### Of Lee and Leah And Their Magic Carpet

We rise to ask—why should anyone want to take an interstellar trip to the moon or Mars, when they can board a plane any day at a Chicago airport just after lunch and land in another world before dark?

That was what Leah Weaver and Lee Calbertor did. On June 21 they boarded an 80-passenger plane at Chicago at 12:45 p. m. For nine hours and two minutes they glided through the air four miles above the earth, and then glided smoothly down to the most modern airport in the world in new-old Mexico City at 8:47 p. m. Their time. This was indeed real, not imagined magic, far more marvelous than the magic carpets of the Arabian Nights.

It was after lunch when they left Chicago. It was early evening twilight when they landed in the old Aztec Indian city, built on a 7,800 foot plateau. The reflection of refracting sunlight still hung over the Sleeping Beauty and her Lover, which are specifically the tremendous peaks, 17,000 foot Ixtachalt, and the 18,000 foot Popocatepetl, have hung their backdrop of eternal snows far above the tropical gardens of the city.

The extremes of height and depth of these guardian peaks have in the past been reflected in the comparative living standards of the upper and lower classes. The aristocrats are the minority of the descendants of the Spanish invaders. The lower class is the great mass of the descendants of the original Indian occupants of the land. But the gap is narrowing, because of the program of the Mexican government. Its effects are shown by the fact that when Lee and Leah made their bus trip two years ago the beggars were everywhere. This time they scarcely saw a beggar.

During their near 400 years of submission the Mexican Indians have retained their native arts, while the Spanish have also retained theirs. At the Indian market of Toluco thirty miles outside the city, Lee and Leah saw the genuine art of the native race in their artistic pottery and beautifully designed fabrics. In the monasteries and cathedrals, some nearly 400 years old, they saw the Castilian art of the late Middle Ages.

In the new buildings being erected by the Mexican government, extremes of modern construction and design and windowless walls form a contrast with immense murals covering these walls, practically all reflecting the story of Mexico's past, painted by Mexican artists who include some of the greatest in the world.

The Mexicans take their art where they find it. In the great Palace of Art Lee and Leah saw the magnificent curtain made from a million pieces of glass by the great jewelry and art firm of Tiffany of New York. Here they witness the effects of night, dawn and day and storm over the great peaks of "the sleeping lady" and her "lover," with the Cortez trail winding down between, created by light effects through the curtain mural of colored bits of glass.

We cannot report their trip as they told it. They went and went and went. The worst thing is they went and didn't take us along.

## Moccasin Court Deadline Passed

The deadline of July 1, 1954, set by the Public Housing Administration for vacancy of all units in the Moccasin Court project passed with only one family left as occupants, according to Vera Bachman, housing manager.

First notice for vacation was given on March 15, 1953, at which time the Public Housing Administration ordered that any of the units vacated should not be rented. By the fore-part of June, 1954, there were only about 15 tenants left, all others having made satisfactory arrangements in Buchanan, Niles, South Bend, and in lesser numbers out of this area. Of the 15 left, Mrs. Bachman stated that all but about 6 had made arrangements, either by building, buying or renting, and would be out before the deadline. The final result was most satisfactory as it had been feared that there might be many who would fail to vacate and that some inconvenience might result.

Mrs. Bachman said that as of Friday (July 10) she had had no notice from the Disposition Section of the P. H. A. when final steps would be made to dispose of the properties. It is presumed that when that time arrives the Disposition Section will ask for sealed bids, with the condition that all houses bought must be removed from the site.

Three local persons, William Moore and Hazel Smiles of Buchanan and Charles Lewis of Niles, have purchased the sites of one housing unit each, after furnishing a performance bond that they will meet all requirements for the rehabilitation of the units on their lots, if they buy them at the disposal sale. These requirements are:

- 1 Ownership of site
- 2 New electric service and a check of wiring
- 3 Addition of concrete block foundations and concrete footings around entire base
- 4 Add chimney of approved construction material
- 5 Add new pitch room structure over entire house
- 6 Replace rotted or defective floor beams, joists or flooring
- 7 Add new exterior siding
- 8 Repaint all exterior trim

The tenants remain in the houses, as special dealings with the lot owners exclude them from the necessity of moving for the time being at least.

