

Pro and Con on City Ballot Issues

Why Vote Yes

Two charter amendments affecting the City government are up for consideration of Buchanan voters on Nov. 2.

One proposal is of minor importance. It specifies that in the event a commission meeting date falls on a holiday the meeting will be held on the next following business day. This change should be adopted.

The other amendment would change the terms of City Commissioners. The commission is made up of five members. At present we elect three commissioners each spring and the two candidates getting the highest number of votes receive two-year terms and the third highest a one-year term. Only two commissioners are held over each year, and therefore it is possible to elect three entirely new and inexperienced individuals in any election. Getting the best results for the least money in the development of a modern city requires continuous long-range planning. This planning in turn requires a continuous majority of experienced members on the city governing board.

The new amendment, if adopted, would provide for three years for all commissioners and it makes certain that there would be three men with some experience remaining on the commission. Each spring we would elect alternately one or two commissioners for three year terms, thus providing the opportunity for introducing new faces and new ideas on a gradual basis according to the wishes of the voters.

I believe that all of us are interested in good government. I think that most of us would also agree that the cause of good government is furthered by keeping a reasonable amount of experience in the governing body. The fundamental basis for success in any organization whether it be government, business, fraternal or religious, comes from the experience of persons who have the opportunity to learn all the "ins and outs" of the organization. The "know-how" that comes from experience is the backbone of any organization. I cannot conceive of any group succeeding when the majority of its leadership is changed radically and frequently. I agree that every institution needs new ideas in its leadership group. In city government it is wise to allow for gradual changes by the periodic election of new members. Since I favor evolutionary rather than revolutionary changes, I would prefer to see three experienced people remain on the commission each year, which still allows for the possibility of selecting either one or two new members at every election.

I am certain that no member of the city commission has any ulterior motives in proposing the new election procedure. We who favor its adoption do so because we do not think it is good business for the City to be faced with the situation each year of having only two experienced men remaining on the commission.

This new election procedure is exactly the same as the one we use for the election of our school board. If the plan works well for them, which experience has proved that it has, then it should also be good for the election of city commissioners.

If you are interested in good government vote "yes" on both city charter amendments.

Why Vote No

I have been asked to make a statement on the proposed charter amendment dealing with changing the terms of office and methods of electing city commissioners.

The section of the charter proposed to be changed reads as follows: "At the regular commission meeting February 22, 1954, the following motion was made: Quoting from the minutes of that meeting, 'After discussing the matter at some length, it was moved by Commissioner Strayer, seconded by Commissioner Smith, that the city attorney be instructed to prepare an amendment to Section 3.2 of the city charter to be voted by the electors of the City of Buchanan at the November 1954 election, to provide two commissioners to be elected for two years, the next two commissioners for two years and the third year one commissioner for three years, in the same manner that school board members are elected. Motion carried by the following roll call, yes Strayer, Smith and Anderson, Nay Hagley and Derflinger.'"

This proposal would make it impossible for the electors or voters to change the majority of the commission at any one election no matter how dissatisfied they were with the commissions' actions and policies.

In writing the charter the Charter Committee used very good judgment in balancing the extra power they gave the commission with the procedure they provided for electing three commissioners each year. In this way the electors or voters may approve or disapprove the actions and policies of the Commission each year as the case may be. If the voters are in sympathy with the program of the Commission, they may elect three commissioners who will continue the program. If the voters are not in sympathy with the program and policies of the commission, they may elect three commissioners who will act in harmony with their wishes.

I have enough confidence in the voters of Buchanan to believe that if at any election they should elect three new commissioners, they will be men qualified and able to act in the best interests of the city.

This explains my reasons for voting against the proposed charter amendment in the Commission meeting. I believe that the voters have a right and duty they should retain. However, as I have already stated, I feel the voters will decide best any issue in an election if they have the opportunity.

In summing up this matter the people favoring the Commission having more power will vote yes on the amendment and the people who believe they should retain all their rights as electors of the City of Buchanan will vote no on the amendment.

Persons named as enumerators for the 1954 census of agriculture in Berrien county started the census on Oct. 25, following an intensive period of training held in the Youth Memorial Building of Benton Harbor from Oct. 19 to Oct. 23. In charge of the school were Richard H. Wene and Fred O. Albrecht, crew leaders in north and south Berrien county respectively.

Farm census questionnaires were mailed to all farm operators a week before the canvass began in order to give the farm operators time to consult their records before the census takers arrive. It is expected that the enumeration will require from three to four weeks.

The census is designed to provide information on the number and size of the farms, acreage and harvesting of crops, livestock production and inventories, farm facilities and equipment, farm values and mortgage debt. Each farmer is being asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered simply by checking "yes" or "no."

The rush tends to be late in the day, when workers get out of factories or business places. IF YOU CAN GET TO THE POLLS IN THE FORENOON, DO SO. The polls open at 7 a.m.

Here's The Proposition

On Election Day—Pray First And Then Vote!

Tuesday, Nov. 2 is election day. It would be rank exaggeration to say that the caliber of our citizenship depends on our behaviour on election day alone—whether we vote or not.

Good citizenship, to the extent that it is good, must be practiced every day. Casting your ballot is one of the big things. Cussing the city for not sweeping the streets oftener, while throwing an empty cigarette package in the gutter, is one of the small things on the other side of the ledger. It's been done.

But whatever choices the American citizen makes at the polls, this writer at least, believes that both Mr. and Mrs. Voter have increased in stature and in good intention, even since the end of World War II. It may very likely be that the press of tremendous events—and of momentous possibilities—have forced us into a more intelligent seriousness.

However that may be, we do not remember a previous election in which there has been greater non-partisan effort to assist the voter to cast an informed vote.

In comparison with the attitudes of today, let's step back to the attitudes of politicians regardless of party thirty years ago. The great interpreter of American politics in those days was Frank Kent, editorial writer on the "Baltimore Sun" and the author of several books on politics that are still good reading. Here are a few of the axioms that Mr. Kent laid down, of which the first, at least, still remains a political rule of the first magnitude.

1 You can't lick somebody with nobody (meaning an entirely unknown person).

2 Never handle a red-hot poker on the front porch. Which meant when a big stink is uncovered, let's us boys get together and settle it quick behind closed doors. Never settle it in the open. Keep the public as uninformed as possible.

