

Work is being completed on converting the old Samson barn into a first-rate clubhouse at Brookwood Golf Course. Nine professional holes have been added to the nine already in use. The architects of the new course say that the terrain and the lake and ponds and hills along with some beautiful woods make it an ideal setting for the course.

School Election On June 9

June 9 is the date for the Buchanan school election. At that time voters will be asked to approve a yet undetermined amount of operating millage and to elect two members to the board of education. Vern Lubben has announced that he will not seek re-election, and Dr. Richard Beistle still hasn't said whether he will run again. The deadline for candidates to file their petitions is May 12.

Three candidates have already taken out petitions. Cletha Wade, Robert Luke and Bill DeVos have indicated that they will be candidates.

Still trying to determine the state equalized valuation and the amount of state aid they can expect, the school administration is trying to figure out how much millage they will require. Last year they asked for and got an additional 1.4 mills from 16.35 mills to 17.75. They pointed out that this additional millage was a one-time shot to pay for band uniforms, band instruments, expenses of the school farm and the cost of opening a new middle school. Last year's millage was approved by a vote of 694 to 486. The new system of tax assessment should raise the state equalized valuation considerably, but the state aid will decrease. The new budget will be presented at the May 19 meeting. Over 80 percent of it goes for salaries.

Fine Arts Week In Final Three Days

The auditorium was well filled with an enthusiastic crowd Sunday afternoon for the opening event in Buchanan Fine Arts Week, the joint concert of the Concert and Symphony Bands of the high school.

Both groups showed tremendous improvement since their last appearances and impressed the audience with their skillful presentation of a well-varied program. The Symphony Band performed the difficult Finale of Shostakovich's Fifth Symphony with real professionalism and easily switched to the swinging beat of Tribute to Jim Croce and a rousing Sousa march to end the afternoon. This last number was accompanied by the surprise release of some confetti and a few balloons from the balcony in keeping with the parade spirit.

Monday night the program, divided between the three middle school bands, evidenced a good grasp of music fundamentals as the sixth, seventh and eighth grade bands appeared with progressively difficult compositions nicely performed.

On Tuesday activities switched to the gymnasium at the high school for the grade school music festival with song and dance provided by the third, fourth and fifth grades, well received as always by a fine crowd.

For those who receive their Records on Wednesday, May 7 will be the night of the performance by the fourth and fifth grade strings and the middle school orchestra with the fifth grade band winding up the musical evening.

Tonight's program (Thursday) will be in the middle school gym with the 7th and 8th Middle School Chorus and the Middle School Ensemble sharing the

honors.

Friday the Buchanan High School Choir and the Drama Department will each offer a segment of the evening's fare in the auditorium, and on Saturday the week will close with the performance of more middle school groups -- the Sixth Grade Chorus and the Middle School Ensemble back at middle school.

More detailed accounts of the Thursday, Friday and Saturday programs are given elsewhere in this issue.

During the week those who attended have also had the opportunity to view the exhibits at the high school in the new art room and showcases in the halls where art students' work is being displayed, and in the home economics room where elementary art is on display as well as home economics projects of the high school classes.

On the nights of the concerts at the new middle school, art and home economics projects will be displayed in the art room and commons area there during the evening.

Other exhibits include woodshop and foundry projects on display all week in room 106 at the high school, tables, checkboards and gunracks will be among the displays.

It is interesting to realize that this unique Fine Arts Week program involves almost 1000 children in town as well as an imposing assortment of teachers on all levels, all cooperating to create a week of mutual enjoyment for Buchanan residents. Anyone who hasn't yet seized the opportunity to attend one or more of these carefully prepared concerts and exhibits is depriving himself of a great deal of pleasure. It's not too late.

With his first varsity coaching job, Heckathorne's team finished with a 20 and 5 record and got to the state quarter finals. Heckathorne went to Ferris State College and graduated from Western Michigan University.

