Fox and Dog Trapped in Woven Wire Fences

That a woven wire fence can be a quite effective animal trap was proven this week by two novel catches in the North Buchanan district.

A red fox and a wire terrier dog were found hanging in woven wire fences within forty rods of each other on the Jack Harroff place and on the south line fence of the Dunbar farm.

Jack Harroff found the fox suspended by one hind leg, which he had inserted through a top loop in the wire. He had evidently jumped the fence, kicking back against the top of it to clear it, when one leg accidentally went through one of the top loops. He was alive but had struggled until the leg was half amputated. Harroff put the fox out of his misery and went after the township bounty.

Earl Dunbar was having his gram combined when he found the wire terrier suspended in the same manner. The terrier was not hurt but about half dead from fatigue and hunger. He operated in getting loose and responded gratefully on receiving refreshments. Dunbar said that his dog had been looking in that direction and whining suspiciously during the two previous nights, so he estimated that the terrier had been hung in the fence all of 48 hours. After a rest and feed he took off for parts unknown.

The Story of Buchanan



THE INDIANS MOVE TO WESTERN HOME

The Indian village best known to Buchananites these days is that of the former "Moccasin village" on the west bank of the St. Joseph river at the foot of Moccasin Bluff, about a mile north of Buchanan.

The spot gets that name from the fact that in the years immediately preceding the removal of the Indians the chief of the village was "Cog Moccasin", in English, "Porcupine Shoe". The village was probably located on the high ground just west of the Red Bud Trail, where it curves away to the north from the side of the bluff, about a mile north of Buchanan. Chief Moccasin left his name in Buchanan in the names of a street, a school, a federal housing project, and a bluff.

The Moccasin village site is well-known among archeologists for the interesting variety of remains of different tribal cultures, indicating that it was a favorite residence of successive Indian tribes over a long period of time. It had been a favorite hunting ground for amateur archeologists since the start of white settlement in the vicinity. So much so that when a research party from the Museum of Anthropology of the University of Michigan investigated it in the summer of 1948 they complained that its value had then been much diminished by the unscientific spade-work of the amateurs.

Pioneer residents of the site, including George Churchill, found many thousands of fine Indian relics. Following the deaths of these pioneer collectors their assets were sold or dispersed among relatives, and now undoubtedly are a part of Indian relic collections over the entire United States. For some years a member of the faculty of Notre Dame University used to curvy the site annually just after the spring rains had washed new relics bare.

and the Indians. He had fought with the alliance of tribes under Tecumseh at the battle of the Thames in Ontario, Canada, where the martial power of the Indians was finally crushed. Apparently after that he had drowned his wounded pride in liquor. At the treaty of the tribes at Chicago in 1821, where he represented his tribe in proposed cessions of lands to the whites, he was told by Lewis Cass, then the Indian commissioner, to keep sober if possible in order to drive the best possible bargain for his people.

He replied, "Father, we care not for the land, the money or the goods, what we want is whiskey, give us whiskey." He was then quite old and from that time on his decline was rapid. McCoy made in his journals the following notation on his death: "On the 27th of July, 1826, a poor destitute Indian woman was murdered about a mile and a half from our house under circumstances too shocking to be related. About the same time Topinabee, the principal chief, fell from his horse while under the influence of ardent spirits, and received an injury from which he died two days afterwards. Both these deaths were attributed to the whiskey sellers."

The only chieftain in this region to preserve his dignity and self-respect by abstaining from whiskey was Pokagon. Edward Cowles, the first historian of Berrien county, said of Pokagon that "he was the reality of the noble men of whom we read. He was a man of considerable talent, and in his many business transactions with the early settlers was never known to break his word."

Pokagon was a Catholic, one of the relatively few who had received their faith from the earlier Catholic missionaries and preserved it. He was also a friend of the Baptist Carey Mission and moved his village from Cass county to a place near it after McCoy came. So also had Weesaw, who came from Prairie Ronde, and Topinabee.

THE LIONS CLUB BUILD A TRACK

Giving in funds or in goods that are the equivalent of funds may be one way for people to express interest in community promotion, but a very much more vital participation is the contribution of sizeable portions of their time and strength in construction.

This has been in very vivid evidence in the past week in the work begun by members of the Lions club for the installation of a quarter-mile cinder running track around the football gridiron at Memorial Field. Buchanan high school track teams have always been handicapped by the lack of a good running track, either for meets or practice. A good track, if let to a contractor, would probably cost a few thousand dollars. There isn't that much available. So the Lions started work on the project two weeks ago.

