

Don Rennhack Named Varsity Cage Coach

Don Rennhack has been named to succeed Ray Berry as varsity basketball coach, announced Principal Donald Trull Berrien resigned last week after 13 years as head coach.

With the naming of Rennhack, there is little hope for Blossomland conference coaches that Berry's departure will make Buchanan an easy mark. As a junior varsity coach for the past five seasons, Rennhack's teams have compiled an enviable record of 58 wins against only 20 losses.

Rennhack's teams have twice gone undefeated in league play. In 1963-64 the junior varsity posted a 10-0 league record while playing to a 14-1 season, and last year the jayvees boasted an 11-0 conference mark, again while playing to an overall 14-1 record. In 1963-64 Buchanan's only loss was to St. Joe, and in 1966-67 the lone defeat came at the hands of Niles.

Rennhack experienced his worst year in 1964-65 when his team posted a 7-9 record. However, his team bounced back with a 12-4 record in 1965-66, was 14-1 in 1966-67, and this spring finished with an 11-5 mark.

Rennhack's first experience as a basketball coach has been the past five years here, but he played basketball throughout his high school career at Bridgman, played with Benton Harbor junior college team two years and played while serving in the Navy.

Native of Bridgman
A native of Bridgman, Rennhack was a member of four consecutive Bridgman high school teams that captured the district Class D title. As a freshman and sophomore he was moved up to the team for the tournaments and as a junior and senior he was a regular member of the team.

After graduating from high school in 1952, Rennhack attended Benton Harbor junior college, where he continued to play basketball. In his second year there the team was junior college state champ and placed fourth in the nation. Rennhack then served two years in the Navy during which he played with four different teams.

He returned to college and in 1959 graduated from Western Michigan university with a B. A. degree.

Rennhack, 34, came to Buchanan in the fall of 1959 and has taught junior high mathematics for the past nine years. He coached JV basketball for five years and freshman ball for the previous four years. Rennhack also has served as varsity track coach for the past seven years and has coached cross country two years.

The new varsity basketball coach plans to give up either track or cross country next year.

He and his wife, the former Jan Rokely of Bridgman, are the parents of two children, Kim 7 and Kent age 4. The family resides at 510 West Front. Rennhack is a member of St. Paul's Lutheran church and Buchanan Jaycees.

Special Vote Set In Townships

Special elections to confirm township board actions are scheduled in Buchanan township today (Thursday) and in Bertrand on Thursday, May 2. Voters will be asked to decide the question of confirming the grant of a franchise to Indiana & Michigan Electric company.

The proposed franchise would grant to the company easements on public property within the townships and the right to transact business within those townships subject to reasonable regulation by the respective boards.

Both township boards have approved the proposed 30 year franchise with I&M. The special elections afford township residents an opportunity to confirm their board's action. The company is seeking the franchise to enhance their financial rating.

Clark, Union In Agreement, Set Vote Sunday

Terms of a new three-year contract will be presented to Local 468 UAW-AFL-CIO members at a special meeting Sunday afternoon in the high school gym. The meeting to ratify the proposed contract has been called at 4 o'clock.

Tentative agreement between union and Clark Equipment company negotiators was reached about 2:30 a.m. Sunday. Negotiators also agreed to an extension of the present contract, which expired midnight April 14, while a final draft of the proposed contract was drawn for presentation to the union membership.

Malcolm House, director of industrial relations at Clark, and Lemuel Barker, Local 468 president, stated that negotiations were in total agreement on all contractual and economic items in the proposed contract. Details of the contract were not revealed.

Supervisors Expected to Accede to Fast Time Rule

Berrien county supervisors are faced with the reality that time and tide wait for no man following their resolution of March 18 when they declared that Berrien County would join Central time zone cities as of Sunday, April 28.

The supervisors have found support from local residents and adjacent counties wanting in the light of legal opinions from the state Attorney General's office in Lansing and protests from local business and industries.

As a result of this lost support, county supervisors will hold a special meeting Friday in lieu of their regular Monday meeting to reconsider their action of March 18.

