

Sixteen Drivers Get Summons In Traffic

Sixteen area motorists were apprehended by Buchanan city police during the last week for traffic offenses on the city's streets.

Petitions In; Check Underway

The second phase of a Chamber of Commerce sponsored community development plan was put into effect this week with the filing of 833 signatures on petitions calling for the Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages in Buchanan.

Paul W. DeVos, chairman of the Chamber's Sunday Sales committee, filed the petitions with Asst. City Clerk Mrs. John Cline Friday at City Hall. Only 565 signatures are required by law in order to place the question of Sunday sales on the November ballot.

In preparing their signature drive, DeVos and his committee met with interested parties in the community, including the Buchanan Ministerial association, to discuss their aims and goals. DeVos said reaction to the proposal was "mixed". The question, as it will appear on the November ballot, is "Shall the sale of beer and wine within the City of Buchanan between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight on Sunday be prohibited?"


Voters in favor of allowing Sunday sales must vote "No" in order to reflect their wishes. City Clerk-Treasurer Raymond T. Suabedissen is now examining the submitted petitions to insure that all signers are qualified and registered electors, residing in the city. Deadline for filing the question was Tuesday.

Flames Destroy Hanover Barn

Fire destroyed a barn, a loft full of hay and farm machinery at the Robert Hanover farm early Tuesday morning, according to Charles Wesner, chief of the Buchanan Township Fire department.

Responding to the call, received shortly after 1 a.m., firemen were unable to save the barn or its contents after more than 3,000 bales of first cutting hay were fired by what Wesner believed to be faulty wiring.

The Hanover farm is located at Rt. 2, Main Street road, just south of the Glendora road. Hanover said two tractors, one a diesel, a conveyor, milking equipment and other miscellaneous equipment were lost in the blaze as well as the full barn of hay. Hay from the season's second cutting lay in the field ready for baling and storage at the time of the blaze.

About 38 head of mixed stock were in the barn at the time the blaze is believed to have begun, but a quick check while firemen were at the scene indicated that all the cattle were out of the barn. A horse, owned by Hanover's daughter, was removed from the barn by firemen who arrived to quell the blaze.

A self-propelled combine, parked next to the barn, was pulled away after firemen arrived, but damage to belts and possibly wiring is suspected as a result of the intense heat. No official estimate of damage was given by Chief Wesner but observers at the scene estimated damage would exceed \$15,000.

'68 Community Fund Goal Set At \$37,543

A campaign goal of \$37,543.00 was set by the Board of Directors of the Buchanan Community Fund for the 1968 drive at a meeting held Tuesday, Aug. 27 in the Chamber of Commerce office.

This year's solicitation begins Tuesday, Oct. 1 and will continue thru Tuesday, Oct. 15, according to Ron Church, '68 campaign chairman and manager of the Buchanan Farmers Credit Union.

Taking the responsibilities of co-chairman with Church is Joe Garbert, owner-manager of Sexton's Furniture company. "The new goal represents an increase of less than two percent over 1967's mark of \$36,858.00," said Church.

He pointed out that twelve area agencies are served directly thru the Buchanan Community Fund and more than 35 state-wide agencies receive funds thru the Michigan United Fund, of which the Buchanan drive is a member.

Of the twelve agencies included in this year's drive, five are community service groups, such as Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts and others, five represent the social service needs of the community, such as Family Counseling and the School for Exceptional Children; and two are health oriented agencies, such as the Berrien County Cancer Service.

Each agency receiving monies from the local Community Fund is carefully screened by an allocation and budget committee within the Fund, headed this year by Elder Jack Rees. The budget request of at least one agency was denied as a result of scrutiny of its request by this committee. Community service agencies and the amounts they will receive after '68's successful campaign. See FUND, Page 5

New Boating Hours Set For Clear Lake

Sanitary Violations May Close Camp Sura

Officials of the Chicago Board of Jewish Education and administrators of Camp Sura, located on E Clear Lake road, were threatened with a close-down of camping activities for the 1969 season unless 45 violations uncovered by the Berrien County Health department are corrected.

The violations range from rusted mixing bowls being used in the camp's grill and baking room to two sewage systems which have failed with sewage being discharged onto the ground surface within the camp's limits, according to a department report.

A report to the Chicago school officials, written earlier in August and made public at Tuesday evening's meeting of the Buchanan township board meeting, called on the camp authorities to make immediate corrections or face the possibility of no camp at the site in 1969.

