Cause of Fire Still Unknown

The cause of the fire which devastated Poorman's Recreation Saturday is still unknown. Between 40 and 50 young people had just started bowling that morning when smoke was seen coming from the men's restroom. The door was so hot, that there was difficulty opening it. When it was finally opened, flames shot out into the rest of the building. The young people all left quickly in an orderly fashion.

The fire department from Buchanan arrived soon and attempted to contain the fire to the one section, but it had spread along the roof.

The area where the trophies were kept and engraved was ruined as was most of the front, either by smoke or water. The bowling lanes themselves suffered from the moisture. From the appearance inside, the whole thing could be called a total loss.

It is uncertain whether the bowling alley will be rebuilt.

School's Name Spelled Wrong!

The Buchanan board of education met at Stark School Monday night as guests of the Stark PTA.

Assistant superintendent Norman Kreager said that an appraisal of school property could be done for \$3420, and the board approved this expense.

For the second month, discussion about a possible assistant principal at the middle school was tabled. Also tabled was action on the 1975-76 school calendar.

Tenure was granted to Susan Durant, Jacquelyn Grashus, Karin Holm, Patsy Kwast, Barbara Kulwicki, Karen McBratnie, Thomas McLaughlin, Janet Mottl, Larry Robinson, Patrick Sexton, Joann Smary and Gail Trescher. The probationary period for Mark Hintz and Fred Olson was extended another year.

The resignation of Doris Kibbe was accepted.

It was discovered that many of the blazers purchased for the middle school band have "BUCHANAN" spelled wrong. They have to be sent back, and the company says they'll take care of the problem.

The new policies in which girls are competing in more sports has caused problems in certain areas. In one school, there are girls on the boys wrestling team, and in others, boys have joined the girls' teams. The board passed a resolution to prevent this. Girls won't be allowed on boys teams which involve physical contact, and boys won't be welcome on the girls basketball, volleyball, softball or track teams. Girls teams won't compete against any team on which there are boys, and boys and girls will be discouraged from competing on teams which were intended for the opposite sex.

Norman Kreager presented a proposed budget which has to be given to the County Tax Allocation Board. With a great deal of uncertainty about state aid and the new SEV for the district, it can only be a guess at this time. But \$180,846 was added to last year's budget of \$2,740,547 for an increase of 6.5 percent.

It Isn't Fair

Of all the taxes on the books, those having to do with personal property are the most unfair and the most ridiculous. Just about everybody agrees that a tax on personal property is inequitable, but nobody does anything about it.

This company's tax on its old equipment went from \$537 in 1973 to \$1282 in 1974 and will go to \$1800 in 1975. This in spite of the fact that the assessed valuation is higher than the actual worth of it.

What is being done is taxing companies for acquiring new equipment or enlarging their inventory. It's double taxation in its worst form. It is in effect punishment for improving one's operation. If this company hadn't gone to considerable expense to get a new press to put out a better paper, it wouldn't have to pay as much tax.

The whole system encourages silly attempts at trying to adjust figures to save money on personal property taxes. The result is that proportionately a few pay too much and others don't pay enough.

Everybody gripes about personal property taxes. Any tax expert will admit that it's something which should be abolished. Yet Buchanan taxpayers meekly submit to it along with everybody else. This week a great many persons protested to the Board of Review about their own personal assessments. What they should be doing is to protest the whole system which allows such a silly tax to remain on the books.

We're still a great believer in letter writing and will continue to register our feelings with everyone concerned.

Many Protest Their Assessments

On March 7, the city assessor, John Leich, sent out post cards informing property owners of their new assessed valuations. The notices were sent out after two sessions of the Board of Review had taken place.

A large number of persons went to the last Board of Review session on Monday. The posted time was 3 to 9 p.m., and there was a steady stream of persons protesting their assessed valuation.

Clark Equipment Company was the first to appear. They were protesting both their in-

ventory and personal property and their real estate assessments. They had hired an assessor at their own expense whose figures were considerably lower than Buchanan's tax assessor. Clark had gone to a new system for listing inventory, FIFO, (first in, first out), and their figures differed vastly from Buchanan's. On the matter of the new building, Clark said that the square footage had been figured incorrectly and there was no allowance for an obsolescence factor or for unusable space such as elevator shafts.