## Dewey Avenue School Again Up For Sale

Open Bids Aug. 10 For Sale 93-Year-Old Building And Large Grounds

Once more the Dewey Avenue school building, now nearing the dawn of its hundredth year, is to be advertised for bids, together with the three large lots on which it stands.

The Board of Education has an advertisement in this issue which announces that all bids received will be opened on Aug. 10 at the hour of 7:30 p. m. in the presence of the Superintendent of Schools.

The terms are stated in detail in the advertisement on another page. The board reserves the right to reject any and all bids for any reason or no reason, at the end of the month following the opening, all earnest money to be returned to all bidders at that time.

The main part of the building, which is from the south end just past the western exit, is now about 98 years old. It was opened for use for the fall term of 1856, the first principal being George M. Dewey, grandfather of Thomas E. Dewey, present governor of New York state, and twice Republican candidate for the presidency. It represented the "union school" idea which then swept Michigan meaning the creation of larger buildings built on life basis of the union of several districts, with division of classes under several teachers.

It had been retired from use at least twice. The first time was in 1872, when the old high school building was complete in the rear of the present structure. It was afterwards restored to public school use and additions were built on it. It was finally (we hope) vacated for school use when the present new Moccasin school was opened in the fall of 1943.

## Biggest Little Lions Club Sends 8 To Convention

Believed Largest In Ratio Of Delegates To Membership

The Buchanan Lions were represented at the 37th annual International convention in New York City this past weekend by a delegation of eight. The Buchanan attendees were the delegates consisting of Frank Poorman, Robert O. Barnes, William Burkett, William Strayer and the alternates, consisting of Wayne Castle, Lowell Swem, O. D. Proseus and Caryl Herman.

The official dates of the convention were July 8-9-10-11, with the general headquarters in Madison Square Gardens and the official hotel the Statler. The business meetings were held mornings, with programs of entertainment in the afternoon and evening. High lights in entertainment included the game between the Giants and Pirates baseball teams at the Polo Grounds and tours of the following places of interest: Empire State building, Statue of Liberty, Coney Island, the immense new American ocean liner "United States", also considerable subway riding.

It is believed that the Buchanan delegation of eight had a valid claim to being the largest present in ratio of delegates to club membership in the United States. It was larger in actual numbers than that of any city in this area, including South Bend. The state of Michigan had the second largest number of delegates, surpassed only by the host state, New York. The local delegation got back Saturday evening, happy though bent a bit, and very enthusiastic over the worth-while occasion.

## Court house round-up

St. Joseph — Berrien county barristers made what was for them a momentous decision this week. Never before has the Berrien county bar association taken a stand for or against candidates for judicial offices.

But this week they decided the time had come to shatter precedent. They didn't mention Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield by name, but they left little doubt about whom they were talking when members of the association adopted a resolution declaring that "a man who cannot argue a law case cannot judge one."

Judge Hatfield is not a lawyer, but he is nevertheless a candidate for one of the two circuit judge-

ships to be filled in the general election this fall. Hatfield thinks his 22 years on the probate bench qualifies him for the advancement.

The lawyers disagree. They feel that a "person who is not qualified to practice law without legal education could not possibly fulfill the functions of circuit judge. We further believe that the public good would be seriously jeopardized by the election of any such candidate."

Those are pretty harsh words for attorneys who still have to practice before Hatfield even if he should be beaten for circuit judge. His term as probate judge still has two years to run. But they went on to make them

even harsher.

"The complex nature of our society has led to the development of rules of law governing the trial of cases and the determination of personal and property rights which present difficulties even to the most scholarly and experienced lawyers. It is imperative to the orderly administration of justice by the courts that the judges of the circuit court be lawyers."

Those are usually fighting words to Hatfield, who loves nothing better than a good old-fashioned political roughhouse. But this time he let them pass without one of his well-known, literary counter-attacks.

He just went blithely on tackling up "Hatfield for Circuit Judge" signs on every telephone pole in sight.

If you should see supervisors Frank Kinst in New Buffalo, or, perhaps, Frank Porman or E. B. Ross over in Buchanan passing out handbills this week, don't get the idea that they are running for re-election.

