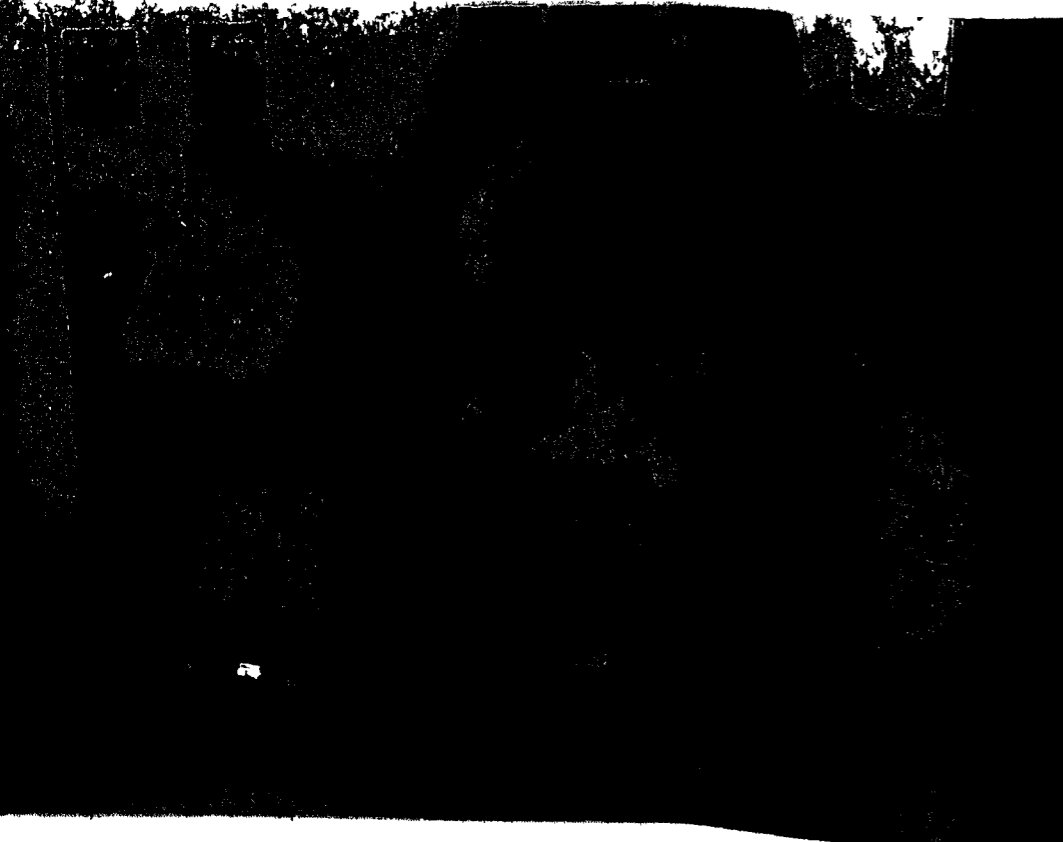

## Our Newest Hero

A marine is sent to Thailand. He's young and untraveled. He's never been in combat, although his boot camp training was rough. When he left high school, he was undecided what to do, so he became a marine.

Suddenly his outfit is given orders to move out. The ultimate destination is Koh Tang. Where is that? Why is he going there?

The whole operation is over quickly. He wonders, as the marines prepare to leave the island, if the thirty nine men they were sent to rescue are safe.

As he prepares to return to the beach, he is hit by small arms fire. He dies quickly. In a battle which few will long remember, his life is finished.

Did he die in vain, this nameless marine? Is the death of this strong, healthy, intelligent young man a total loss? What will we tell his mother?

When this nation was young, its trade was hampered by pirates. The President ordered the marines to storm Tripoli and recover our seamen who had been kidnapped. Later, marines went into Mexico in peacetime to demonstrate that Americans can't be pushed around.

From the Halls of Montezuma to the Shores of Tripoli to the island of Koh Tang, it's the same. This newest of our war dead died no less in vain than those at Guadalcanal or Gettysburg.

On Memorial Day it is fitting to add Koh Tang as one of America's finer hours and to honor the dead of that remote spot. This young marine joins countless other American heroes.

But let us pray that the actions at Koh Tang will justify the purpose and deter others from initiating such senseless incidents.

