## Clark Expansion Explained to Business Assoc. At Niles Banquet

## Instructors In First Aid Wanted

### Now Here's the Proposition

### C. E. Men Explain New Expansion To Business Assoc.

Charles King, Claude Fenn and Milton Peck Talk At Niles Banquet

Members of the Buchanan Business Association were guests Tuesday evening of the Clark Equipment company at a dinner and program meeting in the Pickwick clubrooms, Niles, the occasion being the first public release of building and manufacturing plans approved by company management on Feb. 9.

In charge of the meeting was the president of the Buchanan Business Association, Philip Sexton, who introduced Charles King and Claude A. Fenn, by whom the new expansion was explained.

King stated that the Clark Equipment company now has a total of 6,500 employees, of whom 2,500 are at Jackson, 1,900 at Battle Creek and 2,100 at Buchanan. During 1943 and 1944, at the height of military production during World War II, a total of 3,500 workers were employed at the Buchanan plant.

He said that at the present time the company does not have any large amount of contracts or government use as an auxiliary of defense, less than 10% of total present production in fact. However large contracts have been under negotiation and will doubtless materialize at a future date, the picture here being the same as that in the national industry as a whole. Extent of expansion at Buchanan is being made with a view to the labor market of this region.

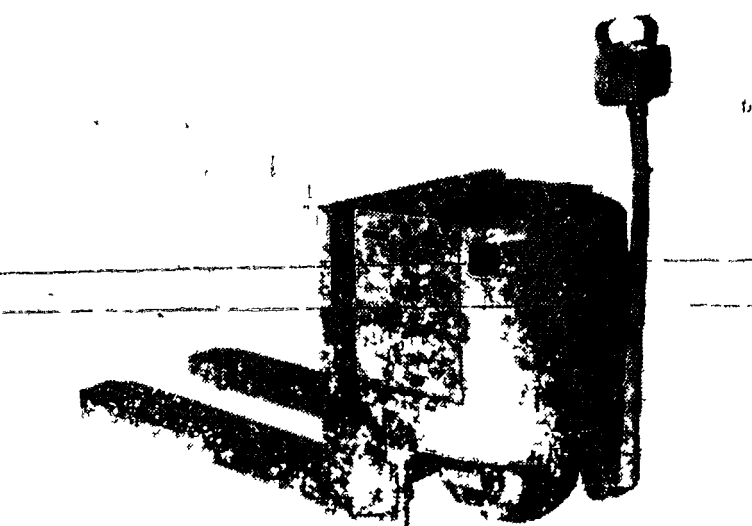
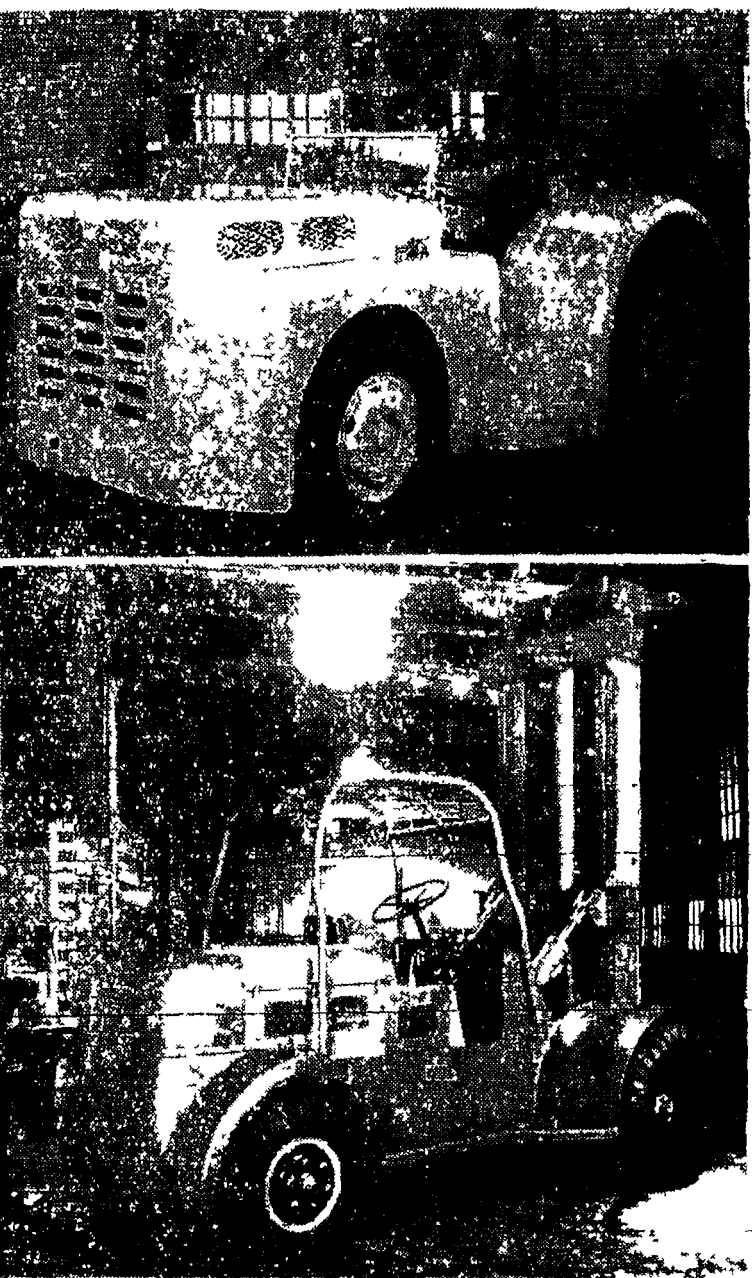
Production of war materials at Clark plants will undoubtedly be large in the event of an all-out war effort, stated Mr. King, as during World War II the company produced 75% of all axle truck housings used by the armed forces. In addition most of the transmissions for such vehicles were made by the Clark Equipment company, or by other companies using Clark transmission models.

