



Rayon And Linen In Table Damasks Compared By Expert

Housewives in search of household linens are often puzzled by "linens" which, according to the label, are made with rayon but look like linen.

Julia Tear, textiles specialist at Michigan State college, observes that the rayon damasks are often very lovely and may cost you as much, or more, than linen.

You can decide whether to accept the rayon damask by asking yourself two questions. Is the material firm enough and heavy enough to be smoothly on the table?

Are the yarns in the fabric of a high twist? Labels may tell you something about the material. Damasks may be part linen and part rayon. Usually they are part rayon and part cotton. Loosely woven materials will not wash or wear well.

Rayon and cotton fabric. This looks very much like linen crash or art linen. Quality must be judged as with the damasks. The looser weaves may lose their linen-like texture and become shiny and flimsy. Designs and colors used in the printed cloths may make them quite expensive.

Towelings which is part rayon will probably be higher priced than cotton-towelings. Rayons will absorb more moisture than cotton and the same amount as linen. However, rayon dries more slowly than either cotton or linen. Rayon will not wash as well as linen or cotton because it is weak when wet and cannot stand rubbing and rough treatment.

60% of Army Psychos Are Restored to Combat

CHICAGO—Sixty per cent of troops suffering from neuropsychiatric disorders were healed and returned to further combat duty by army psychiatrists.

An additional 30 per cent were able to return to non-combat status in the European theater of war. Of the remaining 10 per cent evacuated to the United States, 40 to 50 per cent were salvaged for further service and the remainder discharged.

These figures are revealed in War Medicine, a publication of the American Medical Association.

Psychiatrists in a large army camp often had 500 consultations a month, according to Brig Gen William C. Menninger, director of the neuropsychiatric division of the surgeon general's office.

This high rate, Menninger said, was due to the structure of the army, which "requires every man to be a follower and many to be leaders."

"When a man fails in either of these roles, he may become a case."

Chevalier Is Freed on Charges of Aiding Nazis

PARIS—Maurice Chevalier, whose protruding lip and saucy gait accent to the heights of Hollywood stardom, was acquitted recently on charges of collaboration with the Germans. The national committee of un-aided purge gave its verdict in Chevalier's case with out-sentences. The charges against Chevalier were that he toured Germany, but it was shown his tour was to French prisoners of war camps and that his alleged meeting with Hermann Goering was unsobered.

Sprinkle with a mixture of bread crumbs and grated cheese, if desired. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, 20 minutes or until brown. Cream of carrot soup with cheese makes a hearty luncheon course. Make a white sauce by

stirring 4 tablespoons flour into 4 tablespoons melted butter and cook a few minutes. Gradually add 4 cups of milk. Add 1 cup grated raw carrot and cook for several minutes. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Just before serving, sprinkle with cheese over the top. Serve with

toasted bread cut into squares. Prepare for second servings.

Serve Mich. Carrots For Variety, Health
Have you noticed the abundance of firm bulk carrots in your local market? Michigan grown carrots are plentiful this winter and are especially tender and sweet.

Evelyn Craig of Michigan State college believes you should serve the colorful carrots more often. The foods and nutrition specialist says carrots are high in vitamin A content and can be served in many ways.

Glazed carrots used as a garnish

around a meat loaf give it a picture-book look. Boil whole small carrots until almost tender. Rub off the skins under cold water. Dry carrots thoroughly and roll in sugar. Heat 3 tablespoons butter in a heavy skillet and simmer carrots in it until glazed, turning frequently. For ginger glazed carrots, add 1/2 teaspoon powdered ginger to the butter. Arrange parsley tops on the carrots so they will look like new carrots just pulled.

Remember to use raw carrots in tossed green salads. Use carrot curls as a relish. You can make





Talk Highway Safety With Your Children

On rainy days there's double danger to children crossing the streets on the way to school. They should be cautioned to wait until the way is clear, not to obstruct their view by holding their umbrellas too low, and to walk across slippery streets. Rain often makes it harder for the motorist to see through his windshield. Unavoidable skidding is the cause of entirely too many accidents. Children should learn to know that a skidding car is entirely out of the control of the driver. Tell your child the importance of watching carefully the instructions of the school boy patrols as a further help in avoiding accidents.

Schoolboy patrols comprise one of the greatest life saving organizations in the county. Scores of the cities have found that their records of fatalities and injuries to children of school age have greatly improved since they installed schoolboy patrols.



The child of today is the driver and pedestrian of tomorrow. Carry a plea of safety to the child and youth in our schools. In view of the great good that is being done through the schoolboy patrols, each parent should impress upon the youngsters the need for obeying the traffic signals and protecting themselves generally.

Jay-walking, the practice of pedestrians crossing the streets in the middle of the block is one of the most frequent causes of accidents. It is not unusual to find children, particularly those who have studied safety lessons in the past urging their parents to follow safety rules. "Daddy, you crossed against the light" is a frequent expression coming from safety-minded youngsters as their parents ignore the traffic signals — another form of "jay-walking".



Alexander Graham Bell's invention of the telephone was the achievement of a trained scientific mind.


Continuous scientific progress to improve telephone communication began with him and has continued ever since. It is carried on today by the six thousand men and women of the Bell Telephone Laboratories.


