Dairy Industry Chief Money-Maker For State Farmers

The dairy industry, number one money-maker for Michigan farmers, brought state dairymen ap-

proximately 208 million dollars in 1946, according to recent U. S. department of agriculture farm production figures

A. C. Baltzer, extension dairyman at Michigan State College, states that milk sold at wholesale accounted for the largest share of the total income. Seventy-three percent of Michigan's milk production was sold to plants and dealers and brought farmers 153 million

dollars Cash sales of milk, cream, and butter brought 189 million dollars Michigan's production income ranked sixth in the nation. Wisconsin led the cash income list with 508 million dollars.

The 24 million cows in the United States fell below Michigan's one million cows in yield. The average U. S. cow produced 4,891 pounds of milk and 195 pounds of

butterfat while her Michigan sis-

ter produced 5,640 pounds of milk and 223 pounds of butterfat.

The first three months of 1947 show the nation's production to be running about 4 billion pounds in advance of the same three months of 1946. Michigan figures are in approximately the same ratio.

the nation in contributing one-cent a pound for all butterfat marketed during the month. The money will be used by state units of the American Dairy association to insure future dairy markets through advertising, promotion, merchandising and research. The contributions are voluntary and it is estimated that 90 to 95% of the members of dairy marketing organizations are cooperating.

Berrien Co. Leads Michigan In Number Of Cases Of Rabies

Rabies apparently is spreading north and into the Thumb district of the state, Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the Bureau of Disease Control, Michigan Department of Health warned today.

The first case north of the Saginaw-Muskegon line was a Huron county cat diagnosed in the Health Department Laboratories lately.

Eight other new cases diagnosed in the laboratories the same day brought to 133 the number of cases in 14 southern Michigan counties.

Counties now affected and the number of cases reported in each follows: Berrien, 51; Kalamazoo, 23; Van Buren, 25; Cass, 9; Wayne, 11; Monroe, 3; Genesee, 3; Jackson, 2; and Muskegon, Lenawee, Shawassee, Allegan, St. Joseph and Huron, 1 each. Berrien, Kalamazoo, Van Buren, Cass and Monroe have established quarantines.

All cases of rabies reported to date this year are in dogs, with the exception of one cow and one horse in Jackson county, a pig in Berrien, and the cat in Huron. It is thought possible that fox and skunk populations of the lower part of the state are infected.

All animal bites should have a physician's care. All queer acting animals should be confined under the attention of a veterinarian. Stray dogs should be avoided. All dogs should be vaccinated. All

