## Section of Auditorium Ceiling Falls at School

Fate was kind Tuesday night when a large section of the ceiling under the balcony in the high school auditorium crashed to the floor. The ceiling fell when no one was in the auditorium.

Only hours before the mishap the senior play cast was rehearsing for the annual production to be presented this Thursday and Saturday nights. Had the ceiling fallen during rehearsal or while the play was being presented, numerous persons could have been seriously injured.

The mishap was discovered about 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, reports Paul Spaulding, director of buildings and grounds. He said the section that fell measured about 12 feet by 60 feet along the front edge under the balcony. The plaster ceiling crashed down on four rows of seats the entire width of the auditorium. Many of the seats were smashed or damaged.

Main portion of the plastered ceiling under the balcony was less than an inch thick, but that portion under the leading edge of the balcony measured up to more than 2 1/2 inches in thickness.

Spaulding said cause of the mishap and the extent of damage will not be known until the auditorium is inspected by an architectural engineer. As a result, the auditorium has been closed until further notice.

The senior play scheduled for Thursday and Saturday nights will be performed in the Moccasin elementary school gym.

## Battle of Saigon Told By Former Resident

EDITOR'S NOTE: Printed here is the second part of letter written by Miss Victoria Zachman, describing the Viet Cong offensive in Saigon Jan. 31. Miss Zachman is employed in the American Embassy in Saigon. The account of the battle was contained in a letter to her sister, Miss Rose Zachman of 608 West Roe.

Feb 3 8 a.m. Gad! I have just had a very rude shock for this early in the a.m. Took the dogs to the park across the street for their morning run, and as I was returning, looked up the street (same street I live on) and saw, lying on a bamboo ladder (which someone had apparently been using as a stretcher to carry the man) a now very much dead Viet Cong (shot). The body was about a half block away from the French hospital (the civilian populace uses this hospital). I go to the little Catholic chapel there every Sunday.

The thing I find inexplicable about this body is why it was still lying there in the street at this hour if the Viet Cong were carrying a wounded comrade to the hospital, and ran in to a police patrol. I can see that they would abandon their comrade, but why hasn't he been picked up by the local or our police? The street is a widely traveled one (except that there are no longer very many people stirring about other than military, before 7 a.m.).

I note that the MP's are now wearing flak jackets and have sandbag barricades on their jeeps.

There must be a big battle waging nearby because a tremendous contingent of armed troops has just roared by. The helicopters are circling just as they did the morning that the fighting at the palace and embassy was still going on.

You probably see as much on television as I see out of my window, or out on the roof. I must stop this and go up to the roof again to see what the helicopters are disturbed about. Later — found out. The helicopters are using the embassy helicopter pad for landing to pick up troops to take them to some battlefield. Just saw

about eight large trucks also go by loaded with field troops. One of my friends reports that he saw six Viet Cong suspects marched out of a building about a block away, with their hands up in the air, yesterday p.m. when he was up on this wonderful roof, which is a wonderful observation post for us. You overlook the entire city from up there. That poor body is still lying there.

Wish I could get this letter to the post office to relieve your minds, but it is about two blocks from here, and since I still hear infrequent gunfire from that area, I am not about to take that kind of unnecessary risk.

The ambulances are very busy again this morning! Both civilian and military. I shudder to think of how many innocent Vietnamese must be dying with all of the bombing that is going on in the outskirts of Saigon. It goes on all night. Some of the fires appear to have been going on for three days now.

I understand that the military messes (which are the only places open now for dining, other than hotels that have dining rooms) in Saigon are now rationing food, but that they are not yet down to eating C-rations. Many of our USAID people who live in hotels without mess facilities are obliged to eat there. I understand See SAIGON, Page 5

## Buchananites Are Cleanest?

Buchanan residents might claim the title of being the cleanest people in the world if the amount of water used in 1967 has any bearing on that claim. Total gallons pumped at the well field in 1967 was 886,128,400 gallons, reports Neal Burks fire chief. This compares with 715,263,300 gallons in 1966.

