

No Need for Extra Millage For Galien Schools: Whipple

"It will not be necessary to ask the people of the district for additional millage for operation if the proposed state aid bill is signed by the Governor," stated Supt. Harold Whipple of the Galien Township school.

"Cuts in some programs may be necessary, but it will not be in education," Whipple added.

Also discussed by Whipple during his legislative report given at the school board meeting Monday night was Senate Bill 280. This bill controls the capacity of school buses and prevents overloading.

"I think every board should favor this bill. Some boards don't because it would mean the purchase of additional buses," Whipple stated.

School Board Election

It was announced at the meeting that the terms of office on the school board of Howard Doughten and LeRoy Williams will terminate this year.

Doughten, a long time member of the board and secretary, stated Monday night that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself. Williams, completing his first four year term, has also declined to run for reelection.

Petitions for the wide open field, are available from superintendent's office and from board secretary Howard Doughten. They must be filed with the secretary on or before 4 p.m. Monday, May 13. Each petition must bear at least 20 signatures and not more than 25. The last day of registration with the village or township clerk is Friday, May 10.

A candidate for a post on the board of education must be a See GALIEN, Page 5

Representative Don Pears, Buchanan, announced candidate to succeed himself in the November election, gave a short talk on some of the issues that will face voters in November. Some of the topics that were discussed by Pears were the time change, redistricting and the number of ballots that the voter will be required to handle in November. Pears said that there will be several constitutional amendments on the ballot besides the time change.

The next meeting of the City Republicans will be held Tuesday, May 14. The time and place has not been decided.

Michigan Gas Mails Refunds

Michigan Gas and Electric company this week mailed \$3.4 million worth of refund checks and refund applications to more than 73,000 present and former electric and gas customers.

Richard W. Sampson, executive vice president of MG & E, said the company expects to complete the refund program over the next several months. He also said that the mailing fulfills the commitment to a refund made by the American Electric Power company before it acquired MG & E last August.

Another commitment made by AEP, to reduce rates was fulfilled on Feb. 6 when new, lower rates took effect that will save electric and gas customers a total of \$1,148,000 a year.

Refunds will be made to MG & E's residential, commercial and industrial customers, Sampson said. A total of \$3,065,000 has been mailed to 47,438 active customers, while 25,941 former customers will receive application forms.

Elementary Boundaries To Remain Same Next Year

Present elementary school boundaries were established as guides for the 1968-69 school year during the Board of Education meeting Monday night. The board voted to use the 1967-68 boundaries, but left the administration with a flexible situation so that boundary lines can be adjusted as necessary to balance class sizes.

Asst. Supt. Richard Dougherty said some flexibility is necessary to balance classes between schools. However, he added, an attempt will be made to keep all students of one family at the same school. The board also deferred action on hiring of additional elementary teachers to permit reduction of class sizes.

In his report on projected elementary class sizes, Dougherty said he is expecting no appreciable increase in elementary enrollment. However, he added, in keeping with the philosophy of smaller class sizes, he and elementary principals are recommending the addition of two elementary teachers. These would be in grades three and six at Moccasin.

Dougherty also suggested that if no teacher is available for the early elementary transitional room next year, that an additional first grade teacher be hired to offset the additional load on regular classes.

School Board Petitioning Open

Nominating petitions for school board candidates are now available at the office of Supt. Pierre Bailey. Deadline for filing is 4 p.m. May 11.

Three seats on the board will be filled in the annual election June 10. The four-year terms of B. G. Harker and Gordon Schneider expire and the two-year unexpired term of Marlan Burchfield must be filled. Mrs. June Wessendorf was appointed to fill the vacancy following Mrs. Burchfield's resignation until the June 10 election.

Nominating petitions must be signed by at least 20 registered voters. Candidates must be registered voters and own property within the district or be a co-owner.

Advertising Clinic Planned

A special advertising clinic is being planned for Buchanan businessmen, announced Leon Clark, chairman of the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce. The clinic is sponsored by the chamber as a part of the retail division's continuing education program.

Last year the division sponsored a clinic on shopping and a retail sales refresher course.

Clark said the three-hour clinic will be held Monday night, April 29, at 7 o'clock in the high school library. The clinic will be conducted by Professor William Haight of the school of journalism at Michigan State University. Haight also conducted the retail sales refresher course.

