

Property Owners Along Mill Race Meet In City Hall

Agree With City To Defer Action Until Title To Race Site Is Examined

The first hearing to enable property owners along each side of the mill race to voice their wishes as to the disposition of that time-hallowed relic of water power days was held at the city hall Monday evening, with 19 out of the 29 property owners attending.

The meeting achieved no conclusion except that it was decided that a thorough legal investigation of the actual ownership, if any, of the mill race site be made before any other steps are taken. The majority of sentiment among the owners was in favor of retention of the race—if the city cleaned it up. A few favored abandonment under any consideration.

Property owners present stated that a main difficulty is the increasing growth of wild rice which has clogged the current during the past few years and caused increased sediment accumulation. One owner said that 15 years ago it was possible to go under the bridges and some for minnows. At present it would hardly be possible to crawl under and keep one's head above water.

Another owner stated that when he first bought his property the mill race was a self-cleaning stream running with fair rapidity in a narrow course, instead of the wide sluggish stream it now is. He stated that in the past twenty years not less than three feet of sediment had accumulated in the course of the stream adjacent to his property. He attributed much of the accumulation to the attempted construction of a swimming pool near the headgates in the late twenties, when citizens inspired to build a swimming pool for boys at Athletic park dredged out a deep hole. Still more responsible, he stated, was the fact that a number of years ago another citizen interested in making the stream a haunt of wild fowl sewed wild rice near the headgates where the race separates from the creek. This wild rice has now seeded itself along the course of the race clear to the mill. Also when the streets were paved in the past few years on the hillside above the race, much more sediment was washed down into the course, the rice preventing it being carried away.

Difficulties pointed out in abandonment of the race is the evident possibility that if it is voided and the city attempts to deed over the property rights to the adjacent lot owners, there will be a tangle of controversies over lines, which are reported to be irregular.

But if it is not voided, it was pointed out, and the city accepts the responsibility of maintenance, a certain amount of expense will be continuous if the race is not allowed to gradually relapse to its present state. In answer to that, owners interested in its maintenance contended that complete extinction of the wild rice might minimize that difficulty.

The congregation of Bethel Temple, which is on a site bordering the race, stated that it represented some danger to children attending there during the presence of the race at least three children are known to have drowned in it.

A few of the owners along the race have made something of its scenic possibilities by keeping its banks clean and improved and displaying a deep interest in its retention. A similar full cooperation of property owners along the course would greatly simplify the problem.

It was agreed to by the city that another hearing would be called for the property owners after a legal examination of the property rights is held.

Ground Gains Feature As Locals Fail To Click In Air

Buchanan's varsity eleven gathered in another non-conference scalp Friday when they overpowered the Class C. Coloma team on the latter's gridiron to win 32 to 0, last Friday.

In the first period Buchanan received the kick-off to carry from the 30 to the 41 stripe before taking to the dirt. Don Metzger, driving through center, on two plays, found plenty of blocking and drove and spun across the mid-field stripe to Coloma's 39. Captain L. Gray, followed by Rifenberg, sped through tackle to drop the pigskin on the 15-yard line. L. Gray through tackle and Metzger through center advanced to let 4 where L. Gray carried across for the early score of the game. The Bucks failed for the extra point, and they led 6-0.

Dokey kicked off for Buchanan to the 20-stripe. The ball was brought back to the 31 by Knutson. Coloma took to the air. Philwitz failed to complete his pass intended for Rockwell Knutson, trying end, and Philwitz, trying the line, failed to pick up a first down, putting Knutson back in pure formation.

Kick went to the 30-yard Gray, knifing through tackle when across the mid-field stripe and went to the 25. The Bucks, after being penalized 15 yards, failed to make first down. Gray kicked in to the end zone putting the ball on the 20 in the hands of Coloma.

Huskey picked up 4 yards through center, followed by Philwitz's cash between tackle and end to ring up a first down. Coloma fought on but found no holes and was forced to kick.

Buchanan was surprised by the defensive power of Coloma and gave the ball back to them when Gray kicked to the 8-yard line. Coloma fought with all their strength but found Buchanan's defense too tight. Buchanan took over on the 28. L. Gray drove on three plays to again score for Buchanan. The extra point was good, piling the score to 13-0.

Starting the second half Buchanan kicked off to Coloma which put the ball in play on the 45. Coloma started on a drive, picking up a first down on the 35 but was suddenly brought to a halt.

Buchanan was forced to kick after picking up one first down but failed for the second.

L. Gray kicked to the 8-yard line where Coloma fumbled and Max Polley recovered for the Bucks. Rifenberg, on two plays, went over standing up to score once more for the Bucks. The extra point was no good because of the bad wind. Score Buchanan 19, Coloma 0.

