School and City Discuss Plans For Pupil Safety

A proposal made by letter by Supt. H. C. Stark, head of the school government, that the city government furnish a policeman to handle the combined auto and pupil traffic at the high school building brought to a head the question of the relative responsibilities of the school and the city for pupil safety at the regular meeting of the city commission Monday night.

The school government was represented at the meeting by High School Principal Richard Dougherty, who reported the view of the schools that this matter of child safety in transit to and from schools is no longer a matter of controlling the pupil traffic but of controlling the adult auto traffic. This, stated Dougherty, is the work of police, not of children or even of school teachers.

Superintendent Stark had proposed in a letter to City Manager Omans that the city furnish a policeman to direct this combined problem of pupil and auto traffic at the high school building at the following school day schedule: 8:00-8:45 a. m., 11:45-12 noon; 12:45-1:15 p. m., 3:15-3:30 p. m.

Supt. Stark also asked for an "extra person," which might be a policeman, to handle the traffic at the intersection of Moccasin and Fourth streets at the same time.

The commission assumed that this personnel, whether policeman or special guard, would be in excess of the regular guard at West Front and Moccasin, which is admitted to be the most critical student traffic spot in the city.

The city commission took the position that the school as well as the city had a responsibility for the school foot traffic problem. Mayor Anderson stated that the city had a setup in its budget for the payment of two guards. So far the city has maintained only one special guard, Walter R. Sturm, at the intersection of West Front and Moccasin until some agreement could be reached with the school government as to where the other guard should be used.

It was the sentiment of the city commission that if a third guard was needed he should be provided by the school government, either from the teacher staff, the janitor staff, or by hiring a person as guard for a fractional day.

Figures from the superintendent's office stating that the student traffic daily at Terre Coupe and Chicago was 75, and that of 174 at North Portage and Fulton, was challenged by city officials. Police patrolmen stated that they had checked the volume of student crossing at Portage and Fulton for a day and found it to be only 12 pupils, the pupil traffic on Portage street being in fact distributed between all street intersections from East Front street north to Elizabeth street and south to the High Grade Oil company location.

City Commission members first raised the question whether teachers might not serve as guards. Principal Richard Dougherty stated that the teachers felt that intervals following the dismissal of pupils were important to them, as students who have special problems in studies or relationships always came to them at that time, and they felt that this service was a main part of their job, whereas policing street traffic was not.

The city commission then asked whether the hours of janitors could not be adjusted so that they could take care of student pupil and auto traffic on the schedule suggested by Supt. H. C. Stark.

A motion was then made by Commissioner Goldwyn Smith that the city agree to furnish two guards, with the understanding that City Manager Omans, Supt. Stark and Chief Krugh confer where these guards should be stationed, any additional guard to be provided by the school government either by adapting the work hours of one of its employees or hiring an outside person.

Construction Of S & S Super Market Under Way

Work was started Sept. 7 on the site of the 80x140 building to be erected by the S & S Super Market on the south side of East Front street immediately east of the site of Poorman's Recreation. The owners state that the store building will be one of the largest and most modern in this section of Michigan. It will be set back about 80 feet from East Front street on a large lot, permitting an estimated 60 parked cars in front and many more on each side of the building. The site will be graded first, until it settles, when an asphalt pavement will be installed some time next year. The building is Charles Wilcox. It is expected that the new store building will be completed and ready to open toward the end of the present year.

Broceus School Votes Against Consolidation

Twenty-three residents of the Broceus school district attended the special meeting Monday evening in the schoolhouse, when the proposed consolidation of the school with four other rural schools in the area was turned down, and a decision made to build a new school. After a lengthy discussion on ways and means of alleviating the overcrowded condition in the school, and the problems of consolidating, which would include the purchase and maintenance of a school bus, it was voted to build. Tentative plans are for a 2-room building, which can be enlarged when necessary.

