At a meeting of the Buchanan Park and Recreation board held last week the members voted to create a permanent memorial to Buchanan high school's late, well-loved director of athletics, Lester Miller. The trophy will be inscribed each year with the name of the boy selected as the outstanding athlete of that year. It will remain permanently in the high school trophy case.

Howe District Votes to Erect School Building

A special meeting of voters of the Howe school district in Bertrand township was held Saturday evening in the schoolhouse, when it was voted to build a new school, after considering four proposals for solving the problem that within five years the school will be inadequate for the number of pupils expected to be enrolled.

The meeting was conducted by Russell Chilton, moderator of the board of education of the school. The proposals were: Shall the district build a new school, remodel the present school building, consolidate or annex? Thirty-five votes were cast, 32 to build a new school, and three to remodel the old school. There were no votes on consolidating or annexing. It was also voted to buy a new site for the new school, as the present school grounds are not large enough to build on and there is no adjoining ground available.

A building and site committee was appointed, including Ellis May, Robert Hall, Herbert Swartz, Wesley Strong, Harry Bellare and William Swaim. They will work with the board of education in selecting a new site and getting an estimate on the cost of a new school, and report at a later meeting tentatively set for January.

Buchanan Twp. Runs To 2 Fires At Bend of River

The Buchanan township fire department received two calls late Thursday to the Bend of the River section. The first was to the Harry Massow farm, on a road east of the Range Line Road on the dirt road which intersects at the Mead school. The second was to the Lyle Jesswein farm between 4 1/2 and 5 miles north of the Buchanan city limits on the Range Line Road. The damage was small at both places.

The department was called to the Massow farm at 5:05 when a fire broke out under piles of baled wheat and straw. Chief Charles Wesner stated that an electric wire ran along the floor in front of a manger and under the bales. It is quite likely that the fire was started from a short there.

Mrs. Massow and daughter had just arrived from town a few minutes before the fire was discovered. Mrs. Massow stated that she smelled smoke when they drove in the yard but did not see any sign of fire. A few minutes later she went to the barn and en route saw flames through a barn window. She called the Buchanan township fire department, which made a quick run to the scene. As they neared the place they saw that it was in Niles township and Chief Wesner made a radio call to the Niles township department which sent out two trucks.

However, the Buchanan township department had the fire out by the time the Niles trucks arrived. The fire in the straw bales had ignited the wooden manger and the adjacent timbers, but there was no fire above the location of the fire to ignite. Mr. Massow estimated the loss at about \$200.

Mrs. Massow and her daughter had tried to drive a tractor from the barn, but were having difficulty when Stanley Swank of Buchanan drove by. He drove the tractor out and then closed all doors and windows, which retarded the spread of the flames until the Buchanan township truck arrived.

At 9:15 p. m. Thursday the township headquarters received the call from the Jesswein farm. They found a motor which operated a forced heat system on a furnace on fire on the basement floor. It is believed that lightning had entered on the power wire and shorted the motor. However, the fire started when reduced temperatures in the house automatically turned on the motor, which then broke into flames. The house was filled with smoke. However, the damage was almost entirely confined to the motor.

