Anderson Nabbed By Calif. Police After Reckless Spree of Forgery

Combination Of Rain, Ice, Adds To Traffic Problem

1.29 Inches Of Rainfall Recorded Here Monday And Tuesday

Buchanan's White Christmas has been reduced by three days of ragged residue of gray sooty snow as the Record went to press yesterday, with an imminent threat of sudden change to freezing rain or sleet held out by the rapid weather prospects.

Following last Thursday with a 23 high and a low of -5, and a Friday morning with a high of 9 above, the mercury hitched up to a thawing 33 that afternoon. Saturday was a moderate high of 32 and a low of 23. The 7 a. m. power plant boys had a two-day holiday including New Year's (lucky dogs) and had no records for those days. However melting temperatures continued and Tuesday registered a sultry high of 40 and a low of 35. Higher thawing temperatures and a rain which set in Monday and continued until today took the snow fast.

A rainfall of .63 inches was recorded here Monday and a fall of .66 inches Tuesday, totaling 1.29 inches or over half the January normal of 2.44 inches. Traffic was more difficult than ever for the time being as the rain washed down to the packed ice on both paved and on gravelled country roads, which were the most difficult.

At 1:30 p.m. yesterday the tested thermometer at the Wisner Drug store registered 41 above!

Again the same performance was repeated when Jimmie had to leave them again, this time in front of the Spatta home on West Front street. Jimmie has had the sanction of the dog warden to have his dog accompany him, as in the winter he starts from home soon after 6 a. m. while it is still dark and he feels better when the dog is along. He is always "under control" anyway.

Darcy is about 8 1/2 years old, a medium size black dog with only a small strip of white like a necktie on his chest. Also he is grizzling a little about the chops on account of age. He was born on the farm of Atty Bill Desenberg's father-in-law, Arthur C. Fietler, Arden, Mich. One day Jimmy and the Desenberg store and remarked to Bill that he had a three-year-old pup that would like a pup on his next trip to St. Joe Bill stopped at the Hetlia farm and picked up Darcy, a puppy five or six weeks old and just weaned, bringing him to the Sarver home.

Mrs. Sarver immediately delivered an emphatic, "no!" Then she looked again at the tiny fragment of amiable caninism and changed to a weak "yes." Then she and the whole family fell in love with him. Dawn would wear her regulation straw hat and specs and have two saddle bags to swan across her to take the money. She would go to a young man and beg. It was a very painless way of extracting money from people. She also served the South Bend police in traffic safety drives guiding people across the streets.

Darcy's mother was one of two black she-pups born in one litter to Dawn and named Kate and Duplicate. Which was Darcy's mother is not now known, but we'll say it was Duplicate. Darcy, gone, this is getting to be some dog story!

Anyway the whole Sarver family fell in love with Darcy and vice-versa. For a time they disputed Jimmy's sole ownership, but after he got to peddling papers he cleared that up by buying Darcy's license with his own money. A dog's life is after all a dog's life and Darcy had a couple of narrow squeaks en route to the ripe age of 8 1/2 years. Once he was fed some glass by a dog hater and the vet said he had one chance in a hundred to live, but the next morning he dragged himself to his feet and started off with Jimmy to school. Another time an auto ran over the side of his head, taking some hair off.

"He is the most obedient thing you ever saw," remarked Mrs. Sarver. "I only wish the children minded as well. If I look out the window and see him starting away from the yard all I have to do is to rap on the glass and he turns right around, and comes back." Cashes 2 Checks In Bakersfield, Signs Own Name

Is Now Held To Answer For California Forgeries

Sanford Anderson, who left Buchanan Saturday, Nov. 25, after cashing over 20 forged checks drawn against his employer in Niles and Buchanan business places for an aggregate of over \$2,000, came to the end of the get-away trail Saturday, Dec. 30, just five weeks later, following a second check-forging spurge of almost incredible recklessness.

His capture was the immediate result of having cashed two checks, one for \$40 and one for \$400, both signed in his own name, at a hotel in Bakersfield, Calif. The two checks, drawn on Roll-O-Hitch funds in Buchanan, were received by the Union State Bank on Friday, Dec. 29. Local police were notified and Chief Jack Kiugh wired the police at Bakersfield. A return wire was received by Kiugh at 2:25 p. m. Saturday, stating that Anderson was in custody.

