recent survey indicated that Buchanan needs a restaurant, a lumber yard, store for children's and teenagers' clothes, more stores and more single family housing. This brings up some questions. Many people in Buchanan apparently have never been in or have never used the local library, which is excellent. Many persons have never attended one of the high school productions, which of late have been exceptional, or the concerts offered by the band or chorus, which have received state-wide recognition. A great many people feel that the support of their local newspaper is of no importance. Too many fail to understand the vast contribution made to Buchanan by its local industries.

Then, with a somewhat doubtful track record of support to the assets Buchanan already has or had, can Buchanan truly be expected to support any new venture which should come to town?

A Minute With Mary

How Do You Buy - A Used Appliance?

Can you really save money by buying a used appliance? Probably - if you buy right, and know how to select the type of appliance you actually need, says USDA Housing Specialist Glenda Pifer.

When should you consider buying a used appliance? A used appliance might be a good choice for you when you're starting a first home, a vacation home, a recreation room and/or when money is limited. A used appliance, you must understand, can range from one that is almost new to one that is absolute junk. A good shopper examines the situation from three angles, the appliance to fill the need, to fit the available space, and to be within the family's price range.

Before shopping for a used appliance, it's important to know the cost and attributes of a new appliance. Then, you can compare critically. Also, you don't look for extra features you don't need. What should you look for? QUALITY!

You need to know some of the terms such as a "rebuilt appliance" which indicates that it has been checked, repaired, and is in working condition - sometimes the appliance will even carry a store guarantee. A "reconditioned appliance" usually means the appliance has been cleaned, painted, perhaps, and in working condition. The "as is" variety is something else - that means it may, or may not, be clean and that it may, or may not, even work. Of course, if you're handy and know what the appliance should do, it may still be a good buy.

Some other questions you should consider asking are: Will the appliance be delivered or installed? Does it require additional wiring, plumbing, or gas connection?

After answering these questions, you may find that a particular used appliance is exactly what you need, and the money for it will be well-spent.

LWV Makes In Depth Study Of Land Use

The Niles-Buchanan League of Women Voters had recent meetings to determine a national land use policy. Mrs. Roy Streffling of Buchanan, Mrs. Ralph Freevol and Mrs. Dale Dedutch of Niles were hostesses for the various meetings.

Members discussed five main aspects of land use - an overall philosophy, goals, functions for a government role in land use, role of the federal government, and mechanisms to ensure full consideration of state, local, and national concerns in national land use decisions.

The problem of the public good versus private rights came forward in the discussion of the overall philosophy of land use. Can we afford to treat land as a private possession, or is it a common resource to all people, and to be treated as a finite resource? The citizen's role in land use planning and regulation was explored.

Under consideration as national land use goals were the protection of public health, welfare, and safety, and in accordance, the protection of private property rights and values. Also the assurance of public access to unique recreational areas, maintenance and improvement of the quality of existing urban communities, and the restoration of land exposed by such

activities as surface mining were other goals.

The role of government was discussed as to what functions should be included in a government program to achieve the desired goals. These possible functions include: to develop and provide inventories of land resources and present uses, inform on social, environmental, and economic needs, and to require impact statements for these areas by major public and private developers, to determine and provide land development of more than local benefit (low and moderate-income housing and open space), and to exercise the power to regulate the land without compensation.

The role of the federal government in land use decisions could also include specific functions, such as giving financial and technical assistance to states and localities, collecting and analyzing economic, environmental, and social data, establishing standards and criteria for state and local land use planning and regulation, and providing financial incentives to those that comply or imposing sanctions on those who don't.

The land use consensus ended with a discussion of mechanisms needed to ensure full consideration of state, local, and national interests in national land use decisions. The question of

whether or not the federal government should have the power to make pre-emptive decisions on matters of land use was also discussed. The consensus results are being forwarded to the national office where they will be utilized in compiling the national land use policy.

