## First Buchanan Hunters Return With Venison

There may have been plenty of deer in the north, but they were laying mighty low, according to the first returning party of hunters, consisting of 8 men, bringing home 4 deer and a timber wolf.

The first car, driven by Walter Babcock, got back Friday afternoon, with John Harrod, David Rotzien and Robert Franklin as passengers. Robert Franklin brought back a 6-pointer weighing about 130 pounds dressed, also a large timber wolf. John Harrod brought home a spike deer weighing about 125 pounds.

The second car, driven by Don Harger, arrived Saturday morning, with Joe Sexton, Clyde Lolmaugh and Albert Lolmaugh as passengers. Joe Sexton was high man in the party with a 9-point deer dressing over 200 pounds. Albert Lolmaugh had a spike deer.

Very few deer were seen, stated Sexton, with warm weather very likely responsible. Considerably over half the hunters' cars seen en route back were minus any deer, and the percentage of success would be very low, unless the hunting weather improved. The party was delayed 18½ hours by the jam in the Straits of Mackinaw ferries. When Harger's car came to a stop at the end of the line they were 9 miles from the Straits. In questioning the hunters, the average delay had been from 18½ to 20 hours going north. On the return the local hunters were delayed only about 2½ hours.

They went to a cabin owned by a brother-in-law of John Garrod, about 8½ miles out of Newberry, in wild country where much of the timber was virgin pine. The party got something every day they were out. John Franklin shot his deer Monday morning, the opening day of the season. John Garrod shot his spike Tuesday. Franklin killed the timber wolf Wednesday. Joe killed the big deer Thursday and Albert Lolmaugh killed his spike Friday morning, just before they started back.

## To Explain ACP Program At Meet At Co-ops Dec. 2

A meeting will be held at the Buchanan Co-ops at 1:30 P. M. Thursday, Dec. 2, for the purpose of explaining the program of the national Agricultural Conservation Program. All farmers are cordially invited to attend these meetings.

The basic purpose of the Agricultural Conservation Program is to aid in achieving necessary conservation of our soil and water resources. The future prosperity of this nation necessitates the protection and maintenance of our land and water resources.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is entirely voluntary. Any farmer who believes he can do the needed conservation job on his farm without the aid of the limited funds available under the program, is urged to do so.

Farmers will be given an opportunity to request the Federal Government to share the costs, if needed, to aid them in carrying out eligible practices on their farms during the 1955 program year. The 1955 program year begins Nov. 1, 1954 and ends Dec. 31, 1955.

The period for filing requests under the program is from Nov. 15, 1954 and ends March 1, 1955.

It will be necessary to call at the ASC office, 714 Pleasant St., St. Joseph, to sign up for the 1955 program. There will be no meetings held in the different areas for signing up the farms this year.

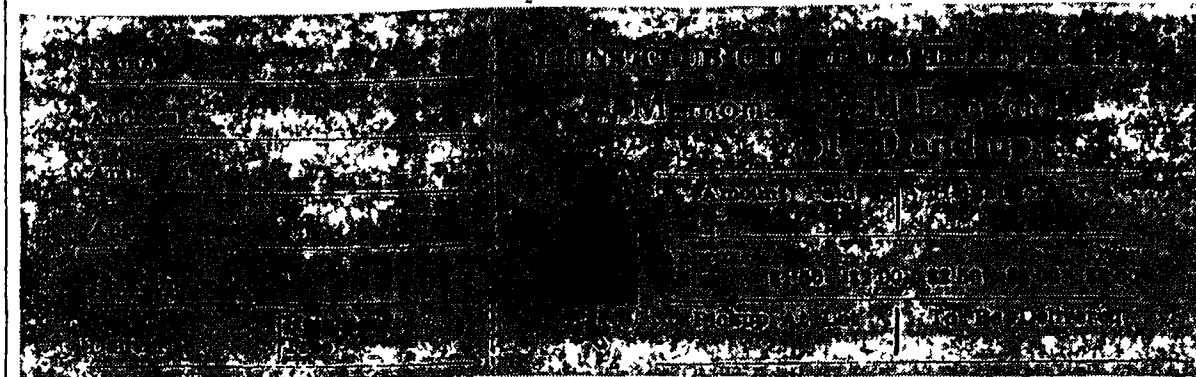

## JC's Sponsor Annual Contest Voice Democracy

The eighth annual Voice of Democracy contest is now under way in the Buchanan high school. Sponsored by the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters, the Radio-Electronics-Television Manufacturers' Association and the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, the contest is open to 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students of all public, private and parochial high schools in the nation and the territories. Contestants are required to write and then voice, by recordings, 5-minute scripts on the subject, "I Speak For Democracy."

Following community and state eliminations, a dozen finalists will be chosen from among the 52 state and territorial winners. A panel of national judges will then select four co-equal national winners, each of whom receive a \$500 college scholarship, an all-expense trip to Washington, D. C., and Williamsburg, Va., next February and either a radio or television receiver.

The local project is handled by the Buchanan high school by Margaret Snyder. The recording of the speeches will be done by the Buchanan Junior Chamber of Commerce, and prizes will also be presented to the local winners by the Buchanan Jaycees.

