Principal Discusses Educational Standards

At a recent meeting with parents, I was asked for my reaction to a recent newspaper article concerning the lowering of standards in public schools. This article referred to the lower scores that students are making on college entrance exams, and it discussed the statements of a number of university people who are concerned about the academic level of incoming freshmen. The article, as have many others recently, questioned why education costs are rising rapidly, while the product appears to be inferior. The inference, if not the direct statement, was that schools are doing a poor job.

I won't argue with the fact that scores are lower, nor will I disagree that incoming freshmen are less well prepared. But I will disagree with the conclusion that school systems are to blame. A student who is graduated from Buchanan High School or from most other U.S. high schools has every opportunity to be better prepared for college than students who were graduated in previous generations. If he is not, these are some of the reasons why:

1. Students often choose easier classes, rather than difficult academic ones, and their parents permit them to take these less difficult classes.

A great deal of pressure has been put on schools to decrease dropout rates and provide classes for everyone. In addition, the state has provided school districts with financial incentives to provide diverse programs. Therefore, there are many more courses to choose from than ever before. Many students avoid the more difficult classes for courses not really designed for them. A public school can not force individual students to take college prep or academic classes, except for those required of all students. We can only advise.

Only the parents of the students can compel them to take the academic classes. We have eight students in physics this year and nine in advanced math. Those students will be well prepared in science and math. Only about one of four students take chemistry and intermediate math before they graduate. Shakespeare Studies, Great Books, and other high level English classes have very small enrollments, and only

about one of three students begins a foreign language.

Don Nichols, in a recent editorial in the Record, quotes an M.S.U. admissions officer as saying that the senior year in high school is a wasted one for most students, as far as college preparation is concerned. That is true, but it need not be. Many academic students can't find room to fit into their schedules all the high level classes we offer.

Here are the schedules of our three National Merit semifinalists and the two students who received commendation:

Great Books, Nobel Prize Authors, Teacher's Aide, Symphony Band, + Advanced Natural Science, Advanced Natural Science.

Great Books, Physics, Spanish I, Art, + Advanced Natural Science, Advanced Natural Science.

Advanced Math, Physics, Individual Reading, Mythology, Advanced Biology, Spanish III, Advanced Math, Chemistry, Business Law, Composition, Introduction to Law, Spanish IV, Great Books, Introduction to Law, Fundamentals of Punctuation, Bookkeeping, English Grammar, Spanish IV.

+ A course for gifted students, that is funded by the State.

These seniors are certainly not wasting their last year in school.

2. Colleges have lowered their standards for various reasons. Many no longer require foreign languages, three years of math, chemistry, etc. Therefore the students don't take them and are less well-prepared.

3. Anyone can get into college these days. Since I have been at Buchanan, no Buchanan applicant has ever been turned down at Southwestern Michigan, Lake Michigan, or Ferris State, to name three. And some of these students have been near or at the bottom of their classes. In the case of Southwestern, and others, not even a high school diploma is required. No wonder that they get less prepared students.

In addition to these three documented reasons, I would add two theories that I have on the subject.

1. The old work ethic is losing status all the time. The man who works too hard on the job is severely criticized by his fellow workers for making them look bad. Young people imitate their parents; the same situation exists in school. The student who works hard gets some of the same feeling from his peers.

Royal Valley Resort To Get Liquor License

The Buchanan township board gave their approval Monday to enable Royal Valley Ski Resort to obtain a Class C liquor license and dance permit. Al Roltman stated that it's hard to run a ski resort without such a license. He said that this would enable them to have banquets during the off-season. He said that the bar, which would have a private entrance, would be closed when school children were present. There would be no canned or bottled beer (only draft) and nobody would be allowed to take drinks outside the bar area. He said that the license would help control the area.

The vote was three to two. Ivan Price, Dr. Jones and Donna Newsom voted yes, and Dale Nelson and Ruth Rose voted no.

The township had met with the city to remedy a dangerous traffic situation involving school children on Rynearson. The township was agreeable to work out a solution on that, but when the city brought up another problem of water drainage, Ivan Price had not agreed to talk

about that. He said Monday that they were two separate issues.

The township approved a plan to dredge the southeast side of Crescent Lake at owner's expense. On another matter, Price said that he had no objection to allowing sewer access if Niles Township needs city sewage service in Samson Terrace.

The Clear Lake residents had petitioned to form a lake board to do something about weed control. The township ruled that the petition was illegal, and the Clear Lake residents wanted to know why it had taken so long to determine its illegality after most of the summer residents had gone home. Price agreed to get together with those who had circulated the petition to get the proper property definitions on the lake can be considered.

The township board expressed concern over the planned discontinuance of emergency ambulance service but admitted that they didn't know what to do about it.

The homecoming committee is especially anxious to have as many graduates from the class of 1950 attend the game, and they will be entertained with refreshments during the half. The football team, which had behind it three consecutive championships, will be honored. They had a successful season, although

they lost three games. After the game, there will be a coffee house to which all alumni and students are invited.