3 If you are attacked as unscrupulous or dishonest never reply. It is really astounding what you can get away with if you strictly ignore all charges.

4 Attack! Attack! Attack! If an opponent brings charges against you, never explain. Find or trump up, some charges and (Continued on page 2)

The off-year election which faces the voters of the Buchanan community next Tuesday, Nov. 2, may not have all the glamour of a presidential campaign. But nevertheless it involves several issues that are comparable in significance to the quadrennial big-time.

The election of state and county officials has significance enough to make the trip to the polls worth while to every qualified voter. This year there is added business of importance for the voters to decide. Closest at hand in significance are the two amendments to the city charter to be submitted to the electors of the city of Buchanan on a special ballot. Most significant of the two charter amendments is concerned with alterations of the terms of the commission members to the end that all 5 serve 3-year terms, with no more than two commissioners to be elected each year.

The other charter amendment provides that in the event that one of the meeting nights of the commission (regularly on the second and fourth Monday nights of each month) should happen to fall on a legal holiday recognized by the city, the meeting must be held on the next succeeding business day thereafter. This would invariably be the following Tuesday.

Two special issues are also being submitted by Berrien County, on separate ballots, which propose two separate one-mill levies for a term of five years, 1955-1959 inclusive. One ballot proposes a one-mill levy to create a sinking fund for the erection of a new county office building, which would supplement the overcrowded county courthouse. The other proposes a Berrien county home for the aged. Both the city and county proposals will be treated more at length elsewhere in this issue.

The polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. The polling place for Buchanan township will be in the new township hall a half mile north of Buchanan on Main street road. Polling places for the city will be: Precinct 1, Fire Station at City hall, Precinct 2, Youth County Building, Precinct 3, offices of Robert F. Habicht Ford agency at 102 South Portage.

DPW Work Plans Delayed 3 Weeks By Rain Damage

The city of Buchanan has shared in the inconvenience and expense during the past two weeks as a result of too much of a good thing—water.

Basement trouble in the downtown area has not been as great as in the past, principally because of measures taken by owners or tenants of buildings. The area of flooded store basements in the recent rains was below the East Front street pavement culvert. Chickies, Haffner's, Buchanan Grill were among chief sufferers.

The largest damage is on the property of the city of Buchanan, in breakdowns in the light shells of asphalt aggregate which carry light traffic successfully in dry seasons. The damage is initiated by water seepage through small cracks or holes. Continued seepage will wash pockets under the light paving, which will then begin breaking down, the holes growing rapidly unless mended at once. The department of Public Works has been set back three weeks in its regular program to keep up with the street pavement breakdown.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 23, ARTICLE X OF THE CONSTITUTION RELATIVE TO SALES TAX AND DISTRIBUTION OF SALES TAX REVENUES.
Shall Section 23, Article X of the Constitution be amended to limit the sales tax levy to a maximum of 3% and provide that the sales tax collected on each dollar of sales, minus collection costs, shall be distributed as follows: 1/2 to cities, villages and townships on a population basis calculated as prescribed therein, 2c to a restricted fund expendable for school districts as provided by law, including a mandatory restricted appropriation for school employees' retirement and the balance to the state?

(PROPOSAL NO. 3)

PROPOSED AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING BORROWING OF NOT TO EXCEED \$30,000,000.00 TO PAY BONUSES FOR MILITARY SERVICE DURING THE "KOREAN" WAR.
Shall Article X of the Constitution be amended by adding Section 26 to authorize borrowing not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for the payment of bonuses, of not to exceed \$500.00 to each person who performed military service between June 27, 1950 and December 31, 1953, or if deceased, to other persons named therein?

(PROPOSAL NO. 4)

An Analysis Of Proposal No. 2 On Your Ballot

(Given below is an admirably clear and brief analysis of the proposed amendment to the Michigan state constitution which will be listed on your ballot as Proposal No. 2. The analysis as given below has been studied and approved by the following state organizations: Michigan Municipal League, Michigan Farm Bureau, Michigan Association of School Administrators, Michigan Bankers Association, Michigan Manufacturers Association, and five others, whose diversity of interests adds up to a strictly neutral status for the group. The text was submitted to the author of the bill, Rollo G. Conklin of Tipton, Mich., and was approved by him. The primary purpose of Proposal No. 2 is to eliminate a present provision in sales tax diversion which COULD wreck distribution and bankrupt the State General Fund.

Proposal No. 2 is not a general panacea for state and local fiscal ills; it is not designed to solve "the school problem." It will, however, put the state in a sounder fiscal position.

Proposal No. 2 was placed on the ballot by the 1954 state legislature. Out of 132 members, only ONE voted against it.

To understand Proposal 2 it is necessary to review Sec. 23, Article X of the state constitution, the sales tax diversion amendment voted in by the people in 1947 where it is translated into plain arithmetic.

Each fiscal year this distribution of sales tax collections is made:
1. to school districts by census 1/6 or 16.67%
2. To school districts by enrollment

ment 44.77%

Total to school districts 61.44%
To specified local governments 1/6 or 16.66%

78.10%

The two shares of 1/6th each are diverted from current sales tax collections. This money will never get into the state general fund, and therefore is not a factor in state financing. The 44.77% share is the seat of trouble, because THAT percentage is figured, not on current collections, but on fiscal year. If sales tax collections did not vary from year to year we the collections of the previous could simply say that schools and local governments get 78% and the state gets the balance, or 22%.

That, alone, is the situation which was dragging the state into bankruptcy until stop-gap business taxes were enacted in stages starting in 1951.

While state taxes continued to increase year after year, payment based on previous collections could be paid. In fact, excesses over current obligations were spent and state budgets were balanced by prospective deficits.

But if collections ever dip significantly, then, in addition to the two 1/6th shares from current sales tax, the state would have to produce, from the lower current collections, 44 7/7% of the larger preceding year's figures. This is the much-discussed time bomb, the state might "owe" more than it collects some year.

Proposal No. 2, stripped of every detail not necessary to this bare outline would distribute sales tax, less collection costs, this way:

To school districts (out of current revenues) 66 2/3% or 2 cents out of every 3 cents collected.

Cities, villages and townships would continue to receive their 1/6th share as collected. The increase in the school's share from 61 4/4% to 66 2/3% would be compensated for by obligations shifted

Computes Costs On Widening Of East Front St.

