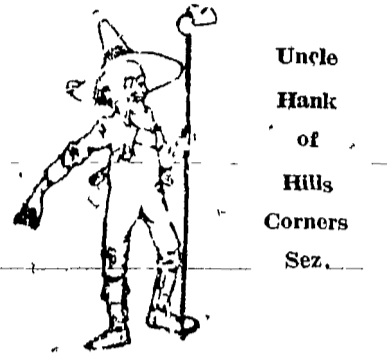

Bogart, Bergin, Henreid Are Stars of Hollywood Film Entertaining pulsating with drama and high human values is the keynote of the new Warner Bros. picture, "Casablanca," which will be shown at the Hollywood theatre Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, April 18-19-20.

The film, taking its title from the Moroccan city that figured so largely in the recent war news, has to do with refugees from war-torn Europe and their attempts to secure exit visas to the Americas. Starring in the film are Humphrey Bogart, Ingrid Bergman and Paul Henreid, who scored as Lettie Davis' leading man in "Now, Vovager." 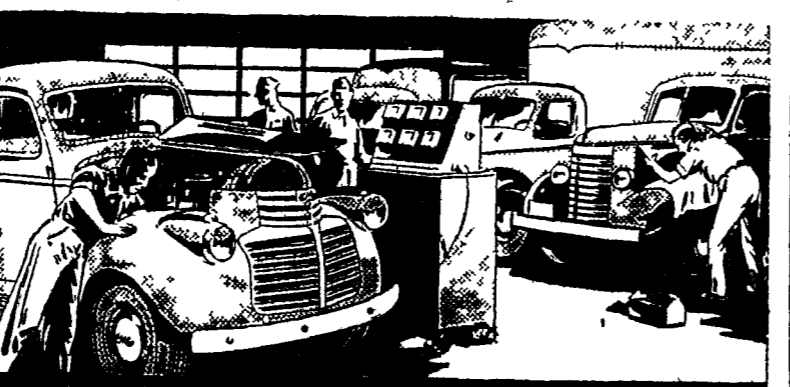

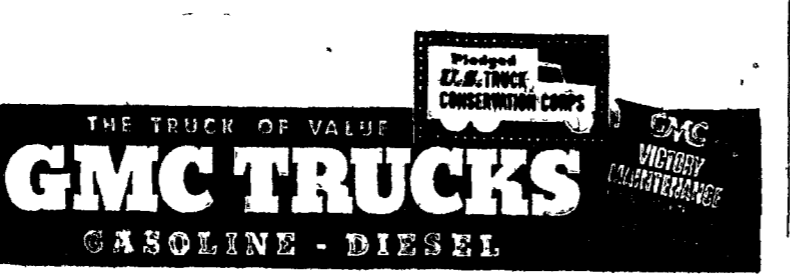

The Blessed Sacrament is carried in procession to a side altar decorated with flowers Throughout the day visitors come to offer prayers of thanksgiving to our Lord of the Eucharist

Good Friday is the saddest day of the church year It commemorates the death of the son of God The vestments are black, the altar is stripped There is no consecration in this mass The celebrant consumes the sacred host taken from the altar of reposition The cross is exposed for veneration Three times the celebrant sings, each in a higher tone "Behold the wood of the cross on which hung the Savior of the world"

Holy Saturday's ceremonies are the longest of the church year They are The blessing of Triple Candle (symbol of the Blessed Trinity) the Pascal Candle (a symbol of Christ) the insinuating of the five red nails, to mark the five wounds of Christ, the blessing of the Easter water, the reading of the 12 prophecies, the chanting of the litany and finally the mass of the feast

### Administrators Facing Removal For Negligence

That a number of administrators, executors, trustees and guardians of estates throughout Berrien county face removal was indicated today by Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield.

"With creditors, heirs, the attorney general's office and even the federal government interested in and frequently checking the assets and incomes of various estates, hardly a day passes but what the court is cited for not removing" these administrators who allow estates to remain open longer than the six months period now set by law," Judge Hatfield stated.

"In the past," the judge added, "I have taken this abuse for I did not want to run an executor's reputation by having his neighbors learn that it was necessary for the court to remove him from a position of public trust and confidence. Furthermore, once removal proceedings are completed against a guardian, trustee or administrator their bondsmen must make good for all property they failed to account for."