In a meeting with Dr. Jerome D. White of the Chicago Board of Jewish Education, Earle H. Olsen, chief environmentalist of the Health department's Environmental Health division, received assurances that the violations would be corrected immediately and steps would be taken to correct the serious sewage problems at the site.

However, in his report, Olsen noted "that many of the items in this report were noted and reported in previous reports, but that very little has been done to correct the problems."

Olsen pointed to a request, filed by letter, to provide the local health department with a drawing that would show the cabins, water supply system and sewage disposal system. "This was not done," said Olsen, "and now we find that two sewage systems have failed and sewage is being discharged onto the ground surface."

"One of these systems is polluting the lake and the swimming beach," he noted.

Olsen told the Record Wednesday morning, "We expect to take every action possible to withhold a camp license from Camp Sura for 1969, if no action is taken on the violations noted in our report. We have contacted the appropriate agencies in Lansing and we expect their full cooperation," he added.

Robert Bachman Home Is Burned

Bertrand township firemen were called to the Robert Bachman home, 3335 W. Bertrand Rd., Thursday morning shortly before 10:30 after a passerby noticed smoke coming from the home.

Bertrand Fire Chief Adam Kuntz said the kitchen, a portion of the dining room, the bathroom and a utility room were severely damaged by the blaze which, he said, may have smoldered for as long as three hours before firemen were summoned.

Bachman, who was called home from his job at Clark Equipment company in Buchanan, said he and his wife, Ann, had left home at about 8:30 a.m. and all was secure at that time. Kuntz said the probable cause of the blaze was a short circuit in the house's electrical system. He would place no estimate on damage.

Bachman was in the process of adding a room to the home before the fire.

The fire chief said the fire was reported by Mrs. Stanley Novak whose home at 3350 W. Bertrand Rd., is across the road from the Bachman house, after a passing motorist stopped to tell her of seeing smoke rolling from the dwelling.

Two Emergencies

Two emergencies involving Buchanan area residents were reported from Pawating hospital during the past week.

Paul Morgan, 4, son of John Morgan of Route 1, was treated Aug. 27 for hornet stings all over legs, arms, head, and back.

Billy Dennison of River road was treated and admitted Aug. 29 for possible concussion resulting from a two-car accident at Pokagon and Smith roads.

The Buchanan Township board approved recommendations of the Michigan Department of Conservation, Tuesday night, regarding limiting of hours for high speed boating on Clear Lake.

The majority of the 24 property owners present at a scheduled hearing favored the passage of the recommendations. There was some opposition to the decision as Supervisor Ivan Price gave everyone a chance to be heard during the meeting. Among the comments heard were "We live in Chicago and should have been notified of the meeting" . . . "The prime time was selected" . . . "It is discriminatory" . . . "Fishermen can fish all the time".

Robert Sawyer, chairman of the township boating committee, stated that there are 36 lakes in the state that have the same boating hours and that the township was being consistent by having the same hours so as to avoid confusion. Opposition to the hours came mainly from out-of-state people who live in another time zone.

The recommendation of the department reads:

"On the waters of Clear Lake, Buchanan township, Berrien county, State of Michigan, no operator of any motor boat, during the period from 6:30 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. of the following day, shall:

(a) operate such motor boat at high speed, which means a speed at or above which the boat reaches a planing condition, or

(b) have in tow or otherwise assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, water sled, surf boat or other similar contrivances."

Effective in 30 Days

The final decision was the outgrowth of numerous complaints from fishermen that high-speed boating was dangerous on a lake the size of Clear Lake. The Department of Conservation conducted an investigation of the allegations and held a hearing on August 18 to seek comments from citizens regarding the complaints. The new hours will take effect in 30 days.

Supervisor Price speaking on the Clear Lake situation stated, "If this doesn't help maybe there will have to be more regulations."

Set Registration Hours

The Buchanan township hall will be open during special hours for the purpose of voter registration for the November election.

It was decided by the board that in addition to the regular hours of Tuesday and Friday from 1 to 5 p.m. that the township hall would be open September 27, 1 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m., September 28, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and October 4, last day of registration, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

If these hours are not convenient for a person to register other arrangements may be made. See TOWNSHIP, Page 5

During a recent petition drive in the city, solicitors found an unusually high number of persons who were not registered voters.