Of principal interest and im-

port at the regular bi-monthly session of the city commission on Monday night was a presentation by City Manager Omans of a preview of estimated costs for the widening of East Front from

Portage street to Liberty street from 24 to 32 feet, plus the installation of a larger 685-foot storm sewer, to replace the one there now. An additional 300 feet of storm sewer would be extended to the eastern project terminal at Liberty street.

An important consideration before embarking on the proposed project, stated Omans, would be the re-routing of traffic. The only detour route now available would be Ryneerson street, which would not be very satisfactory.

The total estimated cost of the project as submitted by Omans is \$25,570. Chief item is the estimate of \$9,062.50 asphalt concrete pavement. Second largest item is \$4,572.50 2,950 linear feet of curb and gutter. A total of \$3,800 in sewer costs is estimated.

This project is in the study stage at present and may take several years for final action.

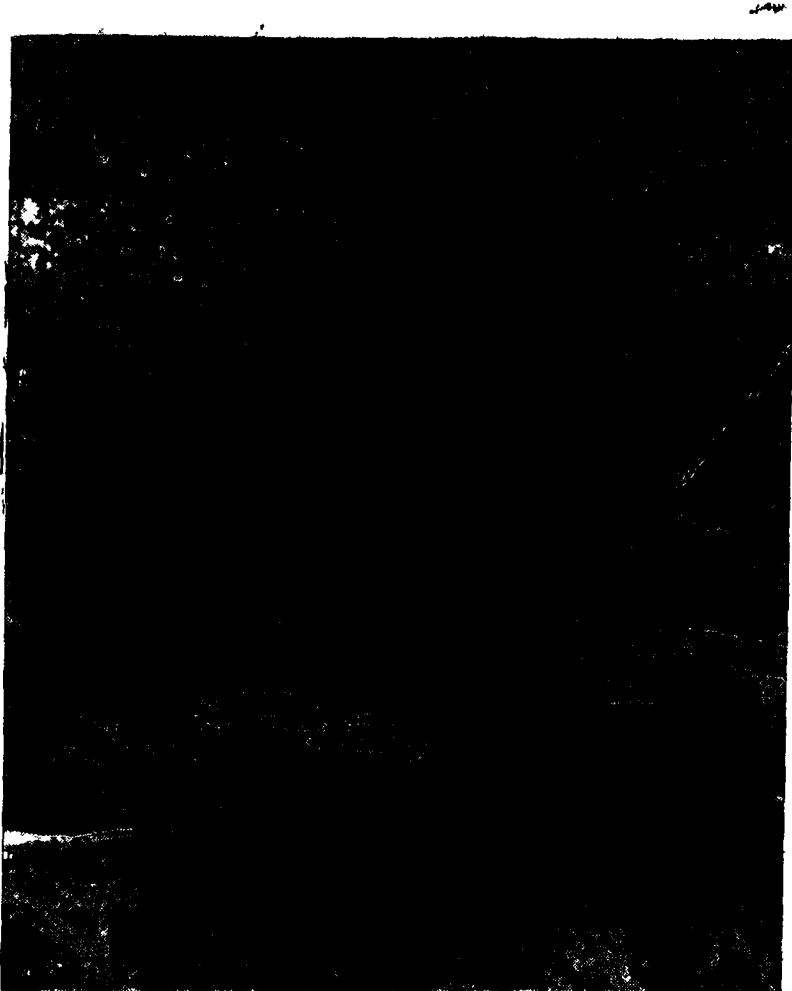

Buchanan High Shop and Trade School Tops

The Buchanan high school general shop department, including the trade school, is now practically through with the main business of changing things around, and is now settling itself comfortably in the added space permitted by the erection of the 50x54 foot addition.

All this to the accompaniment of huge sighs of relief by the instruction staff, including Ray W. (Doc) Miller and Richard Cavanaugh of the general shop and

William Runkewich of the trades school. Being mere men, they don't move furniture around just for the fun of it.

The added space contributes greatly to the efficiency of all departments, permitting more space to move in and also space to house the drafting room, and stock room and tool cribs. The woodworking and other general shop equipment has been moved out of the large single room which previously housed every-

thing, and has a single room in the addition to itself. An open ell to the southeast of the room holds the tool cribs. Another room holds the lumber and other material supplies.

Miller states that his department is now able to save fifteen minutes per class hour of 55 minutes by a change in issuance of tools. Formerly the instructor checked out the tools at the opening of the period and checked them back at the end, the teacher issuing to and receiving back the tools from every student. Now the tool cribs are unlocked at the start of the class, and are left open until it closes. Every student gets the tools he needs and is responsible for taking them back to their proper place in the crib at the end. He may also get and return tools freely at any time during the class period. The saving of 15 minutes per class per pupil time represents a tremendous total of valuable time during the year.

Richard Cavanaugh is in charge of the large general shop class for seventh and eighth grade pupils, teaching them the elementary principles of woodwork and of home repair, as faucet changing, elementary electric and appliance maintenance.

In the upper shop classes Miller grooves the work as far as possible to the needs of the pupil. If they have a practical project connected with their own interests or in the maintenance or improvement of their home property, they will learn far faster than at projects which have no real meaning to them. So if a farm boy is interested in learning architectural drafting to apply on needed buildings and improvements on his home farm, he is practically turned loose. With the necessary occasional direction

he will learn by leaps and bounds. There is a large double door on the south side of the shop through which students may drive their own car for elementary repairs and even for some body and fender bumping. Such jobs are usually on "jalopies" bought for school transportation and would otherwise not be done.

The "show piece" of the shop department is the trade school, headed by William Runkewich. There is, an interesting story back of the growth of the trade school. The first beginning was the organization of the school shop co-ordination program by H. C. Stark and Hugh Pierce back in 1939, when an agreement was reached between the school and the Clark Equipment company to inaugurate an apprentice system. The nature of the Clark Equipment business here made this project a "natural" as the company was engaged in several fundamental processes, such as pattern-making, moulding and tool-making. The apprentice did the practical work in the plant and studied the theory and significance of the applications in the school.

