Bucks Rise To The Heights To Defeat 3 Rivers

Display Top Form In The Turning Back Of Title Contenders

There comes a time in the life of every great football team when strength and courage alone are not enough to defeat determination. That time arrived for undefeated Three Rivers last Friday night, when it ran against a foe that was determined to win, no matter what the odds. The power-packed Buchanan team were, according to the statistics, to meet their downfall at the hands of this highly-rated Wildcat eleven. But when the battle-field had been cleared Buchanan still remained King of the Big Seven, handing the mighty Riverites a 13-7 trimming. The Buchanan victory not only enabled them to take over the top spot in the conference standings, but also to lengthen their string of continuous victories to 10. The Bucks are also the only team in the Big Seven mixup without a defeat.

Buchanan was the superior from the opening kickoff to the final gun, piling up 410 yards and the score scarcely indicated the edge they enjoyed. The Buck backs, led by Dale Rifenberg, continually ripped and tore large holes in the Riverites' defense. The constant charge of the Buchanan forward wall hurried the passes of quarterback Jerry Luzader, so that the passing stat was able to complete only four out of 13 pitches for 29 yards. The Buchanan line, from end to end, was magnificent, especially on defense. In the few times Three Rivers backs did get through they were immediately met by the line-backers, Don Smith, Bill Hess and Richard Virgil.

Bob Gamble played a beautifully deceptive game at quarterback. More often than not the Three Rivers line was bemoaning the fact they did not know where to tackle. The Bucks got off on the right foot by leading off with a 75-yard march before Rifenberg went over from the 5-yard line for the initial marker, giving the Buchananites a 6-0 first-quarter lead. The Maroon and White rolled up a total of 194 yards in the first quarter while the Riverites were held to 2. Buchanan lengthened its lead to 13-0 early in the second quarter when Rifenberg swept around his own right end, racing 40 yards for the Buck's second TD. The score remained there until half-time.

Three Rivers came to life for the only time in the third period, forcing the Bucks back to their 5-yard line. "The Buck's" were forced to yield the ball on downs. But the Cats were not to be thwarted and a second time in the third they powered their way to the Buchanan 15-yard line. From there Luzader went over in the first play of the final quarter. Luzader's first luck went wide, but the Buck's received an off-side penalty and Luzader made his second boot good. This was his 14th straight successful conversion this season. Buchanan took over the line-hut in the remaining part of the final period but was unable to score and the game ended with a 13-7 Buck victory.

Buchanan Schools To Be Shut 2 Days For Kalamazoo Meet

Buchanan schools, along with all other schools in southwestern Michigan, will be closed today and tomorrow to allow teachers to attend meetings of the Michigan Education Association in Kalamazoo. Adelaide Tenney Is Called By Death

Combined Music Career With Her Husband's For Many Years

Mrs. Adelaide B. Tenney, 74, the wife of Dr. George Tenney, and prominently identified with him in musical affairs in the Niles-Buchanan district for the past year, died at Pawating hospital at 10 p. m. Saturday, after a three-year series of tragic illness and accidents.

Mrs. Tenney was born May 17, 1875, in Denver, Colo., the daughter of Walter and Kittie Miller. She was reared and educated in Denver, attending and being graduated from Denver University. There she met George Tenney, whom she married after their graduation. They went to the Chicago area, where Dr. Tenney pursued a distinguished career in music, teaching at the Lewis Institute and ranking as a leading vocal conductor in Chicago many years. For many years he was director of the 315-voice choir of the metropolitan First Congregational church, and Mrs. Tenney was the soprano soloist. She also taught the Aeacia Bible class in that church for 24 years. She studied music many years in Denver and Chicago.

Dr. Tenney was retired from the Lewis Institute faculty in 1919 and they went to Lakeland, Fla., where Dr. Tenney taught two more years in Florida Southern college. They moved to this district in 1941. Here they established a beautiful home on the east bank of the St. Joseph river for a half mile west of the Range Lane Road and about three miles from Buchanan.