The Board of Review consists of Maurice Nelson, Rudolph Rodighero and Leo Slate. The Board listened to each case and said that they would study them and report their findings within ten days.

Clark Equipment Company is actually arguing about millions of dollars and other companies were proportionately hit hard. One industrialist in the area said that the whole tax system in Michigan is going to drive many companies to other states where there is more incentive for a company to do business.

5. The Commission (assuming that this is a city commission) "which has been receiving all the adverse publicity," where are the evidences of this and if so, why do they think this is so?

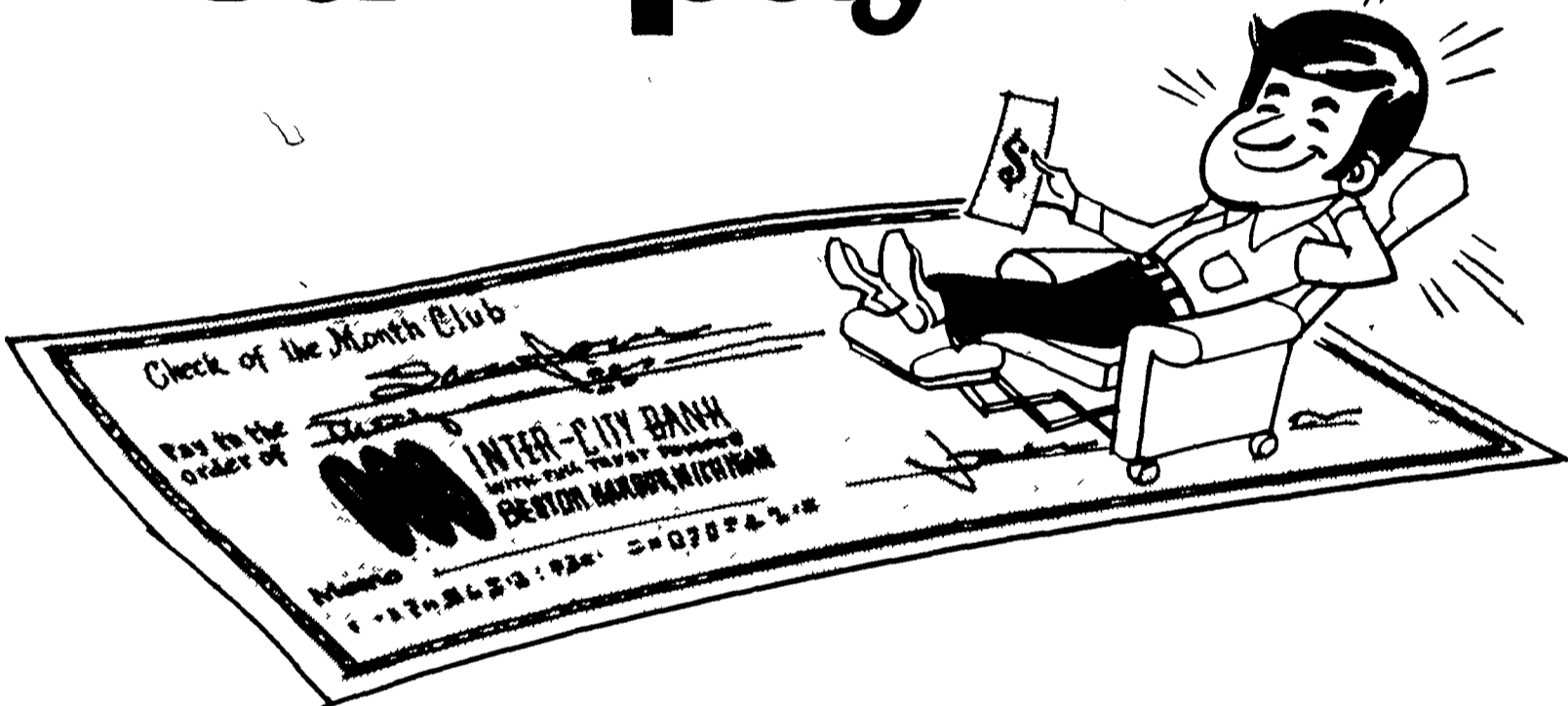

Soup's On

If you're buying prepared soups, read the label and note prices. Some soups are no more than flavored stock or a thickened sauce. They taste good, are ideal in casseroles or for the basis for your own thickened sauces, but add little in the way of vegetables, meat or nutrients other than calories. Ready-to-serve soups usually cost more than a condensed or dehydrated soup of the same kind. One reason for this is the extra weight and size of the can of ready-to-serve soup, because the transportation costs of the product will be higher. Also, ready-to-serve soups are produced and sold in smaller volume, making them a more costly item to pack and stock. Dehydrated soups usually require more preparation time than canned soups, but they offer a different taste and sometimes cost less. The single-serving packages of soups offer little in nutrition, have poor flavor and are more expensive. When calculating the differences in prices between a ready-to-serve and condensed or dehydrated soup mix, don't forget to add in the cost of the milk if it's added to any of the mixtures.

How Do You Tell If The Bread You Buy Is Fresh?

The old familiar squeeze test isn't reliable anymore because some of the newer bread formulas contain softeners that keep loaves soft for days. On the other hand, some compact loaves may be very fresh, but because they have no softening ingredients, they don't yield to pressure in the squeeze test. The best guide is to buy dated loaves, and then use it in the proper length of time, or freeze part of the loaf if you don't use it quickly enough. Freezing won't improve bread, but it will keep it at its peak of freshness if you freeze half of the loaf as soon as you get it home.

More Questions From The Parents

The most recent meeting of the High School Parents' Communications Group was held in the high school library on Thursday, February 20.

Listed below are the questions that were discussed.

1. How has the present lunchroom situation worked out?