When World War II broke out the Michigan Department of Vocational Education began promoting special training for workers in war production factories, offering to furnish equipment. The Clark Equipment company signified agreement. Stark and Pierce went after the equipment. Large classes of adults were trained in machine operation there during the war and at the end of the war the Michigan department in charge gave the equipment to the school.

Opportunities opened up everywhere as the industrial companies began to dismantle shops which had been built and equipped by the government. The Buchanan school administration was alert to profit by the situation. Stark sent Emory Toogood, then school-shop co-ordinator, to scout for equipment that would fit into a school shop set-up.

As a result the local trade school acquired practically new equipment with values nearing \$100,000 on a token payment of a dollar plus the cost of transportation from the plant to the

school. Now the Buchanan high school has the finest trade school machine shop in southwestern Michigan, barring none, unless in cities like Kalamazoo. This must be credited to the alertness of the school administration, and the fine co-operation of the Clark Equipment company plus the very real adaptability of its production processes to apprentice training.

The machine shop is in many ways self-sustaining because of the fact that the equipment is well diversified. For example, all cutters on the milling machine which are ordinarily sharpened outside may now receive that service within the shop. Many of the attachments used on the machines are manufactured wholly in the shop. Illustrations are milling arbors, surface grinders, attachments, boring bars, clamps, special types of bolts. Also the department makes many repairs for the maintenance department of the schools which would otherwise be done outside the school. Because of this variety of machining equipment Mr. Runkewich has been able to buy at junk prices, machine parts which were scrapped by the Clark Equipment Co. The school, which does not have to pay production costs in the form of union wages to students, can retrofit these parts until they serve as well as new replacements.

Clark Equipment 9-Mo. Earnings \$3.65 Per Share

Clark Equipment Co. earnings for the nine-month period ended September 30 - were \$4,153,018, George Spatta, president, reported today in a letter to shareholders.

The earnings are equal to \$3.65 per common share, an increase of eight cents per share over the \$3.57 earned per share for the corresponding period in 1953 when the dollar figure was \$4,041,622.

Gross sales for the nine month period were \$77,861,109, a decline of approximately 17 per cent from sales of \$93,605,969 for the same period a year ago. Earnings, however, increased 3 per cent during this period.

Earnings for the third quarter were \$1,374,168, equal to \$1.21 per common share. This corresponds with earnings of \$970,392, equal to 84 cents per common share, for the third quarter of 1953. Third quarter sales in 1954 were \$26,143,337, compared with \$28,735,510 for the third quarter last year.

Although third quarter sales declined approximately a million dollars from the second quarter figure, with earnings off \$161,000 for the quarter, the drop in earnings and sales was not nearly as great as has been the case during the third quarter of previous years in the recent past. Since 1948, the third quarter has historically been Clark's lowest income producing quarter with the single exception of 1950, when third quarter sales were spurred by Korean war purchasing.

Mr. Spatta reported that sales by the company's Industrial Truck and Construction Machinery Divisions are continuing at good levels. Civilian sales of materials handling industrial trucks are actually ahead of last year's sales, he said, although the division's total is down due to the almost total stoppage of government purchasing. Sales of the Automotive Division are below 1953 levels, due to continued curtailment of purchasing by truck, bus and farm tractor manufacturers who buy transmissions, axles, axle housings and other drive components manufactured by Clark.

Clark's current assets as of Sept. 30, 1954 were \$38,453,291 and total assets were \$60,222,924. On the same date last year, current assets were \$48,654,176 and total assets were \$67,063,011. (In the interim, \$10,000,000 borrowed from banks in a revolving credit arrangement was repaid.) Current liabilities were \$7,369,043 and on the corresponding date a year ago \$15,265,594.

Mich. Solons May Continue Levy On Business Activity

Big and small business will be bailing out the state treasury for years with a "temporary" tax not expected to die.

Tax authors in the legislature already are planning to extend the \$2,000,000 business activities tax beyond its June 15 deadline. Senator Carlton H. Morris (R-Kalamazoo), considered a tax expert of some talent, figures its the way out, because nobody has complained and the money is very nice, indeed.

"Where else can we get \$2,000,000 a year so easily?" he asked.

The tax started as an unwanted child two years ago when the legislature was frightened by the deficit of \$65,000,000. Gov. Williams pouted that it might help the state's financial position, but let it become law without his signature. He favored a corporation profits tax.

Businessmen fought it originally because they were hazy about it—and a flexible tax bill in the hands of legislators can be a lethal thing. Later, after study,

business and industry supported the measure.

Now everybody is happy about the whole arrangement. At least on the surface.

Legislators figure they can keep the tax on the books and keep the cash rolling in without causing a stir. Businessmen feel it's a better tax than one on incomes over \$10,000 or others equally obnoxious.

Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler would like to build roads with the proposed \$100,000,000 bond issue.

Gov. Williams would like to name a 50-member statewide commission to tell him where they should be built, hinting broadly that Ziegler would bow to political demands.

Mayor Ralph W. Crego of Lansing is organizing one group to promote U. S. 127 and U. S. 27, which go through the center of the state, making local merchants delighted with their free-spending tourists.

