Question Is Spring Here Or Are Robins Fooled?

How smart are the birds in guessing when spring will come? Not a bit smarter than people, says an English bird student who is a staff writer for the Christian Science Monitor.

Birds make wrong guesses, stick their necks out and get into trouble, just like people. In recent weeks, he noted, an American robin landed on an island just off the coast of Devonshire, England. The distance required 44 hours of steady flight as a robin's usual speed limit. Did he start out for England, or was he just another "Wrong-Way" Corrigan, who started to fly from New York to California and landed in Ireland?

There's been reports of robins lately, and from Earl Dunbar in the Coveny district there came a report last week of a flock of several hundred blackbirds, with many redwings among them during the "June" in February weather that prevailed during the latter part of the shortest month.

Now comes a report from James Best, who certainly dwells right in the middle of nature in his home set several hundred yards west of the Mayflower road. Jim has not only had robins as guests for several weeks—he has heard and seen several bluebirds. The bluebird used to be considered the certain sign. Decades ago when workmen used to be birds of passage we got the story from Ed Pascoe, superintendent of a Clark Equipment department many years, that one of the employees would come in on a spring morning at the start of the daily shift with the announcement: "I seen a blue bird," whereon all the boys threw their caps up and if they came down they quit and went after another job.

Here Is The Where-With For The Can-Do of The City Workers



This article is the first of a series designed to describe the progress effected by the commission-manager form of government during its nearly five years of operation.

The basic functions of the two arms of the administration are: The commission names a city manager who is to be their servant in the four roles of executive officer, advisor, consultant, and fact finder. The basis of fact and advice which he provides enables the commission to more competently make their decisions and form their policies. If the commission approves a major project involving labor, the city manager takes over with powers similar to those of an industrial plant manager, directing the details of execution. In the latter role the manager has practically complete authority, subject of course to intervention by the commission if they see fit.

The provision of a manager solves the most perplexing problem of administration under the old commission form of government. The commissions elected previously included many able men who realized what needed to be done. However they were too

heavily burdened with their own business or work to find all the facts bearing on a project, or organize it on a sound basis, and carry it through. The experience they acquired in relatively short periods in office ended when they went out. There was no provision for carry-through.

It became increasingly evident during the World War II years that they needed a man with a background of experience in city administration who would assemble the necessary basis of fact, integrate it into a plan, and carry it through when given the green light by the commission.

That problem was solved in 1949 by the adoption of the commission-manager plan and the appointment of a city manager. Both successive managers had experience in the design of public works, including surveying, which relieved the city of heavy engineering charges. The manager in turn developed a Department of Public Works, which united practically all labor employed by the city under a capable head. This department has since taken care of numerous projects which previously had required a contractor, at a great savings to

the city. In addition it has performed with much greater dispatch many other functions which cannot be done satisfactorily by contract, such as snow removal, maintenance and emergency work. The remainder of this article will deal with the organization, equipment, achievement and knowledge of this department, better known as the D. P. W.

Department of Public Works
With approximately the same number of workers as in 1948, before the overall city labor organization was made, the D. P. W. has multiplied its capacity for performance, and also its ability to handle projects which would have been beyond the powers of city workers six years ago. Their work is the more effective because it follows long-range plans which have been integrated in a whole the needs of the city.

The D. P. W.'s ability to perform has been multiplied by the purchase of mechanical equipment which replaced slow and expensive hand labor. No longer do city employees clean streets with a broom and a hand cart, open concrete pavements at a vast expenditure of time with mallets and crowbars, or remove snow by

adding on armies of shovelers. These methods were comparable to the hand methods of the pioneer economy, cutting grain by scythe, hewing square beams from logs with an axe. The present method has two great advantages. It is cheaper and it is quicker, adding much to public convenience.

The present D. P. W. force averages 12 men. Of this number from 3 to 4 are employed in 6-day work handling garbage. This leaves from 8 to 9 men to carry on general work. During the past five years this force has installed four miles of water mains, and 16 miles of street sealing. The sealing nearly covers all of the unpaved streets of Buchanan. The process imposes a waterproof seal over the former road base of mixed dirt and oil, contributing very materially to the upkeep of good streets, which before had been continually breaking up in wet weather.

Previously both the laying of the mains and the sealing of the streets would have been let out to contractors at greatly increased costs. Their work required an increase

in equipment. In 1948 the city owned five pieces of equipment—three trucks and two small tractors, the whole valued at about \$5,000. Today the D. P. W. works with motorized equipment valued at from \$55,000 to \$60,000.