During August they are continuing to devote their meeting nights to the work with an estimate of 25 to 30 men available. They will hold their dinner meetings those nights at Riley's, going in work clothing. Last Thursday night, July 26, they moved some fence and bleachers, set the grade stakes, and distributed the lumber convenient for use. In addition to the labor they donate, they secured by finagling some concession in costs of material and in labor which they cannot contribute themselves. The cost will, consequently be fairly low.

The track will be 20 1/2 feet wide on the 100-yard-dash straightaway, in front of the stadium seats. On the opposite side it will be 14 1/2 feet wide. The base installation will be six inches deep on the average, with extra installation in low spots. About 1,000 cubic yards of cinders will be used, the base being entirely of cinders, with cinders mixed with clay on top to afford a solid grip for running spikes. There will be curbs of native oak lumber on each side, treated chemically to prevent rotting.

The Lions expect that the construction will provide sufficient "program" for several meeting nights. They also expect to be on the sidelines in future track meets, yelling "Run! you so-and-sos, we built a track for you!" The kids won't have any comeback to that. Estimate 2,200 To 2,400 Berrien Youth Will Enter Displays

Growing steadily like the youth it represents, the Berrien County Youth Fair promises to be another year "bigger" when it opens next Wednesday, Aug. 15, at Berrien Springs, for its sixth annual showing.

Fair Association president John Pfeil of Niles estimated the fair will be 15 or 20 percent bigger in all its phases this year. Each year since the first fair in 1946 it has made marked annual growth, he said, adding all indications are for equally as much increase this year.

He predicted some 2,200 to 2,400 young people of the towns and farms of the county will show their work and achievements this year. They will put their exhibits in place Tuesday in preparation for the start of fair activities Wednesday morning.

The exhibits will remain in place until Sunday afternoon, Aug. 19, in line with the fair's policy, there will be no gambling concessions or other games of chance on the grounds.

Stage shows booked by Barnes & Caruthers of Chicago, will be presented at 8 p.m. each evening, Wednesday through Saturday, with a complete change of acts the last two evenings.

Over 200 horses and riders from five midwestern states are expected to appear in the two horse shows on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Pfeil said the fair's horse shows have grown into one of the top horse shows in the Midwest, outside of several big state shows.

A tractor-pulling contest, scheduled at 9 a.m. Saturday, will provide some new features this year. In addition to the colorful pull against a weighted stoneboat, the drivers will try their skill in a driving test which will include a 200-foot race as backing, two- and four-wheel trailers over a turning course.

Prize beef animals, swine and sheep exhibited by boys and girls will be put up for sale in the 4-H livestock auction at 10 a.m. Friday.

The job of judging the exhibits in over 225 classes will get underway at 9 a.m. Wednesday and continue through Thursday, with completion scheduled Friday afternoon when the horse classes are judged.

Grand opening ceremonies are slated at 2:15 p.m. Wednesday, and will be broadcast. Free acts by professional entertainers and demonstrations of skill by individuals and groups of young people will be presented in the show ring the first three afternoons.

All boys and girls have been invited to enter their pets in the Pet Show at 7:30 Thursday evenings. All who show pets will receive a ribbon and an ice cream bar. First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded in the nine classes of the Pet Show.

Still Rattlesnakes Here, Says Herman Hess

While rattlesnakes are not nearly so common as they once were in this area, it is a mistake to say they are extinct, says Herman Hess, amateur marksman and nature-lover of Buchanan.

Hess says that he recently ran over and killed a rattlesnake with his car near Dayton. He has often seen rattlesnakes near Wagner Lake, where, as is their nature, they crawl out on a rocky point to sun themselves. He has seen them there in recent years, and is certain that they can be seen again. They are not regularly inhabitants of marshes, and there is little danger from them there. They are the only poisonous snake in Michigan.

In addition to the hobbies noted above, Hess is a scrapbooker with a book filled with old rifle and revolver targets in which he nicked with some remarkable center shots, also with many articles on nature lore. In the latter are several pages of texts and fine pictures on rattlers and other snakes, with an eloquent defense of nearly all harmful Mr. Hess should place his scrapbook in the library or other place where the Buchanan public might get a little education from it.

There are a large number of beautiful animal and fish pictures in the book.