DeLos Proseus, chairman of the county board of supervisors, was in Allegan Wednesday for a special meeting of representatives of seven southwestern Michigan counties. The time issue was a major point of discussion. Reached by the Record at that meeting, Proseus said, "I intend to recommend to the board of supervisors Friday that Berrien county accept the 'fast' time rule." He pointed out that legal rulings have played an important part in his decision. "We have enough lawbreakers now," he said, "without the board of supervisors joining the pack."

Industry in the county indicated to the board their desire for "fast" time because of the confusion which could result between them and their employees, suppliers and customers.

Proseus reported that all representatives at the Allegan meeting privately favored "slow" time but felt that if they were to defy the state or federal governments on the issue their counties would possibly face reprimands in the form of cutbacks in federal and state funds for public projects and schools. "None of us can afford to face that possibility," Proseus told the Record.

The board of supervisors will also discuss the county's tentative budget at the Friday session.

690 Students to Take Part in Career Day

If you ever want to find yourself at a loss for words, just go out and find yourself a new job, pack up and leave town. That's what I did... and here I am at a loss for words.

After writing this column for the past six years it should be easy to dash off one more. But what do you say? I probably should get in another plug for Nick Jewell for sheriff, since he is a strong proponent of reopening a substation in the southern portion of the county. Without such a substation southern Berrien residents are getting only about one-half of the service for which they are being taxed.

Another subject I might expound on is the proposed county vocational technical school. In theory a vo-tech center sounds good, but voters should take a long hard look at the proposal before adding to their tax load. If the proposition expected to be voted this spring is the same as that proposed last fall, I could not approve it.

It seems that since the "South" was able to make its voice heard in the location of Lake Michigan college, "Northern" politicians are now ready to make concessions to gain popularity down south. On two different occasions last fall the question was asked "Why two centers?" The answer "It will enable us to offer a more diversified program."

On the face of it this sounds good, until you stop to consider that there is not that much difference in the employment opportunities between the two ends of the county. What proponents of the vo-tech center admit privately is that the proposal for two centers, instead of one centrally located one, is purely political to gain support in the southern end of the county.

Another timely reminder might be that area residents should keep in mind that the Record is the only newspaper in the world that is genuinely interested and concerned with the well being and future of Buchanan and the surrounding area. Remember, too, that your hometown newspaper can be no better than you want it to be. It cannot carry news about that which the staff is unaware, and late news or that which has been released earlier in a daily newspaper is as undesirable to the staff as it is to you, the reader.

I guess if I said all of these things I would run out of space and you would run out of time. So, I'll just sign off.

The past seven years have been most interesting and rewarding and I have enjoyed working with many of you Buchananians on the move, and it is up to you to keep it going. I'll be watching your progress thru the columns of the Record. If you are in the Lansing area stop in and say "Hello!"

More than 690 students in grades 9-12 will take part in the second biennial Career Guidance day to be held at Buchanan high school Wednesday, May 1, according to Lyle Sumerix, chairman. The career day program is being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the high school guidance department.

The day will begin with a general session at 11 a.m. and an orientation by Principal Donald Trull. Buchanan Industrialist H. J. Post will keynote the session and following his address will accept student questions.

The afternoon students will attend three 30-minute sessions of their choice and following the last session resource personnel will be available for individual counseling until 3 o'clock.

More than 40 resource persons will discuss careers in fields ranging from accounting to veterinary medicine. Sumerix pointed out that "The Chamber's career day," Sumerix added, "gives our young people an excellent opportunity to expand their views on vocations interesting to them."

Occupation areas in which resource persons will be available include: Clerical, accounting, law enforcement, civil service, conservation, military, sales retail, building trades, medical professions, nursing, pharmacy, health occupations, Veterinary medicine, engineering, chemistry, retail business ownership, business administration, law, hotel-motel operation, machine tooling, transportation, airline stewardess, beautician, barber, mechanical trades, white collar, drafting, business professions, The ministry, social work, health recreation, home economist, interior decorating, modeling, data processing, agriculture, education communications and how to apply for a job.

