## Buchanan Lags In Red Cross Drive

### All Who Intend to Give Are Urged to Contribute Soon as Possible

Buchanan still lags very considerably in the drive for its 1945 Red Cross War Fund quota of \$6,600, according to the drive chairman, Mrs. H. H. Banke.

All who can give are urged to make their contributions as early as possible. Money may be left at the H. H. Banke Plumbing shop, at the office of Dr. J. C. Strayer, or at the Union State Bank. Organizations making the canvass are the Navy Mothers' Club, the Mothers of World War II, the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, and the American Legion Auxiliary.

Berrien county is one-fifth of its way toward the \$66,000 goal of the 1945 American Red Cross War Fund according to Atty. Robert F. Small, general chairman. Contributions for the first 10 days of the campaign total \$18,543.34 in the county.

Coincident with the campaign is an appeal of the county camp and hospital committee of the chapter for donations for canes to be used by the amputees at Fort Custer Station Hospital, the annex of Percy Jones. According to Mrs. Thomas Nowlen, chairman of the committee, there is immediate need of 2,000 such canes. Percy Jones, which two years ago numbered 2,000 beds now has more than 8,000 and is enlarging daily. Mrs. Nowlen also is desirous of securing five 12-cup coffee makers for the boys in the wards. She will welcome the donation of this size or information where she may purchase such coffee makers.

Another important Red Cross function is the appeal for overseas workers. These are paid positions such as field directors and recreational directors as well as stenographic and hospital assistants. Minimum salary for men is \$225 and \$150 for women. H. B. Veneklasen has been selected chairman of a recruiting committee in the county. Further information may be secured at the St. Joseph headquarters of the chapter, 409 Lake Boulevard.

## Ralph Gray Awarded Bronze Star Medal

With the 32nd Infantry Division in the Philippines—Private First Class Ralph W. Gray, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Gray, 210 East 4th street, Buchanan, Mich., has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for "heroic achievement" against the Japs during the fighting on Leyte Island in the Philippines.

When well prepared Jap positions halted his company's advance, Gray volunteered to attempt to destroy them with a flame-thrower. Braving heavy enemy machine gun and sniper fire, he advanced to within fifteen feet of the positions and employed his weapon, destroying the positions and killing or dislodging their occupants. His heroic action enabled the company to resume its advance.

Private Gray entered the army in April 1941 and came overseas with the famed Red Arrow division in April 1942. He is a veteran of the Buna, Saider, Aitape, Norotai, and Levte campaigns.

## Father of Rakowski Brothers Here Dies

Frank Rakowski, aged 84, of rural route No. 2, Niles, Mich., died at 4:35 p. m. Tuesday, March 6, in Quack Convalescent hospital near Niles after a month's illness. He was a retired farmer. Born in Poland Oct. 24, 1860, he came to South Bend from that country 50 years ago and had resided in the vicinity of Niles for the last 27 years. Surviving are six sons, Samuel, Sylvester and John Rakowski, of Buchanan, Mich.; Joseph Rakowski of rural route No. 2, Niles; Alex Rakowski of Chicago, and Stanley Rakowski, of San Francisco, Calif., and seven daughters, Mrs. Mary Otolski and Mrs. Regina Paczesny, both of South Bend, Sister M. ## Lawrence Jackson Wounded in Action in Germany Feb. 22

Mrs. Ethel Place, Route 1, Buchanan, was informed by telegram last week that her son, Pfc. Lawrence E. Jackson, had been wounded in action in Germany on Feb. 22.

A few days afterward she received a letter written by her son from the hospital, with reassuring details as to his condition. The letter follows:

Dearest Mom and Family: A lot has happened since my letter yesterday. I honestly had a feeling something was about to happen—it did.

Everything is okeh now, except after effects of a slight concussion, a bad ear and a few scratches, the result of a shell coming too close. It wasn't over two feet from me—a proof that all our prayers are not in vain. I feel like new tonight but nurse won't even let me take in the brass band that's coming off down on first floor. It's a bloody war, but we're winning fast now.

I lost my best buddy, but he didn't suffer any. Don't let anyone think I am really hurt, because I'm telling you exactly how I am. As ever, your son, Lawrence.

## Robert Ochenryder Gets Posthumous Silver Star Award

The Silver Star has been posthumously awarded to Pfc. Robert Ochenryder, 21, who was killed in action while serving with the infantry in France, Oct. 27, 1944. The War Department notified his wife, the former Bernice Hempfl, and daughter, Rose Marie, 923 Sycamore St., Niles, Mich. The citation read as follows:

Silver Star Award

"For gallantry in action at 27 October, 1944. When his company was pinned down by enemy machine gun fire during the daylight attack to clear the private First Class Ochenryder, a bazooka gunner, courageously crawled forward to a position beyond the front lines and coolly destroyed one of the machine-gun emplacements with accurate fire from his bazooka. This done, he crawled to another position and directed fire against a second machine-gun with his three remaining rounds of ammunition. Two of these rounds proved to be high and with the third he killed one of the enemy manning the machine gun. Out of ammunition, he remained in the forward position, without regard for his personal safety, under fire of the enemy machine gun, at which position he was killed by an enemy sniper. His fearless action was a factor in alleviating his company's precarious position. The brilliant display of courage, initiative, and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon Private First Class Ochenryder and the armed forces of the United States."