Thomas Mosser, moderator of the school board, appointed Warren Skinner, Duane Arend and Donald Flenor on a committee to secure plans and estimates on the cost of a new school. They will report at another special meeting on Oct. 11.

Because of the over-crowded condition in the school, which can accommodate only 41 pupils, the district is paying tuition for 20 children of the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades who are attending school this year in Buchanan. This will be another expense eliminated when the new school is built.

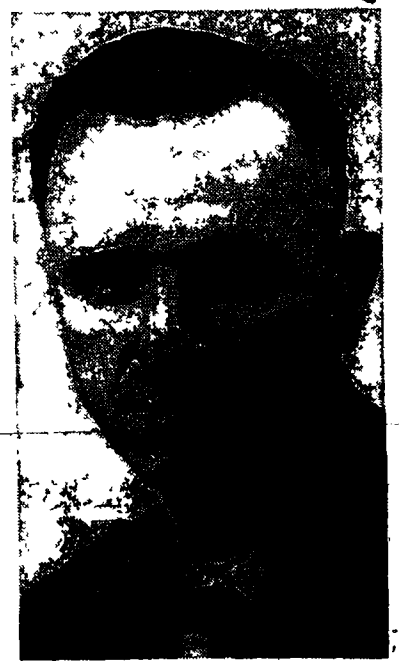
Fire Dept. Runs To Grass Fire On Moccasin Ave.

Total elementary, 894. Junior and senior high school: 7th grade, 138; 8th grade, 146; 9th grade, 126; 10th grade, 118; 11th grade, 99; 12th grade, 71. Total high school grades, 698. The total registration for all grades was 1,592, as compared with 1,575 at a comparable time last year.

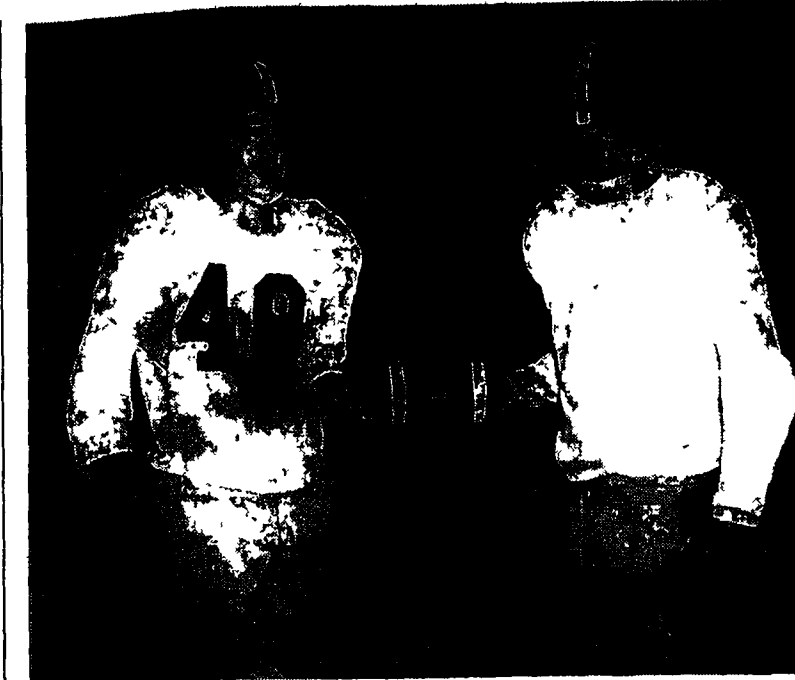
Marilyn Yazell has applied for service in the WAVES (U. S. Navy) and expects to be called for examination very soon.

Neal Burks Named City Fire Chief

Buchanan made a new departure in administrative history Monday evening, when the city commission in regular session, launched the policy of employing a paid, full-time fire chief, and named as the first to hold that office, Neal Burks, member of the Buchanan police force for the past two years.

Burks will take office Oct. 1, working gradually into his duties, and at the same time aiding in the training of his successor in the police force. This move has been under consideration for some time by the commission, who believe that a paid fire chief can save at least a part of his own salary, in addition to helping save the property of others. The direct savings he can make are mainly in the care and maintenance of equipment.