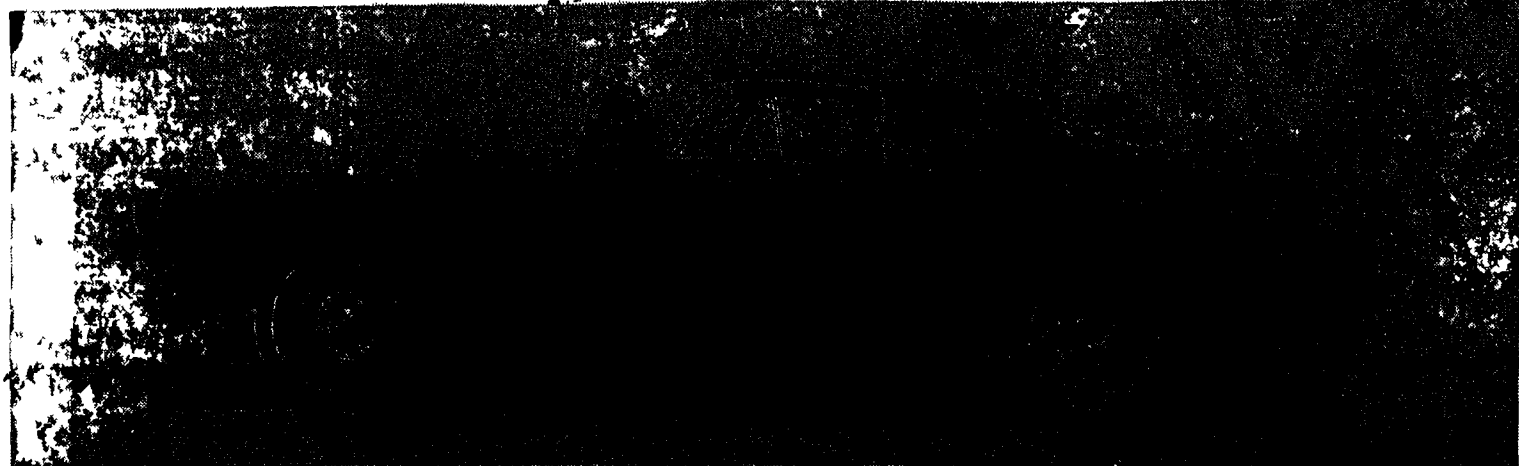
The Dowagiac squad should present a good contest. In their last start they beat St. Joe 26 to 6. They were barely beaten by State High, losing 14 to 6.

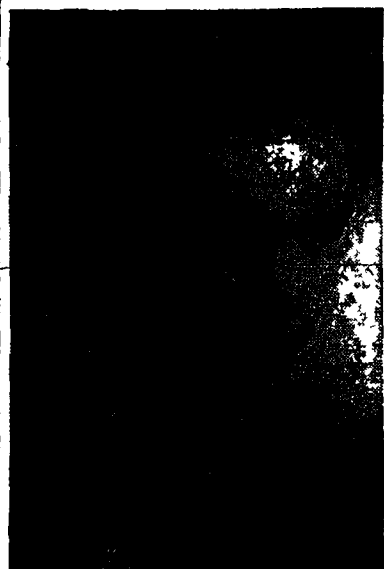
Plans Merger of Ladies Aid and Mission Society

Buchanan Twp. Headquarters Now Completed

The Buchanan township hall is now complete, states Clayton Spalding, clerk. The final touch being the hooking up of the heating equipment Tuesday.

The first public use of the building will be the staging of the Nov. 2 general election there. While the building is complete, a program of interior installation of furnishings and appliances will be taken care of gradually.

The handsome new township quarters are located a half mile or less north of the Buchanan city limits on the east side of the Main street road. The building walls are lined up directly east and west, standing at an angle to the road, with spacious grounds which will be parked later.

The structure has a partition the full length east and west. The fire equipment garage and headquarters is on the north side, 72 feet in length. It is 14 feet longer than the township hall to the south, the extra length jutting out in front. The garage is long enough to hold two fire trucks. Later the township plans to buy a tanker to supply extra water for the present pumper. In the rear of the garage to the east is a meeting room for the firemen.

The south "ell," which constitutes the township headquarters, has a second ell in its southwest corner for a porch entry. Also at the west end of the hall is the small township office for business records, and the heating plant quarters. At the east end of the township hall building is a kitchen which is already hooked up for electricity and plumbing and will be later equipped with kitchen appliances. Men's and women's rest rooms are also at the east end.

Buchananite Reviews 25 Years As County Agent

A D Morley, a brother of Archie Morley of the I. & M. staff here, and a son of Perry Morley, was featured in a recent issue of the Kalamazoo Gazette on the occasion of his 25th anniversary as county farm extension agent in Allegan county.

Not so many remember A D here now, but he moved from his birthplace at Three Oaks in time to attend and graduate from Buchanan high school. He left high school to enlist in the army in World War I, spending 28 months in service and returning to get his high school diploma in Buchanan in 1919.

Then he enrolled in Michigan State College in 1921, specializing first in forestry and later in dairying. He worked in dairies in Michigan and Texas, then as factory worker and salt salesman. In 1929 he was called to Michigan State College in East Lansing by the district supervisor for the Agricultural Extension department. The M S C department head offered him the job of Allegan county's first county agricultural agent. The farmers had previously voted down the idea of employment of a county agent by a wide majority, but the board of supervisors voted by a majority of one that they would install the post anyway.