Mrs. Tenney experienced a stroke three years ago. Again last March she is believed to have had another stroke when she fell across the range in her kitchen and severely burned a hand in a skillet of hot grease. She had recovered from that mishap when she experienced a third stroke in August, while spending the summer at the ranch of her son, Walter Tenney, near Grover, Colo. She returned here and had again recovered sufficiently to move about her home a week ago Friday she had risen from the couch where she spent the time in the living room and went to check the thermostat. Her left leg, weakened by the stroke, gave way under her and she fell across the edge of a heavy rug, fracturing her left hip. She was apparently gaining when she had a sudden relapse last Thursday night.

She is survived by her husband, by two daughters, Mrs. Kathryn Boydston, living near her on the St. Joseph river, and Mrs. Adelaide Williams of Oak Park, Ill., by one son, Walter Tenney of New York City, by a sister, Mrs. Shelton Swan of Glendale, Calif., by six grandchildren and one great-grandchild. She was a member of the choir of the First Presbyterian church of Niles, of the Chicago Artists Association and of the Pi Beta Phi sorority. The funeral services were held in the Niles First Presbyterian church with the Rev. Greenhoe in charge. Burial was made in Silverbrook cemetery, Niles.

Harmon Green Guilty Second Degree Murder

Judge Westin Rules Act Was Unpremeditated

Harmon Green, 51, was found guilty of murder in the second degree by the verdict of Judge E. A. Westin, rendered in the Berrien County Circuit Court late Wednesday afternoon of last week. Judge Westin stated that he had concluded that the act of Green in killing his wife on Aug. 12 was unjustifiable but unpremeditated. Green had waived a trial by jury. He stabbed his wife, Sarah Mae Green, in an impromptu fracas near their home on East Fulton street immediately off North Portage. The stabbing was preceded by a wrangle, Green objecting to his wife visiting the home of a neighbor. While they were quarreling in the middle of the street, Green pulled out a 11-inch blade butcher knife which he wore under his shirt and stabbed her in the abdomen. Patrolmen Randall Couchman and George Burgoyne came in on the scene within a fraction of a minute after the stabbing. Mrs. Green was standing, clapping her abdomen and screaming "He cut me!" Green, who was standing by, at once admitted it. The Swem ambulance was called and Mrs. Green was taken to the Pawating hospital, where she died four hours later. Both Green and his late wife had been married before, but were living together without benefit of marriage.

Benefits Of Grassland Farming On Young Farm Is Explained In Panel Broadcast, Station WHFB

Sod Increase In Rotation Ups Productivity And Cuts Cost

The "grassland farming" system of management as it works out in practice in the Buchanan district was the theme of a broadcast over WHFB, Benton Harbor, from 12:45 to 1 p. m. Thursday of last week. The men in the panel discussion were Fred Young, Buchanan, a director of the Galien River Soils Conservation district, Tom Howells, Bertrand township farmer, Carroll Knutson, conservation aid in the local headquarters of the district. The script which they followed was written by Tom Howells. The bulk of the broadcast explained how the grassland farming procedure has increased production while cutting costs on the Young farm, where Fred Young and his father, Harry Young, farm on the Niles-Buchanan Road. Ninety acres of the 120-acre farm are divided into six fields of 15 acres each, which are farmed under a six-year rotation plan. Four of the fields are in grass-legume mixtures every year, leaving 30 acres planted to other crops included in the rotation system. The remaining 30 acres are rolling land that has previously given much erosion trouble. This part of the farm is continually in legumes and grasses. This means that 90 acres out of the 120-acre farm are in sod crops every year. In answer to the question whether this large amount of sod crops tended to cut down on the farm's overall production and income, Fred Young answered, "No, it has had the opposite effect. The way the grassland system has worked for us the only thing cut down of is work. We have found that our overall production is higher in spite of much less time, labor, and money spent in tending and planting crops. We are easily feeding more cattle, yet we are also able to feed out 100 shoats each year." Although the grassland system is the opposite of intensive farming, it is actually increasing productivity while cutting down production costs on the Young farm. Grassland crops actually paid better than wheat, both immediately and in the long run. The Youngs totaled the value of the output of a field of hay over four years and compared it to the income that they might have reasonably expected to get from wheat. The result was \$1,200 in favor of the hay. The balance was still heavier in favor of the hay when it is considered that it required no heavy tillage each year and that it built up the soil while the wheat would have worn it down. More than that the increasing production of hay enabled them to cut down on machinery costs. The crop valued most highly by the Youngs has been a mixture alfalfa, bromo grass and Ladino clover, used either for hay, pasture or silage. Ladino is a giant white clover, but differs from the native clover in a spreading growth. Each plant sends out several runners which take root and send up new plants, resulting eventually in a very dense growth. Under good conditions it will grow as high as two feet. The life of a sowing of Ladino is indefinite, depending on the care given it. Ladino seed is small and comparatively high-priced at the present time. It is usually sown with other seeds in mixture at the rate of one pound per acre. It may be sown alone but does better with a companion crop. A necessity of the planting is that the small Ladino seed must be very lightly covered. It will produce under a variety of conditions, even in slightly sour land but does best when lime is present. Ladino is a fast-growing and very productive crop if well fed, but it requires liberal applications of 0-20-20 fertilizer for best results. The Youngs harvested a heavy first crop of hay from one field containing Ladino this past summer, and then turned the cows into it immediately after harvest. Although the field was pastured by more than the usual maximum of one cow per acre, the Ladino grew faster than the cows could graze it off. At the end of two months of grazing the entire field was covered by a heavy growth. In a resume Tom Howells stat-