The city commission feels that in tying up all the various responsibilities in one person, paid for his time, rather than leaving them to the volunteered time of many persons, they are more likely to get first class service and a first class fire department. The chief will be able to better train those who serve under him.

City Announces Public Hearings On Two Projects

The city commission announced Oct. 11 as the date for the first public hearing on the installation of curb and gutters on Terre Coupe street from Front street to Hill street, at the Monday evening meeting. Two preliminary hearings will be allowed to determine the wishes of the property owners. If they approve, the city will provide a way to take care of storm waters from the Chicago and Terre Coupe areas to McCoy's Creek.

Because of requests from property owners, the commission also set Sept. 27 as the date for the first public hearing for a reconsideration on installation of curbs, gutters, and storm sewers on Alexander street from Oak to Phelps.

Dewey School Sold To Ackleys



SETTING SUN LIGHTS UP DEWEY AVENUE SCHOOL—This is the 99-year-old schoolhouse in which Buchanan's first graded school was opened in the fall of 1855. The first principal was George M. Dewey, grandfather of Tom Dewey, twice Republican candidate for president and now governor of New York State. The school was vacated in 1872 when the old 3-story high school building was erected on the site of the present heating plant. For several years it was rented for private school use to Nathan (California) Johnson. Later, at unknown dates before 1900 partial use was resumed, then into full use with a frame addition on the east called the "Sheep Shed." Use was finally discontinued in 1949 when the Moccasin school was completed.

The Dewey avenue school, property of Buchanan school District No. 1 fractional for 100 years, at last went into private hands Monday evening, when the school board completed its sale to Ackley Brothers, promoters of Parkridge residential addition. The school district received \$4,500 for the value of the lot, 28x107 1/2 feet in dimension. During the same meeting the board purchased an area of six lots in Parkridge addition at the intersection of Smith and Claremont streets for a future school building site, for which it paid \$4,500. The area bought is 384 1/2 x 180 feet in dimensions.

The district had been negotiating with Ackley Brothers for the site for many months. The property is very well located for the site of a school, as it joins with the Smith Park playground area on the north. This latter area was also a long-term investment. With the development of several attractive residential additions in the Liberty Heights section and to the east, there is evidence that a home section of the town is likely to build up in that direction, in addition to the several hundred population in Liberty Heights who are not well located with reference to schools. The Parkridge tract is an attractive buy at this time, as there are no buildings on it, and its location adjacent to the 5-acre Smith Park will afford the school a large playground area that will serve summer recreation uses also. The site also has the advantage of an adjacent sewer line already installed.

There has been a growing desire among the residents of the already-settled section of Liberty Heights to have a school building in their neighborhood, not so much because of the distance of public schools as from a desire to escape the traffic hazards resulting from crossing through streets.

1949. He spent many nights personally directing the Y.C. recreation room from 7 to 10, when the regular supervisor could not be present. When in Buchanan a short time last summer he said to a collaborator in that project: "I know that the Y.C. activities have kept active-minded boys of Buchanan from delinquency records. Of course I can't say just which ones, but I know that its influence has been in that direction, and there would have been more failures if it had not been here."

Miller took the helm in football at Buchanan high school in the fall of 1944, continuing 7 years. His record for that period was 42 victories, 18 defeats, 3 ties. This was during the days of the Big 7 when opposing

teams were all from larger high schools, with the exception of occasional non-league games. During three consecutive years, 1947, 1948 and 1949 the Buchanan team held the Big 7 championship title and retained the trophy (though sharing the title with Niles in 1949).

He resigned in the spring of 1952 and moved to California, where he had owned and managed a motel north of San Francisco.

He is survived by his wife, by one son, Richard of Buchanan, two sisters, Mrs. Jennie Peterson of Lansing and Mrs. Agnes Cook of Greenville, Mich., three brothers, Herbert of Nashville, Tenn., Gordon of Greencastle, Mich., and J. C. Miller of Elsie, Mich.

