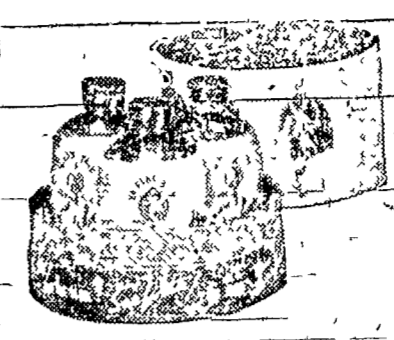

Savings of the co-operative are returned to the patrons according to the amount of business they do with their own organization. These are called "patronage refunds." FIFTH - Give farmers a chance to integrate their business. Co-operatives give small farmers opportunity to use big business methods: (1) Cut costs of production through their purchasing department [purchasing co-operatives]. (2) Increase income through their sales department [marketing co-operatives]. 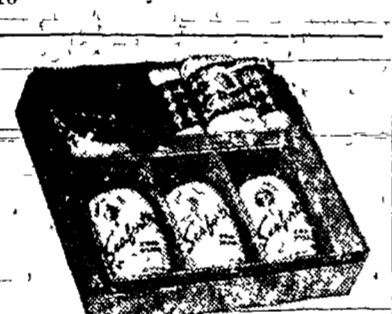
