Bucks Lose To Plainwell, 47-44

Breaks In Final, Oversight By Officials, Add Up To Final Defeat

The Buchanan Bucks came to the end of the Tournament Trail Thursday night, when they were edged out 47-44 in a heart-breaking semi-final by Plainwell. The Bucks had defeated the East Grand Rapids team the night before. They played a good game against a hot Plainwell team but a few bad breaks in the final minutes won the game for their opponents.

Riley of Plainwell is said to have made six fouls instead of the legal limit of four before leaving the game, due to an oversight of the game officials. However, the results had been signed by the Buchanan authorities before the oversight was made before the tournament—management—Plainwell was in good playing form as evidenced by a loss to tough Holland Christian by only five points in the finals.

The first quarter started fast with both teams connecting with the basket. Plainwell surged to a 11-4 lead. Buchanan narrowed the gap but trailed 14-8 at the end of the period. Arman made 9 for the Bucks and Anderson four for the Bucks.

Buchanan started the second quarter strong with baskets by Anderson and Letcher narrowing the margin. An edge on free throws helped and the score was 22-20 at the end of the half.

Letcher registered two baskets as the third started and Plainwell led in one to tie it up. Letcher and Plainwell each scored again, and the quarter ended 32-32.

The pace slowed at the start of the fourth with the lead seeing sawing back and forth. Then Plainwell converted several breaks into scores and maintained the lead until the time ran out. Letcher had 18 for Buchanan and Burchfield 15 for the Trojans.

Co. Dog Wardens Are Employed On 40-Hour Week

Supervisors Allot \$500 To Conduct Survey Of Home For Aged

The Berrien county dog wardens were put on a 40-hour week by the county Board of Supervisors at their meeting, held Monday in St. Joseph. They will have the same authority to make arrests as deputy sheriffs have and may take drastic steps in cases where dogs running loose cannot be stopped in any other way.

The finance committee of the Board recommended a \$500 appropriation be made to conduct a survey on the needs for a county home for the aged.

Supervisor Frank Poorman, chairman of the Welfare committee, asked for the transfer of \$6,985.01 from the county building fund to the juvenile home building fund so a final payment of \$12,172.60 for the construction of the home could be made. This transfer was decided on some time ago, to avoid fractional millage. Mr. Poorman commented on the fact that the cost of the home did not exceed the \$97,000-plus contract price.

Appropriations of \$700 to the Blossom festival, \$500 to the Youth Fair, \$500 to the Western Michigan Tourist and Resort Association, and \$300 to the Coloma Gladiolus festival, were also passed by the board.

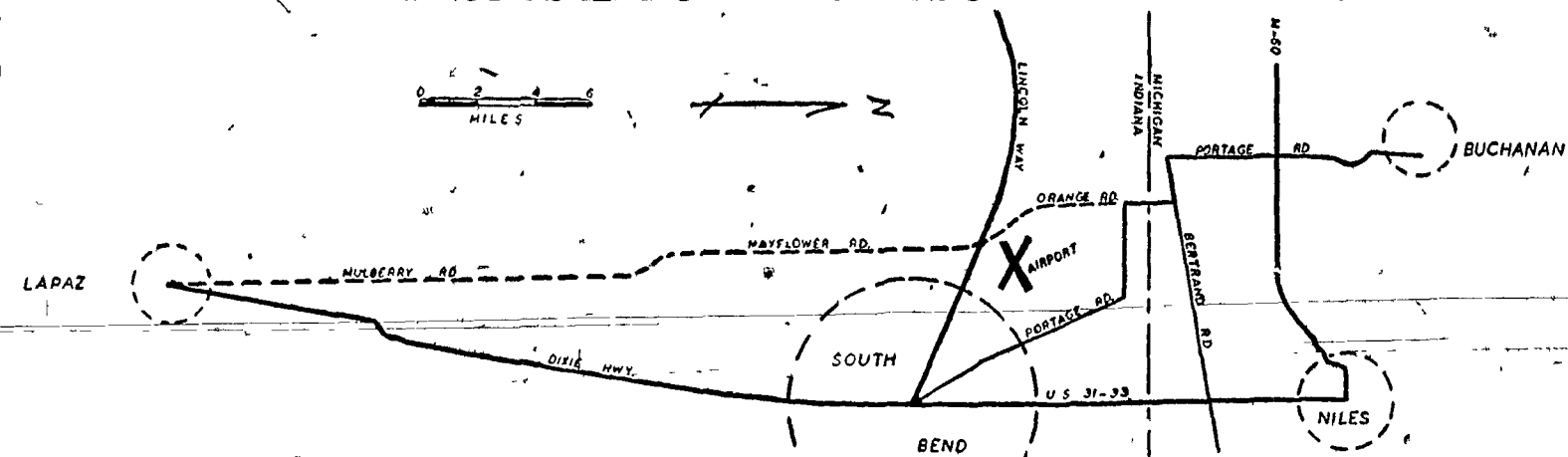
Childhood Friends Meet First Time After 44 Years