The body will arrive in Chicago at 9:40 a.m. Thursday. The funeral will be held at 2 p.m. Friday at the Swen Funeral Home, with Rev. W. Y. Pohly in charge. Burial will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery, Buchanan.

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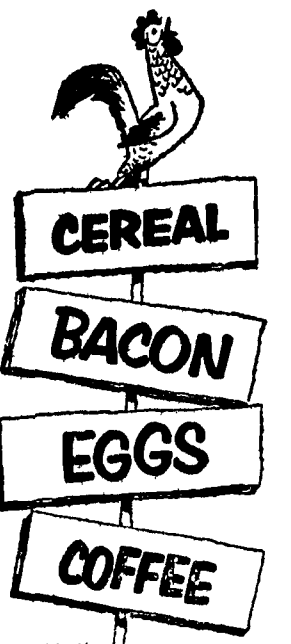

Krugh Announces Co-operation On Safety Children

Chief Jack Krugh has announced that the city of Buchanan is cooperating with the State Safety Commission on the annual September "Watch Out For Kids" traffic safety program.

"Each year," the Chief said, "motorists need to be reminded that children are returning to school and that there is a special need to watch out for them—many of whom have just returned from carefree vacations and have not adapted themselves to the routine of going to and from schools."

According to Chief Krugh over 3,000 children were struck down by automobiles on the streets and highways of Michigan during the last twelve months, 223 of them died and many were crippled for life.

"Our department will pay particular attention to speeding near schools during the first few weeks of September as a forceful reminder to all motorists to watch

out for kids in school areas," the Chief continued.

A state-wide educational program using several hundred thousand leaflets and thousands of posters is underway. In every community motorists can expect to see the poster depicting a little girl running out from between parked cars with the slogan, "Watch Out For Kids."

The leaflets give excellent advice to parents. They are urged to teach their children this simple rule by repeating it over and over again.

STOP at the curb
LOOK both ways
WAIT until it's safe to cross

WALK across the street.

In conclusion the Chief said, "Hitting a child with a ton and a half of steel is not a pleasant thing to do. You, as a driver in such an accident, would find small comfort in the fact that the mishap was caused primarily by the child's own carelessness."

S.W. Michigan Field Corn Day, Galien, Sept. 28

Southwestern Michigan Corn Field Day will be held Tuesday, Sept. 28, at the Leonard Babcock farm located 2 miles north of Galien on Cleveland Avenue.

According to J. P. Hoekema, Berrien county agricultural agent, plans are being made to have a number of specialists from Michigan State College present to explain the different methods that were used. About 12 minutes will be given at each stop so in a period of two hours those attending can make the tour. Tours will start every 15 minutes during the morning and early afternoon.

One of the most interesting plots is the rate of planting. Theoretically, there were about 8,000, 13,000, 16,000, and 26,000 plants planted. Actually the figures are somewhat different but the corn from these plots will be husked and some yield figures will be available. The larger the number of plants, the smaller the ears, but many times, the larger the total yield.

Fertilization of corn is of utmost importance. On one of the plots, corn cobs were used to see if the nitrogen could be tied up. On another plot, an excess of nitrogen was applied to see what would develop. Other tests involve the rate of application, the method and the time of application as well as different analyses

May Plant Grain Over Allotment For Hay, Grazing

Wheat and corn for harvest in 1955 may be planted in excess of farm acreage allotments provided the excess is not left standing beyond a date to be announced by the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee next spring. This provision gives producers an opportunity to comply with their acreage allotments before harvest time.

According to Arthur Lee, chairman of the Berrien county ASC Committee, this means that farmers may plant wheat to protect land, and to be used for hay and grazing, provided the excess over farm acreage allotments is not permitted to mature as grain. Acreage of corn in excess of the farm allotment may not be harvested as grain, silage, or fodder. Dates in advance of harvest will be announced next spring by which time farmers must dispose of their excess acreage of these crops if they wish their 1955 wheat, corn, and other crops to be eligible for price support.