Buchanan still had plenty of life when they took over on the 18. Metzger on one play through the middle of the line carried the ball down to the 6 yard line. Rifenberg taking through tackle, once more rang up a touchdown. The extra point was no good. Bucks 25, Coloma 0.

Coloma, trying to get back into the ball game, threw a pass that landed in the arms of Don Gray. Buchanan then went down the field to score when Metzger drove through center and Rifenberg crossed the goal line. The kick was good to advance the score to 32 to 0.

E. C. McCollum, Pioneer Livery Man, Dies At 68

Started First Taxi Service In Town In 1913

With the passing of Edward C. McCollum early last Friday morning went a man who through long and varied service had become somewhat of a community institution.

Ed, as he was generally known, entered into partnership with his father, Everett McCollum, in a livery stable where the present McCollum garage is now, immediately after he was graduated from Buchanan high school in 1897. In 1903, he became sole owner, and all the years since the first date he has been furnishing transportation for those who wished to hire it, first with the rental of horses and buggies and later with his taxi service.

In addition to his transportation service he served three years as a law enforcement officer, including two terms as deputy sheriff for Buchanan under Sheriff Charles Johnson, and many terms as constable and truant officer. As deputy sheriff and constable he made a reputation as a fearless and efficient officer. Always quiet and courteous, he nevertheless had a reputation for nerve and physical prowess that awed such as were only impressed by such qualifications, and because of that reputation he made many risky arrests entirely without trouble.

For many years during both the horse and automotive eras he supplied a dray and transfer service. For a number of years previous to the recent close of the transfer department of his business he ranked as the senior transfer man in Berrien county in point of continuous service.

His father, Everett McCollum, had started the business in a wooden building where the present concrete block McCollum garage now stands, in 1885, and was in partnership for a time with Gideon Rouse, father of Mrs. Grace Van Halst.

After the George R. Rich Manufacturing Company, predecessor of the Clark Equipment company, came to Buchanan in late 1904, Ed McCollum did much of their hauling. At one time he had seven teams hauling daily between that plant and the Garden City Foundry at Niles.

In 1913 McCollum bought his first car, a Ford, from Harry Boyce, who had opened in 1912 the town's first garage and automobile agency in the old Beehive building which was built in the middle 80's as a skating rink. It was indicative of the temper of the man in his younger days that his first trip with his auto taxi was made in zero weather over icy roads to Niles, when a traveling man demanded fast service that city Harry Boyce got in the car with them, drove the car part way and then turned it over to McCollum who had never had his hand on a car steering wheel before. He took the tavel to his destination, and then on the following day, on the same sort of roads, drove the same traveling man the rounds of New Buffalo, Lakeside, Union Pier, Harbert, Sawyer, Baroda, Bridgman, Stevensville and St. Joseph.

McCollum was born July 14, 1877, about five miles north of Buchanan on the farm now owned and occupied by his niece, Mrs. Will Russell and husband. His parents were Everett and Amanda Russell.

He came to Buchanan to live when he was seventeen years old in a small house which then stood adjacent to the McCollum livery stable. He married Estella Mitchell June 28, 1899 in St. Joseph. They built and moved into the present McCollum home at 205 Days Avenue 37 years ago. He was a member of the Church of Christ and had been affiliated with the Maccabee lodge 45 years.

He died at that home at 1:30 a. m. Friday, Oct. 19. The funeral was held at the Swem Funeral Home at 2:30 p. m. Sunday, with Rev. Melvin M. Martin, pastor of the Church of Christ, in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery. Pallbearers were Herbert Eatchelor, C. J. Wilson, Bob Reamer, Art Blake, Will Roger, Harry Arent.

Survivors are his widow, one son, Clayton, one sister, Mrs. Alta Smith of Berrien Springs. Another sister, Mrs. Ed Place, died Feb. 18, 1945, at Summerville.

Larson had charge of loading the bomb on the planes. The citation read as follows:

Staff Sergeant LeRoy G. Larson, Air Corps, Army of the United States, for heroic action on 8 August, 1945, when a B-25 type bomber loaded with 500 pounds high explosive crashed off the end of Birch runway, Ie Shima, Ryukyu Islands. Sgt. Larson rushed to the scene for possible first aid and rescue work. On his arrival he heard screams in the air, at the risk of his own life from the fire exploding ammunition and bombs, he fought his way through smoke and flame and dragged to safety two badly burned and maimed men. Such distinguished and conspicuously heroic actions exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

5 Residents Of Buchanan Hurt In Car Accident

Auto Crashes Against End Of Load Of Poles On US-31

Five colored residents of Buchanan suffered serious injuries in a collision which occurred when the car in which they were riding crashed into the rear of an I & M. truck loaded with utility poles, shortly before noon Friday.