In the years since A D. has sold himself and the job in a very large way. The county was mostly an area of general farming when he came. Now poultry is a \$4,500,000 industry in Allegan county, centering mostly around

Hamilton, which handles \$3,000,000 annually in poultry and eggs. Morley also has the honor of being one of three men who organized the Allegan county state forest. The state forest was created by inducing the federal government to purchase 20,000 acres of sub-marginal lands in the western part of Allegan county where 300 farm families were on relief. The federal government paid \$14 an acre, and helped the farm occupants to get locations on better land. Then the nearly 14,000 acres were turned over to the State of Michigan, where they have become an immense asset in game preservation and hunting. Truck farming, much more profitable than the muck farming it replaced, is another improvement which Morley has helped to develop. The county is now first in Michigan in growing cauliflower and cucumbers.

Rev. Carson Heads Food For Disaster Areas Overseas

A planning meeting, representative of churches, schools and farm groups of Berrien county, was held by the Christian Rural Overseas Program on Wednesday evening in the Youth Memorial building at the Youth Fair grounds, Berrien Springs.

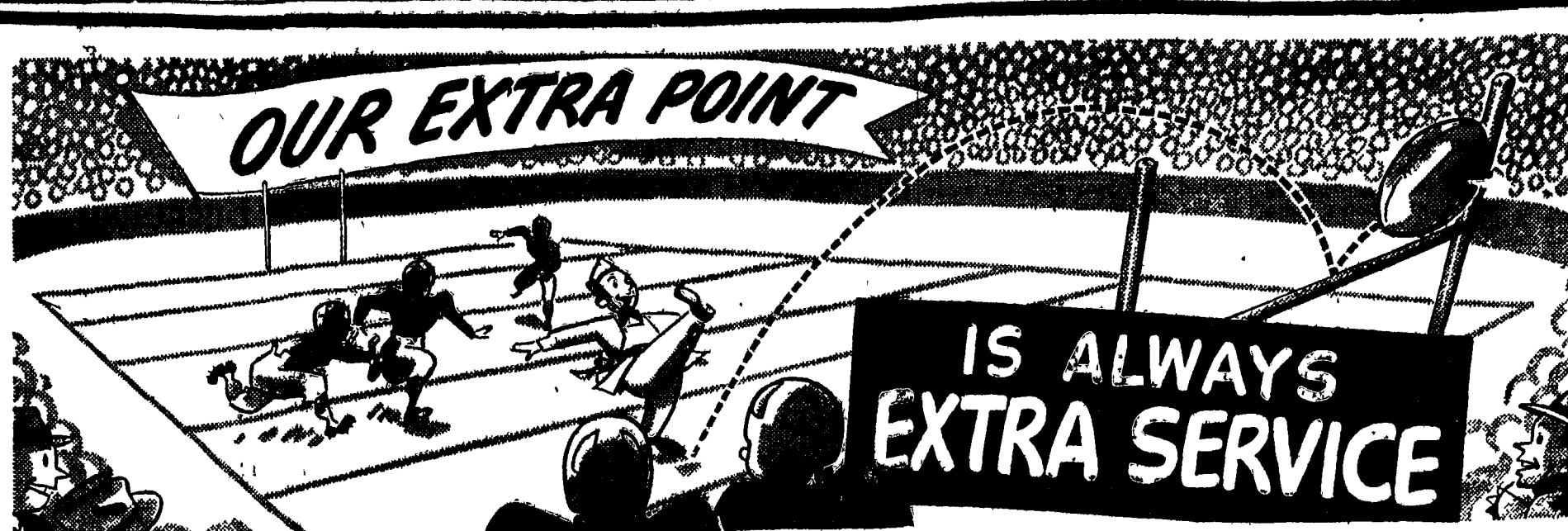
Rev H Carlyle Carson, Buchanan, C R O P chairman for the Berrien County Council of Churches, conducted the meeting. Russell Hartzell, state C R O P director for the Michigan Council of Churches, was the speaker. He discussed the need for monetary contributions to facilitate the distribution of surplus foods in disaster areas overseas. Plans were made to organize to utilize opportunities offered by the government, which has arranged through C R O P that for each dollar donation, it will deliver \$20 worth of surplus food to some needy area overseas. The food will be distributed through the facilities of Church World Service, the C R O P parent agency. Another meeting was planned for 7 p m, Sunday, Oct 24, in the Youth Memorial building, when plans will be outlined for a campaign at Thanksgiving time to take advantage of the government's offer. All churches, schools and farm and service organizations are invited to send representatives to this meeting.

