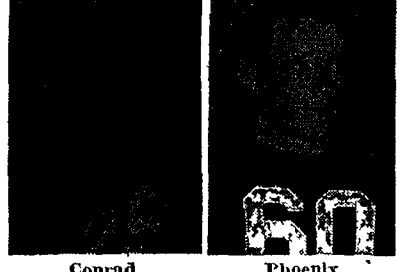

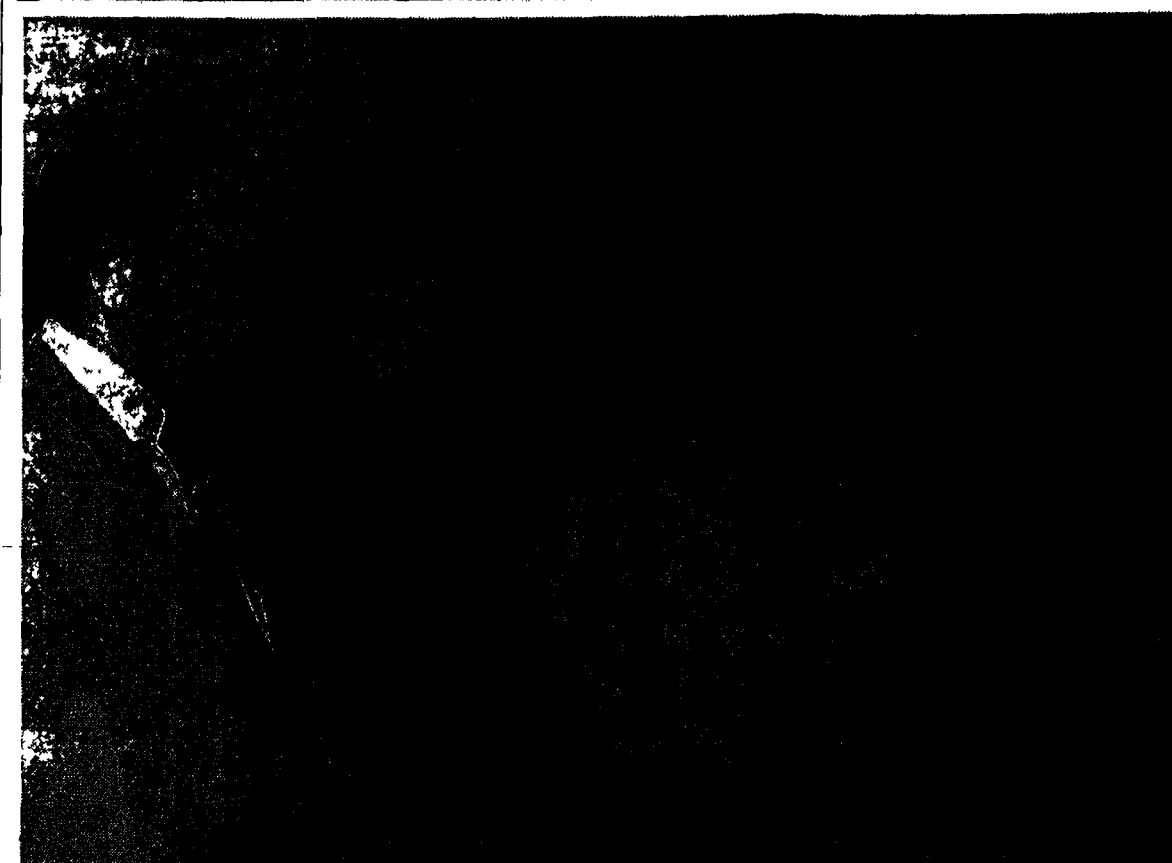

Mayor Anderson Speaker at Meet Of B.&P.W. Club

During the dinner meeting of the Buchanan Business and Professional Women's Club, Monday evening, in the Moccasin avenue school gymnasium, a program of public improvements now in progress by the city were outlined by Mayor Arthur Anderson, guest speaker.

These plans, Mayor Anderson said, will include the construction of a 250,000-gallon water tower with the next few years at a cost of \$40,000 or \$50,000, the improvement of various streets in 1955, and the yearly program of removing old trees and the planting of 150 new trees. He discussed the need for the new public library because of the crowded condition of the present library. He stated that construction on the new building will be started next spring. Contributions to the building fund, he stated, amount to \$40,500, as against the estimated cost of \$47,000. The balance needed is expected to be donated before spring.

