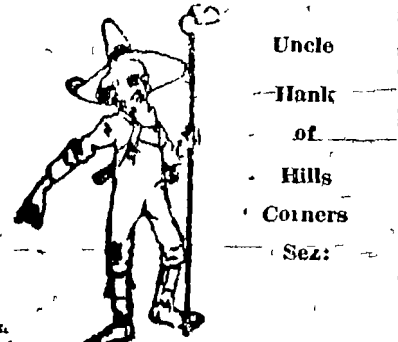

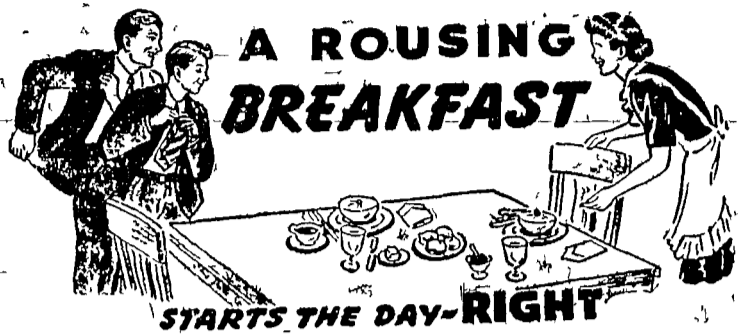

SWISS STEAK— 8 to 4 lbs. round steak (cut 2 in thick) Salt, pepper 1 cup flour 1/4 cup lard 2 onions 2 cups cooked tomatoes or tomato juice

Season steak and place on well-floured cutting board. Cover with flour and pound with meat hammer or edge of heavy saucer. Continue to turn, flour, and pound meat until all flour is taken up by the steak. Brown sliced onions in lard in heavy frying pan. Remove onions. Brown steak on both sides in the lard. Place onions on top. Add tomatoes (or 2 cups water and 2 tbsps vinegar or catchup). Cover and cook slowly or bake in moderate oven (350° F) 2 1/2 to 3 hrs. (Diced vegetables may be cooked with steak during last half hour.) 6 to 8 servings.

Here's Proposition (Continued from page 1) side them, floated the bird, a swallow. "That bird saved my life a lot of times when I was a gullita," he would say. "Those swallows didn't like the Japs. When the Japs came, they flew high and then I knew it was time for me to take to the bush." In two or three minutes the design was done, and Eddy took another from many reached toward him. At one time we counted 35 boys and girls around him. Meanwhile there stood the chief of police looking on with a puzzled face while the crew blocked the sidewalk, without the heart to stop the show. Then as the time neared for him to leave for a Niles appointment Eddy cleared the walk in front of him and started the demonstration. While the kids called the tricks Standing with his legs slightly apart he shot the spinning yo-yo between them and it came up behind and into his side coat-pocket. Eddy apparently never looked to see where his yo-yo was going, he looked at the kids and shot his line, but the yo-yo went where it was supposed to go. Then he did the "sleeping beauty" as the yo-yo whirred motionless at a given point on his string, at the end, half-way up or within a few inches of his hand, wherever he wanted. The kids looked mystified. "What have you got on your yo-yo?" they questioned. "Let's see you do that with ours." Then Eddy would do it with theirs. He manipulated two yo-yos at once, dating them backward and forward in intricate maneuvers. Then he suddenly shot one into the air, and without stopping his talk or seeming to look where it went, he flipped open his coat and it dropped into an inside pocket. Time and again, but never a miss. And while he carved or while he deftly maneuvered he answered questions without hesitation. He stated that he came to the United States in 1929 with three Filipino boys who were to popularize the yo-yo here. At the start of the first world war he was barred from the army for physical reasons. So he entered merchant marine service, but the first chance he got, when in the neighborhood of the Philippines he dropped off the ship and joined the Filipino guerrillas. I helped blow up a dozen bridges when the Americans came I was on Luzon."

anted, he shall take into consideration the sanitary conditions, proximity of such enclosure to the residence or dwellings of others, the nature of such enclosure as bearing upon the likelihood of the escape and consequent annoyance of such fowls, and such other facts and circumstances as would bear upon the likelihood of keeping such fowls under such circumstances creating or constituting a nuisance or annoyance to persons residing in the vicinity, and shall grant such permit if in his opinion it is reasonable to expect that the keeping of such fowls or rabbits under such circumstances will not constitute a nuisance or annoyance to persons residing or living within the vicinity.