Five Buchanan students will attend the 38th American Legion Wolverine Boys' State on the campus of Michigan State University June 11-18. Don Holmes, sponsored by the Buchanan Lions Club, Scott Entenman, sponsored by Clark Equipment Company, David Tallman, by the American Legion, Mike Busby, by Inter-City Bank, and Terry Shaner by the Loyal Order of Moose will be the delegates, and Tom Trull is an alternate.

The delegates are selected by their ability to demonstrate leadership, by their mental alertness, and by the fact that they are vigorous, enthusiastic and personable and able to get along well with others.

Holmes has been a member of the cadet band and the symphonic band, played freshman football and basketball, has been on the tennis team and the cross country team. He's been a member of the Omegan Choir and participated in 4-H. He presently contemplates attending Great Lakes Bible College or Lincoln Christian College.

Entenman has been on the tennis team and was a member of the cast of Fiddler on the Roof. He has been active in the United Methodist Youth Fellowship, the chancel choir and the youth choir. He was employed by the Berrien County Record.

Tallman's interests include auto design and engineering. He's a member of the Portage Prairie United Methodist Church and has been active in 4-H for six years.

Busby was a member of Buchanan's winning basketball team this year. He played basketball in 1971 and 1972 and returned in 1974. His college plans are still indefinite.

Shaner's activities have included track, cross country, freshman football and journalism. He now is considering either Western Michigan or Central Michigan for a political science major.

Let's Catch Them

Along Chicago Road are some fine old historic homes and the pastoral scene is something to behold in the spring. Yet along that old stage coach route somebody had dumped his trash. A few feet further was a trash bag full of beer cans.

The river is beautiful now as the spring leaves appear along its bank. Yet right along Redbud Trail were piles of litter and rubbish apparently thrown from cars.

It's only a small percent of the people who would do something like that. Most citizens are proud of Michigan and attempt to keep it beautiful. But that small percentage are ruining the countryside with their filth. They are decimating the land.

They should be stopped. They should be punished. But first they must be caught. This isn't going to be easy, because apparently they operate at night.

If a carload of these criminals were caught and then forced to pick up all the rubbish on a road for the distance of five miles, this might give a valuable lesson. We've seen signs warning of large fines for litter, but we've never heard of anybody having to pay them.

It is now possible to hire the unemployed with federal funds. We wonder if it's occurred to the county road commission to employ some of these people to police the area and to get rid of the tons of junk which have gathered along the county roads. They could serve a double purpose of picking up the trash and preventing more litter.

We still can't understand why people deliberately litter this lovely land. But if there are people sick enough to do this, they should be stopped before they turn this country into one big garbage dump.

Clark To Reduce Lift Truck Production In England

The Clark Equipment Group announced further centralization of its worldwide lift truck production. The decision, caused in part by the general economic slowdown around the world, means that part of the total labor force of 800 at its Camberley facility in England will be reduced over the next six months.

The Clark group also manufactures certain construction machinery products as well as van carriers at Camberley. Speaking on behalf of the Clark organization, Robert H. Braun, Jr., group vice president of the Clark U.S. parent company commented, "Clark remains committed to the ultimate resurgence of the United Kingdom and European lift truck markets, and closing the industrial truck Camberley plant in no way indicates a lessening of our efforts to capture an even greater market share for our products as economic conditions improve."

"Ultimately," Mr. Braun said, "we expect the worldwide economic picture to brighten enough to permit Clark to build a new electric lift truck plant

somewhere in Europe." Mr. Braun indicated that lack of suitable space at Camberley for the future expansion needed to meet this anticipated marked demand also contributed to Clark's decision.

Although electric lift truck production at the Camberley facility will be slowly reduced as the redundancies take effect, the Clark Group will continue to supply both the United Kingdom and European markets from other facilities including one at Georgetown, Kentucky in the United States. Internal combustion lift truck production in Europe is already centered in the Clark facility in Mulheim, Germany and plans are underway to increase the productive capacity there.

In a further move toward product centralization, the Clark Group has decided to transfer its U.S. production of van carriers to the Camberley facility.

"Obviously," Mr. Braun continued, "there is a great concern over the employment situation at Camberley, and every reasonable effort is being made to assist those affected. A special

job placement service has been set up to help those employees affected to find jobs elsewhere."