During the business meeting, conducted by President Gladys Pears, a donation of \$5 was made to the Boy Scout fund drive, and another \$5 was voted to the Buchanan Veterans Hospital Service Council. Bachelor store not later than Nov. 20. The club will also participate in the Child Study Club's Christmas basket program. Christian Rural Overseas Aid Asks For Food

The Christian Rural Overseas Program is appealing to both urban and rural areas this year for CROP contributions, because of Congressional action last summer, in which the government will send \$20 worth of surplus foods to needy areas overseas for every \$1 donation given through CROP or other co-operating agencies.

According to Rev. H. Carlyle Carson, Berrien county chairman of CROP, churches, Farm Bureau groups and all other organizations and individuals are requested to consider the great opportunities to do a tremendous amount of good by CROP contributions. The surplus foods will be distributed by Church World Service and/or co-operating church organizations. Contributions to CROP may be designated to any Protestant, Catholic or Jewish church organization and it will be sent there and Berrien County will receive the credit.

It is suggested that perhaps in each rural area some farmer will take his truck and collect corn or some other produce from his neighbors, sell the commodity and turn the cash over to CROP.

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This applies mostly to the low muck lands in the Three Oaks, Galien and Baroda regions. Three farmers southwest of Three Oaks and two near Galien are reported to be laying tile in their corn fields in order to drain enough water to get in with their pickers. On many farms two tractors are used to pull one picker. On other farms, where truck tractors are available, they are used to pull the pickers.

The corn is coming in remarkably good condition with very little damage from mildew or sprouting evident. However the moisture content running from 20 to 25% cuts down the price. The market in Buchanan Monday was \$1.35 per bushel for corn containing not over 15% of water. The heavy moisture content delays shipment from the elevator. The elevator contains a dryer which will dry 200 bushels an hour, running day and night. All that can be dried is being shipped by railway cars to the Michigan Elevator Exchange at Toledo, O. The overflow over local drying capacity is hauled to Chicago by three semi-trucks, two 650-bushel semis belonging to the Buchanan Co-ops and one 550-bushel capacity leased from a local farmer.

Don Smith's Grid Career Ends

The gridiron career of Don Smith at Central Michigan College, terminated last Saturday in the game with Michigan Normal of Ypsilanti.

Smith, who was a bright gridiron star at Buchanan high school in the years when B.H.S. held the Big Seven title, played a defensive back for Central Michigan.

This Week Last Round-Up For Leaf Collection

This week and the first of next week at the latest, (the weather not prohibiting) will be the "Last Round-Up" for the city leaf collection.

All householders who have not completed rounding up their leaves for the city trucks are asked to have them on the tree lawn by Saturday morning. The city will respond on call for the collection of leaves in outlying sections where there are no curbs and gutters. In the event of favorable weather the city expects to complete the 1954 leaf harvest the first of next week, not later than Nov. 24.

The truck operated Sunday before last and from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. last Saturday to catch up with collections delayed by the weather.

Local Girl Scout Leaders Attend Chicago Meeting

Several representatives of the Buchanan Girl Scout Council gained new inspiration for their jobs at a meeting of American citizens when they attended a session of the Great Lakes Regional Conference of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. Nov. 16, 17 and 18.

The conference is being held in Grand Rapids, Mich. It is one of four separate conferences to be held in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan, the four states of the Great Lakes Region. The theme of the conference is: "Girl Scouts — A Growing Force for Freedom." Sessions are built around three phases of the theme: "Responsibilities of Freedom," "Leadership for Freedom," and "Roads to Freedom."

Dr. Charles L. Anspach, president of the Central Michigan College of Education delivered the keynote address on the subject, "Strength and Faith To Follow." Mrs. Edith Conant, director of the national program department, spoke on the topic, "The Promise That We Live By." She discussed the Girl Scout Promise and how Girl Scouts translate the words of that promise into action.

The role of the Girl Scouts in developing American citizens will be outlined by Mrs. John Carney, director of the National Community Relations Division, in her talk on "Proud Emblem of the Free."

Some 92,496 Girl Scouts in Michigan are represented by the several hundred adult volunteers attending the conference. Those attending from Buchanan are Mrs. Albert Kahn, Mrs. Fred Lester, Mrs. C. McPherson, Mrs. C. O. Clark.

Loses Part Of Arm In Picker Accident

Paul Streffling, Galien, suffered a compound fracture of the left arm when it was caught in a compactor Saturday afternoon. He was taken to Pawating hospital where it was found it was necessary to amputate the arm below the elbow. Mr. Streffling is reported to be in fair condition.

Ned Gardner, 13, Accidentally Shot

Ned Gardner, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Gardner, accidentally shot himself in the lower left leg Saturday afternoon. He had taken his pellet gun to a woods near the home. The safety catch was not on and the gun was accidentally discharged. After treatment at Pawating hospital, Ned returned home and went back to school as usual Monday morning.