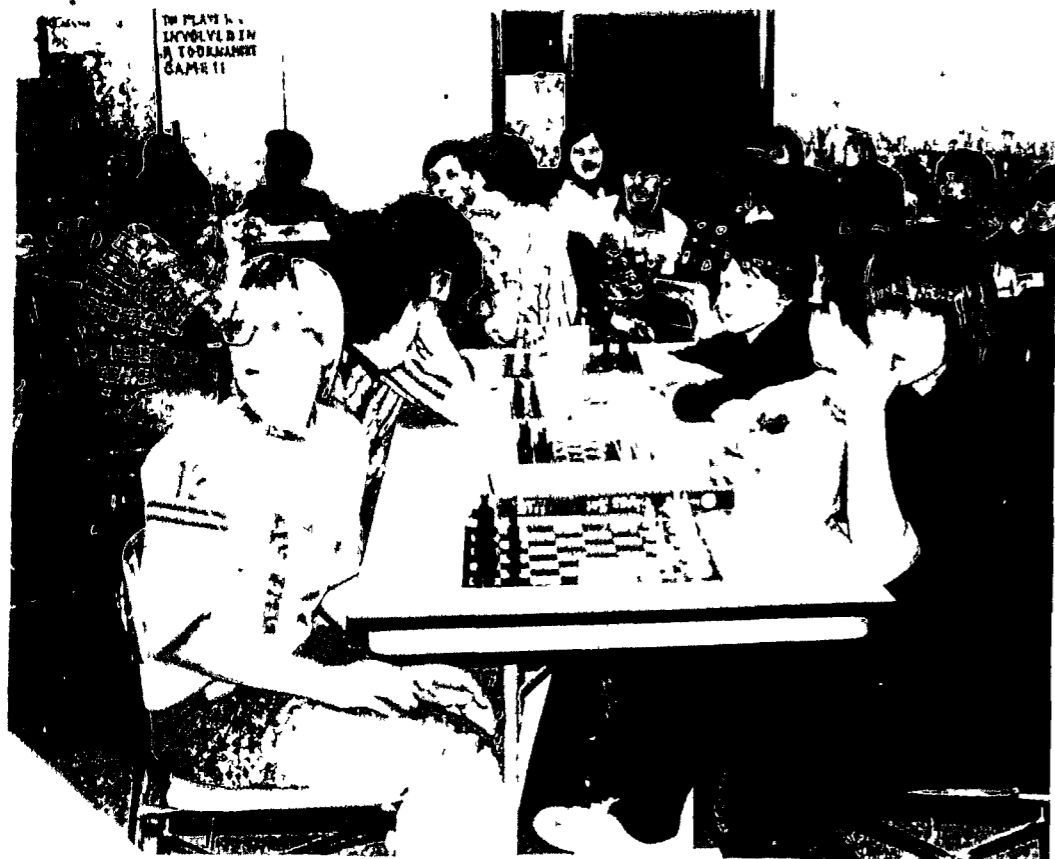

Facts On Vietnam Bonus

Q Who is eligible for the Vietnam Era Veterans' Bonus?
A To be eligible for benefits under Proposal B, the Vietnam Era Veterans' Bonus, you must

- have completed at least 190 days of honorable service or died between January 1, 1961 and September 1, 1973
- have been a resident of Michigan for at least 6 months prior to entering the service.
- have not applied for and received similar benefits from another state
- have not been dishonorably discharged

Q How are the Bonus awards determined?
A Combat veterans will receive \$600. Non-combat veterans will receive \$15.00 for each month served, up to a maximum of \$450.00. In the case of deceased veterans, their beneficiaries would receive their benefits.

Q What requirements determine combat and non-combat veterans?
A "Combat" zone bonuses are those who are eligible to wear the Vietnam Service Medal or the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal. Veterans eligible for combat zone bonuses are those who served in the Vietnam area, Berlin, Lebanon, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Qomoy, Matsu, Taiwan, the Congo, and since Oct. 1, 1966, in Korea

Q Non-combat veterans or other than the area mentioned will get \$15 each per month of service up to a \$450 ceiling

Q Will the bonuses be taxed?
A No The benefits received would not be construed as payment for services and would not be subject to Federal, state or city income tax

Musicians Earn Fine Ratings

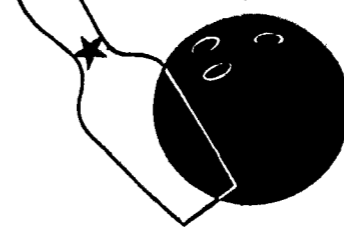
A large group of Buchanan Middle School students did well last Saturday at the District VI Solo and Ensemble Festival at Gobles.