"When an administrator fails to dispose of sufficient assets to pay creditors and also neglects to file his final account so that the remainder of the estate can be distributed among the heirs, they frequently doubt his ability, judgment and motives," Judge Hatfield added. "On top of this, as both the state and federal branches of government are looking for inactivity and intangible taxes and there is always the danger of a lax administrator clouding the title of real estate it behooves an executor to close an estate in the shortest possible time."

"Only last week," the judge added, "one administrator was forced to pay an additional bond in the amount of eighty dollars simply because he took two weeks to close an estate that could have been closed in six months. Furthermore, unless executor, trustee or administrator while prices are high in order to pay the debts of deceased persons they may be forced to sacrifice such property at half its value once the war is over. Therefore, to secure every available dollar for widows and orphans the court must remove all negligent administrators and replace them with conscientious men who have the welfare of heirs and creditors alike at heart."

### 1500 Species of Mushrooms in Mich., Some Are Poisonous

It's top and now before you go picking mushrooms in Michigan.

Take the word of an authority: there are more than 1,500 kinds of mushrooms known in Michigan and a number of these are exceedingly poisonous.

Meat rationing has focused new attention on the mushroom as a possible source of food, explains E. A. Gussney, head of the Michigan State college botany department.

"Upset stomachs sometimes result from forgetting or not knowing facts about the mushroom. Even if edible, only 30 to 40 per cent of the dry weight of mushrooms is digestible, as contrasted to 80 per cent of the dry weight of beef. Pounds for pound, a person must eat by weight three times as much mushrooms as of beef to obtain the same nourishment. A person with digestive troubles should not overload a stomach with material which is two-thirds indigestible."

With those warnings of identification and weight limits out of the way, Dr. Bessey still claims the mushroom, properly selected and identified, is fun to gather, prepare for the table and to eat.

Earliest edible fungus in quantity appears in southern Michigan late in April or early in May when the holes or sponge mushrooms and the bell morels pop up in hardwood forests, woodlots or orchards.

When warmer weather arrives, the ink-cap mushrooms form in clusters around stumps or bases of trees. Later in the summer and early fall the Agaricus appears. From September to freezing weather the most common are the puff-balls.

Strangers to mushroom identification are offered help. Samples, carefully packed in toweling paper and padded to keep samples intact, can be sent to the Department of Botany, Michigan State college, East Lansing. An accompanying letter should describe where the mushrooms were found and with any information helpful in identification. For more than one sort, samples should have numbered tags.

### Pasteurization of Milk Easy Task For Farm Kitchen

Farm kitchen pasteurization of milk is an easy task and is protection against a long list of diseases according to the Michigan department of health.

It is only necessary to bring milk to the boiling point, cooling immediately afterwards, to destroy all disease-producing organisms, declares Dr. H. Allen Meyer, state health commissioner. "If there is objection to the flavor of milk that has been boiled, equal protection can be secured if it is heated to 160 degrees F in a double boiler, using an inexpensive dairy thermometer to make certain that degree of heat is reached.

"Undulant fever may be contracted by use of raw milk from cows that have 'Lansing' disease. Typhoid and diphtheria, severe throat infections and other complaints may result from the use of raw milk."

### Mich. State College Recommends Bait to Kill Cutworms

Damage from cutworms to early garden crops can be prevented by distributing poison bait over the prepared ground two or three evenings before seeding or setting transplants.

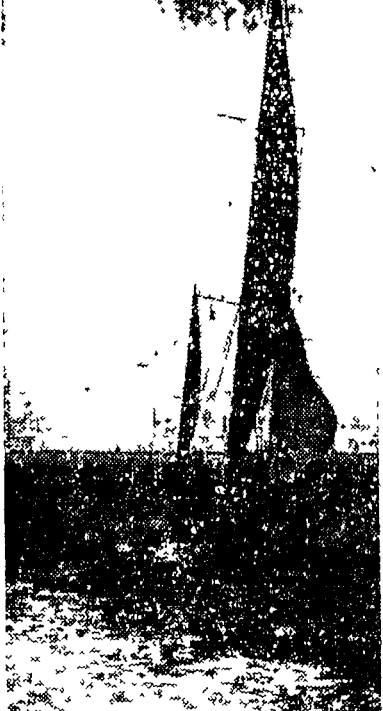
Cutworms winter as half-grown caterpillars in protected places. They require wild food and each individual spends most of the night cutting down plants for consumption the following evening. Having typical caterpillar appetites these cutworms usually cut down several times the amount of food they naturally require. Cutworms are active at night and for best results the poison bait should be spread late in the afternoon or early evening.