The Buchanan Business Association completed its holiday program arrangements at its regular November meeting Tuesday evening during which William Bott, secretary of the Niles Chamber of Commerce, was the featured speaker.

At the business session the association voted that Dec. 3 would be the time set for the unveiling of the Christmas decorations, including the street lights, the completion of store window decorations and the coming of Santa Claus. The date set for keeping open until 9 p.m. nights for the Christmas shopping season is Friday, Dec. 10.

Bert Metzger, co-chairman with City Manager Omans in the street decoration arrangement, stated that the "blinker" bells that were used last year would be used again, and that they had been assured so that the alternating "blinking" arrangement will operate better this year. They bought several additional bells and a quantity of red and green rope for wrapping around the light posts, wrapping around the bells and swinging between the light poles.

The decision on the date of starting to keep stores open followed considerable discussion, after which the majority voted for the earlier opening.

The arrangements on the "Coming of Santa" will be given in more detail later. The American Legion will be in charge of the parade.

Secretary Bott of the Niles Chamber of Commerce gave a half hour talk on various means of observing Christmas in the retail district. He stated that this year his organization has widened the area of decoration. Formerly only the heart of the business district, including Main street and Broadway, was decorated. This year for the first time the Niles Chamber of Commerce is co-operating with the suburban shopping district on 11th street and U.S. 31 in decorations, matching funds for the cost. The organization is also decorating the sections of Sycamore and Cedar in the shopping district, and the crossing streets of 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th, in the business district. Costs can be held down without loss of effectiveness by the use of a compensating ingenuity, said Bott. In Niles they have a movable platform for Santa to meet the youngsters on, on a moveable base consisting of a Model A Ford. This succeeded the former expensive method of building a new platform out of loaned lumber each year.

This does not prevent the showing of Santa in the most favorable setting possible. Youngsters think of Santa as "some guy," and a guy with unlimited wealth. Consequently they will not be impressed with a Santa in obviously makeshift and often dingy and shabby surroundings. He should be seen against an attractive and thoroughly holiday background and setting.

The Niles Santa Claus platform is planned to route the youngsters through safely and without delay of time. There are stairs with railings leading to him and away from him, and a strong railing all around the platform, so that the possibility of a youngster being crowded off or falling off is lessened. Every safety precaution is taken in the course of the parade and in the session with Santa, is observed, plus the provision of insurance for the event if all precautions fail.

The Christmas parade with motor vehicles passing along the street is dangerous if not most carefully guarded, said Bott. Wildly excited youngsters are likely to converge in a mob on Santa's equipage, with the chance that a child may fall under the wheels or get a foot run over. Such an accident will utterly ruin that parade and will stop the event for years to come, said Bott.

This applies to the situation of last year in Buchanan. All the available police had been sent to accompany the parade, and as a result the youngsters had crowded out into the street until unofficial volunteer guards took over and shoved them back.

Details on arrangements for Christmas in the shopping district, including the parade accompanying the coming of Santa Claus, will be given in later issues of the Record, particularly the holiday special which will be issued on Thursday, Dec. 2.

George E. Mills, Former Business Man, Dies at 75

George Edward Mills passed away Tuesday afternoon in his home at 504 S. Portage. He had been ill for some time.

Born Aug. 31, 1879 in Fulton county, Ind., he was the son of William and Victoria Mills. He was married to Grace Regenos in Claypool, Ind., on May 16, 1900. They came to Buchanan from there 37 years ago.

Surviving are three sons, Charles, Burton and Edward Mills, all of Buchanan, 2 foster daughters, Mrs. V. W. Cook, Jackson, Mich., 2 brothers, Ira Mills of Hollandsburg, O., and Charles of Akron, Ind., 10 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday, Nov. 19, at 2 p.m. in the Swann Funeral Home, with W. Robert Palmer officiating. Interment will be in Oak Ridge cemetery.

After working a short time in the Richards Cabinet Works, in the present 2-story brick machinery display room of the Buchanan Co-ops, he went to the local Clark

plant, working 10 years in the axle department. In 1935 he started the hardware business now known as the City Hardware at 208 East Front, continuing until he sold it 16 years later in 1951.

Willard Marsh

Willard Marsh, a native of Buchanan, died in the Manchester Convalescent Home at Beulah, Mich., at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 7, following an illness of over a year.

Mr. Marsh was born in Buchanan township on Aug. 11, 1880, the son of Thomas and Margaret Marsh. He married Myra Ingelright in St. Joseph on June 10, 1902, and that year went to Interlochen to live. Bucks Close Successful Season with 14-0 Loss

"Definitely not one of our better games. The boys just didn't play the way I know they could have."