\$65,000 Rainy Day Fund Raised By Higher Levy

14.5 Mill Income To Cover Actual City Operation For This Year

The government of the city of Buchanan has issued the following explanation of its fiscal policy through its financial officer, Mrs. Esther Hamilton, acting as spokesman of the commission. STATEMENT OF CITY COMMISSION POLICY. The City Commission of Buchanan has, as a policy, in the past few years attempted to put funds aside during "Good Times" to meet emergencies for the so-called "Rainy Days" when economic conditions may not be so good. The following is pointed out so that our citizens may fully understand this policy.

At the close of World War 2, through thrifty management of previous Commissions, a fund known as the "Emergency Fund" had been accumulated in the amount of \$40,154.70 and bonded indebtedness of \$3,000.00. With the purchase of a much needed City Garage at \$8,500.00 and a City Hall, with its remodeling to suit municipal needs, at \$23,482.24 and 50% participation in the Days Avenue sidewalk and culvert costing \$27,000.00, along with Engineering fees of \$6,182.72 and legal fees of \$1,118.23 along with others that could not be budgeted, this fund was reduced to \$4,312.53. The engineering expense of \$6,182.72 had been incurred by the city previous to the adoption of the Commission-Manager form in 1948. The Days Avenue project was then delayed two years until consent to the 50-50 financing of the project had been secured from all property owners involved. The work was done in 1950.

Under our new Charter, adopted in 1949, it was required that any left-over funds from the fiscal year be put into what is now known as "Unappropriated Surpluses." At a levy of thirteen mills, it was impossible to "enlarge this fund" any appreciable amount. The City Commission realized that any large business needs a surplus to meet unexpected difficulties. The total operations of Buchanan's City Government runs over \$200,000.00 per year to provide for the services demanded by the community. To insure sound financial government the following steps were taken:

On June 30th, 1952, the City had a surplus of only \$18,008.41. A Tax Levy of fifteen mills was made for the fiscal year. THE CITY ACTUALLY OPERATED ON 11.56 MILLS, with the balance of 3.44 mills going into surplus. On June 30, 1953, the city had a surplus of \$45,323.59.

For the fiscal year of 1953-54 a Tax Levy of seventeen mills was made to cover indebtedness of \$21,000.00 and \$12,000.00 for Front Street improvement. ACTUAL CITY OPERATION WILL RUN APPROXIMATELY FOURTEEN AND ONE-HALF MILLS. The remaining two and one-half mills will go into surplus making an anticipated surplus, as of June 30, 1954, of \$65,000.00. This surplus represents about 32 1/2% of a year's operation.

Route To Skirt South Bend On Mayflower Road

Would Take Red Bud Trail Route North To A Union With 31

Preliminary surveys have been made by the St. Joseph county (Indiana) surveyors for a proposed by-pass of U S 31 extending directly north from U S 31 at LaPaz, Ind., west of South Bend, and nearly straight north to a junction with Portage Road to Buchanan. Thence it would take the Red Bud Trail route north to a reunion with U S 31 at Berrien Springs.