Seen in the accompanying pictures, the main items of equipment are the following:

ABOVE street sweeper bought two years ago, roller for processing pavements in sealing programs, etc., and loader with great variety of uses; general purpose tractor and sidewalk snow-plow, also used in moving and sweeping with special coarse broom before seal-coating, combination trencher and end-loader for excavating water mains and underground installations, three dump trucks.

BELOW, dump truck, pick-up truck with hydraulic ram packer for handling garbage, water department service truck, which is also used with special equipment for "fogging" in summer to control flies, distributor for spreading oil and seal-coating, chip spreader for spreading stone in seal-coating streets, leaf collector, road grader.

Ask Return Old Commission Form Minus Manager

Petitions Started This Week
To Secure Place On April
5 Ballot

Three petitions are now being circulated in the city in a movement to place before the voters at the April 5 election a special ballot calling for the abolition of the present form of commission government and a return to the form of city government under which the city was previously administered.

The movement is reported to have been initiated at a meeting of citizens held Monday evening. As the Record goes to press no copy of the petition is available for the literal wording of the issue.

However, it is reported that the three main issues raised are as follows:

1. More economy in city government.
2. Confinement of selection of employees to residents of the city, it being stated that men who are not residents of the city are now employed.
3. Objections to certain members of the present city government.

The law requires that such petitions must be signed by 25 percent of the qualified voters of Buchanan in order to obtain the right of presenting the issue at the election. This means approximately 550 bona fide signatures.

Stanley Jones in referring to New York City, which he considered a prime example of the ministers' problem. "New York City is a preacher's graveyard. The only hope of evangelizing this great city is to organize teams for visitation and to visit the people in their homes—house-to-house evangelism."

Visiting members will be happy to take the names of any in need. These will be referred to the church's Dorcas Welfare Society for prompt attention.

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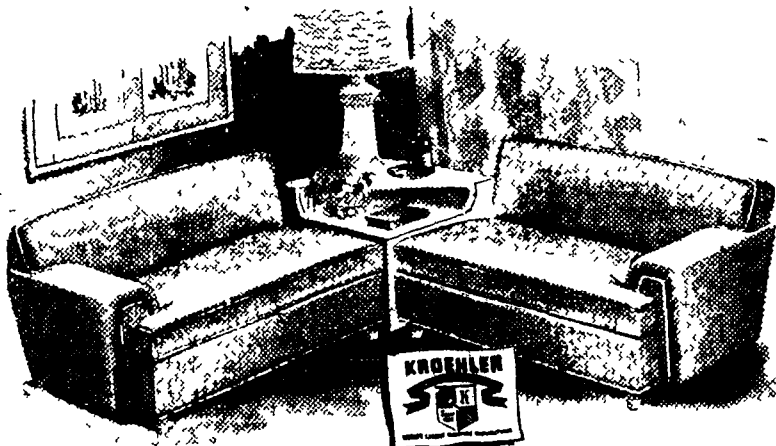

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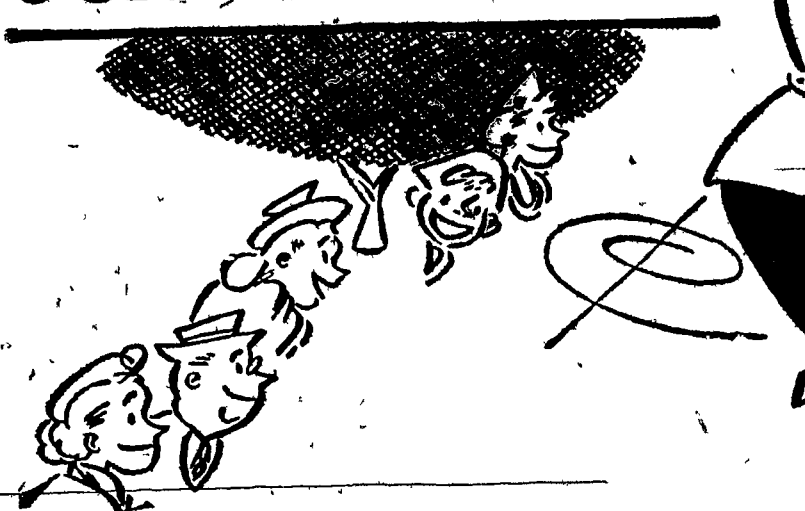

What has been accomplished with this equipment? Let's look at the most obvious services. Do you remember only a half dozen years back when housewives were endlessly tormented with street dust? Once a street sprinkler with a small tank operating daily controlled briefly the dust in a small section. Then came calcium chloride treatment, which controlled dust for about 30 days. Then the surface of the streets was stirred to a small depth and asphaltic oils poured on, creating weak surfaces which broke down annually in wet winter and spring weather.