## Three Give Opinions On The Tax Dilemma

John McDonald, supervisor of Niles Township, expressed surprise that nobody had spoken in defense of Frank Poorman, county commissioner, in his recent stand in the controversy over taxation. "Actually Frank and I are usually political opposites," McDonald commented, "but in his stand I completely agree."

After the city of Buchanan had presented their tax roll to the county commissioners in protest over the system of taxation in the state, the county board of commissioners voted not to accept the equalization report as presented to them. Poorman voted in the minority, stating that in effect the action of the commission was illegal.

As predicted, the state tax board put back the \$38.5 million in S E V which the county commissioners had removed and added another \$800,000 in S E V to the county to be divided among 14 of the 29 governmental units within the county. Buchanan's increase amounted to \$139,000 in S E V.

McDonald and Poorman believe that the only place to fight any inequalities in the tax system is at the state legislature. They point out that Buchanan hired its tax assessor and appointed its board of review, and they reject the statement that local judgement can't be used in individual assessment cases.

Ivan Price, supervisor of Buchanan Township, agrees. He said that the state has to use some formula which is as fair as possible to everyone. Buchanan Township's S E V was raised \$50,492 by the state. Bertrand Township's increase was a whopping \$207,542. Price feels that much of the city of Buchanan's objection to the tax system is valid, but they went about it the wrong way, resulting in further penalties to several governmental units.

McDonald, whose township S E V was raised \$9,179 by the state, says that there are certain steps which should be taken. He said it should be mandatory that a taxing unit budget both in dollars and mills so that they won't be obliged to spend all that they might receive when the S E V is finalized. He suggested that it would be more fair if there were separate factors used for

each of the five classifications: commercial, industrial, residential, agricultural and cut-over-timbers. He would favor the complete abolishment of the personal property tax on businesses as being inequitable. He suggests that more rigid standards be applied in the certification of local assessors.

McDonald, Price, and Poorman agree that the formula of assessing 50 percent of value is too high and that a figure of 40 percent would probably be more fair and impose less of a hardship. The state legislature has been working on this problem at the present time.

McDonald said he'd welcome a meeting of interested citizens to gather with Poorman, the township assessors and city officials to discuss the tax system. He would hope that people would attend such a meeting, not in an argumentative frame of mind but with a desire to learn.

All three men were unanimous in admitting that we have a serious problem but that the proper place to attack it is in Lansing.

## Plan Hospital Benefit

A full list of events will be included in the Berrien County Record.