## ASTRP Tests To Be Given At High School on April 12

Applications must be received by Principal Bailey by March 31.

Qualifying tests for the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program will be given at the Buchanan High School on April 12, according to announcement received by Principal P. T. Bailey.

Applications to take the test here should be sent to Principal Bailey, and must be received by him not later than March 31. Information furnished by the announcement from the Chicago Headquarters Service Command is as follows:

A nation-wide qualifying test for the selection of candidates for the ASTRP will be conducted on 12 April, 1945, at all high schools and colleges to which eligible applicants submit requests for the examination. The examination will be administered by a civilian agency which will be responsible for distribution of tests, scoring and reporting results. Complete information will be furnished school officials about 1 March, 1945. The test will be open to young men who were born after 30 September, 1927, and before 1 September, 1928, and who will have graduated from high school prior to date of their enrollment in the ASTRP program. Those who qualify on this test will be eligible for enrollment in the ASTRP and assignment to selected colleges and universities for terms beginning in the months of July, August and September 1945 only.

To establish eligibility for enrollment in the ASTRP, those who pass the qualifying test are required to enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps, but they are not called to active duty until fourteen (14) days after the completion of the term in which they become 18 years of age. Depending on their age at date of entrance into the program, they are eligible for two, three or four 12-week terms. Trainees accepted for the ASTRP are furnished transportation from their homes to the designated educational institutions, housing, messing, tuition, books, medical care and certain uniforms while in attendance at college. The program may be considered as the equivalent of a government scholarship which effects a saving to parents of about \$1,000 in costs of education for the average young man who is eligible for college training for three 12-week terms.

## Wagner School Will Reach 100th Anniversary March 18

Just five days after the 100th birthday of Mrs. Annie Morley, observed last week, the Wagner school district will also have its centennial.

Thanks to the interest and industry of Mrs. May Mitchell, the date was kept in mind, and the information gathered from the memories of the oldest living alumni of the district sufficient to rebuild a picture of the life of the district as far back as over 75 years ago.

Mrs. Mitchell wrote to and received letters from the following Wagner scholars of the more or less remote past: Clayton Conrad (former mayor, now city manager of Three Rivers); Andrew Huss, Bend of River, Amanda Clendenen Allen, Three Rivers, Wilbert Conrad, Mt. Dora, Fla.; Elizabeth Wray Mills, Waterford, Ind.; Judson Beckwith, Fruitland, Idaho; J. Willet Smith, Howell, N. Y.; Dr. G. A. Conrad, Sault Ste. Marie.

In previous issues the story of Jane Wagner, grandmother of Buchanan, and of Ira D. Wagner, Jr., has been related. She was the first teacher of the district, starting in 1845. In all Mrs. Mitchell has listed the names of 80 teachers who taught the school during its hundred years. The names of the first 32 teachers were printed a few weeks ago, taking the roll down to the term taught by Miss Eva Chamberlain, 120 Charles Court, Buchanan. It is interesting to note that the twelfth teacher, J. Willet Smith, who taught somewhere between 1875 and 1877, is still living.

## Lt. Glenn F. Koch Honored for Conduct in Action, Germany

Lt. Glenn F. Koch, son of Mrs. Esther Koch, South Bend, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Huss, Buchanan, who was wounded Nov. 23, in action in Germany, has received the Purple Heart medal, the Bronze Star and the Combat Infantryman's badge. He wrote his mother that he received the Purple Heart, the day his father, Wilham Koch who died Jan. 24, was buried.

The Bronze Star was awarded to Lt. Koch for gallantry in action. He and a buddy had spent 10 days in a fox hole under continuous shell fire, when a piece of shrapnel from a mortar shell struck him in the leg. His buddy was badly wounded and Lt. Koch, although wounded himself, helped a medical man give first aid to his buddy.

Lt. Koch, who was in a base hospital in England until recently, writes that he is now back in action.

## Award Contract For Relocation Two Dormitories

J. I. Barnes, Culver, Gets Job; 38 New Trailers Arrive

Nearly all of the 38 new trailers plus three utility trailers have arrived at the local Trailer Park and are now being installed.

In addition to the 150 trailers already there, this makes a total of 188 trailer houses. They are being located between the present trailer colony and River street, on ground used for a softball diamond last summer.

The Federal Public Housing Authority Tuesday announced award of a contract for \$160,740 in construction of two war housing projects at Buchanan, to the James I. Barnes Construction Co., Culver, Ind. The contract includes site improvements necessary for relocation of war trailers, and dormitory buildings with accommodations for 200 workers.

Kenard S. Slocum, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Slocum, 1006 Victory street, has been awarded the Soldier's Medal of Valor for heroism displayed at Neuilly, France, on the night of Oct. 8, 1944.

A bombardier plane had crashed in the immediate area of the planes belonging to his squadron and burst into flames, the gasoline tank and ammunition exploding. Sgt. Slocum, though personally realizing the danger involved, succeeded in moving to safety two of six endangered aircraft. The citation stated that "his cool presence of mind, quick thinking and utter disregard of his own safety saved two aircraft vitally needed in combat operations."

Sgt. Slocum has been in the service three years and overseas 15 months, serving as crew chief of a reconnaissance squadron.