The first clue to his whereabouts was received on Dec. 2, only a week after his flight from Buchanan, when a local resident received a letter stating that he would be in a Los Angeles hotel for three days Dec. 10-11-12. The receiver of the letter immediately turned it over to the police here and a wire was sent to the police at Los Angeles. They planted a representative in the hotel, but Anderson did not appear.

On Dec. 16, the Union State Bank of Buchanan received checks in the sums of \$115, \$55 and \$110, which he had cashed at Las Vegas, Nev. These checks were signed with the name Morris Katz. Anderson had registered at six leading hotels in Las Vegas, signing his own name on the register at each place. He had cashed the three checks at three of these hotels, and had left checks which were not cashed at two others.

The police of Las Vegas were so close on his trail that they found a part of his clothing in one hotel, to which he did not return.

On Dec. 28 the local bank again received two checks for \$212 and \$115, cashed in Los Angeles, and again on Dec. 29 another check for \$115 cashed in Los Angeles and the two cashed in Bakersfield. Of the three forgeries cashed in Los Angeles two were signed with the name of H. L. Vickerman and one with the name of Howell Harrison. The forgeries cashed in Bakersfield were signed with his own name, as previously mentioned.

The Bakersfield chief of police stated that he would be held there for prosecution for the forgeries cashed in that city. If he is sent to prison from there Buchanan warrants will be sent to the prison to be served when his term expires when he will be returned to Buchanan.

Miniature Of Old Hollywood Church, Holiday Cards Forming Stained Glass Windows

One of the most unique holiday decorations in a private home in Buchanan was the small replica of a pioneer Methodist church made by Chet Woolley in his apartment at the home of Mrs. E. L. Hamilton, 105 Maple Court.

The church which Woolley reproduced faithfully stood at the cross-road settlement of Hollywood seven miles southeast of St. Joseph, and he had attended it as a boy. Later the congregation attended at St. Joseph and the old church was torn down. Woolley made use of a pastboard carton to reproduce the lines and architecture of the old church. It was about 2 1/2 feet long, 1 1/2 feet wide, and about three feet high to the top of the steeple.

He cut out the windows and doors with a stencil knife and cut small strips for casings which were glued about the openings. The walls were painted white and the roof green. His original address to the structure consisted of a beautiful old Christmas card of a religious nature which fitted into the windows, and were covered with cell-phane to create the illusion of glass. Into a circular window above the front entrance was fitted a miniature of the famous rose window in Notre Dame cathedral in Paris. A light installed in the inside lighted up the windows at night.

The church stood on a table in the front living room window, and hidden beneath the table was installed a record player on which sacred Christmas music was played creating the illusion of music coming from the church. The table on which the church was based was covered with white cotton, sprinkled with artificial snow, and the roof of the building was similarly decorated.