Failure of a 34,000 volt bushing at the entrance to the main Clark Equipment company substation was blamed for a power blackout in the plant Friday afternoon. Indiana & Michigan Electric company officials said power was out from 1:47 to 2:19 p.m.

Commission Ponders County Time Change

Time and the setting of a public hearing highlighted the regular City Commission meeting Monday night.

The commission deferred action on the question as to which time the city would officially adopt when clocks throughout the state are moved ahead one hour Sunday in accordance with Eastern Daylight Time. The question was raised since the Board of Supervisors had voted to move the county into the

Central Time zone for the summer so that, in effect, clocks would not have to be moved ahead.

The decision not to act on the matter came after it was reported that the Board of Supervisors might meet again on the matter prior to the April 28 time change, upon concurrence by City Attorney B. R. Desenberg with County Prosecutor John Hammond that the Board of Supervisors had acted il-

legally, and after receipt of a letter from Walter Schirmer, president, that Clark Equipment company would observe the same time as the official state time due to confusion which would otherwise result between various Clark plants in Michigan and elsewhere.

Set Public Hearing

May 13 was set as the date for a public hearing to consider the rezoning request of Robert S. Malone. Malone has requested rezoning of 5 acres of land at 513 West Fourth St. from R-1 single family residential to R-3 multi family residential district.

Malone, acting for a corporation, said plans for development call for construction of 42 townhouse units on the site. He added that construction is expected to start as soon as rezoning can be completed.

The City Plan Commission recommended favorable action on the rezoning request during a special meeting April 15.

Hear Sale Plans

Two local merchants, Keith Welsh and Joe Garbert, appeared before the commission to outline preliminary plans for the annual sidewalk sale. They represented the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce.

Tentative plans for the summer sales promotion July 19-20 call for blocking of Front street, from Days to Main, to hold a square dance in the street from 7:30 to 11:30 one night of the sale, provide free parking thru-out the central business district; locate a carnival in the Days avenue parking lot, eliminate parking on the north side of Front, from Portage to Oak, to permit merchants to move their merchandise displays off the sidewalk and into the regular parking spaces, due to the heavy pedestrian traffic and narrow sidewalk; and to move a trailer into the area in front of the old theater building from which organ music could be played during the sale.

Following a short discussion, the matter was referred to the police chief and fire chief for their recommendations on the safety and traffic standpoint.

Miscellaneous

In other action, the commission — Approved the appointment of Loren Anderson to fill the unexpired term of George Bonnet on the City Plan Commission. Bonnet resigned because he was unable to attend meetings due to his work. The term expires July 1, 1970.

—Deferred action on a proposed amendment to the city curfew ordinance for further study and the possibility of broadening its coverage.

—Set 2 p.m. May 21 as the time bids will be opened for city insurance coverage.

—Approved three requests for car washes to be held in the Days avenue parking lot: Methodist Youth Fellowship May 11 and June 8, and French club June 1.

—Accepted the nine month revenue and budget reports, and quarterly fire and water reports.

—Agreed to cooperate with Buchanan Band and Orchestra association in officially recognizing the Melbourne Collegiate Academy of Toronto, Canada, band during its exchange concert here next month.

—Approved payment of bills totaling \$3,310.28.

—Voted its appreciation to Lyle Sumerix for his outstanding service to the city while employed as editor of the Berrien County Record, and instructed the city manager to write a letter of appreciation.

Chamber Clinic On Advertising Set for Monday

Getting the most from the advertising dollar is the theme of the Buchanan Chamber of Commerce advertising clinic scheduled for Monday evening, April 29, at 7 o'clock. The three hour session will be held in the high school library, according to Leon Clark, chairman of the Chamber's retail division.

Professor William Haight of the school of journalism at Michigan State University will counsel local merchants on why retail advertising should be planned in advance, how to determine a realistic budget for retail stores, how advertising budget should be allocated, determining specific ad content, how advertising copy and layout can be improved, and how to follow up to assure success of an ad.