3.2 (1) The City Commission of the City of Buchanan shall consist of five members. On the first Monday in April in 1955, there shall be elected three Commissioners, to take office the second Monday in April in 1955. The candidate receiving the greatest number of votes at that election shall serve until the second Monday in April of 1958. The candidate receiving the second largest vote in that election shall serve until the second Monday in April of 1958. The candidate receiving the third largest vote in that election shall serve until the second Monday in April of 1957.

3.2 (2) From and after the election of the Commissioners provided for in sub-paragraph (1) above, Commissioners shall be elected in rotation for three year terms, one year the election to include one Commissioner, and the following two years, two Commissioners each.

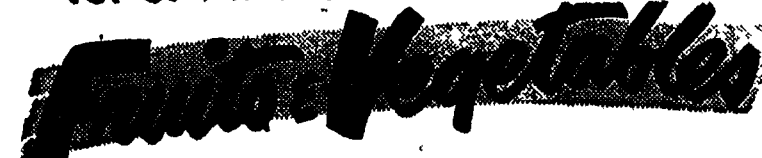

Designer Virgil Exner Puts City on-the-map

Other boys than Virgil M. Exner have left Buchanan for high positions, but certainly none of them ever stood in so intense a spotlight of publicity and public attention as that which focused on Exner when 500 newspaper and magazine writers gathered in Detroit last week to see and report on the new Chrysler models which he had designed.

For the development of transportation has been the great romance and passion of Americans and Exner has identified himself with the "big moment" in transportation development today—the display of the new model. As the chief stylist for the Chrysler Corporation he is inevitably the "big name" in the auto industry now as far as lovers of fine cars are concerned—and their name is legion.

As far as his friends in Buchanan are concerned, they are proud of his success. They are at the same time aware of his reticence and averseness to publicity. But it is not possible at this time to hide a 10,000-watt beacon under a bushel. This is one exception to the proverb that a "prophet is not without honor save in his own country."

His fellow townsmen remember him as the auto-crazy kid who

used to ornament the margins and fly-leaves of his text books with drawings of cars. They have followed each step in his rise in the world of designing. They saw the drawings that occasionally came home while he was taking a two-year course in commercial art at Notre Dame university, and on his first job when he worked chiefly on advertising lay-out and drawings for car catalogues for Advertising Artists, Inc., of South Bend.

His next step up was his employment as a junior designer by General Motors. In his first year there he won a prize in competition with all G. M. designers and was speedily advanced to head of the Pontiac design studios.

In 1938 he returned to South Bend, where, as the employee of a famous New York designing firm, he was the largely anonymous author of designs for Studebaker cars. His most famous product, made after his responsibility for Studebaker design was becoming well known locally at least, was the "torpedo" model, the first made by Studebaker after World War II, in 1946. Some of his more conservative-minded friends and followers thought his design rather extreme. But Exner kept going along. In 1949 he left South

Bend and his Studebaker assignment for Detroit and for a time his Buchanan acquaintances heard little of him and wondered.

He had been employed as head of the advanced styling studio at Chrysler's and only modifications of his work were reaching the production line. Meantime he was studying the product of European designers, especially in France and Italy, where style artists were producing beautiful cars for a limited clientele. He selected the Italians as his preference, and in turn he was rated by the Italian designers as the best of the American auto artists.

As a result of his wide study he designed the first of his idea cars, known as the Chrysler K-310. He was authorized to have the first car of that design built in Europe. He chose Carrozzeria Ghia, great Italian car stylist and body-building artist to hand-tool the first K-310. The design was sent to Ghia, together with a standard Chrysler New Yorker chassis and a 310-horsepower edition of the Firepower V-8 engine.