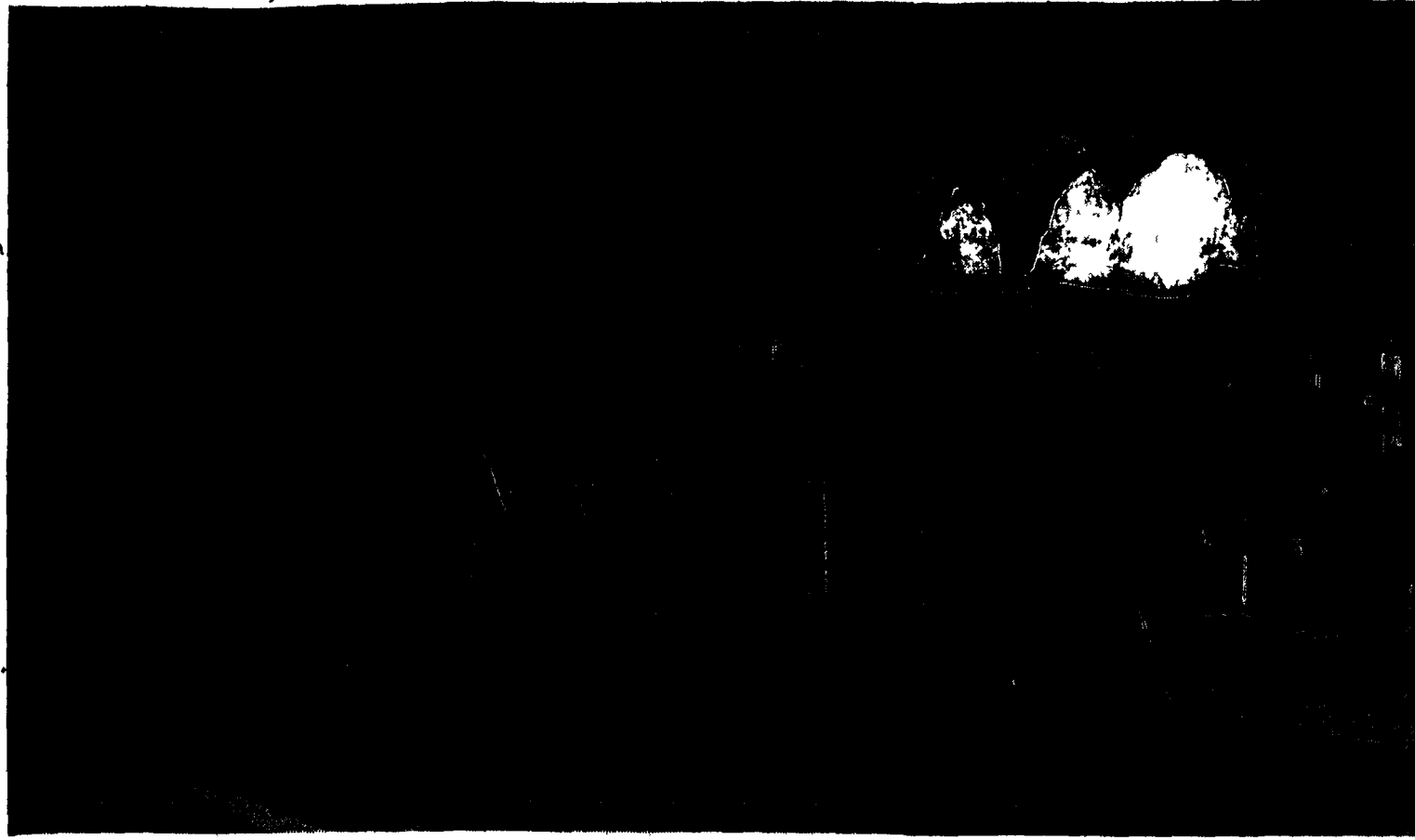

Michigan Slips to 5th In Tourist Industry

Michigan's tourist industry, big-
gest and best in history, is looking
for another pot of gold

That was the reason that the
Michigan Tourist Council decided
to ask the legislature for another

\$100,000 next year to advertise the
state's attractions.

"We just can't compete with the
other states which spend more
money on promotion," said Chair-
man Robert W. Budd.

Michigan ranked third as a
tourist state three years ago, be-
hind New York and California.
Now it has slipped to fifth, with
Pennsylvania and Florida moving

up.

Budd says Michigan is paying
out the same number of dollars as
before, but they don't buy as much
advertising.

Last year, the Council received
\$331,000, but turned over \$100,000
to the four regional tourist coun-
cils. With another slice taken
out for administration, the state
office is spending \$146,000 for pro-
motion this year.

Budd said tourists spend mil-
lions in Michigan each year—most
of it taxable. This turns back
money to the state treasury in
liquor sales, cigarette and other
levies.

Legislators in the past have
heard requests for more advertis-
ing money with an almost phre-
nomenal lack of enthusiasm. They
threaten to cast the council into
oblivion and turn over the func-
tion to local Chambers of Com-
merce.

But, 1955 will be around Jan. 1
and the election will be history for
another two years.

Children are being politely asked
by the State and Federal govern-
ments to drink more milk.

Federal authorities have releas-
ed \$1,500,000 to the state this year,
to expand the school milk program
and the kids are being asked to help.

Under the old arrangement, the
schools received a 1-cent rebate on
each bottle of milk sold. The new
money gives the schools 4 1/2 cents
back.

Newest idea for selling more
milk, paid for in part by the Fed-
eral government. Install milk
vending machines in the schools.

A young lawyer who gambled in
politics and lost is gambling again.

Clemens, who also quit to run un-
successfully for the Congressional
nomination in his district.

Republicans hope, Donald S.
Leonard will be governor. If he
is, Elmer will be off the public
payroll again in the make-over of
the executive and administrative
phase of government. If Wil-
liams stays, Elmer still faces con-
firmation troubles with the Repub-
lican Senate.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING BORROWING OF NOT TO EXCEED \$80,000,000.00 TO PAY BONUSES FOR MILITARY SERVICE DURING THE "KOREAN" WAR. Shall Article X of the Constitution be amended by adding Section 26 to authorize borrowing not to exceed \$80,000,000.00 for the payment of bonuses, of not to exceed \$500.00 to each person who performed military service between June 27, 1950 and December 31, 1953, or if deceased, to other persons named therein?

(PROPOSAL NO. 4)

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 33, ARTICLE V OF THE CONSTITUTION TO PERMIT THE LEGISLATURE TO AUTHORIZE CHARITABLE LOTTERIES. Shall Section 33, Article V of the Constitution which now prohibits all forms of lotteries, be amended to permit the legislature to authorize lotteries to be conducted by and lottery tickets sold by non-profit charitable organizations as hereinafter defined by law?