They're not. And what they are passing out isn't handbills, either.

It is simply that every one of Berrien county's 43 county supervisors agreed to turn salesmen for awhile at a regular meeting of the board this week. They agreed to go out and sell the voters on the need for a new Berrien county courthouse and a new county infirmary.

The leaflets they'll be handing out are — far from handbills — really brochures, telling the voters all about the two buildings the board wants to erect and advising them to vote "yes" on the special ballot they'll be handed in the August 3 primary.

A vote "yes" will mean the voters sanction the plans to build both buildings and the plan under which the board would like to finance them — a 2-mill special tax levy over a 5-year period.

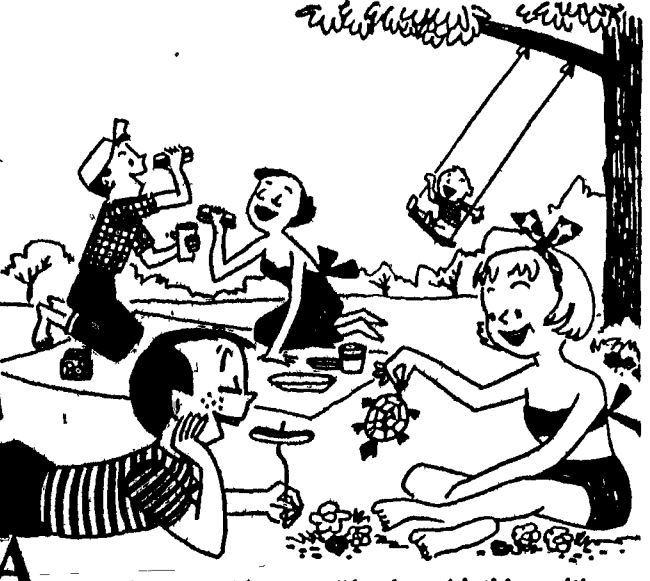
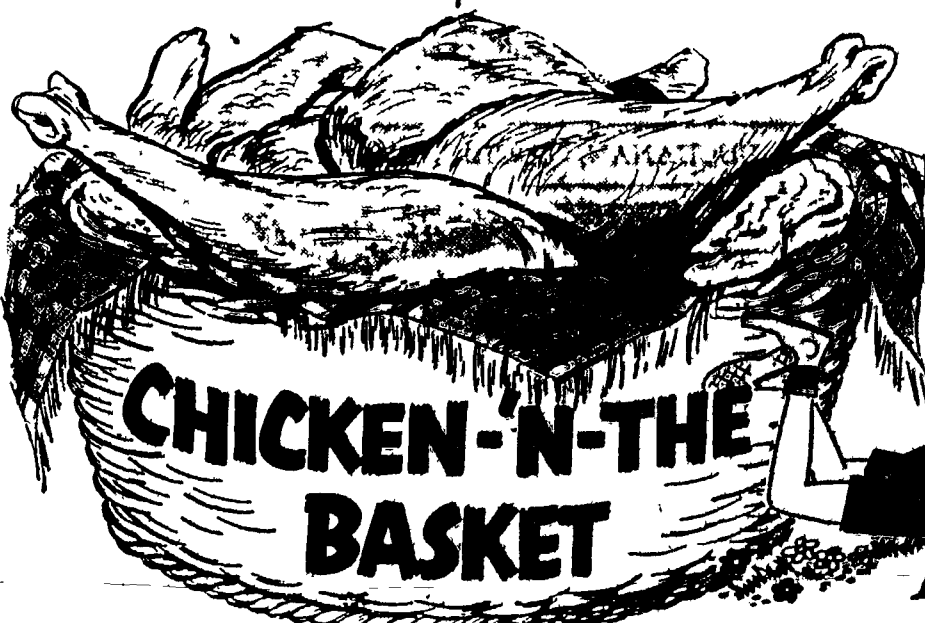
It is what the board calls "pay-as-you-go" financing, a scheme that worked out well on both the county jail and the county home projects, both of which have been completed during the past two years.

