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Some of the invited guests to the ribbon cutting ceremony at Schirmer Parkway included Richard Gault, city commissioner, Clark Equipment Company vice presidents David Howe and Leo McKernan, and city commissioners Mildred Anderson and Joseph Garbert, Jr. Although the ribbon cutting was performed, the parkway still isn't open to traffic. The contractors have to finish painting stripes on it, installing more guard rail and testing the sewers. Before the ribbon cutting somebody had made off with some of the traffic signs already installed.

Unity Hospital Plans More Improvements

The Board of Directors of Unity Hospital in Buchanan recently voted to spend about \$100,000 to augment a compliance program of changes suggested by the State Board of Health Two years ago, the hospital took the first step with completion of a new sewage facilities hooking up with the city of Buchanan's system.

Much of the new phase of the program has to do with proper lighting, ventilation and remodeling of present facilities. Unity Hospital doesn't plan to ask the public for any money to complete this phase of the program.

Three new doctors have been added to the staff of Unity. Dr. Jack Barden is practicing at the Redbud Clinic on Redbud Trail. Dr. Alfred Boyce has joined the O'Malley clinic in Galien. Newest doctor is Dr. Humphrey Uddoh, MD from Nigeria who is going to open his office in Niles in August.

In August a new food service plan will be instigated for hospital patients. Armour Company in conjunction with Greyhound will provide a variety of menus with in-hospital service to improve the whole dietary program of the hospital.

Plan Commission Wants Ideas From The Public

A group of citizens appointed to the Buchanan plan commission have been meeting regularly to plan Buchanan's future. They are of diverse opinions, and they create plenty of interesting discussion. Joseph Garbert is chairman, and the members include Loren Anderson, William Sullivan, Kenneth Mall, Mrs. Reginald Bellaire, Mrs. John Cress, Paul Montgomery, James Jesse, Rev. Keith Morrow and city manager Robert Faulhaber.

At present they are interviewing various firms to ultimately hire one as a professional plan consultant, but among themselves they are gradually coming up with ideas for a long-range plan for Buchanan. A sub committee presented a list of 12 goals as guidelines for the plan commission to follow. The city commissioners have these goals and it is hoped to have more public participation. After discussion and study of ideas from a variety of sources, the plan commission plans to re-evaluate the goals and to redraft them. They would then present them in final form to the city commission on November 14. Then they would make definite plans for implementation of these goals. After the whole plan has been carefully studied they would work with the city to see what should be coordinated with the city budget.

The twelve goals as tentatively set up are:

- 1 The need to maintain a planned and orderly rate of growth in the community.
- 2 The need to effectively locate and interrelate business, residential, industrial and public services.
- 3 The need to encourage the development of modern and diversified industrial districts, well equipped with roads, parking facilities and landscaping and to identify general locations for such districts.
- 4 The need to encourage the development or redevelopment of local neighborhoods offering a variety of housing types, sizes, and densities with associated neighborhood and community facilities and services and retain the community's historical architecture.
- 5 The need to provide adequate transportation facilities to meet the needs of the planned development of the city and adjacent townships.
- 6 The need to identify, preserve and develop well located lands for recreational use throughout the community.

7 The need to enhance the aesthetics of the community to make it a more attractive place in which to live.

8 The need to provide educational, cultural, civic, business services in order to provide an environment which will encourage the growth of the community.

9 The need to identify and provide more efficient flow of traffic and parking areas within the community and provide convenient access to and from the city.

10 To provide for adequate expansion of police, fire, health and social services.

11 To encourage maximum citizen participation in all facets of the community's growth and development.

12 To encourage communications and participation of city government, business, education, labor, management and all other clubs and organizations.

The plan commission has been consulting organizations and individuals to determine what people think should be the priorities for Buchanan. They hope to receive more input from individual citizens with positive ideas. Future hearings in the nature of a public forum are contemplated.

There's A Lot Going On At Clear Lake

One of the busiest places in the area is the new Life Action ranch along the shores of Clear Lake. On this 129 acres of choice land there is an active camping program in progress plus a busy office filled with young people who are spreading their message all over the country.