Committal Service For 3-Year-Old Son Of William Thompson

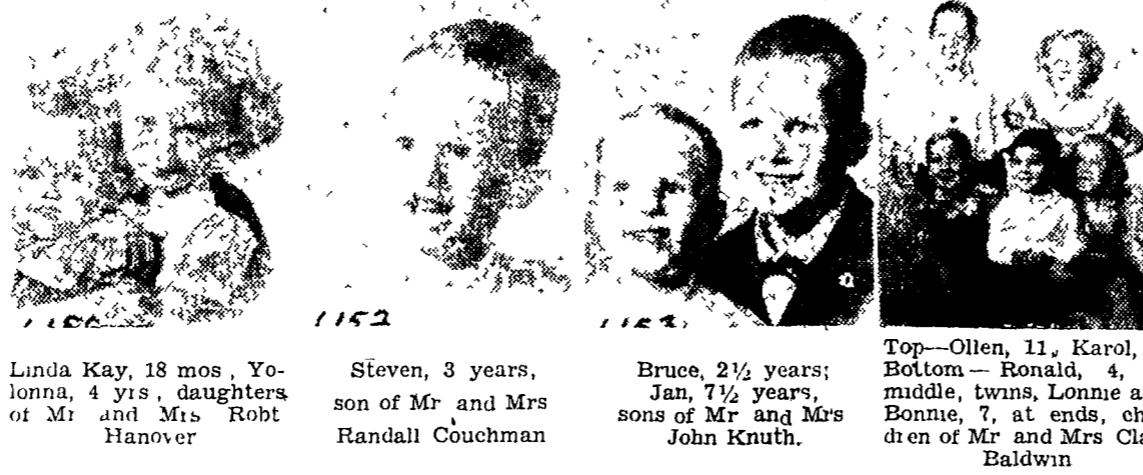

The Story of Buchanan

This is the beginning of an endeavor not only to tell but to explain the story of our town, Buchanan, the part of America in which we live and consequently the part we know best, and to which we are the most bound by ties of love, understanding and allegiance.

History begins at home. We cannot have a clear understanding of the history of our own country until we understand the part which our own community played for the United States. It is merely the sum of many thousands of such communities, large and small. And the community of ours is one of the living and indivisible parts of a living nation. It is our part of the nation and if we know the story of both the part and the whole we shall better understand both. Such an understanding will make both the history of America and of our community more interesting, more vivid. It should help us to be better citizens, prouder of our community, prouder of our land.

If we told only the story of Buchanan, without relation to its setting in the story of the United States, it would be much shorter. Buchanan and its surrounding community has never been the scene of any great events. No great battles have ever been fought here, leaving ruin behind. No great historic events of any other kind occurred here, to cover pages of the history of the nation and to be commemorated by monuments.

But when we understand that the story of our town has been a living part of a very great story, the development and expansion of the United States, it will have a significance it could not have in itself alone.

For there was a long build-up of events before it became possible that a town could be established here in the tradition of American freedom. Great international wars in which England, France and Spain were leading actors were first fought to decide which should have colonial title to the lands on which are now established the Middle Western states of the United States. When England finally came through as the title-holder, another great war, the American Revolution, had to be fought to decide whether the land should remain a part of colonial England or become a nation in its own right. And after the Thirteen Colonies which fought that Revolution emerged a free country, another bloody struggle, the War of 1812, was fought before American title was firmly established to that part of the United States that is now Michigan. While that last war was being fought, we had also to battle the alliance of Indian tribes under the famous chief, Tecumseh, to decide whether we or the Indians should have the control of that part of our country north of the Ohio river and east of the Mississippi.

When the wars, those giant bulldozers of history, had removed the obstructions and cleared the site for settlements, great peaceful decisions must be made. Seven of the original Thirteen Colonies claimed that their boundaries extended west to the Pacific by right of the charter grants which they originally received from the kings of England. Had those claims been acknowledged by the new nation, Buchanan might now be in Connecticut and St. Joseph in Massachusetts, the westward extension of the dividing line running through in the vicinity of Soles.

If that had happened the western lands would have been sold to speculators to secure income for those states. Great leaders decided otherwise, and all the claimants gave up their rights to the nation. The congress of the Confederation of States, before

Signs Favoring Good Farm Year About Buchanan

Farmers of the Buchanan district anticipate a fairly prosperous year, given reasonably good crops, states Robert Koenigshof, Buchanan Co-ops manager.

General indications point to a higher level of prices for farm products. It is already certain that the prices of equipment and other supplies bought by the farmers will be higher. The winter has thus far been very favorable for the wheat crop, the continuous snow blanket and continuous cold favoring survival. Nearly all the wheat entered the winter in good condition, with the exception of late plantings, some of which were ragged.

The year 1950 was a reasonably good year, with a yield somewhat lower than the record year of 1949 being offset by better prices. The corn yield was well below that of 1949, although up to the 10-year average. These lower yields were offset by better prices, and the same was true for wheat. On the other hand there was an abundant clover seed crop the country over and the supply is now in excess of demand. Wholesale houses are full, the market is flooded and the price down.

Price, which is not so important as it is up-country, is the dark spot in the crop picture. Many peach orchards have been damaged and it is feared that apples may also have suffered by the mercury plunges to from 6 to 10 below in this vicinity on Nov. 24.