With citizens of many countries throughout the world disenfranchised by political chicanery, it does not seem plausible to the Record that an American would deny himself the right to vote merely because he was not registered.

There are less than 30 days remaining before registrations close for the November general election. If you expect to vote in that election, you must:


1. Be a U.S. citizen.
2. Be 21 years old.
3. Be a resident of the State of Michigan for six months.
4. Be a resident of Buchanan (or the governmental unit in which you live) for thirty days.

If you have not voted within the last two years, your registration may have been suspended and you should check with the City Clerk at your earliest convenience.

Persons who have just moved to Buchanan from another state (within the last six months) may, under special circumstances, vote for President and Vice President and should contact the City Clerk for full details.

Registration deadline for the November election is 8:00 p.m. Friday, Oct. 4.



"Togetherness" Reward From Weaving Labors

The scene is classic. Children all trundled off into their beds for the night. . . the small room off the parlor shuttered against the gloom. . . warm yellow light mingling with man and wife shadows upon the wall. . . the scratch of pen and gentle clatter of the weaver's loom the only sounds.

A pioneer homestead of the last century, you say?

Wrong. The scene is one of "togetherness", 1968 style. Some hundred thousand TV commercials removed from an evening at home as it was a few years ago. Then, almost every household was prey to the mindless hypnosis of the blue light from the screen in the corner, night after night.

Nowadays however, the trend is to DO something with those leisure hours, creative things that feed the soul and plump the pride.

The age-old scene pictured above was found at 107 Clark St., where, in the thoroughly modern office-den of the Owen Rifenberg home Mrs. Rifenberg spends many fruitful hours engrossed in the ancient art of weaving, while her husband works or reads at his desk.

The scene could be repeated in countless homes, except that even in this new age of arts and crafts, the hobby of weaving cloth is a rarity, (perhaps because one look at the hundreds of strings and moving parts of the weaver's loom is enough to send most "doers" scampering back to their embroidery hoops).

A Maze That Amazes
Weaving is not at all like "knit two purl two", and the two recognizable words "warp" and "weft" amount to just no knowledge at all. In fact, it must be admitted that for a writer who never advanced in needlework beyond four nails in an empty thread spool, an interview with Mrs. Rifenberg was downright embarrassing. . . mostly just gripped pencil, blank paper, and open mouth.

Nevertheless, some phrases involved in the process of weaving were eventually salvaged and scribbled in a semblance of order, and it goes a little like this: The thread or yarn is first wound upon a warping board, then transferred and arranged

on the back beam of the loom, tightened onto rollers, ends threaded through the heddles (hundreds of those) in a pattern, and the heddles fastened to wooden harnesses which control the pattern. The reed is a fine grill through which the warp is passed, controlling the number of threads per inch, and when the floor pedals (as on a pipe organ) are depressed, the harnesses raise the shed and the shuttle is "thrown" through, and . . . (here the writer flounders) . . . some kind of stick on the strings is moved back to tamp the threads into place and . . . voila! Cloth!

It is easy to see why the fraternity (or is it sorority?) of weavers is small and exclusive in our society, and not for the witless, the impatient, or the all-thumbers.

An easy acquaintance with mathematics is also needed. For a current project now on a loom, Charlotte (Dodie) Rifenberg explained that she needed 30 inches of fabric at 16 threads per inch (the number

of threads per inch is dependent upon the weight of the yarn) and for the chosen pattern had wound four threads at a time upon the loom totaling 480 threads. . . and all this, just getting ready to start the actual weaving!

Fruit of the Loom

In August, "Dodie" Rifenberg submitted her most recent and most accomplished work for display during an arts and crafts exhibit at Fernwood. Her ambitious and beautifully crafted project was a three-quarter length cape of heavy wool in a brown and black houndstooth check design. The cape is lined and interlined and designed with deep back pleats and half-belt, and she has enough of the hand-woven fabric left to sew a matching skirt for a complete, smartly-styled ensemble. At present, one of her two looms holds the "makings for a lightweight woolen blouse to be worn with the suit.

The material for the cape and skirt was completed in about six weeks of free time spent at

the loom, and the result was nine yards of perfectly patterned, rich woolen cloth about 29 inches wide. The narrow width of cloth coming off the loom creates some difficulty in using clothing patterns, which are designed for use with commercially woven fabrics not less than 36 inches wide.

"But the hardest part of all," says Dodie Rifenberg, "comes when you pick up the scissors and slice into that material that you have slaved over for so long. That takes real courage!"