The tax levy will raise \$2,500,000, just what the board needs to pay the shot for the two buildings. The courthouse, supervisors say, will give the county the room it needs to adequately house its various offices.

### Weather Sneaks Up On Buchanan Wheat Farmers

The first of the present week dry weather sneaked up in the night on Buchanan farmers who had received so many setbacks from storm that they did not expect combining conditions before the middle of the week at best. But all of a sudden Monday of this week the wheat was ready to combine in most fields. Moreover the price had been advancing, as much as 8 cents in one day, until it reached \$1.85 per bushel, compared with \$1.67 the previous week. Quality as reflected in weight appeared to be lower than that of the banner crop of last year, when the greater part—graded No. 1, with a weight of 60 pounds per bushel or over. So far the wheat coming to the Co-ops elevator has averaged from 54 to 56 pounds per bushel, with an average of 56. The grade-down in price for low weight is as follows: No. 1, 60 lbs. and over, full price; No. 2, 58 to 60, 1c less.

The average yield in the Buchanan district is estimated at 25 bushels per acre this year. The average yield last year was closer to 35 bushels. It is estimated that the average income per acre from Buchanan wheat fields may be \$17.50 under last year because of a combination of lower

grading, lower prices and lower yields.

The majority of wheat growers were in the fields by yesterday (Wednesday). Practically all farmers with any acreage of wheat to speak of have combines. O. Wellbaum and others who have power self-powered combines are engaged to open fields of those who have tractor-drawn units, as the former machine does not create any "down-swath" on the first rounds. Also the self-propelled units do considerable custom combining on smaller farms.

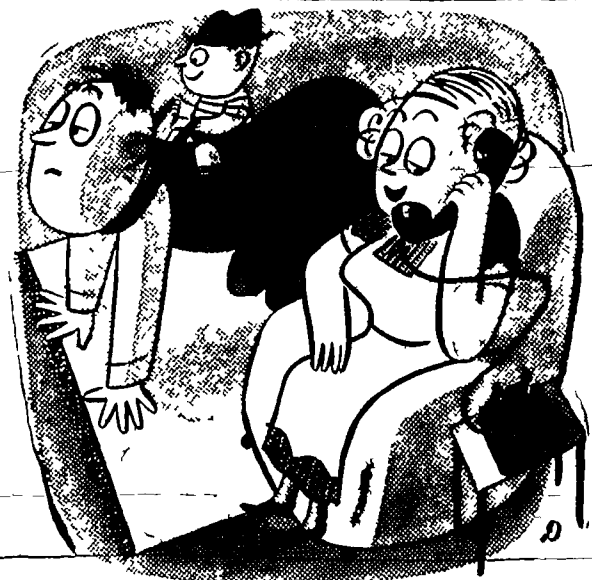
## The Story of Buchanan



### J. D. Ross Lawn Center Of Social Life In 1870's

Before we ring down the curtain on the 1870's in Buchanan, let's take a brief backward look. There was something contradictory about the picture as it has been painted in recent installments of this series, particularly in the mixture of seemingly prosperous activity in the manufacture of wagons and furniture as compared

with low wages and frequent layoffs. This was because, in the midst of the deep-national depression which struck in 1873 and continued into the middle 1870's throughout the United States, Buchanan just happened to be mining out a bonanza in the fine hardwood forests, with a railway on the edge of the town that connected with a natural market — the flood of immigration of farmers across the Mississippi and Missouri into the last rich farm lands of the Middle West. This resulted in a continuing demand at very low prices and consequently low local wages. There was enough prosperity