The St. Joseph county surveyor, Earl McClellan, stated that this seemed a natural route for a by-pass that would relieve traffic congestion over the highway through South Bend and Niles, and also accommodate through traffic bound for Lake Michigan. The proposed route extends north from LaPaz by the Mayflower Road, which is already a substantial highway. It skirts the western boundary of the city of South Bend to Lincoln Way, where it would swing northwest, running west of the St. Joseph county airport to connect with Orange Road and thence north to Join Portage Road where it turns north at the Portage clubhouse.

The route from there on would coincide, with necessary elimination of right-angle corners, with the Portage Road to Buchanan, and thence north on the Red Bud Trail. Mr. McClellan stated that the surveyors of St. Joseph county and of the city of South Bend were in agreement that this route, in addition to by-passing the city, would afford a cut-off of several miles for traffic bound for St. Joseph and Benton Harbor and all points north along the Lake Michigan shore to the Straits of Mackinaw.

The Michigan State Highway Commission stated that they had not been as yet contacted by any Indiana highway authorities on this proposed route. Such route might be created, but the commission had not as yet been informed and had consequently not considered it, said a representative of that body yesterday.

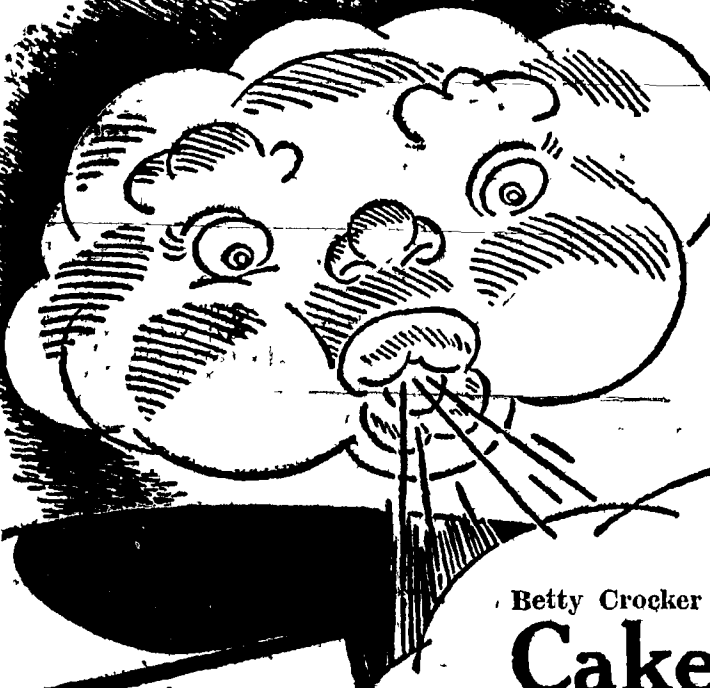

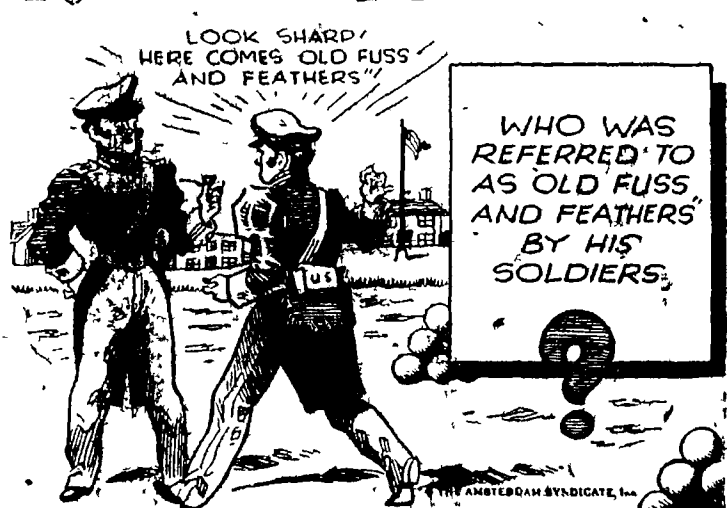

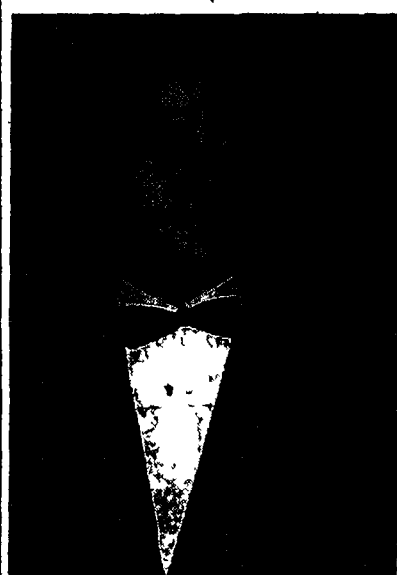

Why Easter Falls On April 18, 1954

Of M. Professor Tells How Easter Originated, Season's Changes

Easter Sunday will fall this year on Sunday, April 18, in accordance with a rule laid down by the Catholic Council of Nice in the city of Nice, Asia Minor, in the year 325 A.D.
It was there and then decided that Easter should thenceforth occur on the first Sunday following the first full moon that fell on March 21 or the next date thereafter. If a full moon should fall on March 21, and that date happened to be Saturday, then Easter would occur on the next day, Sunday, March 22. That is the earliest possible date. The latest possible date is April 25.

March 21 is a determining date was selected because it is the average date of the Vernal Equinox, the time when the sun crosses the equator and the nights and days are of equal length. The Council of Nice cleared up one source of possible misunderstanding when it further decreed that the moon fell on March 21 and that date happened to be on a Sunday, then Easter would come a week later on March 28, the first Sunday after.
Hazel M. Losh, associate professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan, states that this year spring arrives at 10:54 p.m. March 20, or six hours later than last year. This is because

the season arrives when the sun crosses the equator on its apparent yearly northern path, the event taking place at 3:55:24.22-day intervals. Since this interval is 2422 days longer than the calendar year, spring might come late March 20, on March 21, or early March 23.

