L. E. Southerton Killed In M-60 Car-Truck Crash

Split-second tragedy wiped out three lives about 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, when a collision between an automobile and a truck on M-60 a short distance west of Bakerston brought instant death to Lloyd Southerton of Buchanan, Wallace R. Stantz of 406 West Marion street, South Bend, and Elmer O. Stenbauer of 27 Seymour street, Lansing.

Collision Car And Cheese Truck Takes Three Lives

The two vehicles crashed nearly head-on, the impact throwing the lighter automobile off across the hood of the truck cab which it flattened against the truck body, crushing Stantz and Stenbauer who rode with him.

Miss Reed, Daughter Of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Reed, Who Live On The North Side Of The Highway Immediately East Of The McCoy's Creek Bridge

Miss Reed said that she was looking out of the window of her home and saw Southern go by. She was still watching him when she saw his right wheels go off the pavement as he went around the curve. The wheels left the pavement immediately on the east side of the creek. As he righted his car, back off the highway he apparently lost control for a moment and went diagonally across the paving into the left lane, on which the Stantz truck approached from the west. He had apparently gotten his "gander control" and had veered sharply back to the right when the Stantz truck, which had veered left in an attempt to avoid the collision, struck the Southern car almost broadside.

Lois Reed And Her Brother, Arthur, Ran To The Scene Of The Accident

The impact had almost stopped the progress of both vehicles. The truck rolled a few rods across the highway, coming to a stop with the left front wheel against the guard rail cable, only a few yards west of the McCoy's Creek bridge.

Miss Reed Said That Southern Had Been Thrown Clear Of The Car And Was Lying On The Pavement Under The Motor Of The Stantz Truck

The truck motor had burst into flames and gasoline was being lost on Southern's body. Arthur Reed pulled the lifeless body out clear of the wreckage. The Southern car had been lifted off the pavement and wrapped around the hood of the Stantz truck, pinning young Stantz and Stenbauer inside Dale Hanover, who lives across the highway, then came and attempted to put out the fire with a small extinguisher he carried and by carrying water in a bucket from the creek he could make no headway. Mr. E. A. Reed called the Buchanan fire department, which came and put out the flames.

Lloyd Emery Southern Was Born Oct. 16, 1923 In Macy, Ind., The Son Of Perry and Cleo Southern

When he was less than a year old his parents moved to the Bakerston district, making their home about 14 years on the Ivan Ferguson farm. Lloyd attended the creek school in that neighborhood. They moved to Glendon about 1938, and he attended New Troy high school. They moved to Buchanan in 1942.

Lloyd Entered Army Service Feb. 3, 1943 After About A Year Of Training As A Mechanic In Aviation Maintenance

He was shipped across the Atlantic with his unit, leaving the United States, Jan. 30, 1944. He served for a year and ten months in the European, African and Middle Eastern theatres, rising to the rank of sergeant. He received his discharge from service Dec. 8, 1945.

He married Marian Strauss of Three Oaks, formerly of the Wagner district, on April 20, 1946. Survivors are the widow, his parents, who lived at 503 South Oak street; a sister, B. Marie Southern, 503 South Oak street. He was a member of the local post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and of the Fraternal Order of Eagles.

Since his return he had been employed at the Buchanan plant of the Clark Equipment company. Miscellaneous department, where he had been transferred to the "knuckle line" a few days before his death.