Buchanan will have its Memorial Day parade and ceremonies on Monday, May 26. The parade will start at 10 a.m.

At the annual ceremonies at the cemetery, Milo Newer, Jr., state commander of the American Legion, will be the guest speaker.

On Sunday, May 18, flags will be placed on the graves of veterans at approximately 9 a.m. Pack 542 cub scouts, sponsored by the American Legion Post 51, will assist in placing them.

This year's Memorial Day committee will be Jim Desenberg, Walt Jane, Hank Reed and John Eger of the American Legion and Art Reed of the VFW.

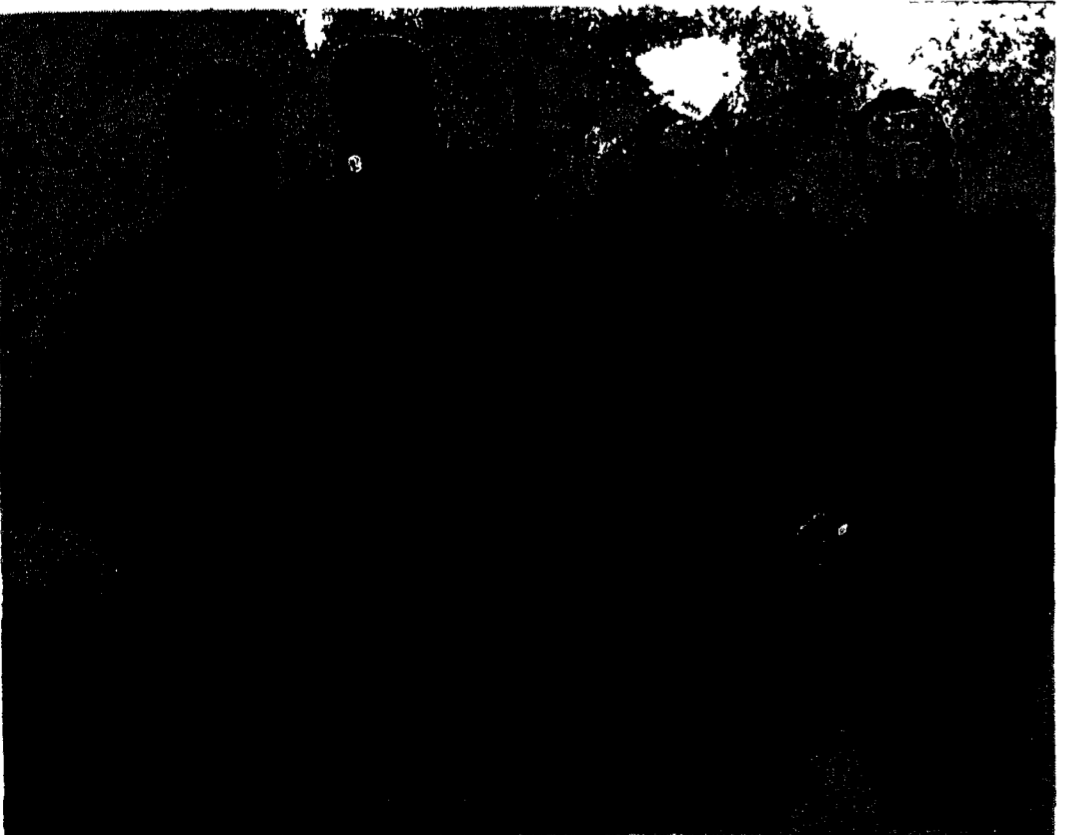

Residents Return From Extensive Tour

Mr and Mrs Douglas Bennett of Route 1, Buchanan, and Mrs Ora Prekert of Gahen, members of the Hills Corners Bible Church, returned last week from a three-week Bible Lands Pilgrimage tour.

The tour began in Lebanon but because planes were grounded at O'Hare by an April snowstorm the three, together with Mr and Mrs Adrian Vaks-vik of Elkhart and eight Canadian members who were stranded in Toronto joined the others a day late. They arrived on the evening before the group left Beirut for Cairo.