Other Clark production which received far more publicity and which became increasingly significant as World War II progressed was the production of material handling equipment. A representative of the company in Germany stated, said Mr. King, that he had been told by German officials that they had had material-handling equipment of the caliber of the Clark production. Hitler would not have been defeated, lack of such equipment having diverted too large appropriation of manpower from combat service.

Claude A. Fenn, Buchanan plant manager, stated that approximately \$2,500,000 would be spent in expansion of buildings and equipment here. The added manufacturing space and facilities will probably mean the employment of 400 to 500 more in the local plant, he estimated. Some of the local cutting will go into installation of very expensive equipment not involving much added manpower. Mr. Fenn cited the replacement of the old electric furnace in the foundry. This furnace has served the company 35 years, but its 20-ton-per-day capacity is no longer adequate. It is to be augmented by a new furnace which will bring the capacity to 30-ton-per-day, at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000.

Milton Peck, sales manager for the new line of power-lift hand-operated trucks, gave a talk on the future possibilities of these and other power-lift, material-handling trucks. Transfer to Buchanan of a part of the production of industrial trucks, or material handling equipment, has much possible significance, he stated, as there is an immense and growing field for these vehicles. This type of equipment has almost entirely replaced the old hand truck crane, which has been superseded by floor-handling operations. The large steel mills have floor material-handling equipment capable of hoisting up to 80,000 pounds. The Clark Equipment company is by far the largest manufacturer in the world of material-handling trucks. Profits in production are now entirely dependent on savings in material-handling equipment, stated Peck, and the old and inefficient system of hoisting heavy material by manpower is no longer feasible either from a business or a human standpoint.

The Shape Of Things To Come At Clark's



If you should visit again, after a spell of absence, that line of brick buildings on the north side of the main entrance to the Plant grounds of the Clark Equipment company, harboring Personnel in their southwest corner and shutting at the east against the switch track — well, you'd never know the old place now.