Apparently things have gone quite well in the lunchroom. The students generally have acted in a responsible manner, and they have had a very adequate amount of time to eat.

2. Mr. Tyus, the advisor of the Buckhorn, was present. He explained in answer to a question about the obvious error in proof-reading, that students learn from their mistakes. He believes that if he were to correct all the mistakes, the students would not be forced to take responsibility for their own actions.

It was suggested that the addition of a date of issue to the front page would be helpful. Mr. Tyus explained that the specific date of issue is somewhat flexible since we are dependent upon an outside printer. It was suggested that a more general date (month or week, for example) would be a possibility.

3. Mr. Tyus is chairing a committee which is presently examining the comments section of our report cards, with the idea that we might revise them. He asked for suggestions, especially for some appropriate positive comments.

4. Why do you have only 6 or 7 periods in a day? The students are limited by this to 6 or 7 subjects, it wasn't this way years ago.

This is really the first time that anyone has raised this question. However, there are a few reasons why we operate as we do.

One is that we feel that the present school day is a reasonable length. The students are in school for 6½ hours. This, coupled with extracurricular activities, homework, and time spent on the bus, makes the day as long or longer than most adults are expected to work. To add periods would mean either lengthening the day or shortening periods. The teachers generally favor the present length of periods.

Secondly, the number of students who would take advantage of or benefit from an increased number of periods is probably quite small.

Another factor would be the need to add more teachers to teach the extra classes. This could be quite expensive.

5. Is there any chance that we will increase the number of periods in 1975-1976 from 6 to 7?

In all likelihood we will remain on a six period day with no study halls. To go to a seven period day would mean adding study halls or adding one-sixth to our teaching staff. The second alternative would be very expensive; the first is not considered, by a large number of our faculty members, to be the best thing educationally.

6. Where is the 1974 yearbook? The yearbook was originally scheduled to be here this fall. Because some of our pages were lost (not the first time) by the publishing company, we had to prepare them again. This cost us a great deal of time. Hopefully, the books will arrive very shortly. We plan to change publishers next year.

7. A suggestion was made that more positive comments should be written on the papers of students who don't ever get A's. They would be "boosted" by this positive reinforcement. This idea was passed on to the teachers.