Leave Leaves

The city of Buchanan, which has one of the best leaf-pickup services in the area, has a problem. Every fall, they ask people to rake their leaves and put them in the tree lawn. They do not want them raked into the street.

If leaves are raked into the street, they get washed down the sewer. The city asks that they be left in the tree lawn and they will be picked up there.

United Way At 64 Percent

As of Monday morning the Buchanan United Way had reached \$34,709, which is 64 percent of its goal. Several categories reported large gains.

Among the education division, which has gone from \$1582 last year to \$2175 this year, the percentage of participation is considerably higher.

The employees at Buchanan Steel Products went from 37 percent participation last year to 71.7 percent participation this year.

Unity Hospital showed a large gain from \$252.21 last year to \$446 this year. This represented 53 percent participation.

Still to be heard from are some of the professional men and women, about 45 percent of the business division, several expected corporate gifts and many corporation employees who have not yet been reported.

Chairman Robert Powers had said that the campaign needed wider participation to make up for the lower employment in Buchanan this year, and it would appear that he is getting it, since many new givers are included already among this year's list.

Assets Up

As of the end of September, Clark Federal Credit Union reported \$8,033,244.74 in assets. Treasurer-manager Vern Lubben said that this represents an increase of \$1,700,000 over last year. There are now 5,651 members.

The Credit Union reported the start of a Savings Draft plan which enables customers to withdraw money from a separate account without coming to the credit union office and at the same time earn the same dividend as other credit union savings accounts.

Take All Suggestions

About nine years ago, the city of Buchanan hired a professional planner and paid for a master plan. The plan they received was expensive but very comprehensive and full of good ideas. The copies of the master plan lie on book shelves, and little attention is paid to them.

Several months ago, the plan commission sent letters to people in town asking for suggestions on projects to improve Buchanan. Several answers were received, and those letters are filed away.

The city applied for state funds to up-date their master plan. This project would cost about \$11,000. They were turned down on their first application and have re-applied.

Now the plan commission is sending out more letters and trying to get input from the community to arrive at some concrete suggestions of what people want for Buchanan.

Over the years, the city has hired planning consultants and traffic consultants, but it doesn't always heed what these professionals tell them. A great amount of money has been spent over the years getting somebody else's advice on what to do and then not following it.

We'd urge the plan commission to consider each suggestion it gets, no matter how unimportant this group may think an idea is. We would hope that they will take advantage of all the material they have gathered already and then get together and come up with their own master plan for the immediate future of Buchanan.

And we'd hope that the city won't jump too quickly into buying another master plan until they've considered all the possibilities contained in the one they have.

