

Sgt. Robert Weener Gets Infantryman's Badge CAMP SAN JUAN, OBISPO, Calif., Jan. 30, 1945—Sgt. Robert L. Weener, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Weener, 608 Main St., Buchanan, Mich., stationed here with the 86th "Black Hawk" Infantry Division, has been awarded the Expert Infantryman's Badge for having successfully passed a series of comprehensive field tests on infantry training. The presentation of the coveted shoulder badge was made by Major General Harry M. Meloy, Commanding General, 86th Division.

To be eligible for the Expert badge was made by Major General Meloy, a soldier must have completed satisfactorily all the requirements of the Army Ground Force Physical Fitness Tests. Among other events, this test includes completion of foot marches 25 miles and 8 miles in length and in eight and two hours respectively.

The Expert Infantryman test, given with the bayonet, a sound knowledge of scouting and patrolling, first aid, field sanitation and ability to use a compass. An infantryman must be skilled in the employment of his weapon, know the principles of camouflage and possess a thorough understanding of military courtesy and discipline.

Lt. Benak Advises How to Retire on \$10 Anyone who has saved up \$10 and would like to retire on it would find a good bet in the island of Sardinia, according to Lt. Frank Benak, combat pilot now home on a furlough after over 60 missions over enemy territory in the European theatre.

Lt. Benak lived in a deep valley in sunny Sardinia from February to October, 1944, while flying missions over Italy and points beyond.

The bomber crews lived in groups of four usually in houses which they had built for themselves by native labor near their air base. These houses, were usually about 20x20 feet square, with two rooms They had brick walls and tile roofs. The hollow tile brick were about five inches thick, the air space inside the brick conditioning the walls against the summer heat Lt. Benak's group had a fire place built into the house, and a crude but workable shower bath walled off by granite tiles.

The entire structure cost them about \$150 Skilled labor for construction was plentiful at 80 cents a day The tile, and hollow brick were made from materials available on the spot and consequently cheap The masons plastered against the interior of the brick, smoothed off the walls and whitewashed them into a very smooth interior.

Furniture was relatively more expensive but still very cheap. It's higher cost was due to the fact that wood suitable for making furniture is scarce in Sardinia. All furniture was hand-made by local artisans Lt. Benak's group had a large chest of drawers made for \$6, and tables and chairs at a corresponding price. They hardly ever used their fire place except for roasting wieners or their equivalent when the mess hall fare grew monotonous or the menu was not appealing. They also had a stove that burned aviation gas for cooking. They employed a "No. 1 boy" as they were generally termed, at \$2 per week to do all their housework including occasional dish-washing, chopping wood for the fire place, shining shoes and anything else they wished This "boy," who was a man with a family, walked the two miles morning and night between his home in the town and the air base, arriving at 7 a. m. and leaving from 5 to 6 p. m.

Sometimes they flew missions daily, other times weather conditions would hold them up for two weeks. The Mediterranean was beautiful to fly over in good weather. It is shallower in most parts than the ocean, this being responsible for the blue color that predominated. The most scenic flight, he said, was that over the Caribbeans in their flight from the United States to North Africa. The waters around the Bahamas and Caribbean islands were lovely in color, with all the variety and intensity of technicolor. Green in the shallows near the shore, they shaded off through all gradations of blue into the black of the deep ocean. Flying at under 4,000 feet they could see sheets of phosphorescent light playing over the white breakers near the shore.



Poles were snapped off by the fury of the storm. Hundreds of towns, millions of people had no electric service. The electric light and power companies moved fast. Line crews worked around the clock. 18-hour stretches were common. Clerks, meter readers—everybody—pitched in to replace workers now at war. Short-wave radio helped direct the job. Men and equipment came to New England from other electric companies as far west as Ohio and Michigan. In fact, some trucks were already rolling before the storm struck. In most cases, service was quickly restored. Hospitals got first priority, then war plants. It was a staggering job, swiftly done—and helped immeasurably by the patience and understanding of customers. This hurricane—like fires, floods, tornadoes across the country—dramatized anew the fact that only a major disaster can interrupt electric service. It proved again that business-managed electric companies are organized and able to meet any emergency as completely as they met America's greatest emergency—war.