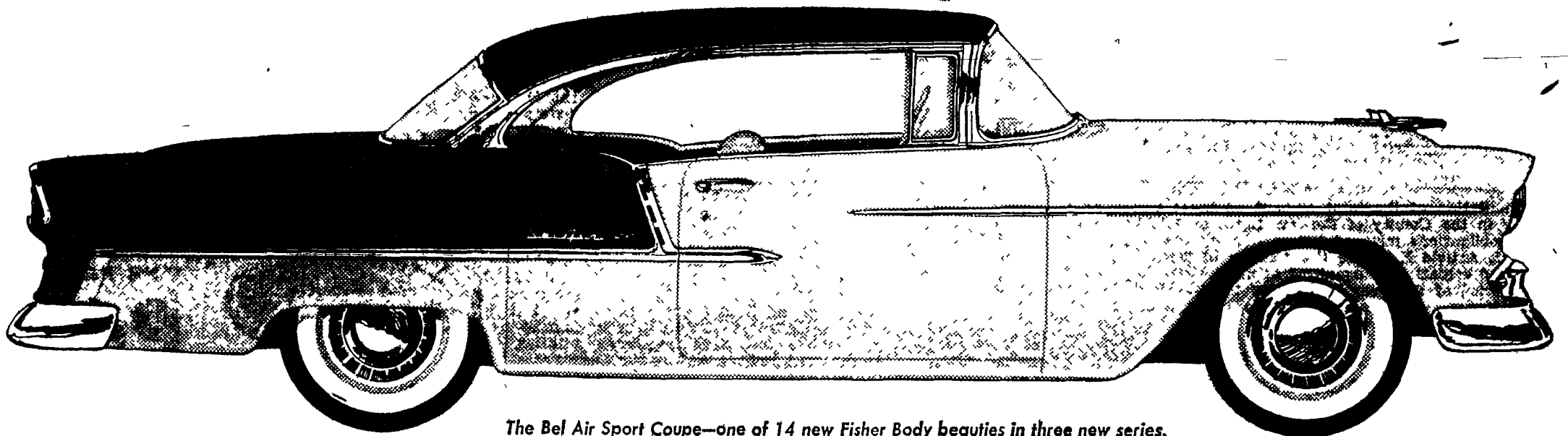

Bill Blake Tells About The Life In Short Grass Country

The Record received the following letter this week from Bill Blake, once of Buchanan, now "out in old Wyoming" in the wildest section of that relic of the Wild West. He writes:

I have just received the Oct 14th issue and enjoyed every article in it as usual. It is a source of real joy to receive my issue every week and to read all of the happenings.

I was rather surprised to find an article on the front page describing my present status and standing. I thank you for the space. But I have several corrections to make regarding it.

But before I mention the mistakes, permit me to commend your recollection of the type and condition of the country around Kaycee. We may not be in the wildest section of Wyoming, but I believe it approaches it. If you would have told me while I was yet a boy (and you did) that any area of the U S was as desolate as some parts of Wyoming are, I wouldn't have believed you (and I didn't). They often speak of the "wild and woolly" West. Well, do to the recent series of droughts there is not much wool left, but believe me, it is still plenty wild! They tell me that grass once flourished on these barren hills, but I am skeptical. In fact, it is all they can do to raise the stuff on the irrigated river bottoms. Maybe you could arrange to Clint Youle to send a little "our unwanted moisture out this

But it seems God always has the upper hand in intelligence, and all this barren land that men have tried to even give away, seems to be loaded with minerals. As you mentioned, there is oil all around us, which is just now being tapped. Then, too, it seems utterly useless land is being gobbled up

at the present. We only await the next discovery to see what intelligent man will do.

Now for the corrections. We have done very little, if any, social work, so-called. Our mission in life is to present Jesus Christ as the only hope for sin-laden man in a sin-cursed world. We strive to become all things to all men that we might by all means save some. If this is what is meant by "social" work in your article, all well and good. But we do not wish people to think that our time is spent merely in providing "good-times" for people, neither just a routine of Church "activities." We do hold two preaching services on Sunday as well as teach a Sunday School class. We have two Bible training classes on Monday nights for the younger people. On Tues. nights, I attempt to be the leader of the local boy Scout troop. Thursday nights, we have a midweek Bible study for the older folks. During the summer, we hold Vacation Bible Schools wherever we can as well as helping in Bible camps. If this be considered social, let me be informed, for it is from beginning to end, a spiritual matter with us.

What boys and girls, men and women need today is not a better social program, but Jesus Christ. Better recreational facilities never guaranteed to keep a person out of trouble, but faith in Jesus Christ has. Please understand, I am not discrediting such movements as the Buchanan Youth Council and like organizations. They serve a purpose. But I do contend that such organizations are missing the mark when they try to supplant the spiritual aspect of a youth with mere clean recreation.

Secondly, I am not a graduate of the Midwest Bible and Missionary Institute. I have spent three and one half years there, but did not graduate. You might say that we are in the practical phase of our training now. We plan to be in this work for at least two years,

after which we will return to school to complete our academic training. Upon graduation, we plan on going to South America as missionaries. We feel the training we are now receiving will be valuable in our future work.

Thirdly, Bill Blake never was a star in any athletic game. He was always one of number which it was necessary to have to make a star possible. I appreciate your overrated estimation of my abilities, but such mistakes as classifying me as a star are apt to bring reproach upon your personal capacity to recognize the virtues which go to make a star athletic contender. Thank you, anyway. Who knows, such mistakes might cause people to wonder about your honesty?