The accident occurred at Bertrand on US-31, south of Niles, when the driver of the car, James Williams, 27, failed to note the I & M truck which had entered the highway and turned south. Driving at an alleged high rate of speed Williams saw the ends of the load of poles just before the car struck and managed to swerve the vehicle enough to save all in the car from very probable death.

Z. Riley, 24, internal injuries.

Her father, William Light, worked in the Lebanon foundry with the fathers of the two afterward noted men, Charles Schwab and Milton J. Hershey. They were known to Mrs. Dunbar in her childhood as Charlie and Jacky. Charlie was then, as afterward known for his aggressive and rambler down a n a t i n g disposition (Milton J. Hershey) was known on the other hand, for his friendly and co-operative disposition. Nearly everything he had as a boy he was willing to share. Early this month Milton J. Hershey died. He had attained the distinction of being the leading figure in the candy industry in America. He left a fortune of \$84,000,000, which he willed in its entirety to the orphans of America.

Fifteen years before he had placed his great candy bar plant, located in what was, in Mrs. Dunbar's girlhood, a cow pasture about eight miles from Lebanon, in the Hershey Foundation, and then handed over the plant to his employees. The present city of Hershey is built around the plant.

Charles Schwab made an equal rise, and became president of the Bessemer Steel Company and a dominating figure in the industry. The two men's lives, Mrs. Dunbar states, illustrated her obvious characteristic of the ir b o y h o o d s. Schwab was the driving, aggressive scrapper, Hershey the friendly, co-operative sharer. And so they remained.

Mary Jane Light came to Buchanan with her parents in 1876. Her first friend in the North Buchanan district was Mary Tomlinson, now Mrs. D. D. Langford. Mary Jane's father, William Light, founded one of the larger sawmills of the district, the site being near the present Red Bud Trail and near Camp Betz.

Parents Of Minors Injured By Firearms May Be Prosecuted

Four boys, 13 or under, have been wounded in early season gun accidents. A Bay City man is dead and two adults have been seriously injured.

The fact that more than half of the early season accident victims have been under 13 is causing grave concern among leaders of sportsmen's groups and conservation department authorities.

Spurred by the record 38 deaths in the 1944 hunting season, accidents sportsmen's organizations and the department in recent months have greatly increased their efforts to educate youths in the safe handling of firearms.

Interested persons have hoped that a decline this fall in gun accidents among youths may result from these efforts, the early season showing indicates there is no reason for optimism.

Two of the injured, Linton and Myles Budd, 14 and 15, of Cedarville were wounded by a 14-year-old companion who had taken a gun without his parents' knowledge.

Prosecution of parents of youths involved in gun accidents is contemplated as a possible means of holding down accidents. Licenses to hunt are issued to persons under 17 only on application of parents or guardians and regulations require that such minors shall be accompanied by responsible adults while hunting on lands on which their parents are not regularly domiciled.

This season's first fatality was Stephen Talaga, 30, of Bay City, killed while duck hunting.

State Board Health Advises Protection Pupils From Disease

Each fall communicable diseases increase with the opening of school. The best way to control these diseases is pointed out in the following article taken from the September issue of "Michigan Public Health" official bulletin of the Michigan Department of Health.

"Prompt exclusion from school of children who appear to vary from their normal health is obviously the crux of the control of communicable disease in the schools.

"The communicable conditions which present the greatest problems in any school system are, by and large, those that, while annoying, are the least severe and are rarely fatal. In this group fall impetigo, scabies, the common cold and epidemic ringworm of the scalp.

"Under the present Michigan regulations, the school teacher has the distinct responsibility of excluding all children who appear to be suffering from a disease which may be communicable.

"It must be remembered that the teacher's responsibility is to the whole school. When he excludes a child, he is merely expressing his opinion that that particular child looks or acts differently than he

looked or acted the day before. He is not making any diagnosis. It is still the responsibility of the parents and the family physician or health officer to determine whether the child who has been sent home has a communicable disease.

"Most parents are very much in favor of excluding from school the neighbors' children who have communicable diseases but they are often reluctant to have their own children sent home. Perhaps they feel that they are being criticized and that the exclusion of their child implies negligence on their part.

"That there are parents in every school district who take it as a personal affront if the teacher dares to exclude their child from school reflects a failure on the part of the school system in educating the community to the reasons and need for prompt exclusion. It is not a function of the school to condition the adults of the community to the point where the teacher will be praised rather than condemned for prompt action."