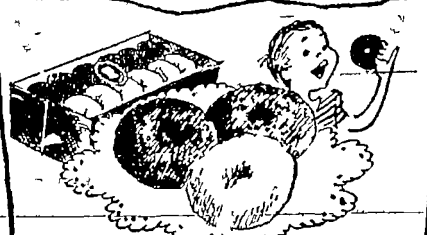

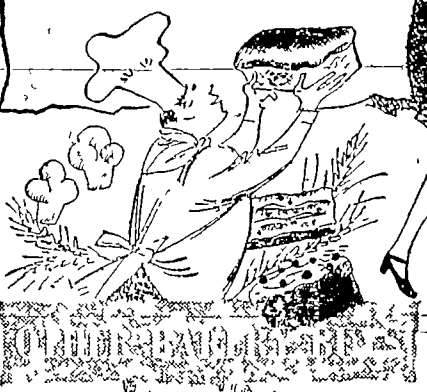

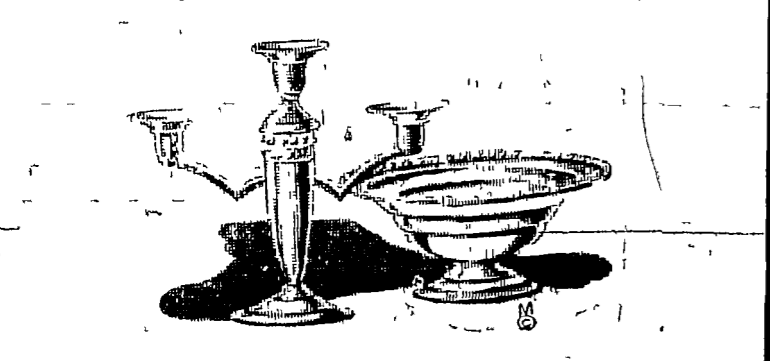

May Be Printing Newspaper By Radio Before 1947 Is Out

The facsimile newspaper slated to appear soon in one's living room at the turn of a radio knob, Clifford F. Weigle, associate professor of journalism at Stanford University, forecasts its regular appearance in some American cities by next fall. The facsimile newspaper would be published usually by newspapers as an hourly supplement that would unwind from facsimile receivers attached to frequency modulation radios. Professor Weigle believes the initial form probably will be a 4-page, 8 1/2 x 11-inch report carrying news printed twice as fast as the fastest announcer can talk. It would include photographs and drawings. This living room newspaper should be available every hour on the hour for 12 or 18 hours a day. The paper, in 100-foot rolls, would cost one cent for each four-page issue.

Mich. Rattlesnakes Too Small For Source Of Commercial Food

Most Michigan people are happy the facts are as they are, but an enterprising inquirer probably has been disappointed by a conservation department game division report that Michigan's rattlesnakes are neither numerous nor big enough to have commercial value in their skins, meat or venom. Michigan's only rattler—the only poisonous snake also—is the massasauga, a species that seldom grows more than two and a half to three feet long here. Generally found in swampy and marshy places, it is not uncommon in a few of the larger marshes of southern Michigan. Diamond back rattlesnakes hunted and raised in southern and western states for commercial purposes are of a different genus, and many times larger.

Grapefruit Seed

Grapefruit seed should be removed with a fork. This method of removal causes less bruising of the fruit and permits one to successfully dig for the deepest seed.

DDT Will Not Kill All Garden Pests

Home gardener who think that DDT is an answer to all of their garden insect problems may find that it won't kill the bugs they think it will. Entomologists at Michigan State college, say that the Mexican bean beetle and red spider mites are not much affected by DDT. A dust mixture of 3% DDT is effective against most potato and cabbage pests. For controlling aphids on potatoes and thrips on onions, a stronger DDT dust is needed. DDT should not be used on leafy vegetables at the time when the foliage will be used as human food.

University Uses Galloping Dominoes In Studying Chance

Johns Hopkins University, which likes its medical students to play with dice, is faced with a shortage of the galloping dominoes. The university is not going into the gambling trade, but it would like to get 1,500 dice, purely for scientific purposes. Like the gambling fraternity, the students watch the dice roll to study the "chance" factor, not how often a seven or eleven will come up, but something similar. The dice are used to illustrate to medical students the laws of probability and chance. This is done by putting several hundred colored dice—red, white or blue preferred, in a box, turning a crank and recording the assortment which turns up in a small row along the side.





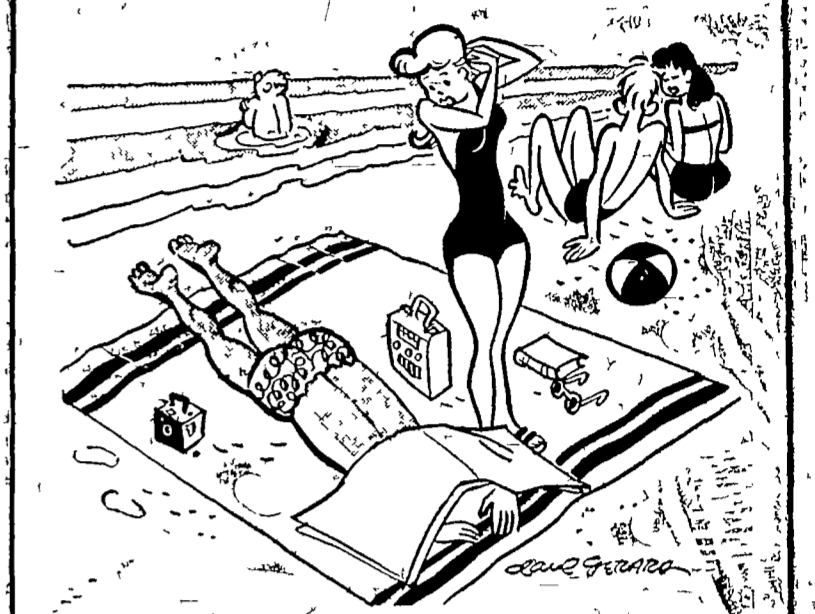

Indians Lose Art Of Making Diet On Wild Plants, Roots

The art of making meals of cat-tail roots, skunk cabbage, lotus, ferns, duck potato and a dozen other wild plants has almost disappeared along with the Indians and pioneers that once depended on them, according to R. D. Bur-

roughs, conservation department regional game supervisor for southern Michigan.