These were the sentiments of Bill Billings, coach of the Buchanan football team which dropped the final game of the year to top-tot Three Rivers. The score was 14-0 in favor of the Wildcats in a game played at Memorial Field, Friday, Nov. 12.

Three Rivers, rated as the best Class B team in the state, completed the first undefeated, untied season since football was started in 1921. The Cats won nine straight games and also the Twin Valley Conference championship. A pair of "P's" — punts and

penalties — held the key to the Bucks' plight. The first touchdown came as a result of a drive from the Buchanan 33 where Three Rivers got possession of the ball following an odd set of circumstances. A blocked punt cost the second marker.

With the first quarter going along smoothly enough, observers were settling back to watch a punt and tuck affair that would probably be decided by a break. First Buchanan took the ball. Getting as far as the 50, Larry Phoenix punted to the Three River's 19.

Then the much-vaunted power of the Cats began to show. Biting off little chunks of yardage at each crack, Three Rivers mov-

ed up the field powered by a slim, 160-pound quarterback named Larry O'Dell. Alternating with the publicized fullback Jim Hurd, he carried the ball to the 47 in 11 plays. Here the Buck line held, Bill Karpinski grabbing Hurd on third and eight just past the line of scrimmage.

O'Dell punted to Dale Dellinger who was dropped in his tracks on the 18. Dodge Karpinski carried for no gain, but a Buck player was detected clipping. The 15-yard penalty moved the ball back to the three, first and 25.

Jim Conrad, Karpinski and Dellinger managed only 12 yards in three downs and Phoenix was forced to punt from the 45. Taking the ball on his own 48, O'Dell returned to the 33 where the touchdown drive started.

The punt figured more directly in the scoring in the final quarter. O'Dell's directional toe put Buchanan in the hole back on its 19, first and ten. Three plays moved the ball to the 24, and Phoenix again dropped back to kick with 10:26 remaining in the game.

However, his line resembled a strainer in soup and it was just a question of who could be the first to block the kick. The honor went to Dick Schmidt, senior 185-pound tackle for Three Rivers.

Pass Hat At Three Rivers Game For Injured Tackle

A collection of \$205.19 was taken up Friday evening at the Three Rivers football game here to help pay expenses which will be incurred by Lee Rotzien, injured tackle, who will be operated on at the Northern Indiana Children's hospital this Friday for torn cartilage and legaments incurred in the Dowagiac game.

Schmidt knocked the ball down and chased it into the end zone to collapse on it for a touchdown. Dave Hurd, brother to Jim, kicked the extra point, as he had the first, to end the scoring.

There were few bright spots for Buchanan followers. When Phoenix kicked from the 50, it was the farthest the Bucks had been away from their goal line offensively all the game. When the game ended that statement still held true.

Billings was more irritated over the outcome of the game than he was sad. "Sure they (Three Rivers) had a good club. They had hard. They were fast and smart. But I still think our boys should have played better. Maybe they had something else on their minds."

northwest of Buchanan on the Runsey Road. The Egans are now raising a 7 to 12-lb bird which fits the ordinary family dinner.

But here's a tip — ORDER IT NOW!

The turkey-raising partners, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Egan, started raising turkeys on the farm where they now operate, in 1941. They

began with 15 hens and two toms of the Broad-breasted Bronze strain. They kept on with this strain until the market demand changed. Its defect for the family market is that the birds are too large, and take longer to develop and fill out their large frames.

They still have some of the Broad-breasted Bronze and also some King White turkeys. The Broad-breasted Bronze is the authentic descendant of the original wild turkey in America.

The smaller, fuller-breasted bird that is a favorite, especially for family dinners, is the Beltsville White or Squab Turkey. When the demand changed to smaller turkeys a few years ago, Egan did some selective breeding on his own strain of that bird. He won honors on it at the national Convention of the Turkey Federation, held in 1952 in Texas.

While the heaviest turkey buying is at Thanksgiving, Christmas and (recently) Easter, the large year-around market is developing. Many hotels and restaurants, even in Buchanan, feature turkey every week-end. Families buy more for special dinners throughout the year. The development of the smaller turkey with the greater percent of the favorite white meat

conduces to that end. The Egans have learned the business from the ground up since they started in 1941. They take care of their blood-testing, hatching, and the interbreeding that brings out the best in a strain. They have developed an industry that gives work to about a dozen farm women during the last four months of the year, and their enterprise is still growing.

Mattie Graffort Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Martha Elizabeth Graffort, a well-known resident of Buchanan during practically all of her lifetime, died very suddenly Sunday morning shortly after she had risen to help her invalid husband dress. She had been ill with a severe cold several days but had not made any complaints indicating that she was seriously ill.