The largest volume was pumped in August with 85,055,100 gallons and the smallest was pumped in January with 60,658,000. The highest daily volume was pumped July 21 with 3,533,400 gallons.

## Loading Zone Survey Asked by Commission

A survey of the downtown area with the possibility of establishing loading zones has been called for by the City Commission. The commission called for the survey after voting to cancel Traffic Order 61 which provided a loading zone in the 100 block of Days avenue.

The Commission instructed the city manager to have Adrian Koert, traffic consultant, make the survey to locate possible loading zones throughout the downtown area.

During a discussion of a letter from F. S. Carbon, advising the commission that he cannot accept the proposed loading zone in front of his business at 107 Days, Commissioner Joe Bachman voiced the opinion that several loading zones should be created to serve the entire central business district.

Traffic Order 61 was adopted at the Feb. 13 meeting, after a request for a loading zone had been submitted by Carbon. The commission met with Carbon and worked out a program whereby a loading zone was created, on condition that vehicles could use it only while loading or unloading, and the vehicles must be parked parallel. The zone was to be available to anyone wanting to use it.

After the order was adopted, Carbon said it was unworkable. He reportedly was concerned for the safety of his employees during the loading operation. Carbon is agreeable to a loading zone, but wants to be allowed to angle park.

To Seek Assistance

The commission plans to seek assistance thru Michigan Congressmen in an effort to conclude the urban renewal project. Mayor Kenneth Witt agreed to write Congressmen regarding problems the city faces.

The holdup in closing of the project is sale of 17 parcels still owned by the project. This problem reportedly came about because of changes in federal requirements after the project was started.

Completion of the project will make the city eligible for a grant to meet its financial obligation to the federal government. Presently the city is paying interest on a loan in the amount of \$167,000.

Discussion on urban renewal centered around extension of a contract with Rohleder and Suabedissen for accounting services for the urban renewal project, with a maximum payment set at \$3,250. The contract was extended.

In other action, the commission:

—Authorized taking of bids for a new police car. Bids are to be opened at 2 p.m. March 6.

—Voted not to participate in the annual Mayor's Exchange Day program.

—Accepted the annual police report.

—Approved payment of bills totaling \$3,542.20.


Oh well. Anway, I know I'll be hearing from all you jovial jogging-joiners any jiffy now. You bet.

# Bucks Cap Perfect 12-0 League Season

The Bucks downed a stubborn Cassopolis quintet 79-73 Friday night to post their first perfect Blossomland conference record in five years. The victory on the Rangers' home floor gave Coach Ray Berry's boys a perfect 12-0 league mark and a 15-0 season tally.

Four-time league champions were undefeated in the first season the league was formed and went undefeated the second year until the final game at Cassopolis. This marks the first season the Bucks have been undefeated in both conference and non-conference play. Scoring in the first period was split between all five Buck cagers. Buchanan's defense almost broke the game open early in the second period, holding the Rangers scoreless the first 2 minutes and allowing only four points during the first 5 minutes of the period.

Hankerson opened the Bucks 21-point quarter with a pair of free throws, Hayward Miller dove for a layup and Hankerson cashed a two-pointer as Buchanan took a 26-16 lead. The squads exchanged points before the Bucks scored seven straight points to take a 35-20 lead after 5 minutes of play. Cass recovered its poise and in the final 2 1/2 minutes out-scored the Bucks 10-4 to close the gap to 41-32 at halftime.

Big man for Buchanan the second quarter was Hankerson with five field goals and four free throws for 14 points.

**Cold Third Period**  
Buchanan cooled off in the third period, scoring only 15 points to 16 for Cass. Scoring was slow thruout the period, with the teams trading points.

Going into the final 8 minutes, the Bucks enjoyed a 56-48 margin. Both teams hit their stride in the finale, with the Rangers outscoring the Bucks 25-23 to narrow the gap to the final six