It still is possible for a person to sample the native foods that helped Indians and early settlers through many a hungry month. But Burroughs warns the experimenter should be a fair botanist, to avoid poisonous plants. And it takes a pioneer's patience to reduce some of these wild roots, tub-

ers, leaves and nuts to edible form.

As a botanist familiar with the wild plants' high food value, Burroughs wonders, however, why no enterprising chemist has ever made use of the country's enormous acorn crop, for example, by developing it as a packaged breakfast food.

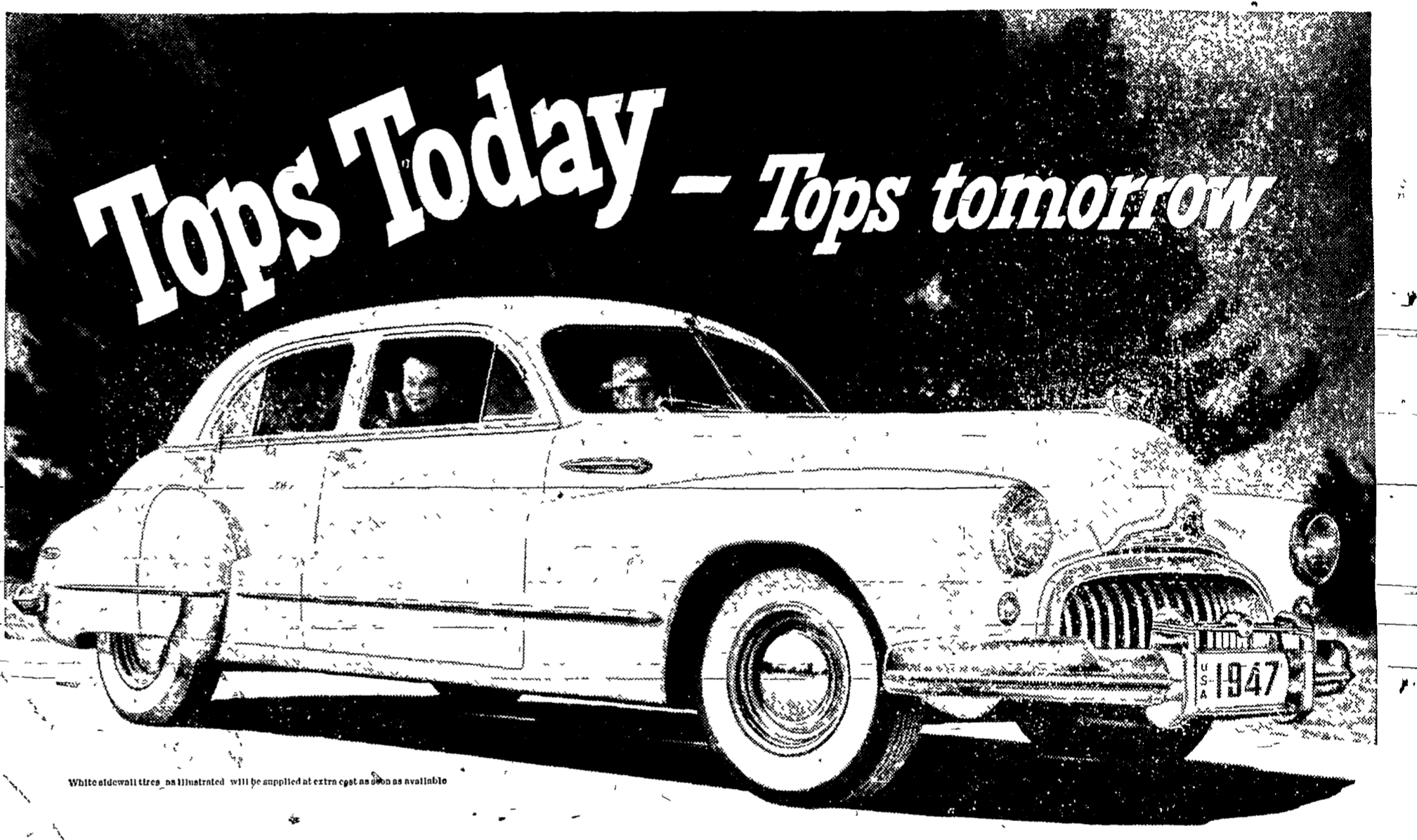