Gone from there or going are the old alphabetical departments, H of housing and carrier machining, G of drive shaft assembly, E of brake assembly, C and D of axle assembly and the heat treat in the rear.

Now already in production in the west part and gradually extending east are the assembly lines of the company's fastest-developing production, the newest models in material handling equipment.

The three models whose storage, assembly and equipment will soon consume the entire space of the former Axle department are pictured above.

Described in downward sequence they are:

1. DRAWBAR PULL TRACTOR—A specialized application in airports all over the world, with a towing capacity of 100,000 pounds. Designed to pull the larger military and commercial planes from hangar to take-off.
2. YARD LIFT 150—The tilting telescopic fork lift truck, capable of hoisting a maximum load of 15,000 pounds 18 feet high. Now being built for and delivered to the armed forces. Capable also of very broad application in the industrial field, as in lumber yards, or for any outdoor operation where heavy materials are to be handled or stocked for storage.
3. POWERED HAND PALLET TRUCK, carrying capacity up to 6,000 pounds. Has potential uses in every phase of industry, from handling wholesale produce merchandise to larger types of metal fabrication. In the smaller industrial plants this pallet truck may be a major material-handling tool. In larger industrial plants using heavy fleets of heavy-duty industrial trucks it may be accessory to the larger trucks for inter-departmental service.

The pallet truck shown is the first development in this line of powered hand trucks the Clark Equipment is now producing. The second model, coming into production immediately, is a low-lift platform truck. Afterward Clark's will further offer the trade four models of tilting telescopic fork trucks, ranging in capacity through maximums of 1,500, 2,000, 2,500 and 3,000 pounds.

Also in development stages is a small electric tractor, embodying the basic principles of the line, which will have a wide application in such uses as in the selector area of large wholesale chain store warehouses.

County Head Ashley Brecht Denies Goals In Berrien County

The 1951 American National Red Cross Fund Drive will officially begin Monday, March 5, and continue through March 19, under the overall direction of County Chairman Ashley Brecht, manager of the Midwest Credit Corporation of Benton Harbor, and with a county goal of \$46,754.

Mrs. H. H. Banke will be the chairman for the Buchanan city drive, with a quota of \$2,500. Other chairmen and goals of this area are Buchanan township, Mrs. Dale Hanover, \$100; Berrien township, Mrs. Lawrence Mitchell, \$195; Galien village and township, Mrs. Austin Dodd, \$560; North Niles township, Mrs. D. Lagom, \$250; South Niles township, Mrs. L. Kramer, \$250; Oronoko township and Berrien Springs, Mrs. Mary Roth, \$1,350.

Mrs. Banke stated that she has volunteers who will take turns in charge of a table in the Union State Bank during the drive, and is organizing other departments of the effort here.

The 1951 goals for Berrien county are as follows:

1. Training of 60 volunteer nurses and now underway at Mercy hospital in Benton Harbor and St. Joseph hospital in St. Joseph.
2. Training of 500 women in home nursing techniques. An instructor conference just completed at St. Joseph headquarters. A five-day intensive course to prepare registered nurses to teach laywomen in home nursing, eventually to cover the county.
3. Training of large numbers of persons in first aid.
4. Assisting civil defense authorities in a county survey of housing facilities in case of emergency or disaster.
5. Sponsoring blood plasma collection in cooperation with the Berrien county medical association and the state department of health. Blood mobile unit was in the Twin Cities and Niles from Jan. 24 to 26. This blood plasma is for the free use of any person in the county who needs it, at no cost to them. Not to be confused with the whole blood program.
6. Training of social welfare aides who volunteer for home service to assist servicemen, veterans and their families and dependents and help in emergencies. Mrs. J. C. Strayer is the home service committee representative in this area.

Local women throughout the county may take advantage of any of these training courses by contacting Red Cross headquarters and arrangements will be made to take care of them as soon as possible.