Library Given Valuable Gift By Jess East

Hundreds Of Pictures Of The Old-Time Buchanan People And Scenes Are Included

The Buchanan Public Library recently received a valuable gift in the form of the Jess East collection of pictures of old-time Buchanan scenes, organizations, groups and individuals.

Mr. East has been collecting these pictures for many years, the set has a real historical interest. It is believed that the collection numbers over 1,500 pictures. The pictures will not be available for view by the public until the library has prepared them for public handling. After that they should be items of inexhaustible interest to all who are interested in old-time Buchanan history, but in middle 19th century fashions, dress, and other archeological matters.

Mr. East has been living in Battle Creek for several years, and had left them in the care of Mrs. Delores Lynch, who turned them over to the library.

They have been placed in the library as the most logical place of preservation and exhibition. The library hopes that when the problem of display is solved the collection may be enlarged. Any one who has such pictures which they would like to place in a permanent file is asked to communicate with Mrs. Lillian Vignasky, librarian, telephone 64.

The library board and staff wish to thank Mr. East for his valuable addition to its resources.

This village location was ideal from the point of view of the Indians. The top ground on its site is known by some experts as "Copperess silt", which is good corn land. The village site itself combined closeness to water with an altitude commanding views of a considerable distance up and down the river, so that surprise attack by water route was less likely. It was also the point of an important river ford at the "Moccasin rifle" that existed there before the Berrien Springs and Buchanan power dams were erected. For this reason it was the converging point of several Indian trail routes. Added to these special advantages was its location on a stream swarming with the great sturgeon, where were a favorite Indian food, and in a region famous for its rich resources in animals, for food and furs.

The missionary, Isaac McCoy, recorded in his journal a visit to Moccasin village "On the morning of July 4, 1824, I took Noaquett, alias Luther Rice, one of our Indian boys, who had acquired some knowledge of English, and rode five miles to an Indian village (Moccasin's) At the house where we halted we found the Indians at their usual occupations. One woman was pounding corn in a mortar, two were making moccasins, one was preparing bark for making sacks. Some of the men were idle and four of them were playing at cards. We were received with the usual expressions of friendship, though the men with cards were too much interested in their game to take much notice of us. I entered into conversations with others but could not divert the attention of the gamblers from their cards. At length I told the owner of the house I would like to talk to them about religion. They replied that they would be glad to hear me. They were informed that if it were agreeable to them such visits would be frequently repeated. "Yes," said Porcupine Moccasin, who had just been at cards, "nobody will be sorry for that. We will be glad when you come and will listen to you."

Topinabee, a noted Potawatomi warrior, was the chief of the tribes in this region, and his name was affixed to a number of treaties between the government

1951 Wheat Harvest Slows Down With 5 Pct. Still Out

The 1951 wheat harvest of the Buchanan district slowed down because of damp weather the forepart of the week with a remnant of approximately five per cent remaining in the field.

The Buchanan Co-ops had shipped out 42 cars yesterday which added to the larger amount trucked out this approximated the total as of this date in 1950. The Buchanan Co-ops now operate two large silos, each hauling from 550 to 600 bushels a year.

In spite of cool weather the corn crop has been developing rapidly, with some fields already shooting ears. The weather has been excellent for growth so far, but more heat will be needed to mature the harvest. The crop is now too far along to be damaged greatly by drought and if not hit by premature frost, there should be plenty of corn in the district this year.

A fair to light crop of Transparent is now in the late stage of harvest, and Dutchess and the rather rare old-fashioned Red Astrakans is coming on. Many orchards are also heavily laden by scrub, which won a foothold when successive rains interfered with continuous and complete spray coverage.

The summer crop averages better than the winter, in which it is reported to be running from 50% down in North Buchanan orchards. Red Delicious, Jonathans, and Stayman Winesaps are reported low in yields in most orchards, although conditions vary from one orchard to another.