The professor explains that the sun on this day "will rise and set exactly at the east and west points of the horizon, making day and night the same 12-hour length." In addition, the sun will shine more directly on the northern hemisphere after this date, warming up that half of the earth.

Nov. 15, 1956 Completion Goal For Indiana Toll Road

**Estimate Cost
Of Construction**
\$225,000,000

**Length Of Road 156.1 Miles,
Whiting, Ind., To Columbus
Ohio**

The \$200,000,000 Indiana Toll Road, now a definite project in the engineering stage, is a matter of interest to all Buchananites. The route now definitely decided on passes immediately north of South Bend, crossing the Portage Road to South Bend just north of the St. Joseph County Infirmary, paralleling and just south of Cleveland Road. The "cloverleaf" interchange where motorists enter or leave the road

at its intersection with US-31 will be about a mile north of Notre Dame University.

No roads will cross the toll road at the same level, over or underpasses being provided at every crossing.

The toll road connects with the Illinois public road system on Indianapolis Boulevard in Whiting, Ind., at the intersection with Indiana State Road 20. From that point its route will extend south-east around Lake Michigan, three miles south of Michigan City, three miles north of LaPorte, and 2 1/2 miles north of New Carlisle, intersecting the old Chicago Trail route about two miles northeast of Hamilton, where it makes its nearest approach to the Indiana-Michigan state line only a half mile to the south.

The entire route through Indiana to its connection with the Ohio Turnpike at Columbus, Ohio, will be 156.1 miles in length. There will be 10 cloverleaf interchanges spaced an average of 15 miles apart, each at some north and

south road intersection. The first interchange west of South Bend will be at Springville in LaPorte county where it intersects Indiana State Road 99. The first interchange to the east of South Bend will be at Simington Lake, Elkhart county, where its route intersects Indiana State Road 19. Enroute it connects with US-12 at Gary.

The toll road will consist of two 24-foot lanes with a 56-foot "depressed median" between them. The level of the bottom of this median area will be several feet lower than the paving on each side. This will aid in drainage and will also tend to prevent cars and trucks which may get out of control from crossing over into the opposite line of traffic.

The preliminary financing will be by the proceeds of an estimated bond issue totalling from \$225,000,000 to \$250,000,000. The toll road bonds and other expenses will not be paid by taxes but from the toll receipts. The bonds will be redeemed at a rate proportionate to the road's income. On completion of payment the toll road will become the property of the state of Indiana.