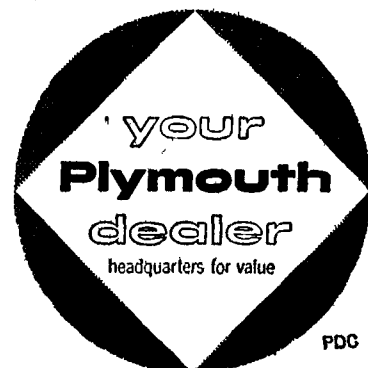

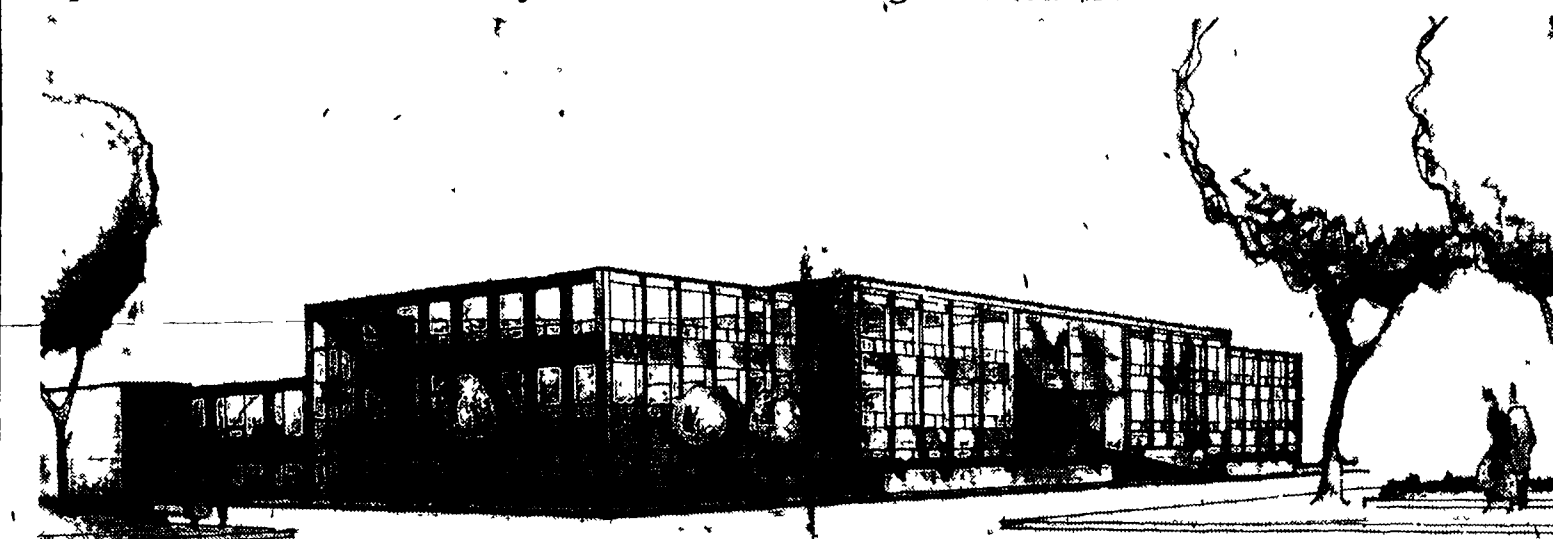

Above is the frontal ejection of Berrien county's proposed new court house building, which is to be presented to the voters—together with the proposed county home for the aged, in one special package at the coming primary election. The resolution which phrases the

issue proposing the two-mill levy which would raise approximately \$2,500,000 over a five-year period to provide funds for construction of both buildings. Half the amount would finance the proposed U-shaped two-story building with one-story wings, to be built around the present structure of