8. Why don't we have a high school orchestra?

We have had very few strings players in the high school during the last couple of years. Those that we do have often find that there are other courses that they must take. We will continue to offer strings or orchestra to high school students, and the class will operate when there is sufficient student interest.

9. What is the current status of "graduation in less than four years," as a result of recent Board action?

The Board has appointed a committee of three to act on each request from high school students that early graduation be permitted. This applies to students who have completed 20 credits in less than four years. The committee consists of Mrs. Mahan, representing the Board, Mr. Dick, and the high school principal.

We met for the first time recently. At this meeting we determined that we needed some specific guidelines from the Board, so that our decision would be based on their wishes, rather than our personal inclinations. When we receive answers to our questions, we will act on the request that we now have.

10. Why does it cost so much money to be a cheerleader? The parent who asked the question estimated that it has cost her daughter \$75 to be a cheerleader this year.

Most of the items involved in the \$75.00 were purchased by the girls because they chose to do so. For example, each girl purchased a cheerleading jacket. This certainly is not required of cheerleaders, but the girls decided themselves to buy the jackets.

This problem has been discussed with Mr. Bashara, the cheerleading advisor. He agrees

that it should not cost the girls money to be cheerleaders. The school will buy any item required of cheerleaders and that item will remain school property. Every attempt will be made to be certain that all cheerleaders really want to purchase any items that the cheerleaders decide, on their own, to buy (such as the jacket).

11. Why don't the 7th grade, 8th grade, freshmen, and junior varsity teams get the same calibre of equipment as the varsity teams?

It is the philosophy of both the middle school administration and the high school administration that our athletic programs should be most attractive at the varsity level, so that students have something to strive for and because the varsity team is the school team, the one which we hope that the school and the community will support most enthusiastically. However, we would not skimp in any way on equipment required to permit athletes to perform safely, regardless of the level of competition.

12. Why is Spanish the only language that a student can take for four years?

We have offered both Spanish and French for four years. However, the number of students who were interested in taking French III and French IV was so small that we could not offer that class this year.

We will give students the opportunity to sign up for Spanish I-IV, French I-IV, German I and Latin I when scheduling for next year takes place in the near future.

The next meeting of our Parents' Communications Group will be Tuesday, March 25, at 7:30 p.m., in the high school library. Mr. Wayne Writer, Community School Director, will attend.

When we read the events of Palm Sunday, it seems that there was at least one day in Lent which brought great happiness to our Savior. Palm Sunday seems to be a day of belated recognition, of honor and glory for the Lord we love. Just look at that happy scene! A large and enthusiastic crowd welcomes Jesus to the Holy City and cries saying "Blessed be the King who comes in the name of the Lord!" Little children lift up their voices in praise. The Word of God is quoted and applied to the Son of God. Palm branches wave in the soft spring air. Why, if it were today, gaily-tinted confetti would drift down like a technicolor blanket! Surely, this day must be a day of deep satisfaction for the Master. There must be a smile of triumph and joy on the face of our Lord. He, the rightful King of our hearts, is honored by His people.

As a farmer who was hard hit by bad weather last year, I'd like to know more about loans the government is supposed to make to people like me. How do I go about applying for one?

—K. T., Muskegon

On February 4, 1975, the Farmers Home Administration of the Department of Agriculture announced that farmers in 23 Michigan counties who suffered crop loss or other damages due to bad weather conditions in 1974 could apply for emergency loan assistance to cover their losses. Muskegon is one of those counties and you can apply at the FMHA office located at 940 Van Eyck Street, Muskegon 49442. Farmers in other counties should check the phone book under U. S. Government for the FMHA office in their area.

These loans are repayable in their entirety at an interest rate of 5% over a period of from 1 to 5 years.

I had an argument with my kid the other day about the automobile companies. He claims they haven't done anything to improve gas mileage on new cars. I think they have. What do you say?

—A. C., Flint

Government-mandated safety and emission standards have cost quite a lot—not only in terms of the price of a new automobile—but also in terms of gasoline mileage. Nevertheless, automobile makers have improved fuel economy in 1975 model cars by 13.5% over last year's models.

Furthermore, President Ford has called on the car manufacturers to continue this trend and to increase fuel economy by 40% during the next five years.