House Bill No. 160, now before the sessions of the Michigan State Legislature, which would make it mandatory for all villages and cities with a population over 5,000 to place patrolmen on a 40-hour week, was studied by the city commission at their meeting Monday night and the members voted unanimously to request State Senator Elwood W. Bonine and State Representative Don Peers to actively oppose this and all other legislation which has the end of regulating by state law hours of employment or other terms of employment of any class of municipal employees.

The passage of this and other legislation that would certainly ensue would progressively nullify the State Home Rule Act. An elementary principle of home rule is that the local legislative bodies which have the financial responsibility should be permitted to administer the city affairs, rather than the state, which would have no financial responsibility.

The commission stated in the resolution which expressed their opposition to the bill that they supported the right of all city employees to seek improved working conditions through their own municipal legislative bodies.

### Police Presence At B. H. Strike Approved By City

Presence In Line With Policy Of Co-operation, Says City Manager Gunn

The city commission listened at the Monday evening meeting to a review by the city manager of co-operation on the response to the local police department to a request for aid from the county sheriff's department during the recent Malleable Products strike in Benton Harbor.

During that strike five local police went to Benton Harbor on six different days, being absent on an average of 2 1/2 hours per day. While the call from the sheriff's department was in the form of a request, it could have been mandatory under a state law which gives the sheriff power to call every peace officer in the county to any place, for any length of time during which, in his judgment, an emergency exists.

The local police were called during early morning hours when an emergency was most likely. All the police went without protest. City Manager Gunn stated further:

"For the information of the Commission, the facts influencing our decision are as follows:

"The sheriff can, if he deems it necessary, order out assistance. His authority under the law is very broad. In this case we were 'requested', not 'ordered', but in my opinion the more polite term does not remove our obligation to respond.

"The wholehearted cooperation between the sheriff and the local police, and between the local departments, works to the advantage of all. You may recall that about eight months ago it appeared that we might need assistance from the sheriff. On that occasion he guaranteed that we would receive police protection, for whatever period of time was needed to clarify our situation. We need the larger departments more than they need us, for they have more to offer. You are aware that we do not lodge women prisoners in the Buchanan jail. They are taken to Niles, as well as all others in excess of the capacity of our jail. At the present time we take all of our prisoners to Niles, since our jail is being moved. No charge is made for any of this service. If we ask the sheriff or any city in the county for assistance of any kind, we can be sure to get it.

"Police protection for the city was maintained throughout the six-day period. Two men remained on duty here, and the others were all available for immediate recall by radio. If the police car did NOT go to Benton Harbor."

After listening to the explanation the city commission voted a unanimous approval.

## Conservation Dist. To Conduct Better '51 Pasture Contest

The Galien River Soil Conservation district directors in co-operation with local dairy processors and the Berrien County Extension Service, plan to conduct a 1951 Better Pasture Contest, according to district chairman, Paul Smith of Galien.

The 1951 contest will be open to all farm owners in the Galien River Soil Conservation district which includes the following townships: New Buffalo, Three Oaks, Chickaming, Weesaw, Galien, Buchanan, Bertrand, and Niles. Cash awards totaling \$100 are being provided by dairies purchasing milk in the area included.

The purpose of this contest is to encourage greater and more efficient pasture production, for efficient livestock production and effective soil and water conservation. Entry blanks are available from Soil Conservation district directors, Edward Jelmet and Clarence W. of Three Oaks, and Fred Young, Niles, Raymond DeWitt, Buchanan, and P. Smith of Galien. In addition to the directors, Smith says that the Buchanan Soil Conservation office and the County Extension office at Benton Harbor have application blanks available. The contest will include the 1951 pasture season, entries should be in the Cooperative Extension office by April 15, 1951.

