

Niles Division Of State Police Have Busy Year

47 Report Lists Amazing Total Large And Small Crime

The annual report of the Niles detachment of the Michigan State Police (a frontier post), located on US-31 near the Indiana-Michigan state line, indicates that the 8 officers assigned to this post were kept busy during 1947. The Niles post patrols the east half of Berrien county and the west half of Cass county. In this area, 1304 complaints were answered to answer these calls and to patrol the area, the officers traveled 113,016 miles (4 1/2 times around the earth)

Officers assigned to the Niles detachment are listed as: Sgt. Paul Frederick, corporal L B Miller, Trooper Dale Stratton, Matland Larson, Don McCray, John Araszewski, Andy Paliu, and Edward Paruch. Sgt. Fredrick was transferred to Niles from Flint on May 1, 1947, and Sgt. Earl Secrist was promoted and transferred from Niles to Detroit

While on patrol, officers arrested 1085 persons for traffic violations and 386 persons for various crimes which ranged from robbery armed to simple assaults and petty larceny. 6733 automobiles for defective equipment, investigated 352 accidents and assisted 4009 motorists who were stalled or in difficulty along the highway. During the year, lost or stolen property valued at \$14,057.03 was recovered by the officers of the Niles detachment

The Michigan State Police inspect and test all kerosene shipped to the bulk plants. During 1947, the Niles detachment inspected and tested 56 tank cars of kerosene which totalled 306,753 gallons

When on patrol at night, officers are continually checking places of business to see that everything is all right. In the resort areas during the closed season, officers kept checking to see that none of the cottages have been tampered with. In doing this, 14,190 inspections were made during 1947

Following are several crimes which were outstanding. On Jan. 28, 1947, Troopers London and Atchewski, apprehended Lawrence Goad, who had robbed a taxi driver in Benton Harbor, earlier in the evening and was caught in the act of robbing the second taxi driver. Later it was learned that Lawrence Goad had three other convictions had overpowered a guard at the Tenn state prison and escaped. In stolen cars they toured through a number of states. When touring they held-up and robbed a number of persons and gas stations. Lawrence Goad had the Prison guard's revolver stuck in the taxi driver's back when apprehended by officers

On Nov 5, 1947, while investigating an accident on US-31 south of Niles, it was learned that the motorcycle involved had been stolen. Further investigation revealed that the rider, Felton Jones, was wanted for several robberies, also that he had escaped from the State prison at Kirby, Alabama

Another case which was of interest in this area occurred on Oct. 15, 1947, a tall colored man had looted three business places in Gary, Ind. While looting the third place the owner of the store shot at the bandit and wounded him twice. The next day the suspect was spotted in the heavily wooded area south and east of Niles. A posse consisting of all law enforcing officers in this area was formed and two hours later the subject was apprehended and turned over to the Gary-Indiana police