Included in the clinic will be why retail advertising should be planned in advance, how to determine a realistic budget for retail stores, how advertising budget should be allocated, specifically what should be the ad content, how advertising copy and layout can be improved, and how to follow up to assure success of an ad.

The clinic is open to interested businessmen. Registration fee is \$2 per person. Interested businessmen should contact the Chamber office.

OK Rezoning For Townhouse

Rezoning to permit construction of 42 townhouse units on West Fourth street was approved by the City Plan Commission at a special meeting Monday night. The measure now goes before the City Commission where a public hearing will be held before final action can be taken.

Rezoning requested is for R-3 multi-family residential instead of the present R-1 single family residence. Plans for the housing development were revealed last week when the rezoning request was presented to the City Commission.

Outlines Programs —Reviewing the purpose of the plan commission, chairman Roland Brado outlined several programs he feels the commission should be considering at this time. These included:

—Review of zoning throughout the city and acquire an up-to-date city map with overlay to facilitate such a review.

—Review and recommend street extension.

—Review and evaluate new sidewalk program.

—Review planning programs purchased by the city to determine progress, changes made, and evaluate present city course in view of plans.

—Study potential annexation.

Berry Ends 13 Years As Basketball Coach

The resignation of Ray Berry as varsity basketball coach was announced this week by Principal Donald Trull.

Berry thus ends a 13-year career as basketball coach for the Buchanan Bucks during which his teams have won five conference titles and four district crowns. His 1961-1962 squad was ranked as the No. 2 class B team in the state and this year the Bucks were ranked No. 4.

Regarding his resignation, Berry said he did not have any definite plans at this time. He added:

"I am grateful to Buchanan for having had the opportunity to coach varsity basketball for 13 years. I have always felt that when the time came for me to step down I wanted to leave basketball in the best possible condition. I hope I have."

"I wish the boys and the future coach the best of everything. Once again, I thank the players, school and citizens of Buchanan for their loyal support."

Five District Champions

In his 13 years here, Berry's teams have compiled a record of 132 victories against 100 losses, and have experienced only three losing seasons. Three times the Bucks went undefeated in league play, but only once did they post an undefeated regular season. This year Buchanan was 10-0 for the regular season, the first perfect season in 39 years.

The Bucks were Big Six champs in 1962 with a 10-0 record. That year they posted a 15-1 season mark and were 18-2 including tourney play. The Blossomland conference was organized in 1962-63 season and the Bucks won the conference crown in 1963 with a 9-1 mark and again in 1964 with a 10-0 record. They won the Blossomland crown in 1966 with a 9-1 record and this year were undefeated in league play at 12-0.

Berry's Bucks have five district titles under their belts, but the regional crowns have always been just beyond reach. Buchanan was district champ in 1960, 1961, 1962, and 1964. In 1960 Buchanan took the district title after beating South Haven and Dowagiac, and went on to beat Coopersville in the regional before losing to Godwin Heights for the regional championship. That year the Bucks posted an 11-9 record.

In 1961 the Bucks placed third in the Big Six and beat Dowagiac and Coloma for the district crown. That year Buchanan beat Godwin Heights in the regional before losing to Holland Christian in the regional finals. Their record in 1960-61 was 11-8.

The Bucks won their first and only Big Six championship in 1962, marking the first year they beat the St. Joe Bears on their home court since 1954. Also it was the first time they had swept the Bears and Niles Vikings twice in one season. In district play Buchanan beat South Haven and Bangor for the title. In the regionals the Bucks upset Holland Christian in double overtime before losing to East Grand Rapids in overtime for the regional title. Their season mark was 18-2.

The final district crown came in 1964 after the Bucks had won the Blossomland conference crown. Buchanan beat Edwardsburg, Cassopolis and Dowagiac for the district title, but lost to Allegan in the regional semifinals to post a 15-4 season record.

Altho Berry's Bucks have not been able to claim a regional crown, they claim the distinction of having their three regional final opponents go on to become Class B runners-up in the state.

Came Here in 1955

Berry was hired in 1955 as athletic director, varsity basketball and baseball coach, and assistant football coach. In his first year, the Bucks tied Dowagiac for second place in the Big Four conference.

