Charles Mutchler, a Buchanan resident of long standing, died at Clearmont, Fla., at 4 p.m. Monday, Jan. 26, 1954.

Further details are lacking as no communication has been received here at noon Wednesday. Tidings of his death came indirectly through a relative in Flint. The informant said that he became acutely ill about three weeks ago. He had been ill several years with heart trouble and other complications.

He and Mrs. Mutchler had been spending the winters in Florida for several years, spending the warmer months at his farm a mile west of the Colvin school on the Glendora Road. Further details will be given next week.

Set 8-ft. Limit Depending On The Width Sidewalks

Require Permits; Double Fees If Erected Without

The city sign ordinance was amended at the meeting of the city commission held Monday evening, liberalizing the provision for signs in the business district. Whereas the original city ordinance passed in December of 1949 limited business signs installed after that date to no more than one-foot extension over the sidewalk, the amendment stipulates that the signs may extend no further than eight feet horizontally from the building, not within three feet of the back of the curb, whichever is less.

The ordinance requires that all signs extending over public property must be not less than ten feet above the grade of the sidewalk, with the exception of "single" signs of two feet in length or less, and with a total area not exceeding two feet square, may be installed 7 feet above the grade of sidewalk. No post or other support of a sign, awning or marquee is permitted in the public right of way.

The city may order any of the above mentioned or other advertising devices over public property removed on 60-day notice, should any change in traveled street width cause it to interfere with full use of street width, or if it interferes with visibility of traffic control devices including directional or street signs necessary for the proper direction of traffic.

George Snodgrass Trapped 7 Hours In Car, Is Recovering

The condition of George Snodgrass, Three Oaks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Snodgrass, Buchanan, is now reported as satisfactory at Pawating hospital. Mr. Snodgrass is the young man who was trapped in his overturned car for seven hours early Saturday morning. On his way home from his employment at Studebaker, Inc., South Bend, his car overturned on a rural road, four miles east of Three Oaks, and one mile south of M60. The car came to rest on its top in a field about 50 ft. from the road. Mr. Snodgrass suffered face lacerations and shock. With the temperature at 14 degrees, his feet were believed to be frozen but even this has improved.

A neighbor, Edward King, on his way to work at 7:55 a.m. noticed the car and freed Mr. Snodgrass with considerable difficulty. Calls all night and morning had brought no response from drivers passing the wreck. Taken to a Galesburg hospital and by ambulance to Pawating, Mr. Snodgrass seems to be getting along satisfactorily now.

Bucks' Varsity, Reserves Win Over Vicksburg

After Close First Half Bucks Run Away From Bulldogs 54-35

Buchanan met the Vicksburg Bulldogs Friday, Jan. 22, and the Bucks came home with a well played 54-35 win. The Buck Junior Varsity did just as well by winning an easy 68-25 game. The Buck varsity was in the lead all the way and the Bulldogs had a very rough night. R. Anderson and D. Smith led the Bucks with 22 and 15 points respectively.

The first quarter got underway with the Bucks getting the ball. The Bucks brought it down and passed the ball around a little bit. Then they gave it to "Andy" and he shot it and the Bucks led 2-0. Vicksburg then lost the ball and Anderson got fouled. He made it and Buchanan led 3-0. At the end of the first quarter Buchanan led 11-9. Ralph Anderson made all eleven points for Buchanan, while Katt had 3 for Vicksburg.

The second quarter got underway with the Bucks getting the tip and keeping the ball. Then they got a good shot, and made it and led Vicksburg by 4 points. Then Vicksburg made a basket and Buchanan made another one and then started going. The boys were hitting better and rolled in 16 points in the second quarter, while Vicksburg made 12. R. Anderson had slowed down but D. Smith, J. Letcher and G. Smith started up. D. Smith and R. Anderson led the Bucks with 5 points each, and Kelly led Vicksburg with 6 points. Buchanan led at the end of the second quarter 27-21.

The third quarter got underway with Buchanan getting the ball and moving ahead. Buchanan started making points and moving away. Midway in third quarter Coach Steffen put R. Anderson on the bench with four fouls. J. Schmidt took his place. He looked very good in his place. He had been out with a broken wrist which he got in football. Buchanan was rolling fine and made twice as many points as Vicksburg did. D. Smith led Buchanan with 6 points which Kott and Kelly each had three for Vicksburg. Buchanan led 41-28 at the end of the third quarter.