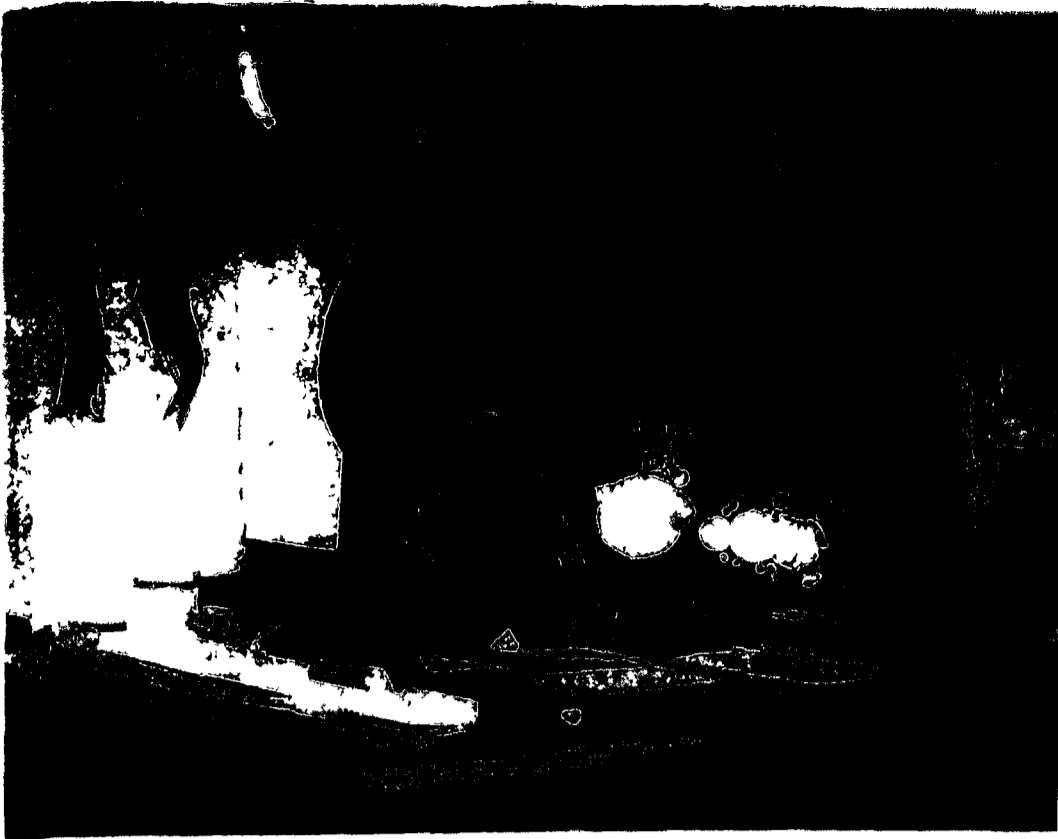
## Commencement

### Letters to the Editor

To the Editor  
Subject: Buchanan School Operation Expense

We the electorate have been advised that on June 9th we are requested to vote and approve a \$17.00 per thousand assessed valuation tax rate for the school year 1976. I am of the opinion that this is not fiscal responsibility under present economic conditions. It appears to be business as usual and we can no longer afford it.

I am stating that we the electorate must assume fiscal responsibility and vote this tax rate down. In effect what we will be doing is ordering the School Board, our elected representatives, (not the administration) to propose to us a tax rate showing an economically forced reduction of school operational expenses.

Forced reduction of operating expense in no way implies the removal from school curricular items such as sports activities, music, and other curriculum of this nature or the elimination of bussing in the past expressed as the sole way of reducing expenses. These items should be adjusted in the overall reduction, not eliminated, they are an important part of education. Previously, elimination of items of this nature have been used as scare tactics to force passage of a given millage. This excuse cannot be accepted or tolerated under present catastrophic economic conditions.

We the electorate have been forced to reduce our living expenses drastically, local businesses have been forced to reduce their expenses just to hold their heads above water and hope they can survive, many pensioners are losing hope or have lost hope of meeting expenses, local industries have been forced to reduce their manpower drastically thus creating an unbelievably high unemployment condition in our community. These are trying times, wherever we look we see high unemployment, stagnation and economic crises. Until this economic crisis reverses we must apply the same approach to school operations as we do to our own individual budgets.

As one individual taxpayer I am requesting each of you, the electorate of the Buchanan School District, require the school board to assume fiscal responsibility. We should and must demand that they as duly elected representatives follow our guidelines.

As a step in this direction it is proposed that the actual operational expenses for the school year of 1974 be used as a baseline. For myself I would propose that the 1976 budget be at a minimum, 10 percent to 15 percent less than this baseline.

This amount which eliminates the effect of the one shot 14 special millage voted in last year related to the \$77,455,329 equalized assessed valuation for the district should be the maximum millage request. This to apply for one year only. Succeeding years would be themselves be evaluated in line with current economic conditions at that time.

The electorate should vote for and approve for the school year 1976 this revised millage rate no more, no less.

I realize this will create hardship and a reevaluation of curricula but these are hard times. If we don't direct the school system to bite the bullet and to approach

then expenses on the same basis that we approach our own, there eventually will be no school system. This must not happen and we cannot afford to have it happen.

Let us each and every one vote on June 9th, for or against, but vote, to insure fiscal responsibility in our school system. In this important issue let there be the largest turnout in history so that no one can say the majority did not speak with authority of direction for or against.

To the Editor

This is the way the old man told his story.

Now that the tall man has been measured with a different stick, and is therefore shorter, the total figure is less than the King has decreed."

And the Lord replied, "Then you will give each of the other men in the region a fractional part of the height that was subtracted from the tall man, so that the total will again be what the King has demanded."

And when the assessor did as he was told, the other men were astonished to find that they had grown a fraction overnight, though their measuring sticks did not show it; only the tax assessor's list showed it. And the men were angered and said, "We will bring our own sticks to be measured with, that we may be shorter also, and can be assessed at a lesser tallness."

But the Lord answered them, saying, "No, that cannot be. Only the tall man is allowed to use his own stick to be measured. Each of you has grown overnight, and should be proud to pay his taxes as taller men."