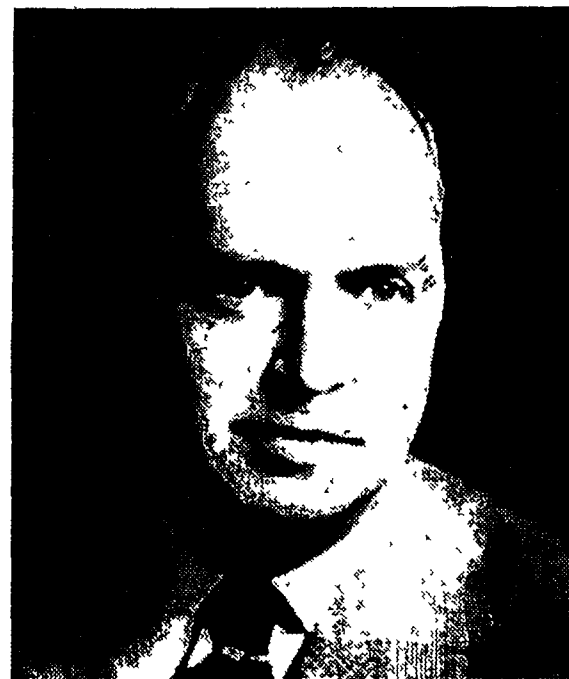

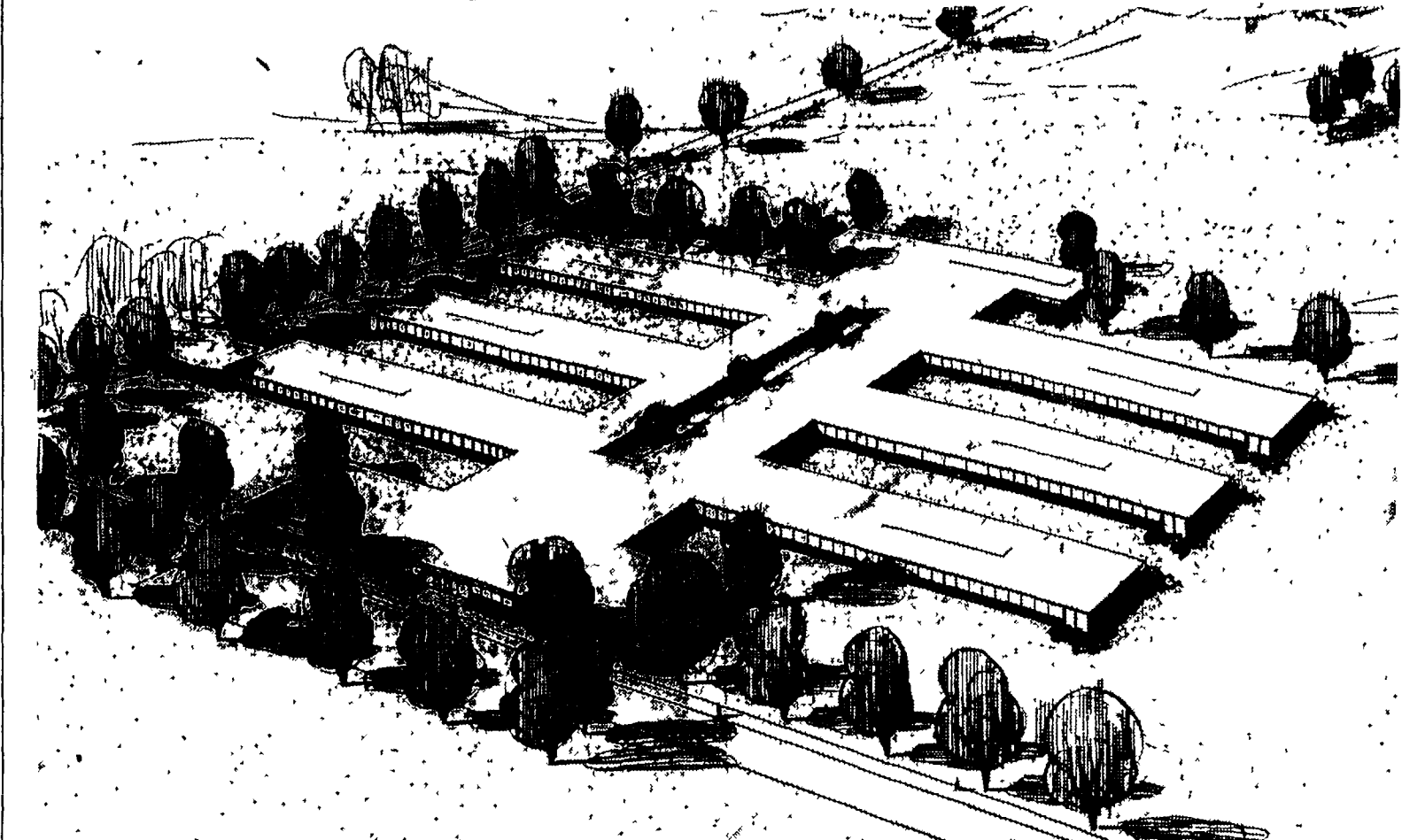

## Proposed New Berrien County Home For The Aged



**PROPOSED HOME FOR BERRIEN COUNTY AGED**—Above is shown the plans for the proposed home for the 160 aged men and women of Berrien county, who are dependent on county and state aid for housing, food and medical care.