She was born Oct. 6, 1878 at Mishawaka, Ind., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Scott. When she was a few weeks old the family moved to a farm on Portage Prairie, and two years later moved to the home at 208 South Oak street, where she died.

She was graduated from Buchanan high school as valedictorian with the class of 1896. She married Phay Graffort on May 7, 1899, in the home where she died. Her husband initiated and maintained a newspaper, the Buchanan Argus, for several years, and she became associated in the work of printing and editing.

She was a member and Past Matron of Sylvia Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, also the first Noble Grand of the Rebekah lodge at the time of its organization here. She clerked many years in the Boardman Dry Goods store, and continued under the Koenigshof sisters until she was obliged to remain at home to care for an invalid husband.

She is survived by her husband, by a daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Martin, by three grandchildren, Mrs. Barbara Nelson, Maynard Martin, Jr., and Jimmie C. Martin.

The funeral was held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the Swem Funeral Home with the Rev. L. E. Lee in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Howard Grants Back From Motor Trip Down Mexico Way

Mrs. Howard Grant of the sales force at Wisner's, and her husband, are just fresh back from a 6-weeks' auto tour to old Mexico and return.

It was her first trip but Howard had made several, so they took a new route which took them off the beaten path to the part of old Mexico, via dirt roads through country and towns that have not

changed much for hundreds of years. They crossed the Rio Grande river at Laredo, following a main route as far as Monterrey, where they veered west to Torreon and southwest to Durango, and from there on 100 miles to Mazatlan, on the Pacific coast. The route from Durango to Mazatlan was via an old cart trail consisting of just two tracks, often so deeply rutted that the car bottom occasionally scraped the rocky center. They met only one auto on the 100-mile stretch. Most of the people lived in adobe or mud-

walled houses, with heavy thatched roofs. The houses seemed to have no doors, and the people and farm animals wandered in and out. The 100-mile trip took them eight hours.

The people were very friendly, calling greetings as they passed. The streets of the towns mostly were only worn pathways, though a few had cobblestones. Only in one town did they see any electricity in this section of Mexico.

Between Durango and Mazatlan they crossed the Sierra Madre Mountain range, making 13,000 feet at the highest altitude, and traveling much of the time through the clouds.

They left Mazatlan by the Road of Coronado toward Mexico City. They spent three days in Mexico City, seeing the features of the national capital. They took a plane to the western seaport of Acapulco. They returned to the United States on the Pan-American highway, and made a side trip to spend a day in New Orleans.

Youth Memorial Given Corn Crop By Jr. Farm Bu.

Among the several hundred loads of corn which stampeded the unloading facilities of the Buchanan Co-ops elevator last week were those hauled by the Berrien County Central Junior Farm Bureau, the receipts to be credited to the Youth Memorial Building Fund.

The Central organization leased 70 acres on the Max Bailey farm, north of Eau Claire, last spring to raise money for the Youth Memorial. They were to get half of the receipts from the corn raised. Practically all expenses were donated. The seed corn was given by the Pioneer and the DeKalb hybrid seed corn companies. Tractors and plows were furnished by St. Joseph and Benton Harbor farm machinery dealers. The gasoline was furnished by the Farm Bureau Oil company.

The labor was volunteered by the members of the Central Junior Farm Bureau, the members bringing their own equipment. The picking was (or is being) done by George Wuske of Sodus and Foster brothers, Dale and John, of Niles. Members also donated time and trucks for delivery at the Co-ops.

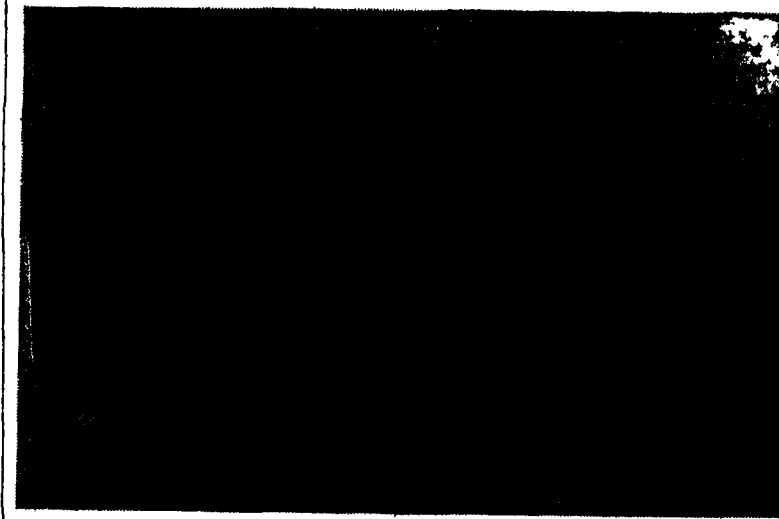
The corn was planted May 21, and was very well matured, having less moisture content than any other corn delivered last week. The organization borrowed money from the Buchanan Co-ops for the only expense incurred, which was principally for fertilizer.