A chief feature of the design was a revival of the large and graceful wire wheel, with fenders that fully revealed them in front and more than usual behind. The wheel, in Exner's belief, is one of



the purest and most beautiful of man's designs, as well as one of his oldest and greatest inventions. The beauty of the car is enhanced by revealing rather than hiding the wheel, said Exner. An essential of auto-planning is to make a "car look like a car," in his opinion, and to that end the wheel should be featured and not hid.

The K-310 design combines the modern American functionalism with the best of the traditional "classic" features. Following the favorable reception of the K-310 design Exner and his staff developed the Chrysler C-200, the Chrysler D'Elegance, the Plymouth Explorer and Belmont, the Dodge Firearrow, and his latest, the DeSoto Adventurer. The first of all these models were hand-made by the master coach-maker, Carrozzeria Ghia of Turin, Italy. All of Exner's cars are built on standard Chrysler model chassis with conventional springing, steering ratios and automatic transmissions. Most have power steering and power brakes. While attempting to achieve as much as possible of the beauty which the European artist embodies in his cars, made for small clienteles, he aims also to incorporate the strictly practical features required to achieve large markets. After all, the chief function of autos, in America at least, is to satisfy our master passion for going places sitting down. Exner has summed his philosophy of design this way:

"An auto must be styled with an eye toward its ultimate function, and the designs which most profoundly satisfy our senses are those which have been created with the keenest realizations of the functions for which they were intended. The automobile of the future, though it may appear different than it does today, must look like a means of transportation."

While the Exner's family home is in Detroit, they have a "second home" at 206 West Third street, Buchanan, with Mr. and Mrs. George Exner. There his wife and their children, the son Virgil, Jr., and their two daughters, Bronwen

and Marie, spend much of the summer vacation and also the week-ends during good weather. Virgil Jr. is following in his dad's footsteps in designing. Several years ago he won the national trophy in the annual Fisher Body contest for teen-agers. The prize was a four-year scholarship in the school of his choice. He chose Notre Dame and has been achieving considerable attention there for one guess? Auto designing. Last year he designed and made a small but intricate model on scale. This model was given a place of honor in the industrial museum at the university. This year Virgil, Jr., has been given a special room in which he, aided by other stu-

dents, will build a regular working automobile from special molds made for him from his design. The new model will eventually leave the building through double doors and under its own power.

Look out, pop! Another master designer may soon be giving you some competition!

Meet Your Merchant



The merchant we honor this week is Gus Fagras, Sr., proprietor and operator for over 26 years of the Fagras grocery at the intersection of West Front street and Terre Coupe road. The sign reading Fagras & Sons is just a bit misleading as the store and filling station are now two separate and independent business enterprises, the latter being operated by his oldest living son, Gus Fagras, Jr.

There is some one missing from the picture. On Aug. 15 of this year Mrs. Fagras, Sr., died suddenly of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Up to the day before her death she had been a true working helpmeet in the business. There she had reared six children, two of whom were born before they came to Buchanan and four after. When the children were young she had hired help to care for them, the living quarters having been always in the rear of the store where she could keep in close touch, while she worked beside her husband. Both Mr. Fagras and his son expressed disappointment that the store could not have had its turn while she lived, as she had had a very real part in the development of the store from small beginnings to the beautiful modern establishment of today.

Mr. Fagras came to the United States from Greece in 1916, going first to relatives in St. Louis, Mo. From there he soon went to Youngstown, O., where he worked in the steel mills, and then to the steel mills of Pittsburgh, Pa. There he and Selma Snook were married Oct. 6, 1924. He had some experience in a department store there, rising to a position of some responsibility. Then he and his wife went first to McClure, Pa., and then to Youngstown, O.,

where Gus went into the steel mills again, then bought a partnership in a restaurant.

There they were visited by a Buchananite, Mr. William Snook, uncle of Mrs. Fagras. He had started a small grocery and filling station business at West Front and Terre Coupe. He said it was for sale again. Fagras returned with him to Buchanan and looked it over, then back to Youngstown and closed the purchase. Then he returned with his family, then a wife and two children, and took over the property. The store was located in a 24x10-foot room in the front of the building, with living quarters back of and over the store.