Of the 160 aged included in the county welfare program 40 men are now confined to the convalescent ward of the Berrien county hospital at Berrien Center. In addition 40 men and 15 women are housed in the county infirmary proper.

The remaining 65 aged people are residents of various private convalescent homes throughout the county. These and those who are in the convalescent wards of the county hospital may be shunted back and forth, as emergencies arise. This is not pleasant for them and their transportation by ambulance is expensive to the county.

In addition the dispersal of these people over the county must be regularly visited by the members of the welfare department at the expense of added time and travel cost.

The proposed new home would house all these people under one roof. This would mean that medical care and attention would be close at hand for all. A supervised diet kitchen would provide attention to dietary needs. Occupational therapy would provide activity with resulting mental relief.

## Meet Your Merchant



Last week it was Wayne and Donald Stubbs, this week it is Joseph and Donald Roti. The story of this week differs mainly in covering a larger expanse of time and more changes in business.

Joseph Roti came to Buchanan in 1916, about a year before the present junior partner was born. He opened a shoe repair business with a few lines of workmen's shoes on sale in the wooden building where the Surplus store now is at East Front street. Mrs. Roti came in 1917, bringing her month-old son, Donald.

After two years there, Mr. Roti entered into partnership with Dominic DiGiacomo. The Brooks General Store, located in the building now owned by Herman Kujawa, was being closed by the owner, Mr. Brooks, who moved all of his stock except the shoes to South Bend and established the Star Store there. Roti and DiGiacomo had purchased the shoes, which they later sold to Harry Jones, who came here from Coldwater. Roti agreed to remain in the store with Jones for one year. However, Jones soon went bankrupt. Mr. Roti bought the small shoe stock remaining and moved it to the present quarters of Marlin Kean's barber shop on Main street, terminating five years of tenancy in the present Kujawa building on Front street.

He bought the small building on Main from Esther Parkinson and remained there a year. Then he bought a larger building at 110 Main street, lately vacated by Daisy's Delicatessen, transferring his shoe business there in 1927 and remaining until 1939. That year he sold the Main street location and bought from Dan Merson the building he still occupies at 209 East Front street.

He immediately installed a better display front and made other improvements. In 1949 the present handsome modern front and beautiful interior were installed.

Mr. Roti was active in business organization in Buchanan in his earlier years, having been a member of the Chamber of Commerce, which flourished in the late 1920's, and also treasurer and then president of the Buchanan Luncheon Club of the early 1930's.

The junior partner, Donald, entered the firm 4 years ago in 1950 and has in the meantime made himself a place in the business community as well as in the city at large. He was appointed chairman on the 1952 March of Dimes campaign in Buchanan, making a brilliant success, and has since been a member of the Berrien county Polo Fund Committee. He was elected president of the Buchanan Business Association in 1952.

At the tender age of one month, Don decided that he would prefer growing up in a small town, and consequently came with his parents from Chicago. He went through the Buchanan schools, graduating from high school here in 1935. He was then graduated from Western Michigan College in 1941, and immediately entered service in the U. S. Navy, serving at Corpus Christi, Texas, Newport, R. I., and 1½ years in the South Pacific.

While serving at Newport he was married to a WSC classmate, Shirley Louise Lemmer of Kalamazoo. They have four children, Joseph, Lee, 10, Anne Louise, 7, Mary Margaret, 5, Donna Jean, 2.

The 38-year span of the Roti shoe business in Buchanan has seen the town develop from a country village with muddy unpaved streets, intermittent board, brick and concrete sidewalks, or none at all, to a well-improved and progressive small city. While in his first business site in the present Surplus Store building, Joseph Roti watched the laying of the East Front street brick pavement by hand, from the corner of Front and Days avenue east to Portage street. Previously Front street had been paved from Days avenue to Oak street.

Father and son have since contributed to the modernization and improvement of trading facilities in Buchanan by the development of one of the finest shoe stores, in respect to building, equipment and stock, in southwestern Michigan.