A varied and interesting program has been planned for the Annual Junior Farm Bureau banquet to be held on March 8. Several of the county Junior Farm Bureau members will participate in the entertainment. Allan Seyfried, Galien, county Junior Farm Bureau president, will serve as the toastmaster at the affair. T. C. 1 slightly beaten egg 2 1/2 cups cooked macaroni  
2 1/2 cup Fat Milk 4 tablespoons melted butter

1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 teaspoon salt 7 oz. can tuna

Our City - Introducing Your Fire Department

Whether it was because of Providence or a good fire department, Buchanan has been singularly free of serious fires for many years. It has been said that such a record can be traced to divine providence, since two of the three worst fires in the past 25 years destroyed the Methodist church and the Church of Christ, the other destroying most of the old high school building, except that part now housing the manual training department and the heating plant.

Aside from all that, most people will agree that Buchanan has exceptionally good fire protection, especially when it is considered that it is manned by volunteer firemen. When it is considered that every crew that takes to a fire must be summoned from homes or employment places ranging up to three-quarters of a mile away from the fire station, the record of approximately three minutes from the first shriek of the siren to the get-away of the first truck is very good indeed. Cities in this vicinity with well-trained and full-time fire departments have not fared nearly so well as Buchanan.

The local fire protection squad is composed of 16 men, averaging about 8 to 9 years on the force, the oldest in point of service being Carl Thanning, with 25 years of experience.

For a long time the department membership has been limited to 16 men, chosen by the department itself from a waiting list of applicants. When there is a vacancy in the department, the members convene and scrutinize very closely the next-in-line. If for any reason the applicant seems not well qualified, the second-in-line is studied. And so on.

ver, Neal Burks. Ten of the 16 are employed at the Clark Equipment plant, nine on the 8-12 shift and one on the 1-12 shift. One works days at the Bendix plant in South Bend, and the five remaining are in business, or related employment.

The members who respond to a fire call receive \$2.50 for the first hour, and \$1.50 for each hour or fraction thereof they remain on duty. By length of experience they are for the most part well qualified, and in addition each member has received a certificate for completing 12 weeks of training in the elements of fire fighting.

What happens when there is a fire? The first element in procedure, all aside from the origin of the fire, is its discovery. Some one must find it. Ordinarily you would suppose that the next in order would be to call the fire department just as quickly as possible.

No, say the fire department officials. The first thing is to find out whether there is anyone in the building. A life is more valuable than property. If there is any chance that there might be anyone in it, asleep or unlikely to other reasons to get out, that should be checked first.

When you are sure of that, say the department heads, then get the call in. In doing that be very careful to give accurately information on the location. In some cases, particularly in the event of rural fires, the information may not be accurate but not definite enough. However, that time is always terribly important in fighting fire. Even a minute or two may decide the issue.

Nearly 50% of the fire calls made are not clear enough even if not inaccurate as far as they go. Supposing you have only recently come to town and live in an apartment or room which you rent. You might even get your mail at the postoffice so that the matter of correct address might

not seem important. Still you should know the name of the street on which you live and your number on the street. You should also know the directions, the points of the compass. A small but surprising number do not.

But supposing an outsider who knows neither streets nor numbers sees and reports the fire—what to do? Try to give the general direction and then pick a landmark and its direction from the scene of the fire.

Doubtless it would be a part of good fire protection to school yourself on how you would call the fire department. That is especially true in the case of country homes.

When the call is made at the fire station, one of the attendants that is on duty day or night, first sound the siren and then immediately start calling the individual firemen, as sometimes they may not hear the alarm. The attendant keeps the siren going until four firemen have arrived, which is the minimum for manning a truck. When the first truck leaves the attendant will stop the siren but will call all the homes of men not yet arrived.

It may be a stormy night, there may be noise in the house or outside that temporarily prevents the department member from hearing a siren. There is never any difficulty in getting a telephone response. As a rule the firemen wear zippered coveralls that they can hastily slip over night wear without dressing, regular firemen's boots, and rain coats and hats, often kept in the car. An average of from 10 to 11 men report for fires. In the next installment we will consider their procedure and equipment details.