In Cairo, one highlight was attendance at a 'Sound and Light presentation featuring the Pyramids and Sphinx. The main purpose of visiting Jordan was to motor about 150 miles south from Ammon to see the "rose-red City of Petra"

The second week was spent in Israel entering via the Allenby Bridge. Four days were spent sightseeing in and near Jerusalem the next two nights were spent at a kibbutz, the Nof Ginosar on the Sea of Galilee, while visiting sites in that vicinity. A boat ride took the group to the Ein Gev Kibbutz, in the shadow of the Golan Heights, to eat Peter's fish one noontime.

On April 16, as the bus was driving toward Tel Aviv, many crowds were out celebrating the 27th anniversary of Israel's becoming an independent state, much as the Fourth of July is observed in this country.

The next day thirteen of the group left for home and the remaining twenty-five flew to Istanbul Turkey for a week's stay visiting the sites of the Seven Churches of Asia Minor and Istanbul. Several days were spent in Izmir about 200 miles

south of Istanbul to see sites near there. There was an overnight stay at a heated mineral springs resort at Pamukkale, near the old city of Hierapolis.

On the last day in Istanbul the group had a 1 1/2 hour boat ride the length of the Bosphorus, past the entrance to the Black Sea, a bus ride across the 3-year-old Intercontinental Bridge linking Europe and Asia; a visit to several great mosques and museums and to the Grand Bazaar, which houses over 4,000 bazaars (shops) under one roof. This day, April 23, was the 55th anniversary of Turkey's becoming a republic, so as in Israel the previous week, the people were enjoying a holiday.

About an hour out of Amsterdam over the Atlantic there was a break in the clouds, and the Captain called the group's attention to the "bonne braes" of Scotland about 35,000 feet

beneath them. Rivers and villages could be seen clearly. A few hours later, land appeared again. This time Greenland, but it was black, covered at intervals with snow.

Twenty-three hours after leaving the Istanbul airport, with a time adjustment of eight hours, the five were back at the South Bend Airport, reporting themselves happy to be back in the USA.