R.L.D.S. Arranges Thanksgiving Eve Supper and Party

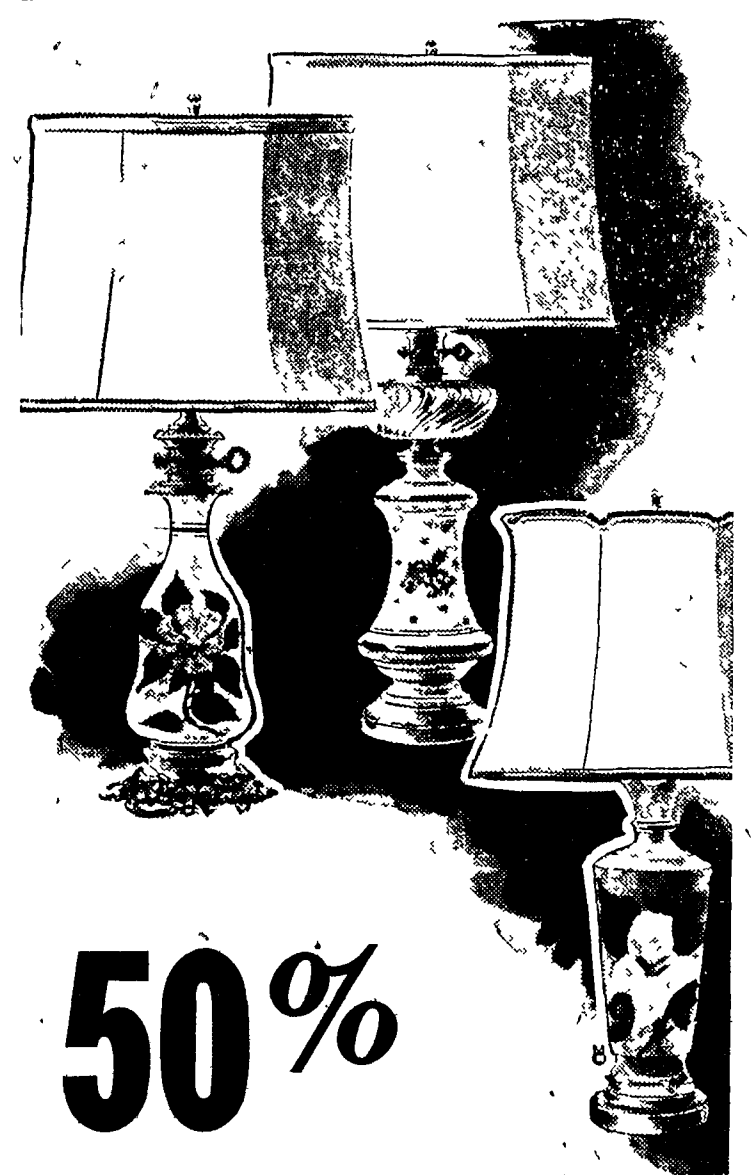

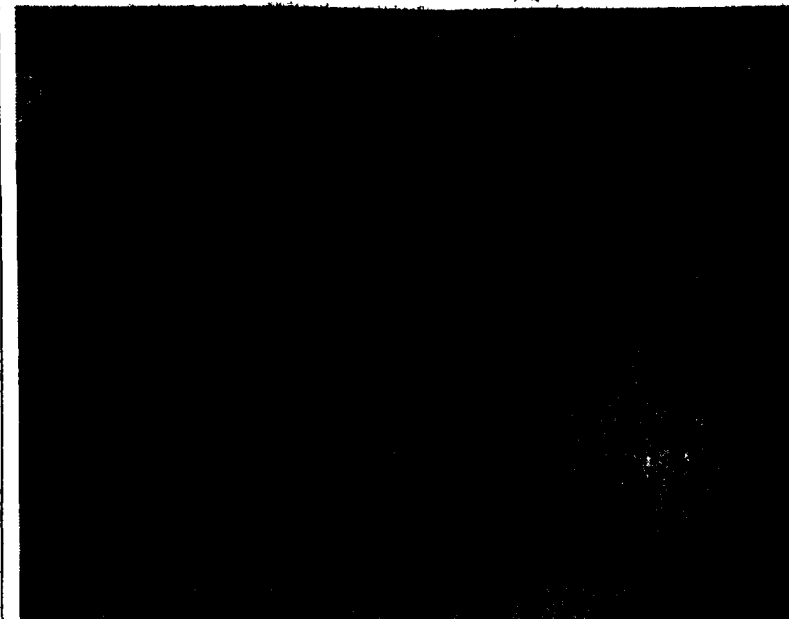

They agreed that untold wealth will accompany the widening and deepening of the channel from the Atlantic to the Great Lakes, bringing more people, industry, and world markets.