Fagras took over the business July 9, 1918, first leasing the building housing it. He then bought the building and started enlarging. He first took out the partition between the store and the family living room, tripling the store area. Then came the depression and Mr. and Mrs. Fagras had enough on their hands rearing six children. However, the store and the filling station in front had survived then until the business sides began to clear.

The upturn was on by 1935 when Fagras extended the store eight feet north and installed the present Klawner front. In 1949 he extended the rear section of the store 25 feet west, making room for a lubrication department and a showroom, enclosed in a concrete block and brick veneer wall. He converted the store into a modern grocery, with frozen food and dairy cages, a walk-in cooler and other modernizing equipment that accelerated the work.

In the meantime their children had been growing up. The oldest, James, was a brilliant musician and an honor student at the high school from which he was graduated in 1941. He became a fine violinist. While still in Buchanan he played second violin in the South Bend Junior Symphony, his instructor playing first violin. When he was graduated from Buchanan high, he received a scholarship at Oberlin and entered that college to specialize in music.

By then the United States was involved in World War II. James was taken into the army and left, carrying with him his beloved violin. In the army he came through an intelligence test with top honors and was sent by the army to the University of Arizona to train his high intelligence in special work in meteorology and allied subjects. Suddenly the war entered its final crescendo following D-Day in June, 1944, and the Tank invasion of Europe. The colleges were suddenly emptied of soldiers in special training and they were packed off mostly to enter the infantry. James was assigned to the infantry in Patton's Third Armored Division, in time to

go through the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium, without a scratch. He wrote home saying he wanted strings for his violin, which he still had with him. But before the strings were sent he wrote again that his violin had been hit and destroyed. Shortly after he was killed on Dec. 2, 1944, as Patton's division surged eastward from Belgium into Germany. The telegram reached his parents Dec. 18. He is buried in Lime, France.

In 1946 Gus, Jr., then graduated from high school, entered the army, serving most of his time in the holling theatre of Italian and Yugo-Slavian rivalry for the port of Trieste. But there was no action and he came home safe. Then the Korean war broke and the youngest son, who had been in charge of the gas station and lubrication department, was taken into the army, and Gus, Jr., stepped into his place in the family business. A good I.Q. did a bit for Andy and he was assigned as mechanic in charge of jet bombers, which is now his present

work at the Smoky Hill Airforce Base in Salina, Kas. He is still there with over two years to go before discharge. The Fagras family has more than done its bit for America in war.

On his return Gus, Jr. married the former Alice Hyde. They have two sons, Ronnie and Michael. And the latest news in the Fagras family is the birth of a daughter, now named Angela Marie, to Mrs. Andy Fagras in Pawating hospital Sunday, Oct. 10. Gus had married the former Pat Clifford while home on furlough soon after he entered the army in March, 1953. The oldest daughter, Martha, now Mrs. Cletus Huske, and her husband came to help keep the home after the mother died. Mary Fagras, second daughter, works in the home store. Kathryn, youngest daughter, works in the Nash auto agency in Niles. That calls the roll of the family of Gus Fagras, Sr., including his five living children and three grandchildren.

Supervisor Questions Legality Berrien's Last 5 Elections

Probably the biggest group of worriers in Berrien county are the men who run the county's government—the members of the board of supervisors. And, they were at their worrying best when they convened for one of their big worry-sessions of the year in the court house last week.

Most of their worries, naturally, are over money. They worry about spending it and they worry about not spending it. And all wrapped up in their money worries are such worrisome issues as the employment of more sheriff's deputies, paying the employees the county already has, more money, launching a war against lake erosion, and spreading the tax they have to spread to raise the money they think they'll have to spend.

But last week the supervisors didn't stop worrying when they stopped talking finances. They also worried a bit about a new fire escape that's being built at the county infirmary and about whether the elections Berrien county has held over the past dozen years or so have been legal.

Chief among the worriers were supervisors Frank Kinst, of New Buffalo, and Heath Calvin of Niles.

Kinst normally is one of the more quiet worriers on the board. He seldom has much to say during board sessions. You might say he is one of the more self-contained worriers among supervisors.

But last week he literally went on a vocal worrier's rampage. Somewhere he had read a law saying, in effect, that the board of supervisors every two years must elect a new three man board of canvassers. Kinst reflected "I've been on the board four years and I don't remember ever having voted on a board of canvassers."