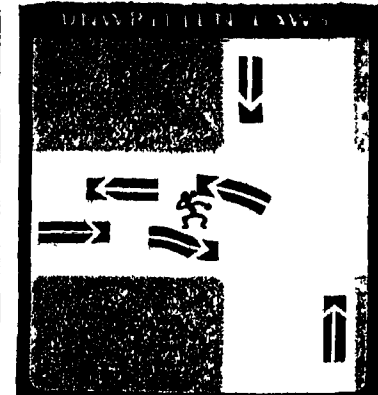

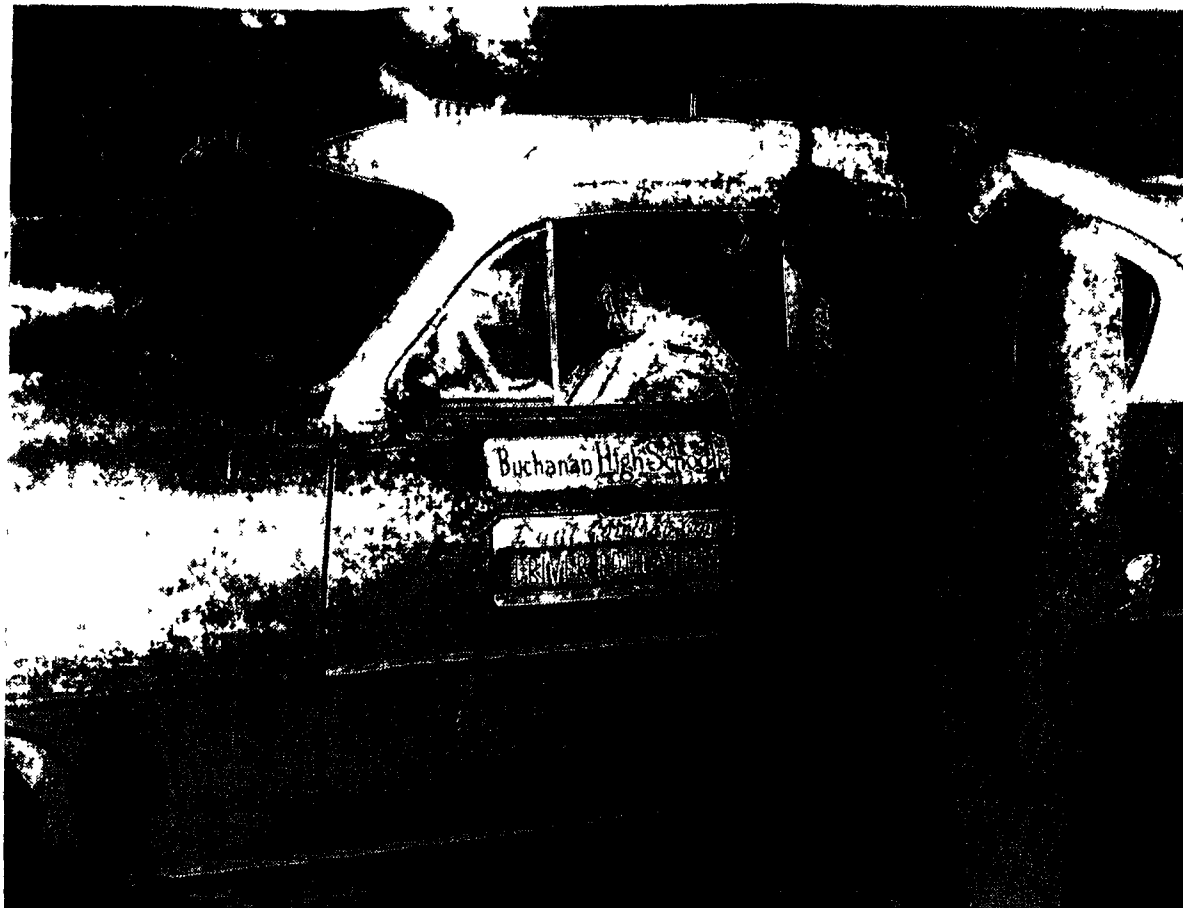

Student Drivers Like On-the-job Training

Buchanan high school's first course in Student Driver Education is proceeding satisfactorily with the maximum of 32 students enrolled, all sophomores or juniors, 16 boys and 16 girls. The potential size of the class is limited by the number of hours required weekly in the training car loaned by Wisner Motors, Inc. Each student must have two hours a week in the car. All of the training in the car must be done outside the regular school hours. So Mr. Rizer has two one-hour driving classes daily, starting at 3.30 and 4.30 with four students in the car each time, the students on each trip rotating for fifteen minutes at the wheel. That totals eight students taking in-the-car instruction daily for four days per week. Friday is kept clear for a catch-up day, making up any time lost by closing of schools.

Krugh Announces Series of Safe Driving Lessons

Chief Jack Krugh today announced a series of 19 safe driving lessons dealing with pedestrian safety. These are being run by the Berrien County Record as a public service to assist in saving the lives of local residents while they are on foot in traffic.

"All motorists and pedestrians are urged to study the illustrations which will be shown in the series because they represent the most common types of difficulty which result from mixing the man on foot with the man on wheels in the traffic stream," the Chief said.

"In traffic it's what you don't know and don't understand, and therefore are not prepared for, that gets you into trouble," he added.

According to Chief Krugh any motorist or pedestrian who learns these 19 lessons will be much less apt to become involved in a pedestrian accident than a person who has not thought out these practical driving and walking situations.

This is the season of the year when several dangerous conditions "gang up" in motorists and pedestrians. If it is twice as hard to drive safely at night then it must be three times as hard to drive equally safely when it's dark and raining. And it's probably four times as hard to drive equally safely when it's dark and snowing and the pavement is icy. The smart motorist takes these into account and looks harder, tries harder, and cuts his speed when conditions are against him.

In calling upon all motorists to cooperate with the pedestrian protection program the Chief said, "Just remember, there's an awful difference between banging up a fender and hitting a pedestrian."

for holidays, teacher conventions or for other reasons.

That makes 32 hours actual driving instruction week-days, or one hour for each pupil. Then on Saturday Rizer holds four driving classes of two hours each, which adds another 32 student hours of driving, or a total of 64 for the week. That means two hours for everyone of the 32 students, which is the amount required weekly for credit.

The Buchanan high school course measures up to the requirements which enables students to secure lower insurance rates than are ordinarily assessed against the untrained teenagers. The instructor, Earl Rizer, has received the required training and has a certificate from the State Department of Public Instruction. The equipment and the hours of actual driver training are up to requirements.

In the class room the American Automobile Association text book is used. There the students receive instruction in the state and city laws governing auto traffic. They are also instructed in the code of responsibility. The slogan is "sportsman-like driving."

Students of fourteen years of age or over and attending senior high school classes are eligible. However, the instructor was swamped with applications by far more students than could be

handled. As a result it was decided to "catch up" with the older students who applied. These were practically all in the sophomore or junior classes. It is expected that two or three semesters will cover the number of applicants from those classes and enable the instruction to be given eventually to the youngest students, where it is believed it will pay more dividends.

Practically all of the students learn very readily from instruction in the car, where they are taught how to enter parking places either forward into angle parking or backward into parallel parking and the other tricks of the business, plus public safety driving policy and technique on the highways.

The car has been equipped with "dual control" which does not mean two steering wheels, but an extra clutch and brake on the instructor's side of the front seat. Each student is insured for \$1,000 in case of injury, and the car carries insurance to the extent of \$300,000 public liability and \$100,000 property damage.