"But we'll still need land for farming to feed all these people," said George S. McIntyre, state director of agriculture.

He said that the expansion of industry and residential suburbs possible with the Seaway boom threaten to overrun some of the better farm lands near the border lakes.

Agriculture in Michigan will be called upon to grow more food and livestock to feed the state and also to take advantage of the world markets.

"We'll need the land we have now and more probably," McIntyre said.

Michigan State College is going to test the effectiveness of flu shots it has been providing free for several years.

Each fall when the students flock to the campus, they are offered the shots free when they complete registration. Doctors believe they do the trick and keep more students in classes instead of the infirmary, but they are going to make certain in tests this winter.

People will disagree over toll highways until they are completed and paid for, a period of time which may out-distance the life span of those who are building them.

The toll theory is that those who use the roads pay for them. Free roads are financed from tax money, which often forces payment from people who never receive direct benefit.

After years of controversy, the new Michigan Turnpike Authority is getting started on a toll road between Detroit and the Saginaw-Bay City area.

It is the second try. Monroe residents objected so strongly to the Authority taking

over the Detroit-Toledo expressway, a free road now under construction, that plans were abandoned to make it a toll highway.

Already complaints are being heard about the proposed Detroit to Saginaw-Bay City toll road. Farmers do not want to eliminate farm-to-market roads; resort people want exit points nearby, gasoline dealers want stations on the superhighway.

The law is quite clear on most points, giving the Authority power to make contracts for gasoline service on the highways, to build the roads and sell revenue bonds to pay for them.

Public policy is expected to make certain in the legislature that farmers and resort owners, vacationists and "average" motorists are protected.

For instance, one clause in the law requires that free highways come close to paralleling the toll roads.

Michigan will get \$551,000 in Federal money to improve airports in the state.

Beneficiaries will be Willow Run airport near Ann Arbor, Detroit-Wayne County airport, Capital City airport at Lansing, Bishop Field at Flint, Kent county airport at Grand Rapids, and Muskegon County airport at Muskegon.

This is the first year that southwestern Michigan fruit growers and other businessmen have received an "adequate share" for their air terminals at Muskegon and Grand Rapids.

"Many of them use the air for shipment and personal travel," said Brig Gen Lester J. Maitland, state aeronautical chief.

Another point in the increased Federal aid for the airports: employment, which, especially around Muskegon and Detroit, has been at the crisis point for months.

Work is underway on two major prison buildings which are part of an emergency housing program. The inmate population is creeping toward an all-time record of 10,000.

Corrections Director Gus Harrison said that the new \$250,000 dormitory at Ionia Reformatory for 230 more men and the \$50,000 man farm housing unit at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson will ease the situation for another two years.

"In addition we can shift around and get room for 270 more, which should ease the situation considerably," he said.

To make the picture even brighter, a new 500-man prison will be built at Ionia. It is expected to be ready within two years when the population reaches a desperation point again.

Explanation To Local Farmers On Social Security

This is a second of a series of three articles which will appear in the Berrien County Record. This is made possible as a public service feature of this newspaper.

There are two separate things to keep in mind in regard to Social Security benefit payments. The first is called "insured status" and the second is the actual amount of the benefit payment.

The least time necessary to obtain an insured status — that is, to be insured — is about 18 months of employment covered by Social Security. Those farmers who are already 65 or will be 65 by June of 1956, can qualify for benefits under the minimum requirement, if they operate their farm in 1955 and 1956. A rule of thumb for others not yet 65 is that approximately half the time since 1950 and the age of 65 or death, must have been spent in employment covered by Social Security before the person has an "insured status." The most time necessary is 10 years.

The amount of the retirement benefit is figured according to a set formula based on the average earnings. The average earnings is the total earnings divided by the number of months that have elapsed from 1955 to age 65 or death.

The formula used to determine your monthly retirement benefit is 55% of an average monthly wage of \$110, or less, but the pension will be no smaller than \$30 a month. If your monthly earnings are more than \$110, your pension will be 55% of the first \$110, plus 20% of the remainder.