John C. Rehm Dies Suddenly

John C. Rehm, a merchant in Buchanan over 40 years, was found dead in his bed at his home at 210 Main street by the Buchanan police at 10:05 yesterday (Wednesday). A neighbor, Mrs. Kerna Moors, noticed that he did not make his usual appearance in the morning. She became concerned and when knocking on the doors did not get any response she called the police who entered by a window. An examining physician said that he had probably died about 4 p. m. He had attended the Presbyterian church Sunday, seemingly in his usual health, and was not known to have been ill. He came to Buchanan about 1899. He married Virginia Barnhart Nov. 20, 1899, and about that time he bought a "dime store" business in the quarters now occupied by the Marz Sweet Shop and remained in business here until several months after the present owners bought the building in late 1945. There he conducted the Rehm Variety Store for 46 years. He was a member of the Presbyterian church since 1908 and held many offices in that institution. Several years ago his friends totaled up the length of his services in various capacities and credited him with 160 years of service in the church. He was treasurer for over 30 years, and an elder at the time of his death. His only known living relatives are a niece and nephew in Sturgis, Mich. No arrangements had been made for the funeral when the Record went to press.

City Considers Adoption of Uniform Traffic Plan

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Studies Program Used In Many Michigan Cities

Cpl. Nicolien, State Police, Explains Plan To City Commission

Cpl Richard Nicolien, attached to the Paw Paw post of the Michigan state police, presented a suggested program of uniform traffic law enforcement before the city commission at their regular semi-monthly meeting Monday evening.

The program presented was originated by the Michigan State Police in 1945 as their recommendations for a more just and effective traffic enforcement policy. It has been adopted by the Michigan Association of Police Chiefs, and is now in effect in 43 Michigan cities, and has been adopted by 57 other Michigan towns and cities in the Detroit area, with provisions for placing it in effect Jan 1, 1950.

This program was tried out first in five Michigan "pilot cities" when the plan attached its present form it included a

pooling of judgment of a large number of judges and enforcement officers on a sensible composite of what constitutes good universal traffic practice. The plan is based on the assumption that effective enforcement requires uniformity of traffic law.

Michigan drivers, said Cpl Nicolien, should not be obliged to encounter wholly different traffic regulations in driving from state to state, or even in driving from city to city in their own state.

A uniformity of law everywhere in the United States would tremendously simplify the problems of the driver, the enforcement officers and the courts. At the present time there is a wide variance of practice that obliges local traffic officers to deal more leniently with drivers from other communities. Many violators beg off on the plea that they were observing the regulations in force in their own towns. Usually this is true.

Cpl Nicolien illustrated the confusion in Michigan by the following instance. The Michigan department of public instruction sends out safety instructions to the schools advising youthful bicycle riders to ride on the left side of the road facing the oncoming traffic. This is good safety practice, stated Nicolien, but unfortunately is against the state traffic law which holds that all

vehicular traffic should proceed on the right side, and makes no distinction between a bicycle and a "vehicle."