Toll rates will be proportionate to the length of the trip. There will be no grade level crossroads in the 156.1 miles extent. A traffic analysis estimates that as of 1956-57 a total of 17,661 vehicles, consisting of 12,371 passenger cars and 5,290 commercial vehicles would use the road, their trips averaging 113 miles.

The toll charges recommended for passenger cars traveling the entire 156 miles are .01249 cents per mile or \$1.95 for the entire distance. Light trucks would pay the same charge. Heavier trucks of combined tractor-trailers would pay according to gross weight, from .01953 cents per mile up to 16,000 pounds gross weight with a top of up to .08712 on trucks and trailers with a gross weight of up to 85,000 pounds. The toll charge for all vehicles will be proportionate to the distance traveled on the road. Sixteen service areas will each include a restaurant, lounge and rest rooms, a small confectionery and novelty shop, and an automobile and truck service center. These clusters of service buildings will be in pairs on opposite sides of the highway. Those using the road will be given tickets when they enter it and will then pay according to distance traveled as they leave the road.

The members of the Indiana Toll road commission in charge of creating the project are a combination of state and corporate representatives. It is now estimated that the complete route may be open for traffic on Nov. 15, 1956, if funds are available on or before May 1, 1954. Any delay in raising funds will extend the service date of the road proportionately later.

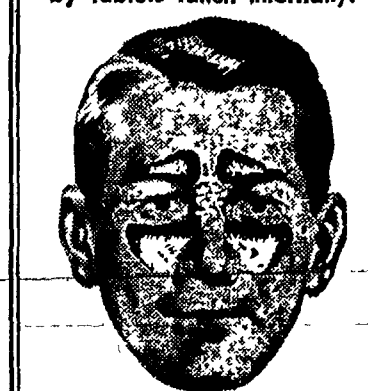

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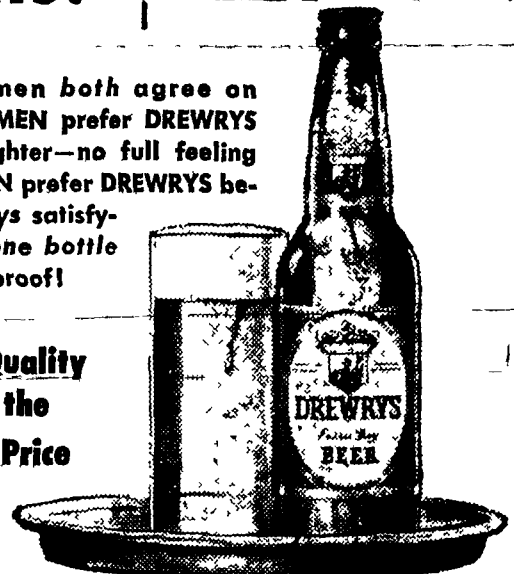

Legislative News Letter

(Furnished by State Rep. Don R. Pears (R-Buchanan))

Another, and toughest to date, deadline was met on March 10, when the House cleared its deck of House Bills (tax and appropriation bills excepted) and either passed and sent them to the Senate, or killed them either by the process of re-referring to committee or by death on the floor when sufficient votes were not mustered. Faced with a heavy calendar of 73 bills, of which 54 were House Bills, it meant burning the midnight oil, so to speak, to accomplish this Herculean task.

As is usual, the more controversial bills are subject to action in the late days of the sessions, and we experienced no lack of hot issues.

Possibly the hottest one was HB 207, placing censorship restrictions on the dramatization of beer and wine advertising on TV. Debate on this bill lasted well over an hour and a half, during which time an unsuccessful attempt was made to send the bill back to committee and permit the creation of a study committee to work with the various interested parties to write a bill which opponents felt would more adequately solve the problem. The bill went to Third Reading, and under a suspension of rules, was put on its immediate passage, and passed 56 to 32. It has now gone to the Senate.

HB 89 reducing the working hours of a fireman's work week from 73 1/2 to 63 1/2 hours, was taken off the table and passed by a vote of 52 to 46.