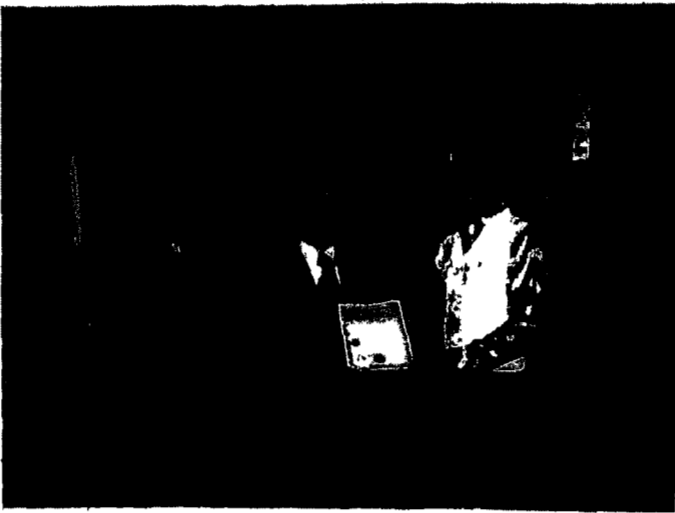

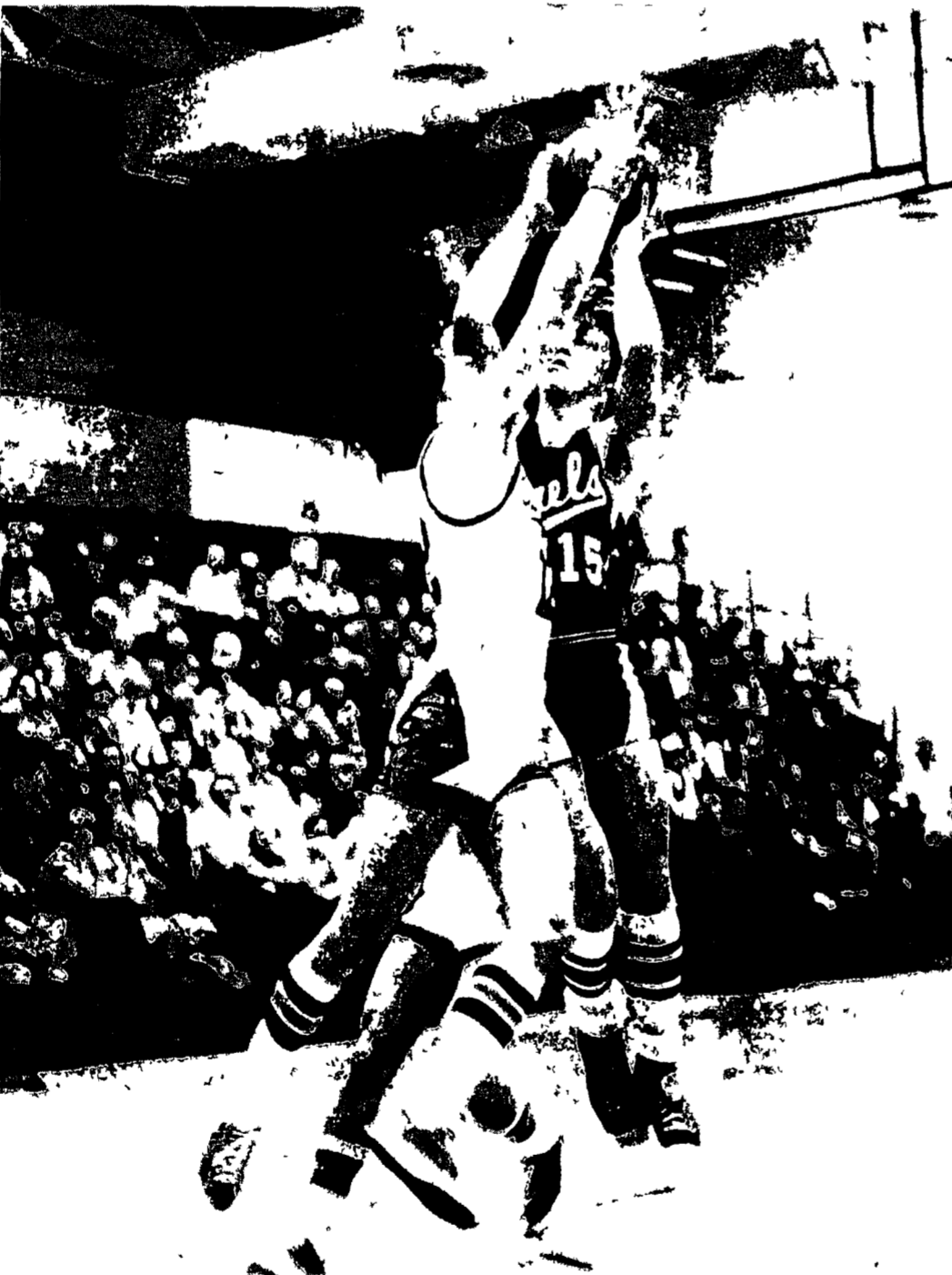

Board Of Education Minutes

The Board of Education, Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan held its regular monthly meeting Monday, January 20, 1975, at the High School building. Members present: David Hanson, William Moon, Gerald Moulds, and Jeanette Mahan. Absent: Richard Beistle, Vernon Lubben, and Richard Rossow (Board Members) and SRA Delegate Lisa Swem. Others present: Administration, members of the press, and 10 visitors.