In displaying her cape, Mrs. Rifenberg was joined by Buchanan's only other current weaver, Mrs. M. J. McKinnon, who exhibited a full-length coat of blue English tweed, woven from yarn she had purchased in Nassau. Mrs. McKinnon has been a devotee to the art of weaving for 18 years, and her talents at the loom are widely acclaimed.

The Long and Short

"Dodie" Rifenberg began weaving about three years ago, when she finally succumbed to the magic of fabrics coming off the loom belonging to her mother, Mrs. Edwin T. Ross. Mrs. Ross had been a weaver for a number of years, and was a

member of the Niles Weavers club, which draws its uncommon membership from a wide area. (Mrs. McKinnon is a member of this group, which is affiliated with the Michigan Hand Weavers Association, and is presently secretary of the area club).

The first step for Mrs. Rifenberg was the purchase of a 20-inch floor loom, and her only help at the beginning came from her mother, who deftly threaded the new loom for the initial project, and then left to vacation in Arizona. Whether or not the unusual length of the work was directly related to the length of the vacation, what eventually emerged from the loom was a full 10 yards of colorful staid carpeting. . . pretty and useful enough so that the younger woman was irrevocably 'bitten by the bug'.

A series of lessons, given by Mrs. Fred Henderson of Niles, followed the new weaver's first success at the loom; and since then there have been many more lessons, resulting in increasingly intricate hand-loomed items—such as scarves, hats, and place mats, all crafted in varying textures and yarns, and finally culminating in the cape

and skirt suit ensemble. The material for the latter was turned out on a recently acquired, and larger, floor loom.

In the Owen Rifenberg home, for instance, what started out to be "hubby's" very own den soon became a his-and-hers kind of place. . . and lately more "hers" than "his", as "his" desk was squeezed into a corner to make room for that second, larger floor loom.

This is a small pitfall, however, and Owen Rifenberg is indeed quite cheerful about sitting upon, instead of in front of, his desk. In fact, he has reacted with more pride than pique to his wife's unique pastime, because the results of her three year adventure into the art of weaving have been mutually rewarding.

After all, while she is busily weaving rugs and clothing in "his" den, he can feel perfectly free to sand off a gun rack or the fishing files in "her" kitchen

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is one of a series of public service articles explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

A common complaint of many citizens relates to the cancellation or non renewal of automobile liability insurance policies. What is surprising is that few citizens are aware of the many safeguards against arbitrary cancellation of automobile liability policies

The legislature in 1966 passed the automobile cancellation act, which applies to all automobile liability policies. This law provides that policies may be canceled only for reasons specified in the act.

Among the reasons for cancellation are the filing of a false application for insurance, filing of a false claim, physical disability, drunk driving, and a seriously defective motor vehicle. The state insurance department requires an insurance company to indicate which of the statutory reasons it is relying upon when canceling a policy. If the reasons do not fulfill the statutory requirements, the cancellation can be set aside.

An insured driver wishing to contest the grounds of cancellation must write the Department of Insurance within seven days after the date of postmark of the notice of cancellation to request a hearing. A filing fee of \$15 must be included with the request. A hearing on the validity of the cancellation will be held within ten days after the Department receives the notice of appeal from the insured driver.

An employee of the Insurance department will conduct the hearing. The insured driver may be represented by an attorney if he so chooses. Upon a successful appeal, the policy of insurance will be reinstated and the \$15 filing fee returned.

An insurance company has the right to refuse to renew a policy without specifying a reason and without the right of appeal on the insured's part, by giving 20 days notice of such refusal. Furthermore, cancellations due to nonpayment of premiums are outside the scope of the law, such cancellations are not subject to appeal.

Also within the first 55 days of coverage, newly issued policies of liability insurance may be canceled without fulfilling one of the statutory reasons and without a right of appeal.

A few of the larger insurance companies have begun to issue guaranteed renewable policies which go much further than our statute in protecting the public. In these policies the insured is guaranteed insurance for a given period - usually 3 or 5 years - and the companies severely limit their own right to cancel. This is definitely a step forward and I would like to see changes in the present law which would reflect this progress.

Specifically, the automobile insurance cancellation law could be strengthened by requiring the same reasons for non-renewal of a policy as are required for cancellation. If you agree with my position, contact your state legislator. Unless he hears from you, he must assume that the people he represents are satisfied with the law as it now stands.