As a result of recent disclosures of the inadequacies of the law to deal with offenders, following the scandals in the highway right-of-way division and the conservation department, the House passed HB 392. As amended, the bill prohibits any employee or official in any State agency or department having control or jurisdiction over state-owned lands or other property, to

have any interest in or dealing in any lands during his service with the State and for a period of time thereafter. Conviction of a violation carries a mandatory maximum punishment by fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment up to 10 years, or both.

HB 282, amending the election law, and affecting Wayne county only, was taken from the table, and passed. This bill would, reorganize the county committee setup.

The House passed HB 384 without a dissenting vote. It provides for destruction of tax sales records and state land lists if same are at least 15 years old and have been microphotographed or filmed.

HB 385 ran into trouble again, this year, and was killed by a 40 to 41 vote. The bill would control and limit the sale of inflammable articles and fibers.

Once again, the House passed a bill (HB 51) calling for a constitutional convention. If adopted by the Senate, and approved by the Governor, the people will have a chance to vote this Fall on whether or not a constitutional convention for the purpose of re-writing the constitution should be ordered. Its fate in the Senate is uncertain.

HJR "F" (Conlin Plan) proposing an amendment to the constitution which, among other things, would revise the sales tax distribution as a fiscal reform by placing it on a current rather than the present retroactive basis, was finally passed after being amended to prohibit the Legislature from ever levying a sales tax in excess of 3 percent, the present rate, and also in allowing local units credit for 50 percent of the per capita disbursements of sales tax funds.

HB 13 which has been on the table since February 2, was taken from the table and decisively killed by a 27 to 57 vote. This was a speed limit law of 65 and 55 m.p.h. for daytime and night driving, respectively.

Retirement bills (HB 134 and HB 216) were passed increasing retirement benefits for teachers

and public school employees. HB 224, increasing legislators' pay \$1,100 a year from the present annual \$2,400 salary and \$1,000 for expenses, to \$3,500 salary and \$1,000 for expenses, came in for a stiff battle, but was passed and sent to the Senate. The pay increase will not affect the present members of the Legislature, since it does not become effective until Jan. 1, 1955. The members elected in the Fall election will profit by the increase if it becomes law.

HB 314, advocated by prison officials as a deterrent to prison riots and escapes, was passed without a dissenting vote. This measure would permit the new sentence to be in addition to, and not concurrent with their present sentence.

HB 404 requiring motor vehicles to be equipped with safety belts provoked quite a storm in the House, and was finally defeated by a vote of 11 to 71.

HB 249, permitting the sale of milk from automatic dispensing machines, and regulating the manner of handling, sterilizing, and licensing, was passed at a rather long debate by a vote of 66 to 19.

The House passed HB 432, transferring to the Court Administrator, the duties of the presiding circuit judge. Also passed was HB 431 authorizing the Court Administrator to call statewide and regional meetings of circuit, recorder, superior and probate judges.

Lewis Prenkert's Dairy Herd High In South Berrien

Twenty-four herds were tested during February in the South Berrien Dairy Herd Improvement Association, according to Charles Brage, tester. These herds averaged 778.8 pounds of milk with 31.38 pounds of butterfat. There were 60 cows that each produced more than 50 pounds of butterfat.

High cows in the association, according to age, were as follows: Under 3 years—Roy Payne's registered Holstein, "Bess", with

1,830 pounds of milk and 88 pounds of butterfat. Under 4 years—Lewis Prenkert's registered Holstein, "Fairie", with 1,820 pounds of milk and 82 pounds of butterfat. Under 5 years—C. T. Prindle's registered Holstein "Fairie", with 1,620 pounds of milk and 75 pounds of butterfat. Over 5 years—Russell Wright's grade Guernsey, "Bonnie", with 1,600 pounds of milk and 83 pounds of butterfat.

High herds, according to herd size, were as follows: Small Herd—Mrs. Geraldine Goodenough & Sons' herd of 10 registered and grade Holsteins with 530 pounds of milk and 20 pounds of butterfat.

Medium Herd—Prenkert's herd of 15 registered Holsteins with 1,128.9 pounds of milk and 49.93 pounds of butterfat.

Large Herd—Mortgag Hampton's herd of 22 registered Holsteins with 1,056.8 pounds of milk and 40.91 pounds of butterfat.