The fourth quarter got underway with Buchanan getting the tip for the fourth time in four quarters on opening jumps. The game slowed down much and many fouls were being called. Anderson came back in the fourth quarter and made 4 free throws. Later in the fourth quarter "Andy" went out with 5 fouls but not before he made 22 points. D. Smith and R. Anderson led Buchanan with 4 points each while Harper and Kott led Vicksburg with 2 points. The game ended, Buchanan 54, Vicksburg 35.

The Bucks reserves went on a scoring spree to a 68-25 win. The Bucks reserves were leading all the way and Vicksburg never was close to Buchanan. Nichols led Buchanan with 16 while Codfield, Karpenski and Wade each had eleven. Fisher, Wile, and Decker had 5 each and Dewitt had 4. Buchanan outscored Vicksburg every quarter. The first quarter by ten, second by 7, the third by 14, and the final by 13. Dale Dellinger, one of the reserves best, was not able to play on account of a bad back.

Frank Merson Is Re-Elected Head Savings & Loan

Local Association Passes Two Million Mark In Total Assets

At the annual meeting of the Buchanan Federal Savings & Loan Association, held Wednesday evening, Jan. 20, H. M. Bestle, B. R. Desenberg and Milford Schultz were re-elected directors, and H. C. Stark was elected director to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Philip Boone.

In the annual election of one-year officers the following were re-elected: president, Frank Merson, vice president, Arthur Voorhees; secretary-treasurer, Milford Schultz; assistant secretaries, Barbara Mayhew and Margaret McCormack.

Following is a summary of the financial gains of the association during 1953: total assets, \$2,961,099, an increase of 29% over last year, amount of savings increased 31%, number savings accounts increased 27%, money loaned increased 32%, number new borrowers increased 27%, increase in association reserves 15%.

Of the total loans made 33% was for new homes constructed and 42% was for the purchase of homes.

Nelson Transfer Safe "Cracked" And \$300 Taken

Thieves Effected Entrance By Prying Off Hasp Which Fastened Inside

The Nelson Transfer headquarters were broken into some time Tuesday night or Wednesday morning, entrance being made through a rear door, and the inner fire door of the safe was pried open and about \$300 in cash taken.

Entrance was effected through sliding doors in the rear. The opening had two sliding doors which met in the middle and were secured by a hasp and bolt dropped through from the inside. The thief or thieves pried off an end of the light hasp with a crowbar. The outer door of the safe was closed but not locked as had been the custom.

The cash drawer was taken out and carried to a rear room which could be lighted without being seen from the front. There the money was taken out, and the box was left with a number of checks, which were left. Following the theft the outer door of the safe was again closed and all appeared as usual. The theft was not discovered until about a half hour after the office attendants came in. It was discovered when Mrs. Esther Nelson opened the door to get some papers.

Chief Krugh stated that no fingerprints were found, though some marks were left suggesting that the thief wore gloves.

All-Out Effort Needed To Pass Buchanan's 1954 Goal Of \$5,000

Total Participation, With Those Giving More Who Can, Essential To Attaining Our Goal Says Chairman Hanlin

Citizens of Buchanan are urgently requested to remember the Mother's March on Polio, otherwise known as the Porchlight Parade, which is to be made this (Thursday) evening, Jan. 28, starting at 7:30.

The beginning of the parade will be signalled by the ringing of church bells. The event has in the past been a main source of revenue, taking in over \$900 last year. This year even more will be required if we meet our quota, states Chairman Philip Hanlin. A goal of \$5,000 has been set for the community total. There are many residents who may be handicapped by circumstances in matching their contribution of last year. But this can be overcome if all give a little (every little counts) and if THOSE WHO CAN WILL GIVE MORE.

New developments in the field of medical science indicate that perhaps this deadly disease may be more successfully combated in the future, with the result that its present seriousness may be mitigated. However at the present time these researches are financed by the funds raised by the March of Dimes. That is a reason for raising our sights in our attack on one of the youth's chief enemies.

In accordance with Section 73 of the City Charter notice is hereby given that the following Ordinance will be presented for final reading and adoption at the regular meeting of the City Commission to be held on February 8th, 1954.