His chief worry was "I question whether any of the elections we have had in recent years have been legal." He had done enough probing to learn that not since 1942 had a member of the board of canvassers been elected by the supervisors. Moreover, two of the members had served better than 20 years.

Kinst demanded action. The board, most of whose members themselves are elected officials, took it—promptly. Supervisors gave a unanimous ballot to a new Democrat member of the board, Ben Rosenberg of Sodas. The re-elected Guy Heim of Berrien Springs as one of the two Republican members and replaced Edward T. Drier of Three Oaks with O. A. D. (Bun) Baldwin Jr., of Bridgman, as the other Republican member. Rosenberg replaces Floyd Somers of Pipestone township.

That was one worry out of the way. At least the upcoming election will be canvassed by a legal board of canvassers.

Infirmary Fire Escape Settles in Sub-Layer of Muck
Supervisor Calvin's worry was over a masonry enclosed fire escape under construction at the

county infirmary and which, he charged, was fallen down even before it was completed.

Calvin also fretted because during the construction period there was no means of escape for second floor patients of the infirmary in case of disaster. "And I was out there yesterday and no one was even working at it," he complained.

That was enough to get the board fretting too. Supervisors called on Architect Hubert Van Dongen of Benton Harbor to ask, in effect, "What gives?"

Van Dongen said, and Calvin later replied that he was satisfied with Van Dongen's answer, that it was a sublayer of muck under the foundation of the masonry addition that was giving. The two-story escape enclosure was settling into the muck and had, up to that time, pulled about two inches away from the original building at the top.

The architect said he had ordered contractors to jack the structure back into place and construct a new, large foundation under it. He promised that while work had been delayed by rain early last week that a fire escape would be usable by the first of this week.

That left the board with only one comparatively little worry—who would pay for the additional work required to make the enclosure sound again. The building committee is to have an answer next month.

Kubath Asks For Four More Deputies

Thus, only the monetary worries were left to create the collective brows of the supervisors. But these are multifold.

First came a request for a \$4,300 appropriation to help finance a lake erosion survey by the U S Army Corps of engineers.

along the county's 32 miles of shoreline. The appropriation passed with surprisingly little opposition after finance chairman William P. Sawyer reported that "the money is available if you want to use it for this."

Then came Sheriff Erwin H. Kubath's request for four new deputies. That would add some \$15,000 a year to county expenditures and this, Sawyer said, simply wasn't there. Kubath, who says he doesn't have enough men to adequately staff the new county jail, offered to settle for two "for the present."

Even this churned up a lot of dollar anxiety and when someone suggested the board ought to chew on the proposal a month, supervisors jumped at the chance to table it. But only after Supervisor Ivan Price of Buchanan township declared pointedly that, "You didn't ask where the money was coming from when you appropriated \$4,300 for an erosion survey."

With mixed emotions the board approached the question of salaries for county employees next year. There was the belief that some adjustment was in order pitted against the fear of red ink operations in 1955.

So the supervisors compromised by granting a three per cent across the board wage hike with some individual increases going even higher. The total adjustment will add \$7,000 to the 1955 budget.

Employee reaction was mixed also, ranging from, "Why did they bother?" to "Well, I suppose it's better than nothing."

Then the supervisors increased their furrowed brows for at least another month by stamping their approval on a record \$5,316,536 27 tax spread for next year. The spread will permit the county to operate in the black next year "by the skin of our teeth."

The only moral the 'roundup' can draw from all this is for all of you who have your own money problems to take heart. They ain't nothin' compared to those of Berrien county's worrier-warriors.