President Hanson called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. and appointed Member Moulds as Acting Secretary in the absence of Secretary Beistle and Member Moon as Acting Treasurer in the absence of Treasurer Lubben. President Hanson asked if there were questions or comments from the press or visitors, and as there were none, the regular agenda was begun. Minutes of the December 9, 1974 meeting were approved as corrected.

Acting Secretary Moulds read correspondence from the Buchanan Education Association requesting a beginning of negotiations on February 3, to which the Board agreed; a letter from the Berrien County Intermediate School District asking for the appointment of a delegate and alternate for its proposed budget hearing, and President Hanson appointed Member Vernon Lubben as primary delegate with Member William Moon as alternate, and an announcement of a MASA-sponsored legislative workshop.

Acting Treasurer Moon moved, seconded by Member Moulds, that bills in the amount of \$212,922.72 (of which \$174,376.15 is for 2 payrolls) be approved for payment. Unanimously carried.

Asst. Supt. Kreager read a report on the property appraisal as prepared by Industrial Appraisal Company, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, listing the replacement value of school properties as \$11,765,451. Mr. Kreager was instructed to obtain the cost of a new appraisal and report back to the Board at the next meeting.

Motion by Member Moulds, seconded by Member Mahan, that the following change in graduation requirements be adopted: "Exceptions to the 4-year requirement may be granted on an individual basis by the Board of Education after review by a committee composed of the High School Principal, a guidance counselor, and one Board Member appointed by the President of the Board of Education." The Board feels, however, that exceptions to the 4-year requirement should be avoided as much as possible. Unanimously carried. President Hanson appointed Member Mahan as the Board's representative in reviewing early-graduation applications.

Superintendent reported on the Middle School traffic situation, starting that, although adjustments had been made by the City, the situation will not be alleviated until sidewalks are constructed. He suggested a meeting of the Board and the City Commission. President Hanson and Member Moulds will represent the Board at said meeting.

The following resolution was offered by Member Moulds, seconded by Member Moon. Whereas, the purpose of Section 47 of the 1974-75 State Aid Act is to appropriate funds to applicant districts for the purposes of developing, evaluating and reporting upon academically talented, or gifted, and Whereas, the Buchanan Community School Board has long been in support of such local programs and wishes to continue encouraging and supporting its faculty and administration in further developing and evaluating such programs, The Board hereby states its awareness of its administrator's application and pledges its continued commitment, efforts, interest and support; material, personnel and finances included, to encourage

program development in this important area of school curriculum; and Therefore, Be It Resolved: that the Buchanan Board of Education hereby seeks State Aid moneys to complete, not supplant, local moneys utilized for developing programs for academically talented students in Buchanan.

AYES: Members Mahan, Moulds, Hanson, and Moon.
 NAYS: None.
 Unanimously adopted.

Member Moulds offered the following resolution, seconded by Member Mahan: Whereas, Miss Phyllis Enders has been a teacher in the Buchanan Community Schools for 12 years and during that time has given unselfishly of her time in the interests of the children of Buchanan, and Whereas, Miss Enders has always performed her teaching tasks with the utmost skill, efficiency, and dedication, and Whereas, A family emergency did exist which necessitated Miss Enders' absence from her school duties; Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Board of Education recognizes this dedication and hereby grants Miss Enders a paid leave of absence for the 5-week period, September 13 through October 25, 1974.

AYES: Members Mahan, Moulds, Hanson, and Moon.
 NAYS: None.
 Unanimously adopted.

Motion by Member Moulds, seconded by Member Moon, that the 13 candidates who have completed the prescribed requirements for high school graduation through the Adult Education Program be certified for graduation. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Moon, seconded by Member Moulds, that 3 Blue Bird bus bodies be purchased from Great Lakes Coach Sales, Dearborn, Michigan, for a total price of \$16,235. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Moulds, seconded by Member Moon, that 3 GMC chassis be purchased from Kennedy Motors, Buchanan, Michigan, for a total price of \$28,942.50. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Ellis May, Special Education Coordinator, presented the annual Special Education report for the Buchanan Community Schools.

Bennie Harris, School Psychologist from the Berrien County Intermediate School District, reported on the student program for the Emotionally Impaired.

Meeting adjourned at 10:20 p.m.