Cpl Nicolien showed a specimen of a uniform traffic violation notice recommended under the plan, featured by listing the "six principal violations causing most accidents, as follows: 1 Excessive speed 2 Improper left turn 3 Improper right turn 4 Disobeying traffic signal 5 Disobeying stop sign 6 Improper passing.

The notice contained further distinction in degrees of seriousness for each one of these offenses, which were to be considered both by the enforcement officers and the courts. In speeding, seriousness was graded by the following considerations: not over 5 miles in excess limit, 5-9 miles in excess, over 10 miles in excess, on slippery pavement, in darkness, in heavy traffic, caused person to dodge, just missed accident, actually hit object.

The six traffic violations listed above are responsible for 90% of the traffic arrests and 80% of the traffic accidents, stated Nicolien.

The city commission voted to refer the suggested plan to Chief Heston for study and recommendation to the city commission at the next regular meeting.

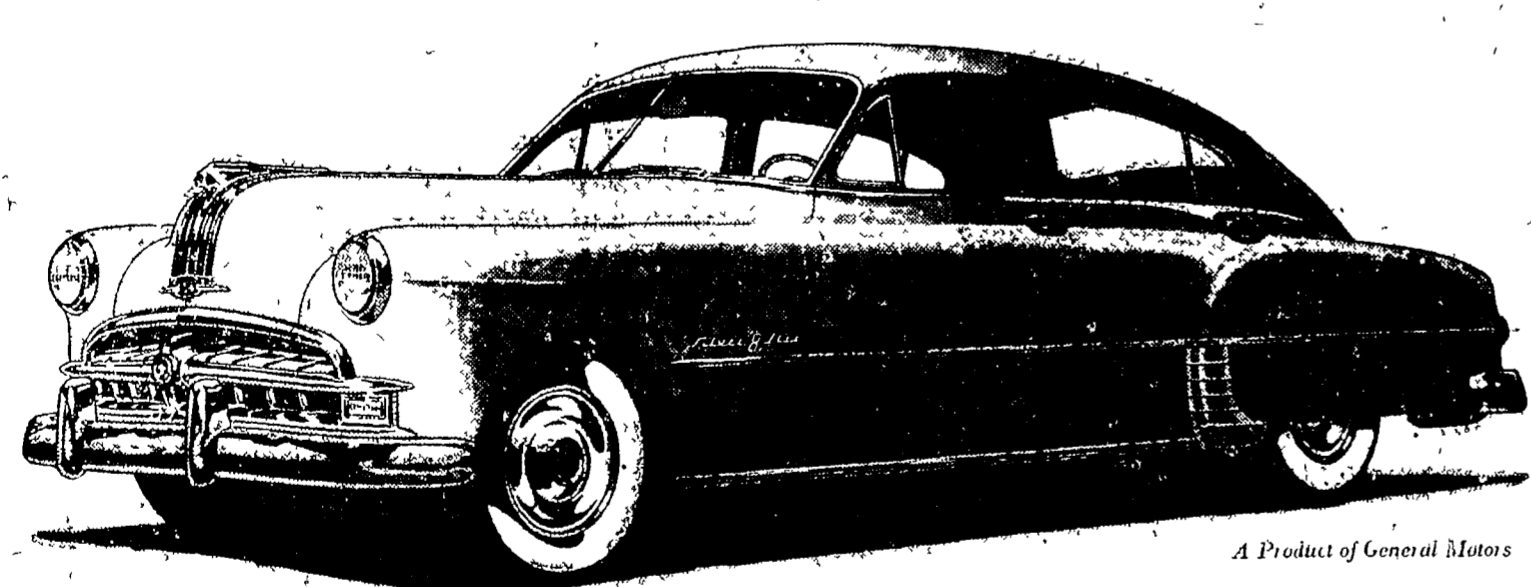

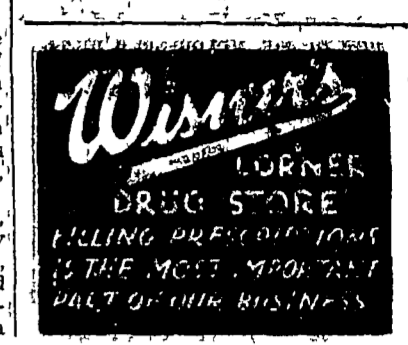