Leonard Hill, 4-H Club Co. Head Gets Year Leave For Study

Leonard Hill, who has served Berrien county as 4-H Club agent for the past six years, has been

given a leave of absence by the Agricultural Committee of the Board of Supervisors and by the State Board of Agriculture. This leave extends from Sept. 20, 1954 to March 19, 1955. Hill has been taking extension courses and will use this six months for advanced study at Michigan State College.

Hill is taking his advanced work in animal husbandry and expects to receive his Master of Science degree at the close of these two terms.

Mr. Hill's friends and associates are happy to see him receive this leave of absence and he has our best wishes. While he is on leave, other members of the Extension staff will try and carry on some of his work. Miss Tina Redman, County Home Demonstration agent, and J. P. Hoekema, County Agricultural agent, will assume some of the responsibilities, and it is expected that Miss Margaret Haskins, secretary, will also have added duties during Mr. Hill's absence.

The South Berrien Dairy Herd Improvement Association had a very high average production for the month of August. Seven herds averaged more than 40 pounds of butterfat per cow. They were Russell Wright, Galien (7 cows),

1054 pounds of milk and 52.7 pounds of butterfat; Larry Doner, Galien (27 cows), 1,103 pounds of milk and 45.3 pounds of butterfat; Herman Gnodtke, Buchanan (12 cows), with 934 pounds of milk and 44.1 pounds of butterfat; Middle Brook Farm, Three Oaks (29 cows), with 1,195 pounds of milk and 43.7 pounds of butterfat; C. T. Prindleville, Three Oaks (27 cows), with 1,170

pounds of milk and 43.5 pounds of butterfat; Morton Hampton, Galien (23 cows), with 1,098 pounds of milk and 41.7 pounds of butterfat; and Hubert Wright, Galien (16 cows), with 947 pounds of milk and 41.2 pounds of butterfat.

The 493 cows in the 25 herds had an average production of 873 pounds of milk and 34.5 pounds of butterfat.

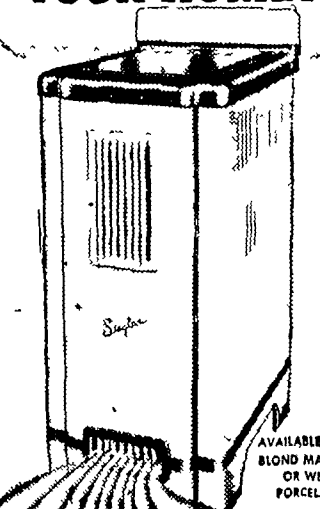

Berrien A.S.C. Announces Rules For Planting Wheat

The Berrien county ASC Committee have had numerous inquiries regarding wheat planting acreage for the ensuing year.
The new county committee have set up the following regulations which they hope will clarify this matter.

Each farm has its own allotment and this cannot be transferred to another farm — unless one or more farms can be combined under one farm number. In cases where there is newly purchased land or additional land, please get in touch with the county committee before planting time. 15 acres can be raised on any farm but to be eligible for price support they have to stay within their allotment figure. In the event the allotment figure is 15 acres or over, they cannot plant any amount over their allotment. Any farm having an allotment figure under 15 acres and who do not want price support are eligible to plant additional acres up to 15 only.

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Nels Nordin Back From Sweden

Nels Nordin, who has been foreman of the housing department of the Clark Equipment company for many years, recently returned from an extended vacation in his native land, Sweden, known to tourists as the "United States of Europe" because it resembles America in its culture and life more than does any other country in Europe.

As far as work is concerned, Sweden is now thriving, with practically full employment, states Nordin. Wages are not nearly so high as in the United States, with an hourly rate of about \$1 per hour the rule. However the average work week is 5 1/2 days or 44 hours per week, and that, with somewhat lower prices for

living, places the Swedes on a relatively prosperous basis. In fact, many lumber workers are now getting as much as \$20 per day in the province of Uppland, where they are salvaging the timber downed by a tornado last year.