And though the men were not proud, they were required to pay the extra tax, because the Lord had not let the wise men of the King look at the tall man and decide for themselves if he should be measured with his own stick, or with the assessor's stick, as all the other men had been.

And the King gathered his taxes unto himself as he had decreed, he knew not from whom, nor did he care.

And Lord Robert the First and his counselors were pleased because the tall man was pleased.

But the other men were angry, because Lord Robert and his counselors had robbed them of the chance to have the King and his wise men rule on the matter. So because the tall man benefited, all the other men suffered; but no one else cared, not the King, nor Lord Robert and his counselors.

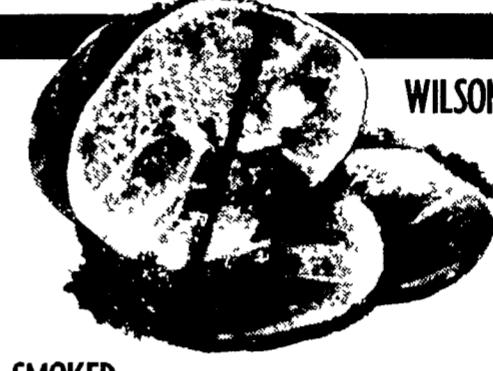

## Early Graduation Issue Again Tabled

The school board traveled to Moccasin School Monday. They took another crack at settling the issue of allowing earlier graduation but couldn't agree. At one point Vern Lubben moved that, if all other requirements are met, residency requirements (8 full semesters) could be waived with parental approval. Board members Mahan and Moon wanted more discussion and Richard Rossow felt there still have to be criteria for deciding individual cases. That motion was defeated and Dr. Beistle offered a list of criteria which included the stipulation that parents must approve in writing if their child is under 18 and that the final semester of the graduated student must be used for an educational experience. If the graduate was going on to college he must complete some form of independent study and if he went on to work he should be evaluated by his employer.

Beistle's plan came to a tie vote and was defeated. The board then went into executive session. When they came out they tabled the whole discussion until a special meeting on Friday morning at 7:45.

The school administration wants to be sure that in granting earlier graduation they don't open up a lot of problems. Superintendent Dougherty said that there has to be more to school than the mere accumulation of credits.

The matter of earlier graduation came up again when the board was asked to certify 142 students for graduation. Beistle objected that the list didn't include the one student who has asked for a waiver and did include another who was out of school for a time. The certification was approved, as were the certifications of the various necessary election boards.

The payment of \$735 in dues for the Michigan Association of School Boards was approved, although Dr. Beistle wondered if in the attempt to cut the budget, there couldn't be a year's moratorium on this.

Dr. Walter Vanderbush outlined some changes in high

school courses which included adding a practical math course and a course on local history. He advocated dropping music history and adding a course in business law. There'll be a new course in technical illustration. He also outlined some changes in graduation requirements which will strengthen the English department and alter the requirements for physical education.

It was announced that the schools had received North Central accreditation with two recommendations.

Moccasin principal David Case gave his building report with slides depicting a day in the school. He then showed some slides illustrating what had been done to the barn and the house at the school-farm.

## Bucks Are The Conference Champs

Trailing 5-0 after 3 1/2 innings, the Buchanan Bucks staged a stirring comeback to defeat River Valley 6-5 and win the championship of the Blossomland Conference. The victory left the Bucks with a 10-2 league mark one game ahead of the second place Mustangs, who finished 9-3.

Buchanan has never won the all-sports trophy of the Blossomland Conference. With only track to be completed, the Bucks stand three points ahead of runnerup Lakeshore in this competition for the current year. However, the Lacers are the favorite to cop the track championship, and the Bucks are in a rebuilding year.

In other games this week Buchanan defeated Brandywine and Dowagiac twice to bring the overall record to a sparkling 21-9, including 17 wins in the last 19 contests. The excellent play of the local team is a testimony to the hard work and coaching skill of Bill Goodman. This is Goodman's fourth year at the helm.

A summary of this week's action follows:

### Buchanan 1 Brandywine 1

For the second time this season, the Bucks and Bobcats were locked in a one run decision that was not decided until the final inning. Both games resulted in 4-3 Buck victories.