The advertising clinic is held by the Chamber as a part of the retail division's continuing education program, said Clark. Local businessmen are urged to attend, he added.

Registration fee is \$2 per person. Interested persons should contact the Chamber office for complete details. At press time 34 merchants had registered.

Police Check 236 Complaints

Buchanan police officers investigated 236 complaints and 64 traffic accidents during the first quarter of 1968, according to Chief of Police David Shibilinski. A total of 84 arrests were made.

Disorderly conduct, speeding, violations of signs or signals, and improper or defective equipment accounted for the bulk of arrests. Eleven minors were detained. Chief Shibilinski reported the department's investigations included 10 complaints of breaking and entering and 17 thefts of less than \$50.

During the three month period, the city's two patrol cars logged more than 18,000 miles.

Pattengale Describes New Modes in Music

the while your eyeballs are struggling to escape, your hair is falling out, and your toes are digging holes in the soles of your shoes. It's unbelievable terrifying . . . fascinating in a demonic sort of way and if you weren't there, see what you missed?



Mrs. Clarence Hartline

In these days of wall-to-wall everything, it's nice to encounter a new direction in superlatives. For instance, consider floor-to-ceiling scrapbooks.

They are real, no exaggeration . . . and they can be found in the home of Mrs. Clarence Hartline of Orange road. These scrapbooks are not the familiar, ribbon tied, flour-pasted souvenirs of girlhood . . . rather, they are massive, professionally bound volumes depicting more than a hundred years of history, and they represent a major lifetime project of a lively, curious, knowledgeable, and dedicated woman.

Mrs. Clarence (Alma) Hartline fits many categories . . . school teacher, farm wife, mother, historian, genealogist, photographer, and author.

Currently, she is completing work on a book begun 15 years ago, and she expects to have it in print by fall. Her manuscript is a detailed study of the land and people of the Portage Prairie and Bertrand areas beginning with the immigrants from Pennsylvania who first began arriving here in 1849.

As for her "scrap" books (certainly misnamed), they are almost impossible to describe adequately in this small space. Shelves in a tall, divided case especially built by her late husband, the books have been a source of wonder and excitement to those individuals privileged to study them. There are now 23 hard-bound volumes,

weighing up to 40 pounds each, with newspaper-size pages, indexed and catalogued chronologically, they encompass family, local, and national history from before the coming of the white man to the mid-1960's, and they include approximately 5,000 photographs of local landmarks and individuals taken by Mrs. Hartline herself. Through clippings, letters, certificates, photostats, pictures, documents . . . many of rare antique value . . . one can sample in these pages the temper, progress, tools, fashions, politics, home life, and special events of every decade.

Asked about the beginnings of this staggering undertaking, Mrs. Hartline declared, "My father (J. E. Vite) was the real historian. He's the one who inspired me when I was yet a young girl." And she recalls that her first collector's item was a 1902 photograph of Queen Victoria's coffin given to her by her father.

Many, many boxes of material later, in 1925, she began to compile the scrapbooks . . . and in the intervening years she has invested uncounted hours, money, and energy in the project. As much as \$150 may be invested in materials alone in a single book (and their historic value is of course, beyond speculation.)

Alma Hartline is one of the descendants of the first 4 Rough brothers who came to this area in the mid 1800's; and she has been a lifetime resident of Portage Prairie, teaching school in the Pollywog (later Oak Forest), Womer, and Kansas schools in early years. She has three daughters Mrs. Earl (Mildred) Gamble, Mrs. Edward (June) Kerschner, and Mrs. Russell (Mary Jane) Clifton; seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

"What a legacy all these offspring have in store! They will inherit not only a full-blown family tree, but a whole forest of Americana preserved for them by Alma Hartline who believes like Francis Bacon that "Out of monuments names, words, proverbs, traditions, private records and evidences, fragments of stories and passages of books and the like, we do save and recover somewhat from the deluge of time."