Nordin spent most of his time there at his native town of Mora, in the province of Dalliarna, well up in the timber district of Sweden. He stated that he heard very little expression of fear or nervousness in Sweden over aggressions by Russia. They were taking present day events quite calmly, although they are well within an hour's bombing range from Russia. They are not even afraid of the Communists in their own country, who have been whittled down from 10% to about 4.5% in voting strength since the end of World War II, and they do not take the Russian threat with any great seriousness.

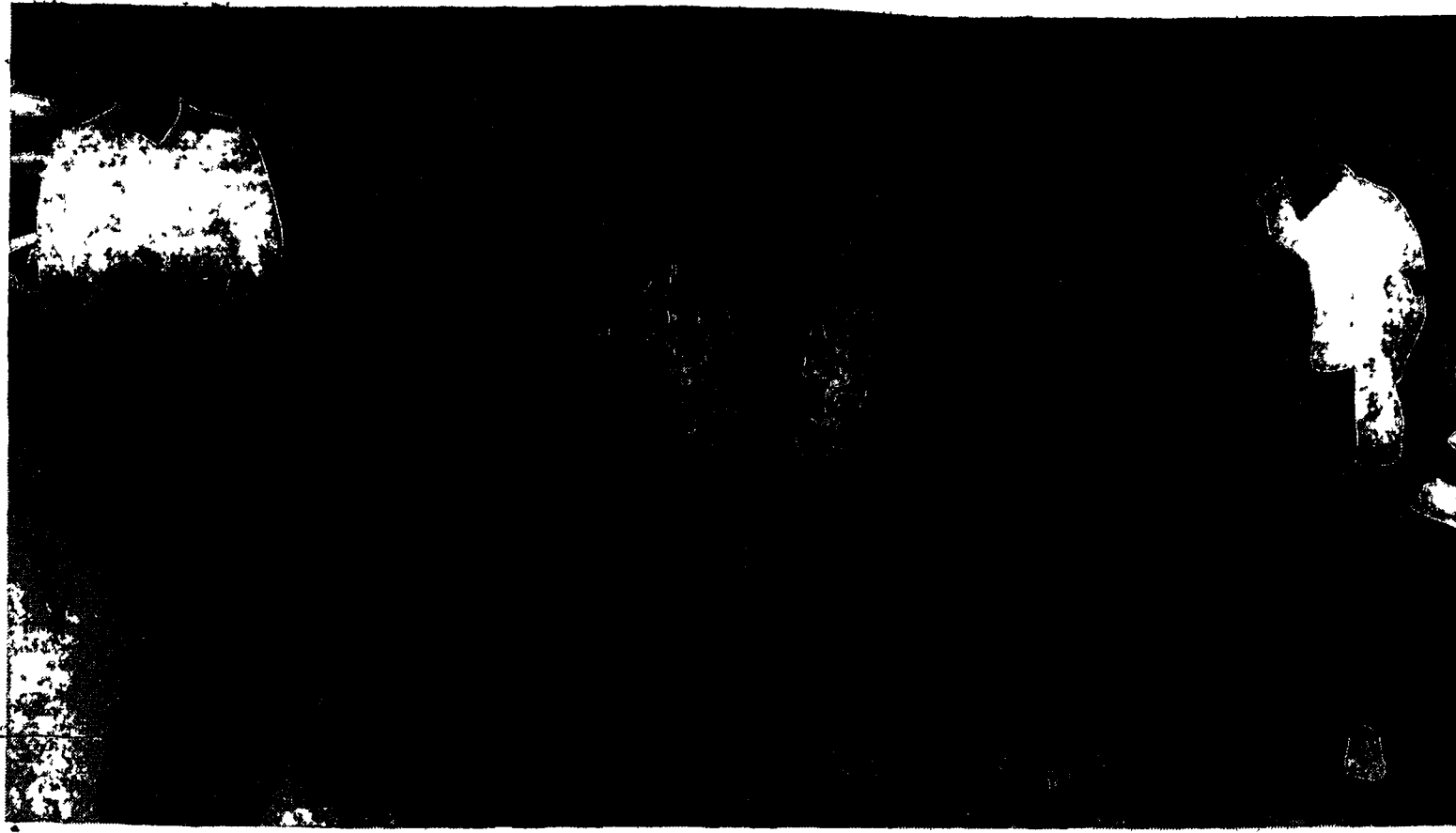

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6 Important Campaign Issues For General Election November 2

Campaign issues are clearly defined for the Nov. 2 election. Both Republicans and Democrats will be arguing about the same points, but from opposite sides.

Independent voters, or those who are sitting on the fence, can weigh the logic of the politicians.

Outcome of the election will probably depend on their decision. Listed below are some main issues.

Economic Conditions. GOP will show that the Democrat "prophecies of doom" were wrong in predicting depression, produce re-

hable figures to show that this year represents a successful shift from a year to a peacetime economy. Statistics will show that 1954 is second best in the nation's history. Democrats will pounce on "second best", claiming that every year must be a best. The Republican approach has lacked boldness, they will charge.

Harmony in Government. Republicans will argue that the governor and the legislature should be of the same party for maximum efficiency. They will point at the record of incumbent administrative officers and predict that even more could be accomplished if there were a Republican governor to work with, instead of hamper, the House, the Senate, lieutenant governor, the treasurer, auditor general, attorney general and secretary of state.

"Maybe so," Democrats will concede. But they'll be quick to point out that history doesn't verify this argument. Neither Sigler or Kelly, they claim, was a strong popular leader when holding the top post with Republican governments.

Democrats will also question that there will be a Republican House after Nov. 2. They have

the idea voters will send so many of their candidates to the Capitol that there will be a Democratic majority.