The whole religious, non-profit, inter-denominational corporation is built around the Life Action team of twenty young people who travel 40,000 miles across the nation to spread their message of new life to teenagers. Most of their work is done through high school assembly programs. Del Fehsenfeld, director and evangelist of the team, said, "They don't sing rock music, not even 'gospel rock'." The girls don't wear short skirts, and the guys don't have long hair. But the Life Action Singers have teenagers flocking to them as if they were all pied pipers.

Rebellion, alienation from parents, immorality and drug abuse are some of the problems which the Life Action team confronts, but they have been attacking head-on what they say is the number one killer of teenagers, suicide.

Part of their ministry deals with family seminars. At Clear Lake, the team plans a year-around camp and a full family conference center. Using themes of a Swiss chalet in one section, a western ranch in another, and an Indian reservation in another, they would provide facilities for all members of a family.

The corporation was started

only four years ago in St. Petersburg. They eventually hope to make Buchanan the site of their national headquarters. All their leadership is young, most of them in their twenties.

Fehsenfeld himself is only 26, one of America's youngest evangelists. He says, "America's youth need to be taught more realism, real love, real honesty, real reverence, real patriotism, real morality, real peace and real life."

Dr. Ed Hindson, young staff evangelist and director of the adult seminars, said, "We don't believe in reaching teens to the exclusion of their parents." His work is to conduct the seminar program that helps parents bridge the generation gap.

Fehsenfeld said that in planning the development in the Buchanan area, the team hopes to become an important part of the community, sharing help with local churches and organizations. All the planning is with the present residents in mind to insure their privacy and lack of inconvenience. Future development plans call for draining and improvement of swampy area along the road.

From one building converted into office space, young women are using sophisticated office machinery to communicate with various sectors of the country and the young men plan and work to develop the whole outreach program. It's a busy place but an extremely happy and wholesome place, and one in which a lot is going on.

The churches missed our point on over-dramatizing the situation of one person needing help in Buchanan. This wasn't the first case. Recently a little family appeared here, broke and hungry. They were finally given money for a meal and enough gas to get them to their destination. This was also done by a private citizen who couldn't find anybody to help.

Every church has some fund. Most churches even have sources of supply if a house is burned out or if people need clothes or blankets.

One letter writer last week suggested that we couldn't afford a central office staffed with administrators. We agree. But it certainly wouldn't be hard for there to be a committee of about three private citizens who could be reached in time of need or would know how to get in touch with the right people.

Better communications among the churches would be beneficial. Better communications among the police, church organizations and the Chamber of Commerce would be helpful to all.

Christmas giving is probably the best example of the problem. Everybody strikes out in all directions, and the system becomes inefficient. Various denominations of the church have often been accused of being unable to work together for a common cause, and such episodes point up the validity of that charge.

This writer's own church has a fund to help people in need, but three calls between three and five in the afternoon were to no avail to reach people we knew.

Several persons offered help after the fact. But so many took the editorial as a personal attack. This was not the point.

The editor will soon learn that to criticize Little League or a church or Ralph Nader is dangerous and will confine his comments to anti-pollution or the evils of drink.

But we still think we're right on this matter!