He coached baseball several years and served as an assistant football coach until the 1967 season. Prior to coming to Buchanan Berry coached two years at Osceola, Iowa, and two years at Dexter, where his teams won the Class C conference title both years.

Berry graduated from Flint Northern high school and earned his degree at Morningstar college in Sioux City, Iowa.

Berrien Time to Remain Same

It's official, Berrien county residents will not have to change their clocks April 28.

Monday the County Board of Supervisors reaffirmed its earlier stand that the county would be moved into the Central Daylight Time zone April 28 and back into the Eastern Standard Time zone next fall. This means that, in effect, Berrien county will be on Eastern Standard Time throughout the year.

Berrien county took the lead last month on the time issue, hoping that other counties in District 8 would follow suit, thus putting pressure on Lansing to act on the matter. However, to date, only Van Buren county has acted and it is rumored that Cass plans to follow suit.

It is anticipated that federal and state agencies throughout the county will have to observe the official state time this summer (Eastern Daylight Time).

The time issue was created last spring after the Michigan Legislature voted to exempt the state from the federal Uniform Time Act. However, Detroit area interests were successful in petitioning to have the time question placed on the ballot this November, and as result the state was forced to conform to the federal act. That act provides that states shall observe Daylight time for six months each year.

The Upper Peninsula rejected the super-fast time last summer and was successful in its drive to be placed in the Central Time zone.

Career Guidance Day Set May 1

The second biennial Career Guidance day will be held at Buchanan high school on Wednesday, May 1, announced Lyle Sumner, chairman.

The career day program is being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in co-operation with the high school guidance department. The program was started two years ago and due to its success, it was decided to hold a career day every two years, said Sumner.

This year's program will be similar to the original one, except that the general assembly will be held in the morning to allow more time for that portion of the program. Again this year, Jack Post will deliver the keynote address.

The general assembly will begin at 11 a.m. Students will be given an orientation on the program by Principal Donald Trull. Following Post's address, he will answer questions from the student body.

In the afternoon students will attend three 30-minute sessions of their choice, and following the last session resource personnel will be available to meet with students individually until 3 o'clock.

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Freedom Week Observance Set

Citizens of Berrien county will join with the entire nation in the observance of "Share In Freedom" Week, beginning here on Sunday. Purpose will be to acquaint more people with United States Savings Bonds and the companion Freedom Shares.

Elitel O Eberhardt, chairman of the Berrien County Savings Bond committee and president of Inter City bank, Benton Harbor, said that newspapers, radio stations, business firms and financial institutions had joined in the effort to bring greater awareness of the advantages of this savings device.

"More than half of our population is 40 years of age or younger, to remember the bond drives of World War II," Eberhardt said. "Therefore, most of today's bond buyers are people who acquired the habit back in the early '40's as a patriotic gesture, then discovered it was a mighty easy and convenient way to save regularly. Surprisingly enough," he added, "about 13 per cent of those war bonds have never been cashed, but are still earning interest for their owners."

Eberhardt pointed out that the current Series E Bond is better than ever, paying the higher 4.15 per cent interest, and maturing in only seven years. The Freedom Shares, offered as a bonus to regular bond buyers, pay 4.74 per cent interest and mature in four and a half years.

Increasing numbers of young parents, the county chairman said, are saving for their children's college education through regular bond buying. By having bonds issued in the child's name, he added, the Federal income tax liability becomes that of the child, resulting usually in little or no tax due on the accrued interest.

I am one white, but my heart and words speak for many. My eyes were filled with tears, my body shook, and my heart pounded with grief as I watched a leader of peace and love leave to his glory. You may ask, why do I write these words? Because my heart can't beat another beat knowing that we can't live as equal brothers. I have camped, eaten, slept, and lived side by side with black and white, never treating them unequal. I love people of all colors because we are people, all of us. We are human, and we are the children of God. We are equal in God's eyes. Can't we all be equal in our eyes? Can't we learn to live on earth as brothers of God, as He has willed us to do?