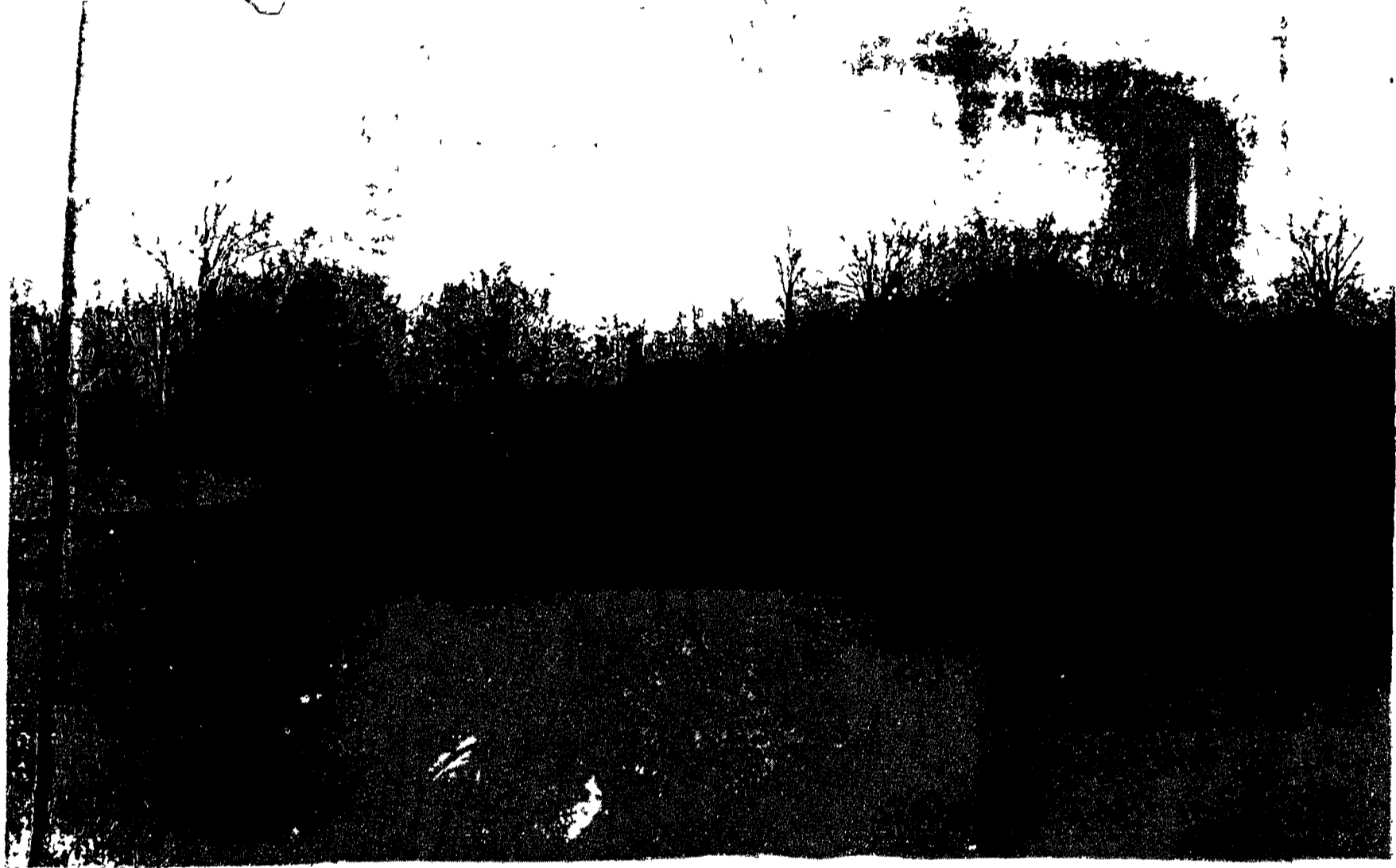

LWV Studies Role of Executive Branch

The Role of the Executive Branch in Government was the subject for a joint meeting of the League of Women Voters of the Niles-Buchanan and St. Joseph-Benton Harbor areas held April 30 at Andrews University.

The featured speaker, Kenneth Morse, a graduate of Western Michigan University with a bachelors degree in sociology, opened his remarks by stating the Executive Branch of government includes the President, Vice-President, and Cabinet. The powers in this branch are under constant change, affected by such factors as the party in office and the character and personality of the President. He went on to describe power as the ability to block or facilitate goals and said the powers of the President and the Congress are only those each is willing to concede to the other. The greatest powers of Congress lie in its control of the federal funds and its power to override a Presidential veto.

The constitutional powers given to the President are those incorporated under his many titles, ceremonial head of the country, chief administrator, commander-in-chief of the armed forces, chief diplomat, and chief legislator. Non-constitutional powers are those under his titles as head of his political party, voice of the American people, and world leader. In answer to a question about the cabinet, Morse stated that it has grown from 7 to 12 members, with the positions themselves changing, such as the elimination of the Postmaster General.

In his comments on the electoral college, he related that it originated because the founding fathers desired it as a buffer between the public vote and the choice of the political heads. Other questions concerned the primaries and types of persons desiring the role of the Presidency.

The league will continue its study of the role of the executive branch, reaching a consensus in November of this year.