Survivors benefits are also payable to widows and minor children of insured individuals. These pay-

ments vary from \$30 to \$200. Next week this newspaper will discuss "What The Farmers Need To Do."

State Makes Strict Rules On Sale Of Christmas Trees

Movement and sale of Christmas trees and evergreen boughs, estimated to be a \$5 million annual business in Michigan, will soon start, and the Michigan Department of Agriculture will establish road blocks on various highways in the state to assure that plant industry laws are complied with.

A person, buying trees or boughs from the original owner, must obtain a legal bill of sale made on triplicate forms available from Conservation officers, State Police, sheriff's offices, county agricultural agents or from the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Purchase of trees or boughs from a person who is not the original owner must be accompanied by a bill of sale giving only the names and addresses of the buyer and seller and the number and kinds of trees or boughs.

Persons not the original owners such as brokers, truckers, sales lot operators or anyone buying or selling trees must keep for two years the bills of sale, which must be shown upon the request of any

enforcement officers.

Property owners may transport Christmas trees or evergreen boughs from their own property without a bill of sale providing they can prove ownership of such property. Persons transporting less than 6 trees are exempt.

Transporting native trees with roots attached is a different matter, according to C. A. Boyer, chief of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Plant Industry. In that event the bill of sale alone is not adequate. An inspection of the trees or plants is necessary before they may be removed from the property on which they are growing. Inspection can be arranged upon

request to Mr. Boyer at his bureau in the Agriculture Department office in the Cass building at Lansing.

Members of the department, within coming weeks, will check on tree cutters and land descriptions to see that trees are legally cut.

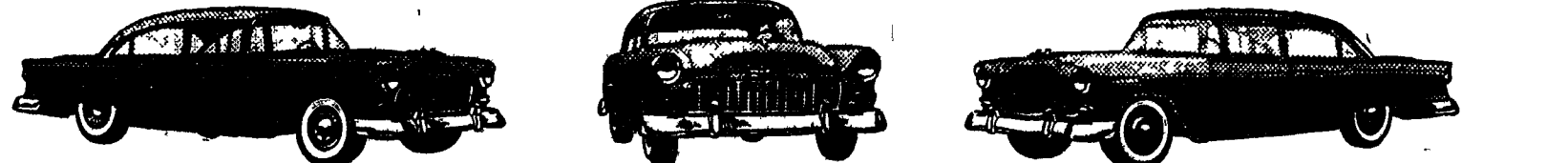
Then I stopped and looked again—for there, hanging on the spare tire was a sign: "This car NOT for sale."

Meet Your Merchant

This week the Record presents as its "Meet Your Merchant" feature Haffner's 5c to \$1 store and its manager, Miss Inez Denno.

To many who came to Buchanan in the past ten years the well-stocked and well-arranged store has always been identified with Inez. However the institution has passed its 30th year, having been first established in 1924 in the present quarters of the Berrien County Record, as the second in the "string" of Haffner 5c to \$1 stores, with Ritchie L. Haffner as its manager. His brother, D. L. Haffner, started the first Haffner store in Garrett, Ind., in May of 1923. So the Buchanan store is now No. 2 in a chain of 39, located in four states, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Ohio.

However the Buchanan store is in a unique position, directly under General Manager A. L. LaFollette, rather than the supervisory force which governs the other stores. The No. 2 Haffner store remained in the present Record quarters until 1926, when dry goods were added and the business outgrew its quarters. It was then transferred into a new building at 225 E. Front where it has operated since. Following Ritchie Haffner, the store was managed by Walter Phenice (now operating a 5c to \$1 store of his own at Constantine, Mich.) and the Coger brothers, first Alvin (now of Toledo, O.) and then Harold of Buchanan. Both quit the mercantile business to enter industry.

Miss Denno, the present manager, is a Buchanan product, a graduate of Buchanan high school who entered the store as a clerk in May, 1943, and was advanced to the managership on May 15, 1944. Meanwhile the store has been expanding in both merchandise and business. Back in the days when the first Haffner store was opened it was in what was known as the "dime store" classification. Most of the stores were then actually known as 5c to 10c stores, with the greatest part of the stock as small hardware items selling at 10c. Now the stores have advanced to the "5c to \$1" classification, but they still sell items at less than a nickel and many over \$1. What sells for under five cents? Well—balloons in the toy classification, small candy bars, small Christmas cards, all-day suckers, and probably enough to fill a long paragraph if you wished to run them all down.

Also, the store sells many items at over \$1, particularly in the dry goods lines, which have grown by leaps and a couple of bounds since Inez took over. They include all departments of ladies' ready-to-wear, millinery, blouses, skirts,