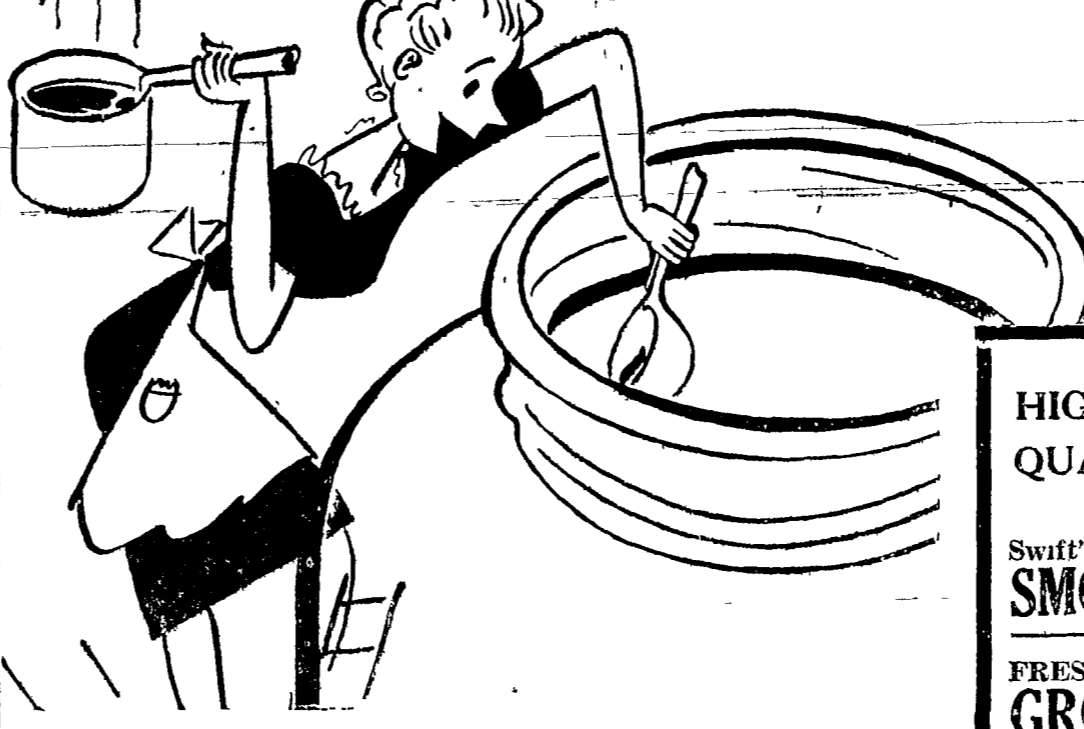

Particularly there is a large need for such benefits by the disabled veterans and members of their families.

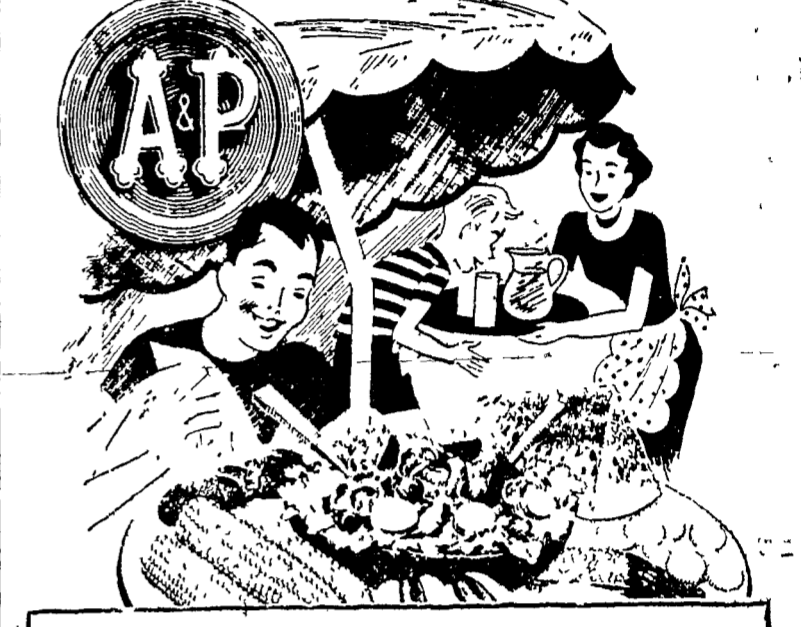

Flood Relief Lags In Buchanan

**Total \$464.65
Reported Friday
In Berrien Co.**

Response to the appeal for contributions to the special American Red Cross flood relief fund has been comparatively slow in Buchanan, states Frank Coward, cash-

ier of the Union State Bank, which is the Buchanan depository. Other places where contributions may be turned in are the city hall, Sexton's, and the Shannah Real Estate & Insurance agency. Berrien's chapter chairman, Atty. Small, announced Friday that the special drive in this county has netted \$464.65 to date. The figure does not include collections from canisters placed around the county. The special