Farm Situation. The Democrats will charge that Republican policies have resulted in hardship for the state's farmers, particularly the small farmer. Claiming that Michigan Farm Bureau and some other organizations represent only the large farmers, they will call for a reversal of present policies in agriculture.

Republicans will explain that change from the previous administration takes time, that their solution to the problem is the only sound one, that farmers are not suffering from their moves but from the aftermath of the Democratic regime.

GOP will define a "small" farmer as one who farms as a sideline but earns his living in a city. Democrats will say a "small farmer" is one who is unable to exist on the farm and must seek city work in order to supplement his "reduced" income.

Relationship With Federal Government. If Don S. Leonard, Republican candidate, should be elected, it will help Michigan at the national level. He will be able to negotiate in a more "harmonious atmosphere" on behalf of the state. This is the argument of the GOP. If Gov. G. Mennen Williams is re-elected to a fourth term, he can fight for Michigan's needs without concern for embarrassment to the national Republican administration.

Campaign Finance. Democrats will be forced to admit that they have access to some \$700,000 raised by CIO for electioneering. But they prefer to talk about the

"encouraging increased contributions of individuals," particularly in the rural areas. They will, of course, strongly deny a sellout to unionized labor because of the CIO-PAC money.

Republicans, on the other hand, will claim financial poverty. They are steadfast in their denial that "big money" is being advanced for party use.

Personalities. Republicans will make much of the "unknowns" on the Democratic ticket, charge that they are all riding the coattails of Gov. Williams. Democrats will argue that their candidates are all keen men who have successful backgrounds in business or professional life. They will say that they are not "professional politicians who have been running for office for years."

Men in charge of the campaigns have been sitting up nights figuring out the best ways to present arguments. The coming contest promises to be the hottest in many years. The ballot box will tell how the voters feel about the issues.

Michigan's fight against the gypsy moth is all but won. Appearance of the devastating insect last spring caused both state and federal officials to leap into action. Even the "Little Legislature" moved with near-record speed to appropriate \$150,-