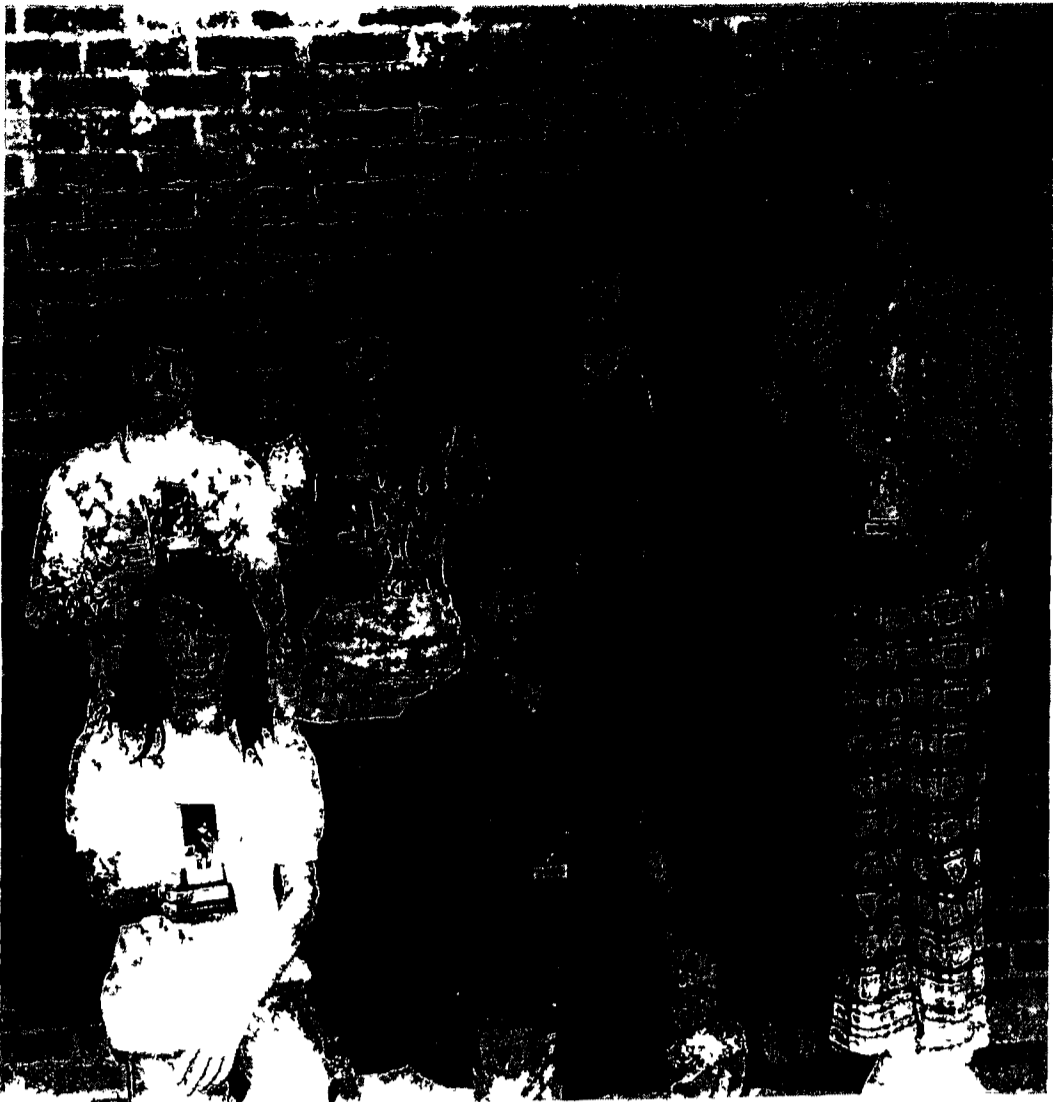

David Strefling placed 3rd in the Spanish II Exam. 316 students took examinations at this level.