ORDINANCE NO. 117
City of Buchanan
SIGN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE ERECTION, ALTERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SIGNS AND TO REPEAL ARTICLE 12 OF ORDINANCE NO. 108.

THE CITY OF BUCHANAN ORDAINS:

Section 1—Scope
No person, firm, corporation or association shall erect, cause or permit to be erected any outdoor advertising device within the City of Buchanan except in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. Signs erected by the City of Buchanan for public purposes need not comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2—Permits
No sign, advertising device or bill board shall be erected, maintained or altered without a permit being first obtained therefor, except that accessory signs of not to exceed four (4) square feet in area and not extending over public property may be erected without a permit. Application for a permit shall be made to the City Clerk and applicant shall show on his application that the consent of the property owner has been secured before a permit will be issued.

Section 3—Accessory Signs
Accessory signs are outdoor advertising devices which carry advertisements incidental to a principal use of the premises on which the sign is located. Such signs shall include only signs indicating business transacted, goods sold, services performed or materials produced on the premises, but not including a sign which is rented or controlled by any party except the owner or occupant of the premises.

Section 4—Billboards
Billboards are all outdoor advertising devices not classified as accessory signs the purpose of which is to attract the public attention to the matter displayed thereon.

Section 5—Signs in Residence Districts
Outdoor advertising devices shall be prohibited in Residence District as defined by the Zoning Ordinance except under the following conditions:

(a) A Physician or other professional man, or a person engaged in a customary home occupation, may display a sign not over one and one-half square feet in area.

(b) Signs advertising the lease, sale or rental of property, provided such signs are not over four square feet in area and provided further that not more than two such signs may be placed on a lot.

Section 6—Signs in Business Districts
Outdoor advertising devices shall be prohibited in Business Districts as defined by the Zoning Ordinance except as follows:

(a) Accessory signs only shall be permitted in Business Districts.

(b) Signs shall not extend over public property a distance greater than eight feet, nor within three feet of the back of curb, whichever is less.

(c) All signs extending over public property shall be not less than ten (10) feet above the grade or sidewalk except that single signs of 2 square feet in area or less and with a projection of not to exceed 2 feet may be installed 7 feet above grade of sidewalk.

(d) No post or other member

supporting a sign, awning, marquee or similar device shall be permitted in the public right-of-way.

(e) The City Commission may order a sign, awning marquee or other advertising device over public property removed on 60 days notice to the last known address of the owner, provided that due to a change in traveled street width, erection of traffic control devices or similar causes the sign interferes with the free and full use of the street by the public or interferes with the effectiveness of traffic control devices including divisional or street signs.

Section 7—Signs in Industrial Districts
Outdoor advertising devices shall be prohibited in Industrial Districts as defined by the Zoning Ordinance except as follows:

(a) Accessory signs as permitted in Business Areas.

(b) Billboards, provided that no bill board shall be erected within 200 feet of a residence, however zoned, without written permission of the residential owner or owners, and provided further that no billboards shall be located less than 25 feet from the street line.

No billboard shall be erected within 500 feet of a bridge, railroad crossing, church or public property.

Section 8—Maximum Size
No ground sign of an area greater than 300 square feet or no sign on a building or structure with a sign area of greater than

80 square feet shall be erected except upon presentation of detailed plans and an authorization by the City Plan Commission.

Section 9—Use of Public Right of Way
No placards, signs or advertising devices shall be erected, displayed or maintained upon any tree, fence or pole or any other object in any street, park or public property. No advertising device of any type shall have supports within the public right-of-way except by official action of the City Commission and provided further that such permission shall in no way alleviate the owner's liability for maintenance or interference with public use of the right-of-way.

Section 10—Maintenance of Signs
The owner of property on which a sign is placed and the person, firm or corporation maintaining said sign are declared to be independently responsible for the condition of the sign and the area in the vicinity thereof. All signs shall be maintained in good repair, safe condition and free from fire hazard or nuisance.

Section 11—Permit Fees
The following permit fees shall be collected prior to the issuance of any permit for the erection or alteration of an advertising device:

Three cents per square foot of face area of any advertising device or sign board with a minimum fee of one dollar. The face area shall be the entire area en-

closed within the outside perimeter of a sign board and shall include all sides of a sign devoted to advertising.