The answer is yes. Yes, we can live and love as brothers if each of us play our part on the stage of life and give ourselves to one another as brothers. As the Golden Rule tells us, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you," and live in hope, faith and love. See LETTERS, Page 5

into law today which deals with open housing. Why are these laws necessary? There is only one answer and that is white America is not willing to grant the Negro the rights he is entitled to under our Constitution.

Although rioting and looting are to be deplored one must consider the factors behind them. The Negroes in the ghetto are caught in a vicious circle which prevents them from escaping in any great numbers. The schools in the ghetto are poorly financed and inadequately staffed because of the absence of a sufficient tax base. This makes it difficult for the Negro to get a good education and escape the ghetto. Housing is deplorable and it is owned by white Americans in most cases who charge high rents and do little to maintain the buildings. Negroes still have trouble getting good jobs and part of this is based on their lack of a good education. The ghetto has a way of perpetuating itself and frustrating its members.

We as white Americans say the problem is far away from us. I have heard the comment over and over again which expresses the idea that the speaker is for equal rights for the Negro but in most cases they are only words and nothing more. But until there is a possibility that a Negro may move into the neighborhood of that person who was for equal rights for the Negro and you will hear comments expressing fear and indignation. Whether it is Chicago, Newark, Detroit or Buchanan there is discrimination and indifference to the plight of the Negro. Remember that Bob Hope equated indifference with rioting.

Our country is facing a very difficult future. I feel it is to face this future and overcome its problems every American black, red, yellow or white is going to have to overcome his prejudices and indifference. The Kerner Report on Civil Disorders has recommended a guaranteed annual wage for all as a solution to the problem. This idea does not overcome the prejudices of people but does defeat the basis of our economic system which few people desire.

Each of us should examine our own conscience. The road ahead will not be easy. We should ask why we even have Civil Rights Acts? Wouldn't it be nice to be able to have everyone receive the equal rights he is guaranteed by our Constitution without additional legislation?

In conclusion, Martin Luther King said on several occasions that equality and brotherhood were his goals and that he hoped that during his life he might be able to help and serve his fellow man. These goals and desires are very noble and could easily guide us all, for what is life all about, but to serve and live in peace with your fellow man.

Three Injured In Rural Crash



However, until 1970 Buchanan is contracted with Niles for the fourth Friday of the season in 1968 and 1969. This is the date the league says Buchanan should be playing Edwardsburg.

Interesting People

"I'm not hiding my age I'm 93, hoppin' on 94", proudly quips the very ambulatory James Dillman, certainly one of the most well-known and durable figures seen 'round and about Buchanan.

In his familiar stance... head hunched forward, hands locked behind his back, sometimes holding a market basket... the sprightly nonagenarian walks two or three miles daily, he estimates, come sun, rain, or sleet.

"Got to get my exercise," declares Mr Dillman. When you or I die they're not going to run any flags at half-mast, so there don't seem much sense to passing on. Might as well keep fit."

Born in 1874 near Wausau, Ind., Dillman was a railroad man before coming to Buchanan. He worked for 14 years at the Buchanan Cabinet company (present Coops building on Days avenue) and was later employed for 34 years as a tool-and-die maker at Clark Equipment company.

"When I quit, they (Clark's) just kept on a'ummin' I didn't think they could do it." Behind smudged spectacles, the faded eyes still hold laughter.

Twice a widower, Mr Dillman lives alone at 112 South Detroit St., where he manages his own household, cooks his meals, and cares for his yard. His only son lives in California.

Although his daily walks generally follow the city sidewalks into the near and far neighborhoods of Buchanan, he may often be seen, with his basket, venturing out into the country side to gather nuts and acorns for "his" squirrels. He figures he daily feeds about a dozen fox-squirrels around his home, and calculates he's spent some \$20 on peanuts alone to placate his tame friends. Dillman even built a tree house for squirrels in front of his home, and he laments the loss of one bushy-tailed rodent who used to sit on his knee and eat crackers.

"I guess that little fella just died of old age", mourns the aged man.

Intrigued at having his picture taken mischievously hoping he'll be around long enough to see it in the paper, the sprightly gentleman gallantly doffs his old brown fedora in farewell, revealing for the first time a startlingly bald pate.

"When they kid me about my bald head", Dillman grinningly volunteers, "I just tell them no one ever put a marble top on

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