Section VI Upon the complaint of any person who considers himself injured by the fact that fowls, or animals are kept in the City Limits of Buchanan according to Section 2 of said ordinance and 3, as amended and who are the owners or lessee, of buildings within the required distance from said place where animals or fowls are kept may make a complaint in writing to the Health Department of the said City of Buchanan and the said Health Department shall investigate said complaint, and if said investigation shows that the person or persons keeping any of the animals or fowls mentioned in Section 2 and 3 of said ordinance, are failing to keep said places clean and such a condition that render them dangerous to public health or that they constitute a public nuisance, said Health Department shall so report to the Chief of Police and said Chief of Police shall notify said person or persons to so change the places where the animals or fowls are kept so that they will cease to be a nuisance or menace to health and if such owner's shall after the time elapsed, them by the Chief of Police, refuse or neglect to carry out his orders, then he shall forthwith bring them into Court and file a complaint against them.

Section VII The keeping of any animals or fowls contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a nuisance, and any person violating the terms of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00 and imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding 90 days or both fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

Section VIII Notwithstanding the fact that the violation of this ordinance shall subject the violator to punishment by fine and imprisonment, or both, the City Commission shall have power to apply to any court of competent jurisdiction for an injunction to restrain the violation of this ordinance, and abate the nuisance thus existing.

Section IX If any part, clause or section of this ordinance is held void or unenforceable, by any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect any other clauses or sections not specifically declared to be void.

Section X This ordinance shall take effect ten days after the publication thereof.

Section XI All ordinance theretofore passed that conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO 89

The City of Buchanan Ordains

That here after no person, firm or corporation shall keep any fowls standing in any public alley any motor or horse drawn vehicle except that such vehicles may use said alley for the purpose of loading or unloading such vehicle for the time necessarily needed. But that no such public alley shall be blocked to traffic in any place more than 30 minutes.

No person, firm, or corporation shall park any vehicle in any private alley or drive way so as to block such drive way without the permission of the owner thereof.

III

Section II No person shall keep or maintain any live swine, hogs, cattle, horses, jackass, rabbits, and other animals or fowls in the City of Buchanan, in any pen, sty, stable, or other enclosure or building within the corporate limits of the City of Buchanan when such pen, sty, stable or other enclosure, or any part thereof, is within 300 feet of a street, alley, public place, or the dwelling house or residence of another.

Section III No live geese, ducks, guinea hens, rabbits, or other fowls shall be brought into or kept in any pen, yard, or other enclosure, any part of which is within 300 feet of the dwelling house or residence of another.

Section IV Geese, ducks, guinea hens, rabbits, chickens, or other fowls may be kept in portions of the City of Buchanan when the person desiring to keep the same shall have obtained a permit so to do from the City Health Department.

Section V Before issuing any such permit, the Health Department shall make an inspection of the premises where such fowls are to be kept, and in determining whether or not a permit shall be

town was two miles from the soap
factory. Natalie's party had the good
fortune to be resting by a house
whose hospitable owners came out
and invited them inside. The next
morning they went back to the
factory. Soon after they were
given work by a Russian Jew, who
had a contract for making a rail-
way cut through a hill about two
miles away. They received \$1 each
daily. The work of the women
was to load a railway flat car
daily with stones and dirt, with
the help of one man. The other
men crushed the stone which was
dynamited from the hill, into
pieces the women could lift.

The Russian Jew proved a good
boss. They stayed on the job for
the winter, saving money, buying
clothes some building small
shacks to live in nearer the town.
When the war was over Natalie
Jesse and her little girl were the
first to return to Poland, her
money enabling her to buy pas-
sage. They made their home with
her husband's father, who owed
her a sum. With what she had
left from her husband's remittance
before the war and what she had
made in Siberia—she was able to
live.

The others came back later, only
a remnant of those who had left
four years before—surviving the
camp and the rigors of the home
journey. In 1921 relatives went
to visit a cousin in Posen, Poland.
The cousin had received a letter
from Mrs. Jesse, asking for news
of his family. The relatives
brought this letter to Mrs. Jesse,
and she was able to correspond
again for the first time in eight
years.

Mrs. Jesse told her to remain
there, for he intended to return.
But at that time the Bolshevik re-
volution broke out. When Jesse
heard that news, he wrote his wife
that he would never return, and
that she and the girl should come
there. However he had not taken
out naturalization papers and
until that was done she could not
get passage as the wife of an Am-
erican citizen. That took two
years.

When that long ordeal neared its
end, Mrs. Jesse and two women
walked several times to Warsaw
and return, many miles away,
making the then arrangements for
passage with Polish and American
officials. She finally secured pas-
sage on Nov. 29, 1923, and arrived
at her husband's home in Wiscon-
sin two weeks before Christmas.