Permit fees shall be doubled for a sign installed in the event a permit is not obtained prior to erection.

Section 12—Temporary Signs
The City Manager may at his discretion, subject to review by the City Commission, permit temporary signs for a period not to exceed 90 days on building sites, subdivisions, developments, civic projects, or special events. Such signs shall conform to the conditions stated of each individual permit but shall not include signs covered by Sec. 8 of this ordinance within the public right-of-way.

Section 13—Unsafe or Non-Conforming Signs
Business or Industrial Uses located in Residence Districts as established by the Zoning Ordinance shall be prohibited from installing or erecting new signs unless application for a permit is reviewed and authorized by the Zoning Board of Appeals. Such permit shall be subject to the conditions placed on the sign permit by the Zoning Board of Appeals and provided further that the Zoning Board of Appeals shall be without authority to authorize a permit which would grant any Non-Conforming Business or Industrial use greater privileges than are permitted in Business or Industrial Districts within the

terms of this ordinance. When any sign or advertising device is found to be in such condition, as to make it immediately dangerous, the City Manager or his agent is hereby authorized to declare the same to be a public nuisance, and is authorized and empowered to abate such nuisance by taking such action as may be, in his judgment necessary, including the authority to take down and remove such sign without notice to the owner thereof. Expense of such action shall be assessed to and paid by the owner of the property involved.

Section 14—Penalties
Any person violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the County or City Jail for a period not to exceed 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

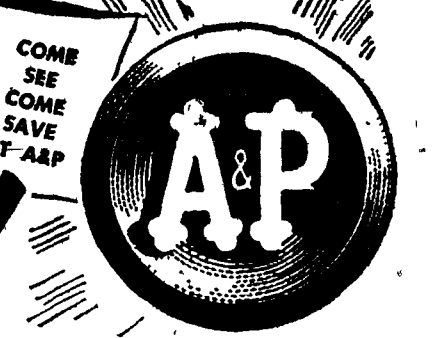
Section 15—Ordinances Repealed

This ordinance shall become effective on the 24th day of February, 1954 following publication thereof.

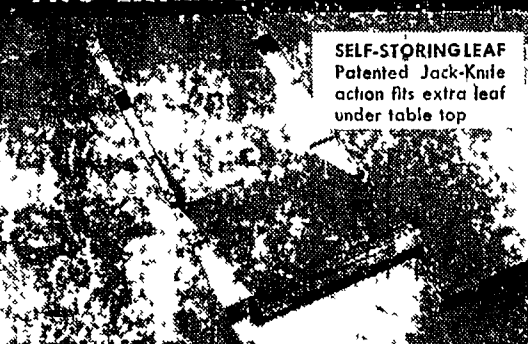

P.O. Adopts New Policy To Speed 1st Class Mail, Papers

Start Delivery Downtown At 9

Postal Dept. Emphasizes The Earlier Deliveries Of 1st Class, Papers

A shift in policy by the U.S. Postoffice Department which will emphasize earlier distribution and delivery of first class mail and papers will probably reach the local postoffices in the next two or three months, states Postmaster Edward Wesner.

According to this policy the clerks and rural mail carriers will distribute the first class mail and papers the first thing in the morning and then both city and rural carriers will start on their routes, leaving third class mail to be distributed afterward.

Wesner first made a tentative offer to business men to start delivery of first class mail and paper at 8:30 a.m. After a number of business men were "sounded out" it was agreed that, inasmuch as not all downtown establishments are open at 8:30, the hour for starting would be set at 9 a.m. At the present time it is started at 9:30.

Leave Some Doors Of School Open Says A Teacher

Suggests Movies, Games, In Addition To TV At Noon Hours

I was very much interested in your front page article of the past week concerning the so-called "noon hour" problem which exists in our local school system. This accusation, made by someone who passed the school last week, is a condition that has existed for the past several years. I am sure it is not a new experience to our school administration. Our school administrative personnel, as well as the Board of Education, has been approached many times on this subject and asked to work out some plan whereby these children could be allowed to enter the buildings without having to wait out in the weather until 1:00 o'clock.