Five years ago the city started the seal-coating program, which made a water-tight seal over the

asphalt-treated streets. These seal-coated streets are mainly in the residence districts, and cover all but about four miles of streets. They would not stand up under heavy truck traffic but stand for years under light auto traffic.

Result: Most of you have forgotten the former nuisance of summer dust, tracked into or blown into your homes in summer and fall.

Gone too, is the annual breakdown of streets treated merely by top-soil agitation and oil, with the universal development of potholes from Liberty street to Chipewewa and points north and south, with their wear and tear on traffic. Once they were the annual joke—"at least they are safer, you can't speed on them." Now for the most part they are a vanished nuisance. On 80% of the unpaved streets we slide noiselessly over seal-coated surfaces, no longer weaving to and fro between the potholes. The treatment of 16 miles of unpaved street in this manner has been a real achievement, done by city labor, not by contractors. It has taken time. In a few sections of the city where old streets are not adequately drained, and the soil itself does not provide adequate drainage, the seal-coat is less lasting. Two major problems ranging from nuisance to danger,

solved with one operation of the D. P. W.

Certainly you remember, back short years ago, when snow was removed from the streets with small armies of men throwing it into trucks with shovels. Now when a storm starts in winter or spring, four city trucks are available, two shoveling plows, one with an under-body scraper, and one spreading salt on the hills. Compared with cities of this area, from South Bend down, Buchanan has a reputation for quick work in street clearing. When two inches of snow have fallen, the salt-spreading truck goes to work on the hills. When an approximation of four inches has fallen two plows and one scraper go to work. If necessary the work goes on around the clock.

Once, short years since, our water main system was a tangle of small and large mains with main dead ends and lack of logical connections. The situation could not be solved by commissioners devoting their spare time in short terms. There had to be carry-through. Now we have the carry-through and the inadequacies of water supply have been removed.

As late as three years ago part of the autumn leaf fall, piled at the tree-lawn by householders, was

loaded on trucks with shovels, the wind blowing them out of the shovels and off the trucks. Now they are picked up by a vacuum collector, which also shreds them, one truck load equalling several the old way.

The details of achievement in special departments as the street, sewer, fire and police, cemetery and administration will be treated later.

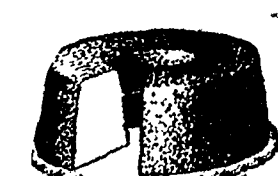

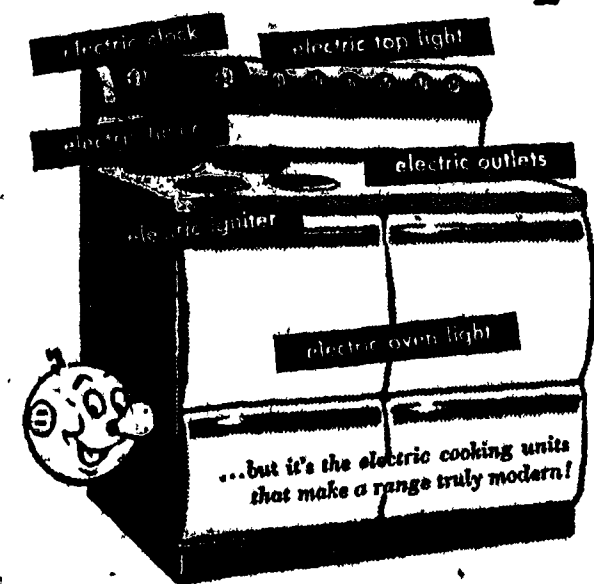

On Feb. 26 and 27, a statewide convention of teen-age drivers was held at Kellogg Center on the Michigan State College campus at Lansing. This convention was sponsored by the Michigan State Safety Commission and the Youth Advisory Council of Michigan Youth Commission in cooperation with the Area Teen Age Safety Conferences and the Governor's Teen Age Traffic Safety Committee. Approximately 175 delegates from all parts of Michigan were in attendance. It was only one of the 50 such state-wide conferences to be held in the nation, and the first to put the program under the charge of the youth themselves. All previous meetings had been of a lecture type headed by adults.

Friday evening, the delegates were honored at a banquet in the Kellogg Center ballroom. Gov. Williams welcomed the group and expressed his appreciation for their interest, and his hope that they would be able to come up with some sincere and helpful suggestions toward bettering driving conditions in Michigan.