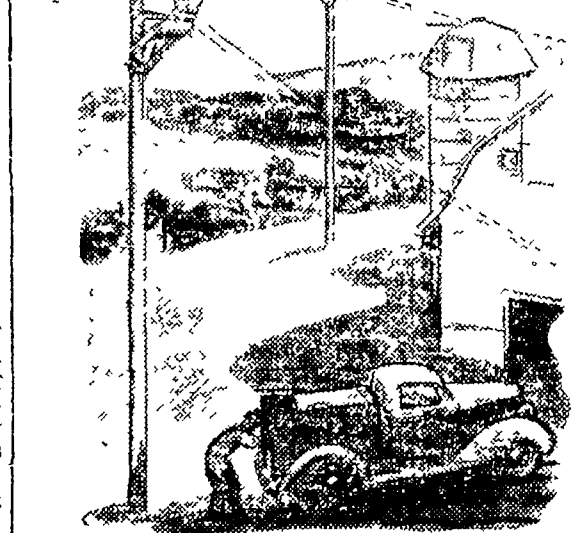
M. State College Advises On Use Of DDT Insecticide

In answer to hundreds of inquiries about ways to use the new insecticide, DDT, which was officially released to civilians August 31, Ray Hutson, Michigan State college entomology head, has drawn up these recommendations on the basis of experiments being conducted at the college.

He points out first that common sense should be employed in using the chemical. Some danger exists if the insecticide is used carelessly or handled continually.

For ordinary household use - valuable for any insect around the house - a 5% solution in kerosene is recommended. This is suitable for painting screens or spraying the inside walls of the house.

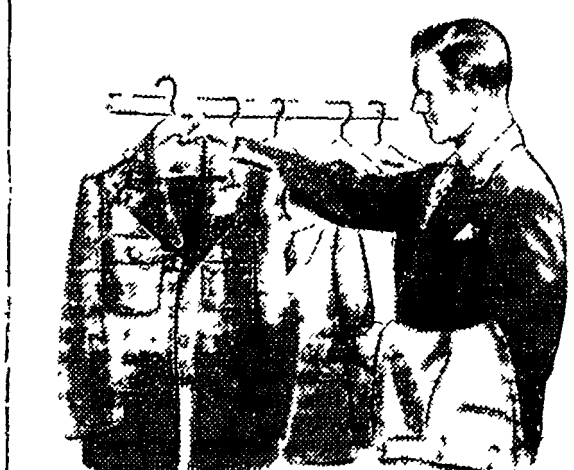

Spot Dempsey Describes Chinese Aerial Campaigns As was casually mentioned last week, Sgt. Robert Dempsey, outfit, 1st Combat Cargo Squadron, is back in town after a year of service in the C-B-I (China-Burma-India) theatre of operations. Back in the days when we at home were reading with misgivings about the advance of the Japanese into Burma, Dempsey was flying with his outfit in a C-47 cargo plane, transporting supplies to resupplying English troops. After the Japanese had been pushed back from Imphal, Dempsey's squadron was moved from Sylhet, India, to Chittagong, Burma, where they flew "bundle dropping" to West African and Indian troops fighting further back. They carried "parapack" supplies, which were dropped by parachute, and "free fall" supplies, which they just pushed out of the door of the plane. The first operation noted above is now known as the India-Burma campaign, the second as the Central Burma campaign. Next came the China campaign. Following the completion of the Central Burma campaign by the expulsion of the Japanese from that area, Dempsey's outfit flew "over the hump" of the Himalaya mountains into China, where they based at Chengtu. In China they took out soldiers in four air base evacuations when Japanese armies were pushing back the Chinese last spring and summer. The bases were Kwelin, Luchow, Suichuan and Lachokow. At Kwelin the 1st Combat Cargo Squadron flew 10,000 American troops out in ten days, carrying them packed like sardines, 50 to a C-47 plane. At the evacuation of Lachokow Sgt. Dempsey met Robert Hewitt of Buchanan. While they waited the Japanese army was edging forward about twenty miles away. When the 1st Combat Cargo Squadron started operations in Burma they had fighter cover to protect them from occasional visits by Japanese air squadrons. Later, and during all of the Chinese campaign, the Americans had complete control of the air. An interesting part of the Chinese service was dropping supplies to guerrillas back of the Japanese lines. These guerrillas had improvised bases where American planes could land to pick up U. S. aviators who had been shot down over China, and had been picked up by the guerrillas and ferreted through enemy country to the guerrilla bases. Sometimes these downed fliers worked their way slowly through the Japanese lines, with the aid of the Chinese, somewhat as the negro slaves were spirited out of the South by the underground railway before the Civil War, weeks and months elapsing before they were picked up by the American planes. Their chief business was in picking up supplies flown over the hump by the Army. Transport command to bases in the lower Himalayas, and transporting them to the supply bases of Chinese front armies. Sgt. Dempsey went Monday to Fort Sheridan, Ill., to receive his discharge papers.