It is true that the teachers do take turns in giving up their noon hour, and some have been paid for assuming the responsibility of these children. However, in many cases, this "assuming responsibility" merely consists of giving the children time to eat their lunch and then turning them outside and locking the door until the bell rings. I am not placing ALL teachers in this category. We have many conscientious and deserving teachers on our faculty.

Only last week I was talking with one of our school administrative officers and he was greatly perturbed to think that even though TV was offered in the building, yet many of the chil-

dren refused to come in and preferred to stay out in the cold. He seemed to feel that this showed lack of parent co-operation. Personally, I can not see how refusal on the part of a child to go inside can be blamed on the parent.

I am a teacher, also, and on cold days my boys and girls may go outside, stay inside, or do a little of each. Since we have this beautiful and well-planned addition to our building, why not make the maximum use of it? My suggestion would be that the school provide TV, movies, monopoly, checkers, Flinch, etc., and then let the children come and go as they like. I realize that all doors can not be left unlocked, but designated entrances could be left open. Then if the children insist upon staying out that is their problem, not the school's. Please, let's leave some doors open.

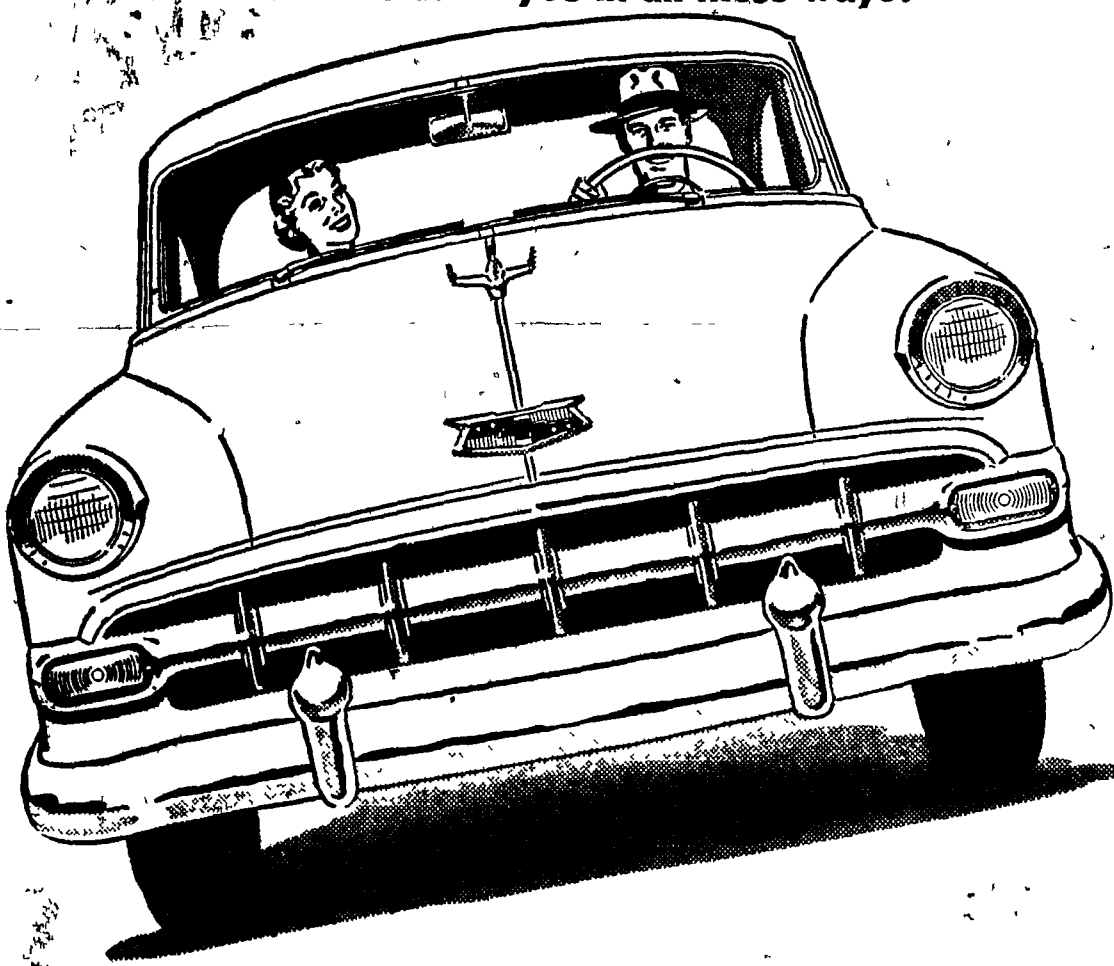

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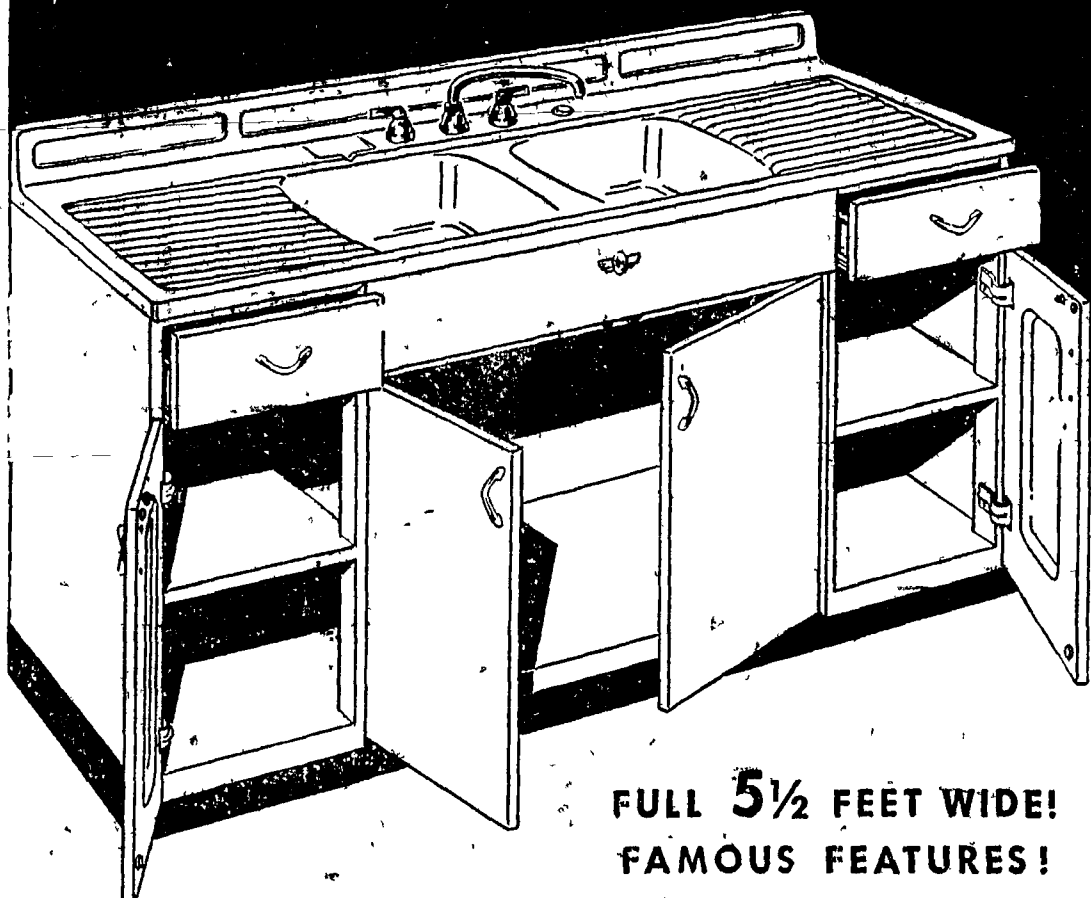
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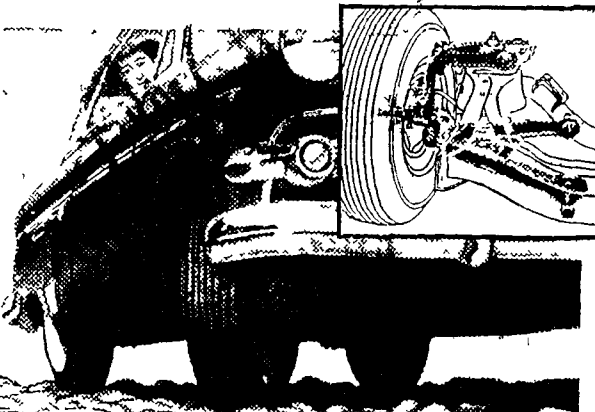

Advise New Year's Resolutions For Improved Farming

New Year's resolutions as suggested by Lee N. Rosenkrans, area conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Kalamazoo, for prairie farming are:

ESTABLISHMENT of a proper land use for every acre and treat each acre according to its needs. Adapt the crops to the land. Round cropping and livestock program around the capabilities of the land.