## GOP Peace Pact Meeting Is Not 100 Pct. Success

Special to the RECORD—

All is not as calm in the Republican primary camp as had been hoped by party leaders.

The GOP rally June 26 when all gubernatorial candidates were "expected" to announce a peace pact with each other and a concentrated attack on their Democratic opponent was only 75% successful. One of the four candidates wouldn't go along with the idea.

He is Dr. Eugene C. Keyes. The doctor, who is not considered by most observers to have much chance of winning the nomination, made it plain he had other plans. "It is my duty to point out to the voters the weaknesses of the other candidates," said Dr. Keyes. And he proceeded to list his opinion why Leonard and Cleary are not good candidates. As far as Brake is concerned, Keyes offered a grudging, "—not too bad."

A source close to GOP strategists evaluated Keyes' actions. "Apparently the doctor thinks he must do something dramatic in order to win attention of voters."

Interparty bickering that characterized GOP primaries for several campaigns has, in the opinion of many, cost the Republicans several elections. Keyes' insistence on fighting Republican candidates could start another battle which would lead to hard feelings after the primary.

A proposed solution to this costly condition is the pre-primary convention. Harold O. Love, Detroit tax attorney, has been trying to sell the idea to Republican bigwigs for several years.

Last September the GOP State Central Committee shelved the idea "for further study."

Efforts to make the pre-primary convention part of the Republican platform will be made again this year.

Love is preparing a post-card which will be sent to each delegate. It makes a plea for the

idea. Part of the message says: "In the interest of party harmony and party responsibility, let's all put our best efforts into coming up with a workable solution to the present unsatisfactory situation."

Editorial support for the idea appeared in the Detroit News on June 15. The News holds that pre-primary convention is a sound idea for both Democrats and Republicans. Part of the News' editorial states:

"The decision to hold pre-primary conventions lies with the party organization, no new law is needed to authorize them. They do not preclude anyone from qualifying as a legal candidate; all they provide is a party stamp of approval. If the aspirant will submit himself and his qualifications to a convention of his party and if he survives that scrutiny."

"Dropped as fast as it started was the drive announced by the Michigan Committee for Better Schools. This plan, which came out of Detroit as a means to benefit metropolitan school districts, met with approval of virtually no group or individual in educational circles. In fact, some of the strongest language heard in many years concerning school problems, used by administration heads."

Prentiss M. Brown, widely respected for his contribution to Michigan civic projects, was listed as chairman of the Committee for Better Schools. Many critics of the plan expressed surprise that Brown "was sold a bill of goods" and believed he did not understand some of its more subtle implications. It was Brown who revealed that the program would be dropped.

A Michigan "Seaway Plan" will be discussed at a series of meetings of the House Marine Affairs Committee. The first session will be held in Port Huron on July 17. Representatives from 17 port cities will be invited.

Purpose of the meetings according to Rep. Clements R. Decker (I-11) "is to find out what legislation is needed to help develop port facilities in preparation for the St. Lawrence seaway."

Dates for other meetings have not yet been announced but Cle-

ments said the group will meet at each of the following cities: Detroit, Saginaw, Traverse City, Benton Harbor, Bay City, Alpena, Muskegon, Holland, Ludington, Frankfort, Sault Ste. Marie, Escanaba, Marquette, Houghton and Menominee.

A proposal to legalize bingo will be on the Nov. 2 ballot. Petitions requiring referendum of charity gambling were filed last week by Charles R. MacLean, attorney for the Michigan Association of Non-profit Charitable Organizations.

If passed, the proposal will enable the legislature to set up legal bingo games, etc., for non-profit charitable organizations only. At present legislative action along this line is prohibited by the Constitution.

MacLean emphasized that the same law which permits charitable groups to hold lotteries

should also specifically prohibit profiteering by "professional" operators. "If any but charitable groups get into this thing," he said, "it'll kill the whole idea for everyone."

A new solution for an old quarrel is being tried at Silver Lake, 15 miles north of Grand Rapids. By mutual agreement summer and permanent residents have agreed not to operate outboard motors after 5 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays. This leaves the lake completely open to fishermen. A meeting has been set for next fall when the success of this idea can be discussed.