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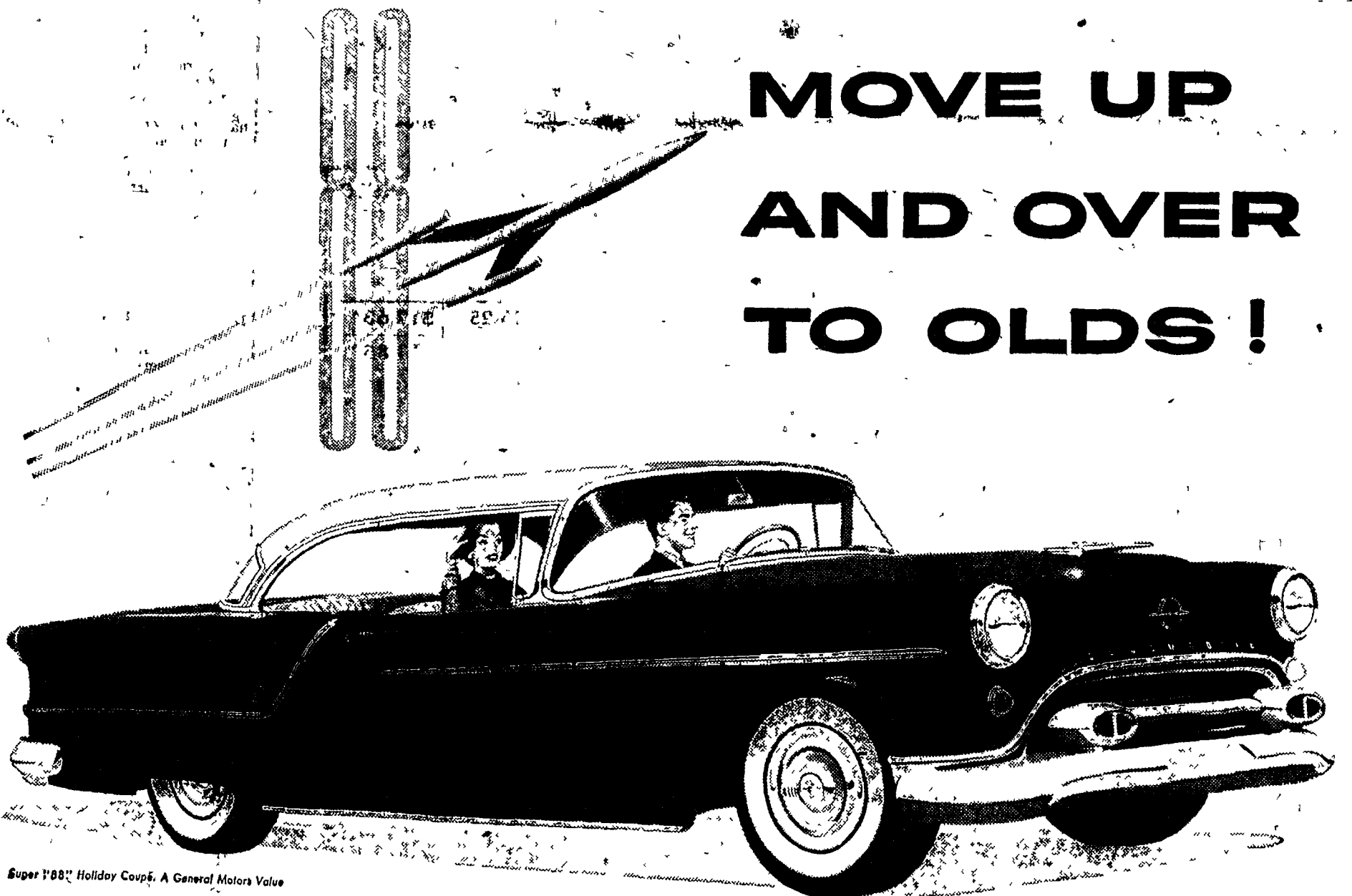
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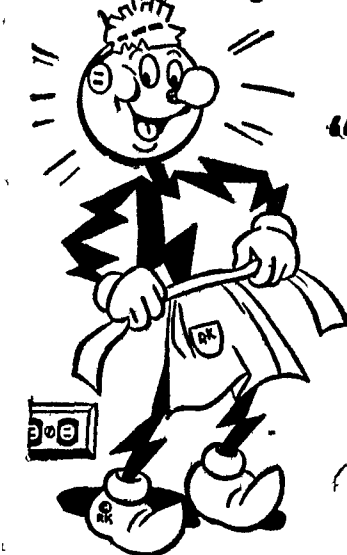

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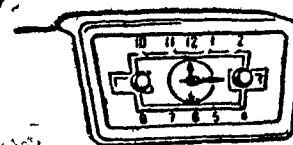
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