## Board of Education Minutes

A special meeting of the Board of Education, Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan was held Monday, May 12, 1975, at 7:30 p.m. at the High School building. Members present: David Hanson, William Moon, Richard Beistle, Vernon Lubben, Gerald Moulds, and Jeannette Mahan. Absent: Richard Rossow. Others present: Administration, members of the press, and 10 guests.

President Hanson called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m., stating that the purpose of the meeting was to present a resolution for the annual school election and any other item that might need official Board action at this time.

Asst. Supt. Kreager certified four petitions for the two Board positions becoming available June 30, 1975. The four candidates are: Paul W. DeVos, Mary Beth Larson, Robert L. Luke, and Cletha Wade.

President Hanson read the following: "Your Board of Education and Administration have given many hours of work and consideration to the 1975-76 budget. They have had to take into consideration many different facts. Paramount in their thinking is the tax situation as it presently is structured in Buchanan. With the drastic increase in the SEV, the proportionate amount of State support for the Buchanan schools has been reduced, which puts the added burden on the local property owners. This is coupled with the necessity and obligation of the Board to provide the best possible education for the students of the community. The schools, like your homes, have been caught up in the spiraling cost increases. You need only check your own heating costs for his past year to recognize what this can do to a budget. The school is no different, the buildings have to be heated."

"The Board feels that the teachers are the most important resource for educational betterment for the children of the Buchanan community and that it is desirable to keep this dedicated staff that we have and give them a salary which is commensurate to their work and which will keep them in a competitive position within the southwestern Michigan area. Our teachers are neither the highest paid in the area, nor the lowest. We feel that they are in a competitive position."

"Your Board has attempted, over the past few years, to improve and maintain the physical facilities of the School District. We feel that at present the schools are in excellent physical condition. There still are needs, and there is a constant problem of maintenance of the existing plants, however, after weighing the entire situation, considering the future, and in particular considering the rather cloudy tax situation and the state of the economy, we feel that it is necessary to call a year of moratorium in capital expenses and to pare to the bone the operational expenses. These capital needs of the district will still remain, but we do feel that it is necessary to delay them this year."

"The Board is asking the community to vote the reduced operational expenditures of 17 mills, which is a reduction of 75 mills for operation. This, combined with the Board's reduction of 61 mills in Debt Retirement, will give a total reduction of 136 mills for the 1975-76 school year. It is anticipated that this 17 mills will bring a net increase of 3.1 percent over last year's revenues. "We hope the community will recognize this as an honest and sincere effort by the Board of Education to keep the costs in line and that the community will vote this 17 mills at the June 9 election."

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Member Beistle, seconded by Member Moulds:

WHEREAS The annual school election will be held in the district on Monday, June 9, 1975, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT



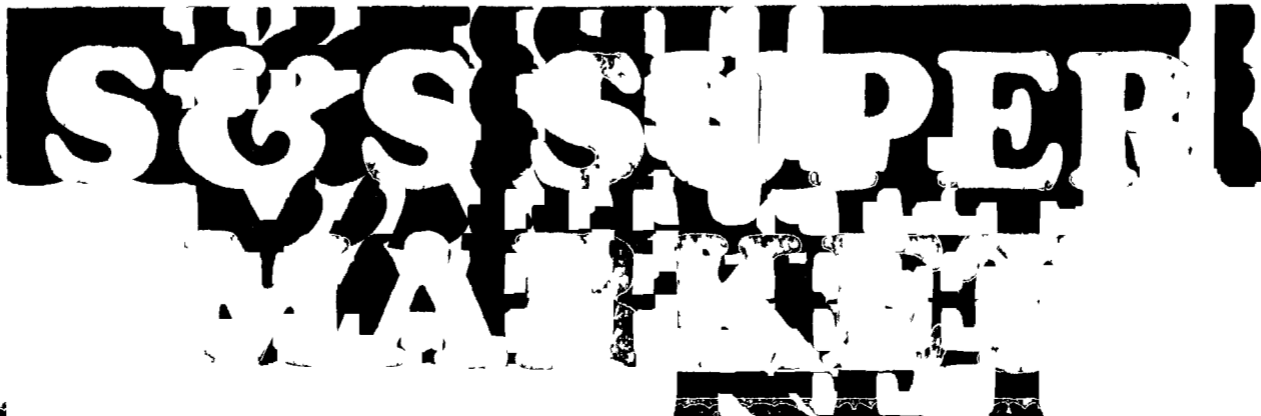