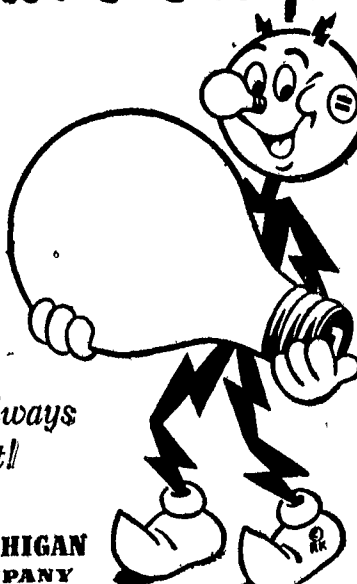

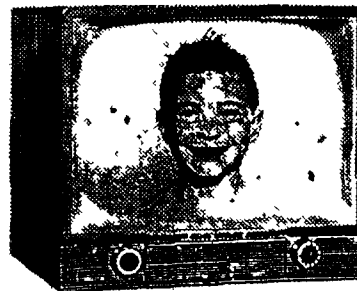

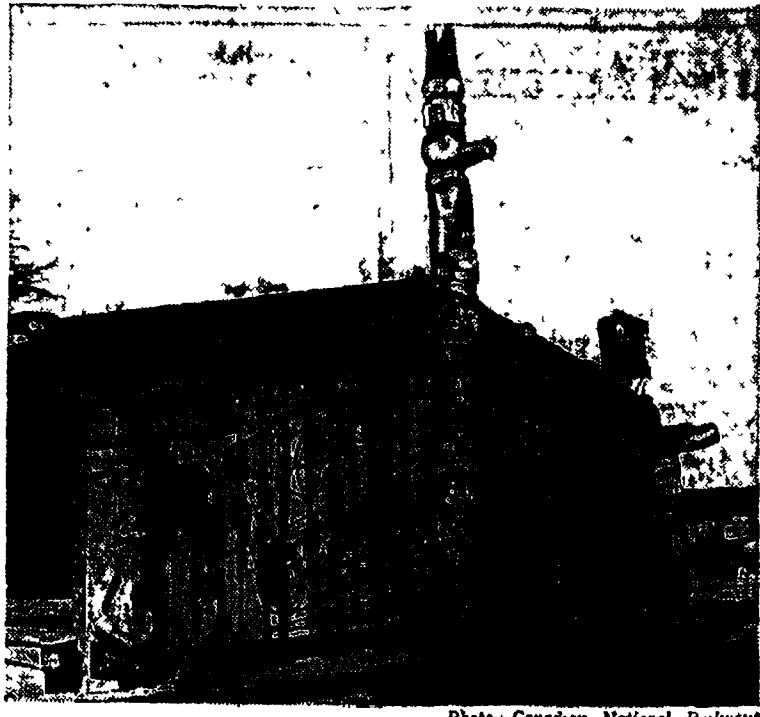

Judge Lamb Asks Consideration For Pedestrian Safety

Judge Rex E. Lamb today announced that his court is cooperating with the State Safety Commission on the October-November Safety Campaign to reduce pedestrian accidents. Motorists are expected to take into account the special hazards of the season—more hours of darkness, rain, snow, sleet, and more pedestrians shopping.

The death of over 400 pedestrians a year in Michigan is reasonable-proof that many motorists have failed to drive as safely as the law and their driver's license requires.

According to Judge Lamb there is no excuse for motorists failing to slow down and exercise special caution when they see a pedestrian or approach areas where pedestrians are likely to be found. "Quite aside from the law," the judge commented, "any motorist

driving a ton of steel should display special courtesy for the man on foot who is the under-dog in the traffic stream. Witnesses are frequently appalled at the discourteous motorist who scares a pedestrian half to death by just missing him or splashes water or mud on him when it is raining. "I am displaying in my courtroom the official safety poster which reads, "Watch for that Walker" as a reminder that the increasing number of hours of darkness which begin in the fall of the year require all motorists to drive more slowly.

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, Mich.—It took a circuit court jury of twelve persons over five hours this week to decide how much a Kalamazoo man should be paid for four hours in the Berrien county jail. Elmer B. Donovan got entangled with two Benton Harbor po-

lice in Jean Klock park on June 21, 1953. He had parked his 1932 model automobile in a place the officers said he should not. But Donovan didn't see fit to move it, arguing that the car was not illegally parked. The police ended the argument by throwing Donovan in jail on a charge of failing to obey a police officer. He was in jail four hours before making bond.

Donovan continued fighting. He fought a conviction in the Municipal court by carrying it to the circuit court. And there he won. A circuit court visiting judge acquitted him, reversing the lower court verdict.

Donovan still wasn't through fighting. He promptly filed two \$100,000 law suits, one against the two officers for false arrest, the other against two city officials for conspiracy to improperly incarcerate him. The suits came to trial this week before another visiting Judge, Chester P. O'Hara, of Detroit.

Again he registered at least a partial victory. The jury awarded him \$5,000 against Patrolman Edwin Ward and ex-sergeant James Guy. Guy has since resigned from the force to become a dental salesman.

Now it's someone else's turn to fight. City Attorney Wilbur Cunningham said the suit will "go on up" before any money will change hands, meaning, of course, that the city plans an appeal to the supreme court.

The first step, though will be a motion to have the verdict set aside on grounds that the officers acted in good faith. "We think we have at least proved a reasonable cause for arrest," Cunningham said.

So it looks as though the suit, which all began over a parking incident, will stay parked right in the courts for sometime before being resolved.

TRIGGER TOPICS—Valentine McClendon, 33, of South Bend, brandished a wicked looking "gat" several years ago and the impulsive act begat him nothing but trouble—trouble that still plagues him.

McClendon brandished the gun in the wrong places—places like a grocery store in Bertrand township, a liquor store and a gasoline station in South Bend.

Of course, the people who were looking down the business end of that barrel didn't take time to realize it was only a toy cap pistol. They just shivered and quaked and handed over their money. That's what McClendon told them to do.

McClendon and a pal, who had a sawed off slung from his belt, were later caught in South Bend. The pal is still in the Indiana State prison at Michigan City, but McClendon got out recently.

He walked through those big iron prison gates but not to freedom. Michigan state police were there waiting to grab him under a five year old warrant. That grocery store happened to be on the Michigan side of the state line.

So McClendon was in court again this week. Again he pleaded guilty to the charge. Again he sits waiting to be sent to prison.