A tentative date of Nov. 30 has been set for the Buchanan finals.

## A. Payne Entered In International Quarter Horse Event

An entry from Berrien county in the 55th Annual International Livestock Exposition, Nov. 26 through Dec. 4, is that of Albert Payne, Galien, who entered in the Quarter Horse division of the world's greatest livestock exhibition, held at the Chicago Stock Yards.

The Quarter Horse entries will be judged Thursday and Friday, Dec. 2 and 3.

In conjunction with the Livestock Exposition will be the 32nd International Grain and Hay Show, the International Wool Show, the International Sheep Shearing contests and four judging contests that will attract both 4-H and college teams from a majority of the states.

## Firemen Lead Battle Against A Dread Disease

Members of the Buchanan fire department "put it on" the Fire Fighters March for Muscular Dystrophy during the ten-day period from Nov. 26 to Dec. 6 inclusive. This is the first time in Berrien county history that fire departments have taken the sponsorship of the drive. The members of the Bertrand Fire department will cover that township at the same time.

In Berrien county, there are 12 known cases of muscular dystrophy, a disease that kills by slowly rendering the muscles useless until finally the helpless victim reaches a point where even a common cold can be a fatal illness.

The exact number of victims across the nation is unknown, largely because the disease is not contagious, and therefore, not reportable to state health agencies. Reliable estimates place the number at some 200,000, of which three fourths are boys or young men.

Exact cause of the disease is not known. Research begun only five years ago now seeks to learn how the disease finds its origin, and what, if anything, can be done to stop the steady downhill affliction of its victims.

The most prevalent forms of the disease strikes children between the ages of three and thirteen years, but all persons up to eighty years of age can become its victims.

## John R. Murray To Head Berrien Co. Polio Drive

John R. Murray, district manager for Michigan Bell Telephone Co., will be chairman of the 1955 polio fund campaign for Berrien county.

Appointment of the Benton Harborite was announced today by Paul Bagwell of Lansing, president of the Michigan chapter of the Nation Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Murray, who resides with his wife and three children at 1807 Broadmoor drive, Fair Plain, was chairman of this year's March of Dimes for Benton Harbor.

Murray has also been otherwise active in community affairs since he came here in September, 1952.

He is a lieutenant-commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve and is commanding officer of the Benton Harbor naval reserve division.

He is a member of twin cities Rotary, the Elks, and Masons and of the Methodist Peace Temple.

He served for 3½ years as a destroyer officer during World War II. Just prior to 1950, he served three years as assistant manager of Michigan Bell's Saginaw district. He was recalled in 1950 by the navy for another two years active duty. He served as operations officer of the heavy cruiser, USS Newport News, while she was cruising the Mediterranean as flagship of the 6th Fleet.

He has been with Michigan Bell since 1948 and came to take over the rapidly-growing Benton Harbor district shortly after his second release from navy service.

He is survived by his wife, by two sons, Ernest and George of Niles, by a daughter, Mrs. George Seyfried of Galien, by 7 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. today (Wednesday) at the Swen Funeral Home with the Rev. T. M. Greenhoe in charge. Burial will be made in Riverside cemetery, Niles.

## Galien-Buchanan Road Closed

## Meet Your Merchant

Paul Marazita, owner and operator of the Marz Sweet Shop, gets the call this week for the "Meet Your Merchant" feature.

Paul comes from a numerous clan, being one of 10 sons of Frank Marazita, who started in the candy business in Buchanan back in the teens of the present century, and later moved his business to Niles shortly after World War I. He went to Niles because he had an opportunity to get a more favorable business location than he could get in Buchanan. But back

in his head he had the idea that he would set up one of his sons in Buchanan when the opportunity became ripe.

The opportunity ripened when he bought the building at 205 East Front street, Buchanan, from John Rehm. He installed a new front, lowered the floor to street level and thoroughly remodeled and decorated the interior. His third son, Paul Marazita, opened the present Marz Sweet Shop on Friday, June 13, 1947.

He was not unknown in Buchanan, where the Marazitas were better remembered from the quality of football they played than from their candy-making skills.

However, when Paul was playing football for Niles in 1938, 1939 and 1940, Buchanan happened to be riding high under Coast John Miller (later of Owosso, Mich.) with an unsullied record of 20 games without a defeat. In 1938 the Bucks tied the Vikings—in 1939 they defeated the Vikings 14-0, Marazita or no Marazita. But in 1940 they sagged a bit and lost to Niles 14-7.

After all, what has all this got to do with the candy business? Anyway Paul played varsity football in Niles for three years, three years in basketball, two years on the tennis team and one year as a dash man on the Niles track team. Every one of the 10 Marazitas played on the Niles high school football team. The youngest, War-

ren, played defensive back on the Viking eleven this past fall. He will be graduated in 1955, after which there will be no more Marazitas on Niles teams (for a few years at least). Then maybe the Bucks can take 'em easier.

Getting back to the candy business, in which there are only four of the Marazita sons now engaged, Frank, the founder of the clan, taught all his boys how to make candy. He came to Buchanan about 1910 to join his brother-in-law, who had started in business somewhere along the east side of

Days avenue, later moving to the west side of the Hollywood theater building when that structure was first erected.