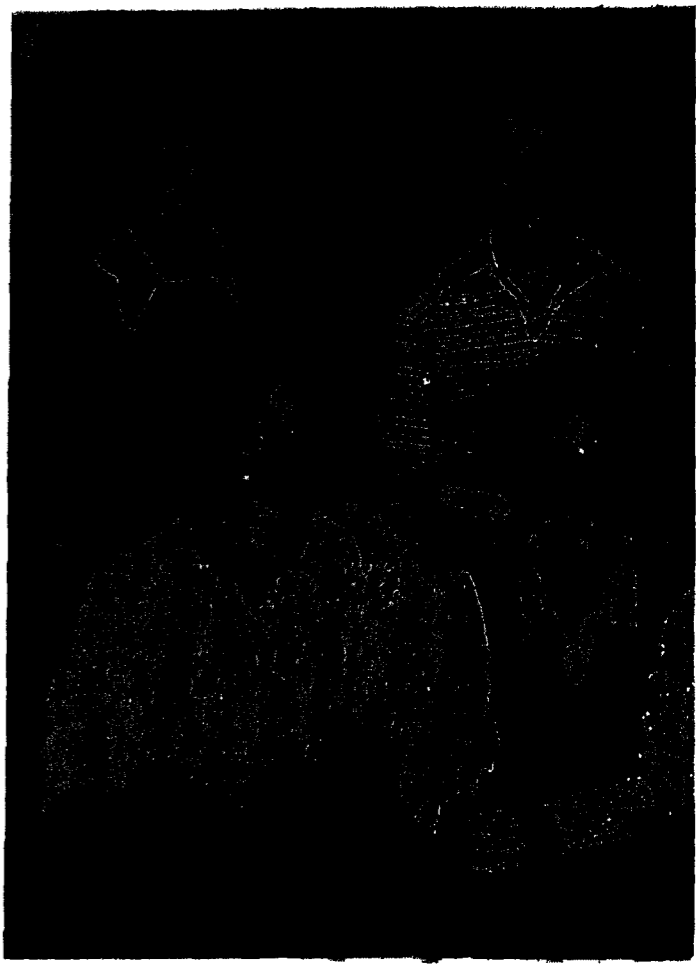

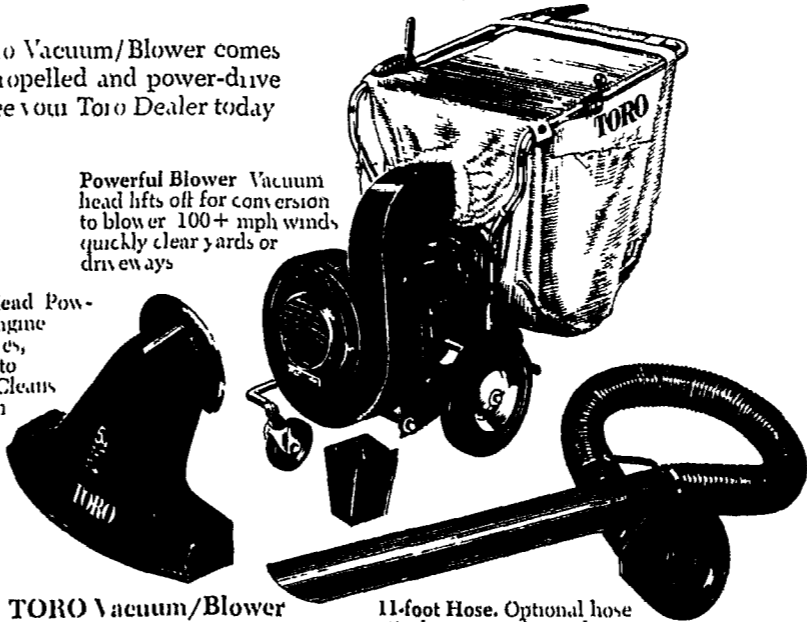

The Grand Sunflower -- And Its Seeds

The stately sunflower now used and grown in many parts of the world was used in North America first by the Indians -- centuries ago. The Indians used the seeds for oil and food and the stems for fibers for weaving rugs and petals for dye.

The non-oil variety sunflower seeds can be eaten as a food in a variety of ways, dehulled and eaten without processing, dehulled, roasted in oil and salted, or salted in the shell.

Sunflower oil is a pale yellow when refined it is colorless with a good flavor and is good for cooking or using as salad oil. It's popular for popping corn, deep-frying foods and other uses when a liquid oil with a high smoke point is needed. It's high in polyunsaturated fatty acids.

Even the meal that remains after the oil is extracted is a high protein supplement for poultry and livestock -- and is used in bird feeders. The hulls, themselves, are also used. They have been used for making a fuel log and for poultry litter so far, but many other possibilities exist.

Then there is sunflower seed flour which is fluffy and light gray in color. It can be mixed with other flours up to one-fourth of the total amount -- anymore, however, affects the flavor of the final product.

To prepare sunflower seeds at home, simply follow these directions. Cover unshelled seeds with salted water (2 qts of water to 1/2 to 1 cups salt). Bring to a boil and simmer 2 hours. Drain and dry on absorbent paper. (Or you may want to soak in salt solution overnight.)

Put sunflower seeds in a shallow pan in a 300 degree oven for 30 to 40 minutes or until golden brown. Stir occasionally. Take out of oven and add 1 teaspoon of melted butter or margarine to one cup of seeds. Stir to coat. Put on an absorbent towel. Salt to taste. Deep fat fry hulled seeds at 360 degrees. For every cup of seeds allow 1/4 cup cooking oil. Cook until golden brown. Skim off and drain seeds on absorbent paper. After salting, store tightly covered.

Actually, sunflower seeds may be used in any recipe that calls for nuts including toppings for cake, frostings or ice cream topping or even fondue dips.

One ounce (about 150 calories) of hulled sunflower seeds, contain vitamins, calcium and other minerals. Sunflower seeds are 50 percent fat, mostly polyunsaturated fatty acid, linoleic.

Outside of the popular "eating out of hand" style -- you may also use sunflower kernels in your batter for coating oven-fried chicken (for a crunchy, nutty taste). Other ways include adding them to hamburger recipes or casserole dishes.

Detroit (April, 1947) Henry Ford, Detroit auto pioneer, is dead at the age of 83. He died four years after turning over the reins of his auto empire to his grandson, Henry Ford II.

Ford pioneered the development of the mass produced automobile. In 1907 he decided to build one car the Model T. Fifteen million Model T's took to the road from 1908 to 1927 and changed the world.

Ford sold his car at a reasonable price. He once said, "The right sales price is always the lowest price at which, all things considered, the article can be manufactured. It is the duty of the manufacturer constantly to lower prices and increase wages."

Ford pioneered the idea that the workers in his auto plants were also consumers who would one day buy the cars they produced.

In 1907 the Model T Roadster costed \$825.00. In 1925 it costed \$260.00 and over 2 million were produced that single year. In 1915 when the average manufacturing wage was \$11.00 per week, Ford announced a \$5.00 per day wage.

By lowering car prices and increasing wages Ford put the world on wheels.