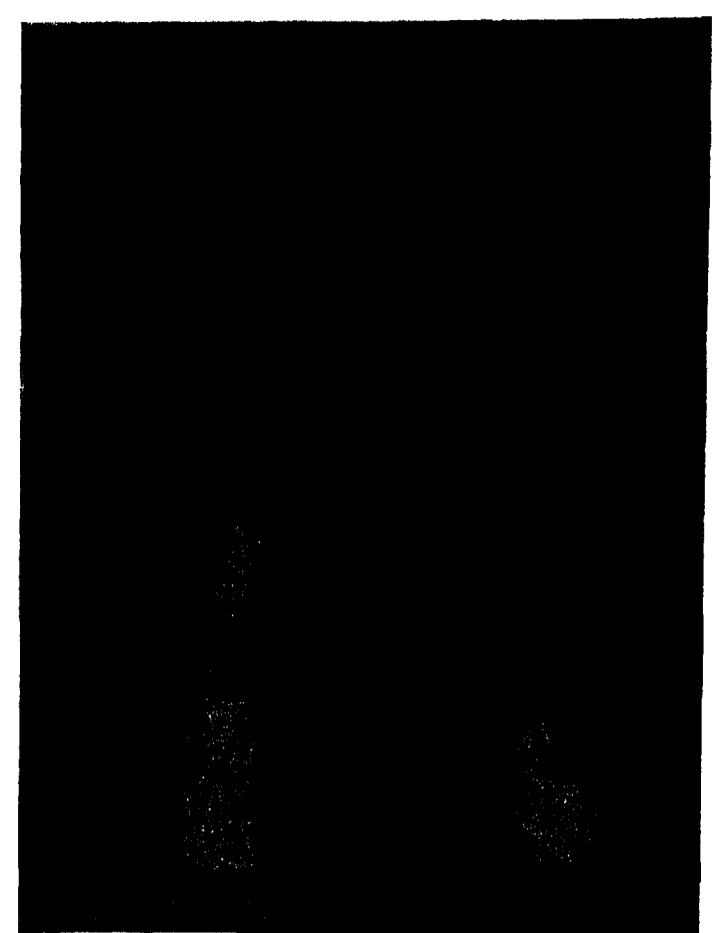
Robert Savoie placed 4th in the Spanish III Examination. 167 students took this exam.

A bid was received from Duane Cham for repair of the township hall roof. It was decided to get some more bids. Cham's was for \$2394.

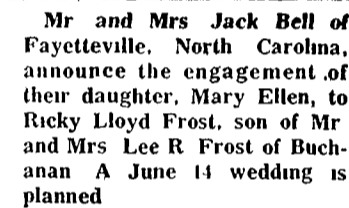

The Michigan Mirror

By Elmer E. White

Michigan's purse may be flatter than the wallets of its unemployed -- despite the latest boost in the state income tax, warns a veteran Republican lawmaker.

Sen. Harry DeMaso, former chairman of the Senate Taxation Committee, says the state must begin to control spending, and make sure the money allocated is doing its job, if another tax hike is to be averted.

"Our budget has gone up \$250 million in the past six years," DeMaso says. "We've always spent more than we've taken in, and had a 'paper surplus.'" He notes also that efforts a decade ago to cut the number of state departments were aimed in part at cutting the number on the state payroll. "But there were about 31,000 on the payroll then, and there are almost 60,000 now," he says.

The state should pool resources of Michigan fiscal experts, "bring in some of the real brains, and let them have free rein to find out what's wrong with our system," DeMaso says.

Such a scheme worked in Minnesota a couple of years back, resulting in a savings of some \$70 million the first year, DeMaso declares.

In recent speeches in Lansing and Ann Arbor, the Battle Creek lawmaker has called also for a "team concept between government and business."

"We've made 'profit' a dirty word," DeMaso contends. "But if a company makes a profit, there's more employment, new buildings, expansion. And those things generate more money for the state's economy."

The day will begin at 9:30 a.m. with a brief orientation session in the elementary building. Afterwards, grandparents will visit their grandchildren's classes. Elementary student council members will serve as guides.

At 11:45 a.m. the visiting grandparents will be served luncheon in the high school cafeteria, and in the afternoon, a program will be presented or the grandparents may return to the classroom if they prefer.

Register by Postcard

In an effort to push more people to the ballot box, a Democratic state representative is proposing easing Michigan's voter registration laws.

Rep. Perry Bullard of Ann Arbor wants to model the state's registration procedures after those of Minnesota.

He's suggesting that qualified persons should be allowed to register to vote by filling in a postage-paid postcard form and mailing the signed card to the county clerk.

In addition, Bullard says qualified persons -- who may have trouble getting to city hall or a township office to register during their own working hours -- should be allowed to register at the polling place on election day.

Unregistered persons could simply go to the polls and, after completing an oath as to their qualifications and giving proof of residency, vote.

"Instead of preventing citizens from voting, the goal of state voter registration policy should be to encourage people to vote and to make it as easy as possible for citizens to register," Bullard says.