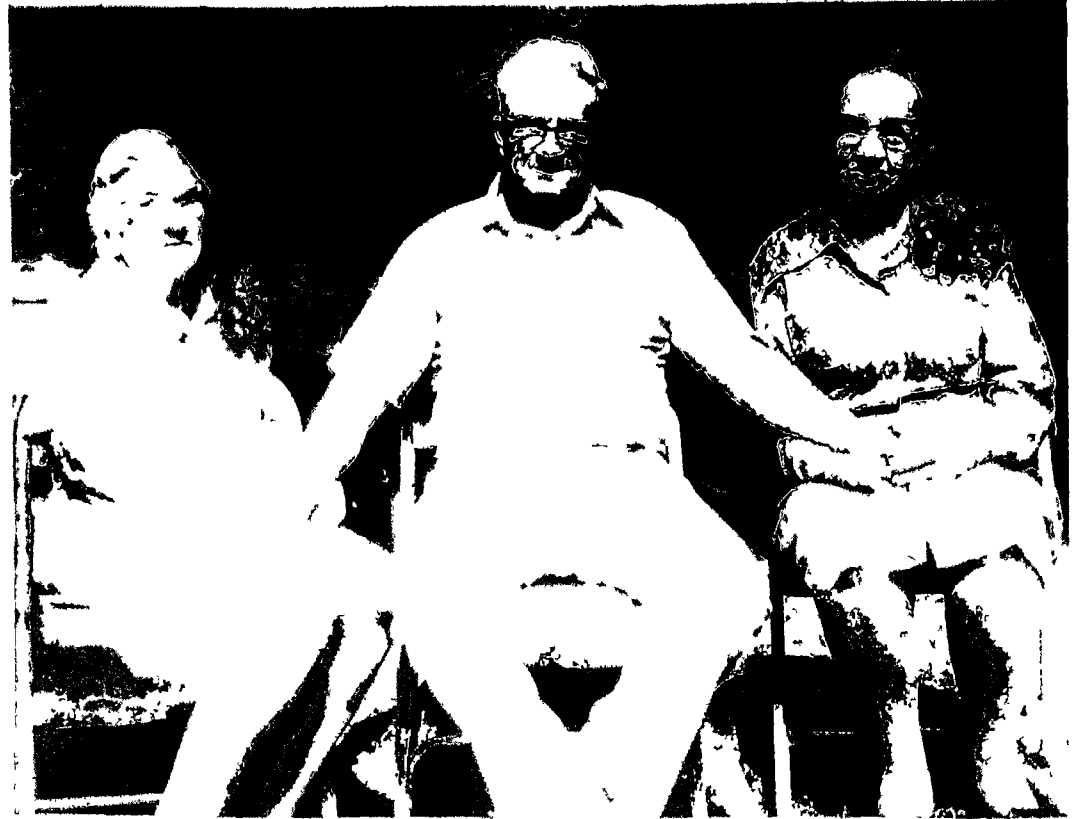

By Richard Condon

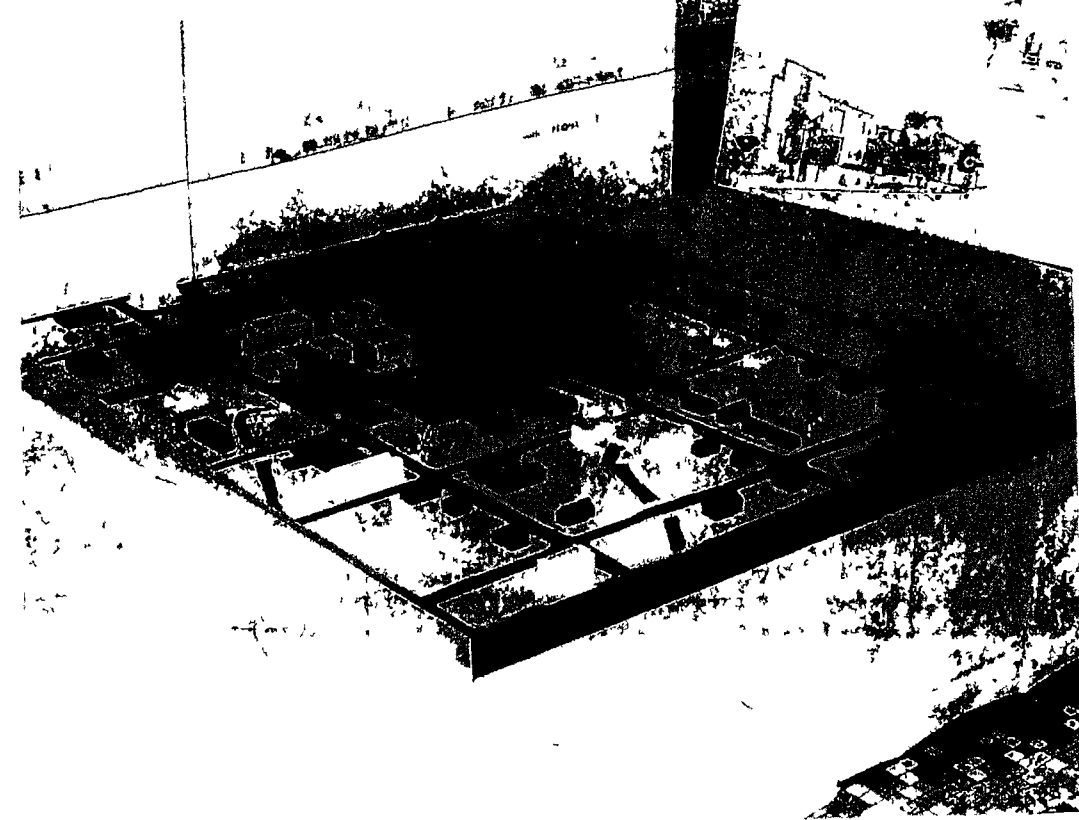
This writer has been prolific and for reasons not clearly understood has been selling his books well.