LIMING. Apply lime according to needs as shown by a soil test.

FERTILIZERS. Replace plant food removed by cropping and leaching. Apply adequate applications of phosphorus and potash with all legume seedings.

CROP ROTATIONS. At least one-half of the cropland should be seeded to legumes for hay or pasture.

MAINTENANCE OF ORGANIC MATTER. Use livestock manure, green manure, crop residues and over-winter cover crops.

REFORESTING. Plant adapted trees on non-agricultural land, land too steep to farm, eroded areas, and low windbreaks.

WILDLIFE. Encourage by the proper management of drainage ditches, fence rows, odd areas, marshes, ponds, shelterbelts, windbreaks, stream banks and wildlife borders.

DRAINAGE. Determine whether it is practical, economical, and feasible to drain land before starting operations.

WOODLAND. Make each acre of woodland produce by proper protection, thinning, improvement cuttings, and harvesting.

PASTURE MANAGEMENT. Control grazing according to the type of livestock, kind, of grass pasture, and type of land.

SUPPORTING PRACTICES. Where practical use contour cultivation, contour plantings of orchards and small fruits, contour strip cropping, field strip cropping, sod waterways, terraces, diversion terraces and windbreaks.

Advices Gutter Cleaners In Dairy Barns

Dairy farmers shifting from a low-profit hand-labor small herd to a big "mechanized" herd can add profits and pleasure with a gutter cleaner, suggests J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent.

Labor shortages and physical handicaps can be offset by a gutter cleaner for farmers who can finance the installation, he explains, and the operating cost is low.

Records kept on several Michigan farms showed operation costs averaged 2 to 4 cents per cow for the winter season, reports Robert L. Maddox, Michigan State College agricultural engineer.

Maddox notes that cleaners fall into two categories—the endless chain type circulating around the

entire barn area and up an elevator to the manure spreader and the single gutter type which shuttles between two motors to clean manure out to the spreader and return. Many farmers have built their own gutter cleaners along one line or the other.

Maddox does not advise gutter cleaners for small or medium-size herds, however, unless the farmer has a peculiar situation to warrant it.

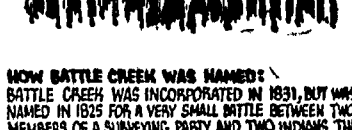

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Legislative News Letter

(The following is the first of a series of Legislative News Letters to be printed by The Record during the 1954 session. These letters are furnished through the courtesy of State Representative Don R. Pears. (—Buchanan).)

It was highly gratifying as we convened January 13 to know that the State is not faced with a staggering deficit and dire predictions of bankruptcy in the immediate future. This fiscal situation is due to Republican legislative insistence on effecting every possible economy in the operation of State Government, loophole plugging in tax collections and the enactment last year by the Legislature of the Business Activities Tax. It is as distasteful to the Legislature as it is to the people to be forced to impose a tax burden so all can breathe easily in the knowledge we are not confronted with a tax problem in this session.

In his first message to the Legislature, delivered in person before a joint convention, which dealt with the economic condition of the State, the Governor struck both a pessimistic and an optimistic note. On the one hand, he took credit for the accomplishments of the Legislature in balancing the budget entirely forgetful of the fact that he opposed our efforts and permitted the tax bill to become law without his signature, while on the other hand he stressed the problem of fear for our economic future.

His second message, sent in as a communication, dealt with public health and safety measures. Supplemental messages are expected.

Lacking organization problems to slow us down in the opening days of the session, we were able to get off to a flying start with the introduction in the House of some 51 bills and 4 joint resolutions, of which 45 bills and 4 resolutions were already printed and in the files of the members within an hour's time following their introduction in the House.