Legislative News Letter

FEBRUARY-28, 1951

Berrien Co. Repr. Don R. Peasly. A Senate Joint Resolution proposing a constitutional amendment to allow equalizing the salaries of Supreme Court justices, received House approval in time to be placed on the April ballot for a vote of the people.

At the same time, efforts to place another amendment on the April ballot, called for by the House, after lengthy debate, could not secure the necessary 67 votes to pass the resolution barring any person convicted of a felony from membership in the State Legislature. It was argued that it was too sweeping in nature, with no provision for extenuating circumstances, and all attempts at compromise to come to a vote, were defeated. It was also argued by opponents that since the Constitution makes each branch of the Legislature the sole judge of the qualifications of its members, it was not necessary to clutter up the spring ballot with an additional amendment.

Permissive legislation, sought by various Registrars of Deeds, as an economy measure, to allow use of plat files rather than a heavy cumbersome and expensive leather-bound plat book, ran into some stiff opposition by opponents who feared the possible loss of valuable plats unless bound in a book. Objections were overcome and the bill passed when it was shown that it was permissive legislation and there was no possible chance to lose a single plat since none of them could or would be taken from the Registrar's office.

Also passed was a bill providing a supplemental appropriation of \$1,250,000 to reimburse local units of government for veterans' homestead exemptions.

The bill amending the cigarette tax act is having tough sledding. While in agreement as to the purpose of the bill, namely, to close loopholes in tax collection which is costing the State a loss in revenue of from half to one and a half million dollars annually, and to break up the bootleg rings, opposition is strong as to the manner in which the purpose is to be accomplished. Several amendments have been accepted which have made it necessary to order a reprint of the bill, but the bill is far from being accepted by the majority yet, and further action has been postponed to March 6. In the meantime another cigarette tax bill has been introduced, which would make use of a stamp tax system.

Among bills introduced in the last few days is one to take the sales tax on food.

Another bill would impose a 4 percent corporate net income tax. This is the administration measure which the Legislature refused to enact two years ago.

Another bill would require head gear, approved by the State Board of Control of Athletics, to be worn by all participants in boxing or sparring matches to prevent head injuries.

Two bills were introduced on liquor. One would legalize the Sunday sale of liquor in cities of 50,000 and over. The bill would provide that liquor could be sold between the hours of 1 p.m. and midnight. The other bill would take the State out of the liquor business.

Another bill would permit village officers and members of the village commission, by unanimous vote of the legislative body, to contract or perform labor or furnish materials to the village.

A joint resolution was introduced proposing a constitutional amendment which would remove public officers from office if they refused to testify or sign a waiver of immunity concerning official actions or conduct.

Of interest, is a bill which would permit buying of a car without being forced by dealer to trade in another car. The bill would also make optional the purchase of accessories. It also provides that orders must be filled in the order received, and that both orders, together with names and addresses of buyers, as well as quotas of cars received from the factory be posted in a conspicuous place in the showroom.

On March 14, a public hearing will be held in the House chambers at 8 p.m. on the attached four bills.

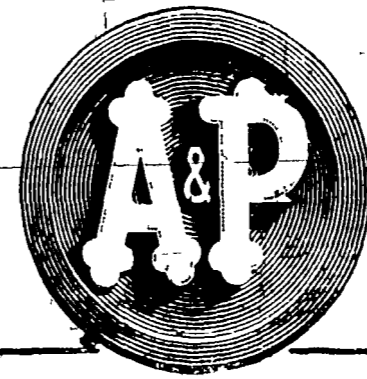

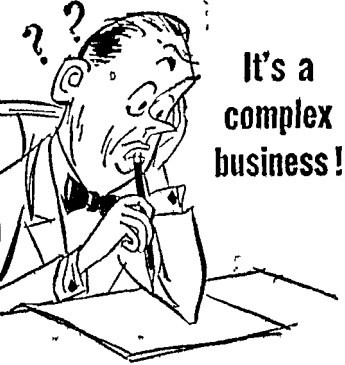

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
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