This is a story of a president who was elected in 1960. He has a ruthless father who bought him the presidency. He chases girls. He's assassinated. Sound familiar? This president's name is Kegan. He's shot in Philadelphia, although there are Dallas connections to the plot.

The plot deals with efforts in 1974 to uncover the real killer. The slain president's half-brother becomes involved in the search which has already meant the death of countless persons who knew too much.

The reader is often misled by wrong information as to what happened and confused by flashbacks which are explained only by the date.

The abundant use of four letter words is probably what sells this book. It has little else going for it.

Detroit (May 21, 1941) Ford workers have chosen to be represented by the United Auto Workers Union following an election held here today.

Seventy percent of the votes cast were for the UAW, twenty-seven percent were for the rival American Federation of Labor Union. Only three percent of the voting workers voted for no union.

Ford Motor Company becomes the last major automobile firm to become unionized. Ford had long fought the attempts to allow workers to bargain collectively.

The company had its own police force known as "The Service Department" to enforce its anti-union stance.

An un-named worker at the plant summed up the attitude this way, "You couldn't talk on the job. You were watched all of the time. Smiling or laughing was forbidden. Any meeting of more than two workers was seen as union organizing, everyone was afraid for his job," he said.

National Labor Relations Board decisions against "unfair labor practices" as well as bad publicity surrounding the violence, paved the way for today's vote.

Earlier Walter Reuther and Richard Frankenstein, both UAW executives, were badly beaten by Ford's Service Department men, in what has been called the "battle of the overpass."

Governor Van Wagener had arranged for today's vote after workers walked off their jobs earlier this month.

Reliable sources indicate that Ford is now ready to settle with the Union, although Ford spokesman Harry Bennett called the walkout a "Communist demonstration of violence and terrorism."

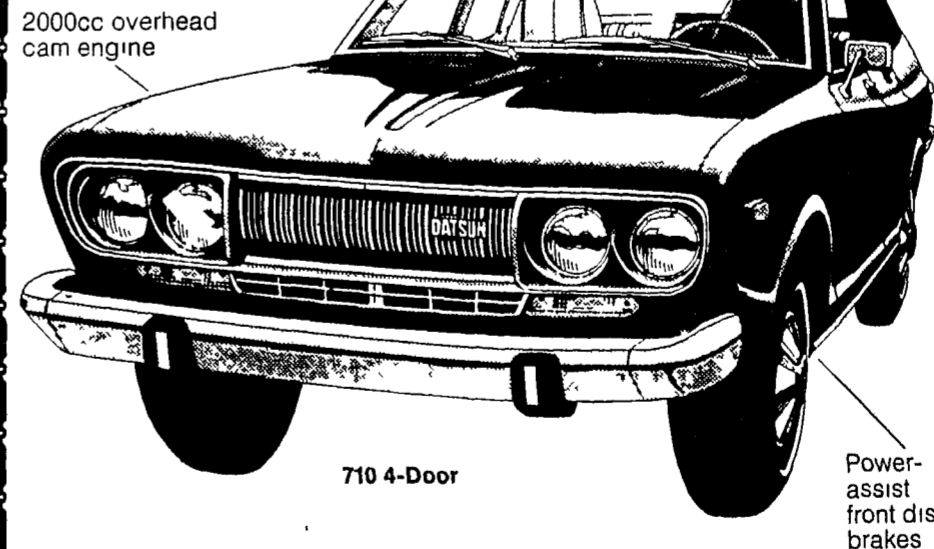

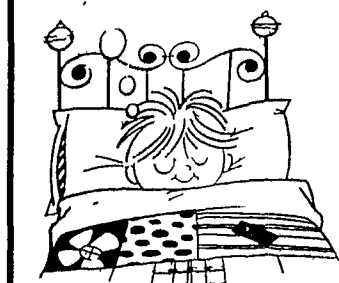