And now I would like to mention briefly a few of the bills and resolutions which have been dropped into the legislative hopper. HB 1 amends the penal code, making it a misdemeanor to abandon refrigerators, iceboxes, etc., without first removing the latch or door. This bill was prompted by the large number of deaths of children who were trapped in these abandoned boxes while playing.

A constitutional amendment is called for in HJR B proposing to lower the voting age to 19, while HJR "C" would allow the State to borrow up to a hundred million dollars to pay a bonus to Michigan Korean Emergency veterans.

HB 4 reintroduced this session would make incurable insanity under certain conditions, additional grounds for divorce. HB 12 would grant free use of State Park facilities to residents over 65 who are suffering with hay fever.

HB 13 would set speed limits of 65 mph during the day and 50 mph at night, with a 25 mph limit in posted school areas during the daytime except during the vacation period of July and August.

HB 47 would prohibit passenger carrying cars from traveling at any speed so low as to cause a hazard to following cars.

HB 51 calls for submitting to the people in the November 2 election, the question of calling a constitutional convention.

HB 52 would provide the death penalty for kidnapping if the person is harmed, and if the jury subsequently orders that type of penalty. This is different from previous capital punishment bills, in that this bill amends the penal code and applies only to kidnapping cases where the victim is harmed.

HB 54 would increase operator and chauffeur licenses 25c to provide additional highway patrolmen.

HB 55 would prohibit bear hunting until 1965 in that area of the State below the Manistee-Lake Huron line, while HM 28 requires a separate license for hunting bear.

HB 27 would require individual fishing licenses for each person.

HB 37 requires minors to file P. L. and P. D. Insurance policies with the Secretary of State as prerequisites to securing a driver's license.

HB 35 creates a Fair Employment Conciliation Commission consisting of 5 members to receive, hear, and act upon complaints, in an effort to eliminate discrimination in employment because of race, sex, or religion. This is substantially the same as the bill before the Legislature last session. The firemen's work week would be reduced from 73 1/2 to 63 hours in HB 59. It also provides for giving an additional 24 consecu-

tive hours off duty in every 8-day period. This measure has been before the Legislature many times.

HB 75 would change the name of Michigan State College to Michigan State University.

These are only a few of the bills. At this writing we have had 105 introduced in the House, about which mention will be made in subsequent letters. Our committees are working and bills and resolutions are now being reported out.

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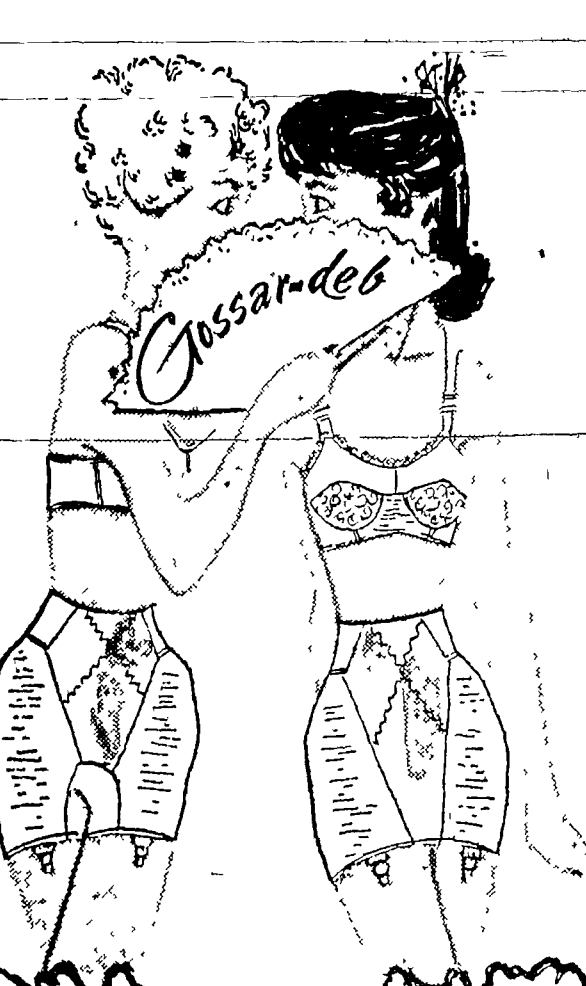
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