Sodium fluosilicate is now substituted for Paris green or white arsenic as a poison for cutworms, reports Prof. E. I. McDaniels at Michigan State college. The fluosilicate is used in the same proportion as suggested for Paris green or white arsenic. It is poisonous to higher animals and the same precautions must be observed in keeping this away from livestock as suggested for the arsenicals.

A very satisfactory bait can be made as follows: Bran, 5 pounds, sodium fluosilicate 4 ounces, molasses one pint, water to moisten. One orange or lemon, peel and all, finely chopped, adds to the attractiveness of the bait. Mix the molasses and the poison with two or three pints of water and add to the bran. Stir thoroughly and add enough water to make a thick batter. Ten pounds of bait is usually recommended for a quarter of an acre of land, or one pound of the dried bait treats a garden plot of 40 by 50 feet for one application.

This same bait is effective to slugs and millipedes, when placed in protected places such as under boards or in crevices.

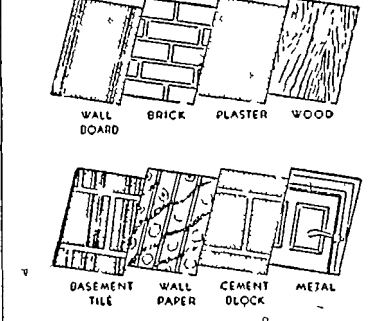

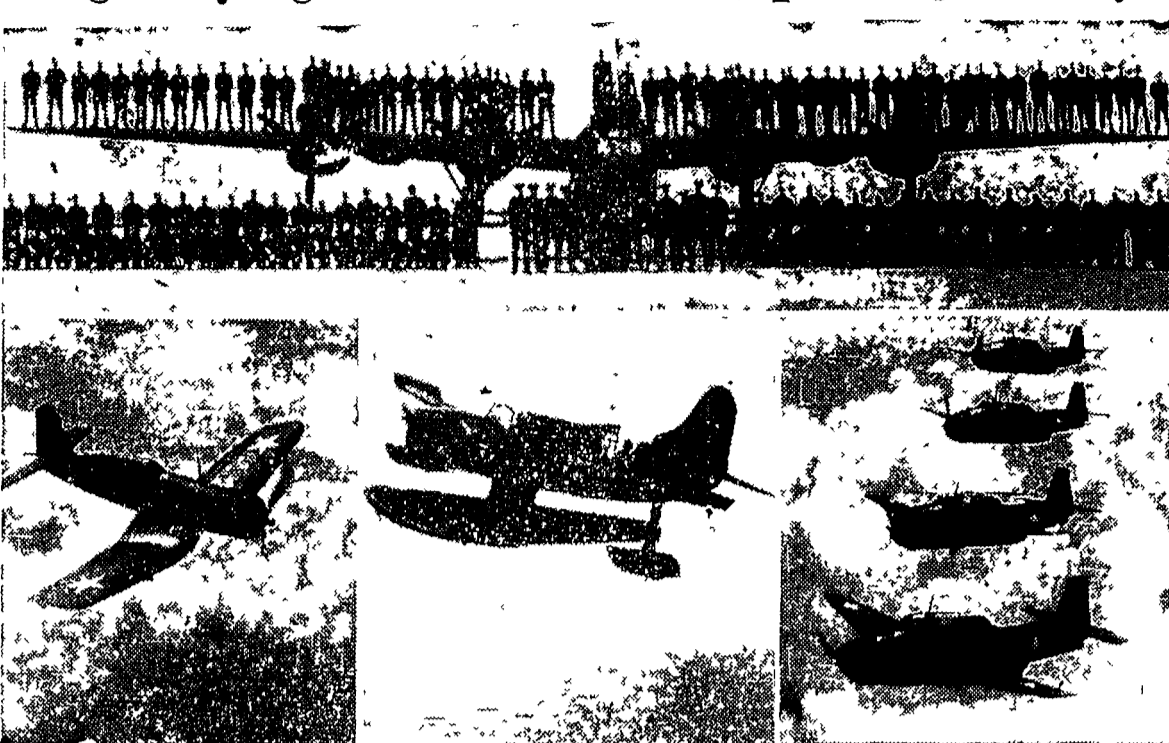