drive probably will run another two weeks. The American Red Cross has undertaken the huge job of interviewing 19,000 families whose possessions were wiped out by the billion-dollar floods that swept down the Missouri and Kaw rivers. That's what L H Peterson, Red Cross field director from Fort Custer, told officials of the Berrien county Red Cross chapter at a meeting in St. Joseph head-

quarters Friday. "By far the biggest job lies ahead of us," Peterson told Chapter Chairman Robert Small of Benton Harbor, and Flood Drive Chairman Richard Insley of St. Joseph. "This is true despite the fact that Red Cross has been providing food and temporary shelter for 45,000 persons since the flood struck," Peterson added. He said that help to replace losses sustained in the flood will be based on the Red Cross interviews. Financial assistance to recovery will be provided both by the Red Cross and the federal government. Red Cross replacement of furniture, livestock, clothing and repairs to damaged homes and farm buildings will be undertaken as a gift, not a loan, Peterson pointed out. He praised the Berrien Red Cross chapter for its part in helping the American Red Cross to raise a special \$5,000,000 fund for flood relief. He described the local chapter's organization as "one of the most efficient" in his district. But he warned that many times the \$5,000,000 figure set as the national Red Cross goal will be needed to complete floor relief work.

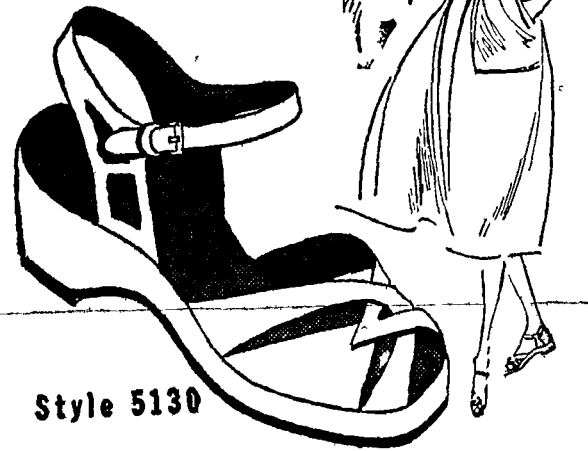

Which is introductory to a story sent the Record by Cpl. Jacob S. Myers, 317th Engineer Pontoon Bridge company, who was sent from Camp McCoy, Wis., to the Fort Riley area in Kansas including Marshall Field and Camp Funston.

The company went to construct a pontoon bridge until a civilian bridge company replaced a large bridge destroyed by the flood.

Myers' unit went in an automotive convoy, leaving Camp McCoy July 13 and arriving at Fort Riley July 20. The scene he found is described in a clipping from a Fort Riley newspaper sent by Cpl. Myers.

Trucks filled with men, shovels and blooms are a common sight on the post now. Fort Riley's cleanup is on the move.

When men first moved into the flooded areas, they found everything torn apart by the water's Great gaping holes pitted once level areas. Buildings were turned about on the foundation if still on the foundation at all.

Great sections of pavement from the roads were displaced. They have fallen or were literally picked up and moved by the rushing waters.

In the Lower Main Post area, where the most devastating damage was seen, entire barracks were torn apart and pieces strewn for yards around. What once had been barracks are now shambles.

What was the motor pool is now a group of hollow shells, some of which slant at grotesque angles. What had been Service Club 2 was only a partial building sections having been torn away.

Probably the greatest single loss incurred on the post was the destruction of Engineers' Bridge to Marshall Field. A pontoon bridge arrived Sunday from Camp McCoy, Wis., and Memphis, Tenn., to take the place of the washed-out span, and the 317th Eng. Pontoon Bridge Co. from Camp McCoy, was immediately prepared to begin the construction.

The 114th Eng. Combat Bn., of the National Guard, from Houston, Miss., and stationed at Camp McCoy, was busy itself on the buildings in the Ho. Det.

The 47th went to Marshall Field in amphibious vehicles, loading and unloading the personal equipment which had been stored on the second floor, and filthy salvage, caught by the flood but still repairable, for the move to their new location at Camp Forsyth.

Water reached up to six feet in some of the barracks and offices, deeper than that in some of the surrounding areas of Marshall Field. Ducks were used because the bridge was out. Most roads in the area are again passable.

Camp Funston seemed to have weathered the flood comparatively well. According to word received from the 10th Division headquarters, 12 buildings were condemned by the Engineers in the area. One building was completely lost. Included in the condemnations were 3 chapels, 2 headquarters buildings, and many dayrooms.

Many buildings had mud and water damage. Theaters and chapels, suffered severe damage to valuable equipment in that camp.

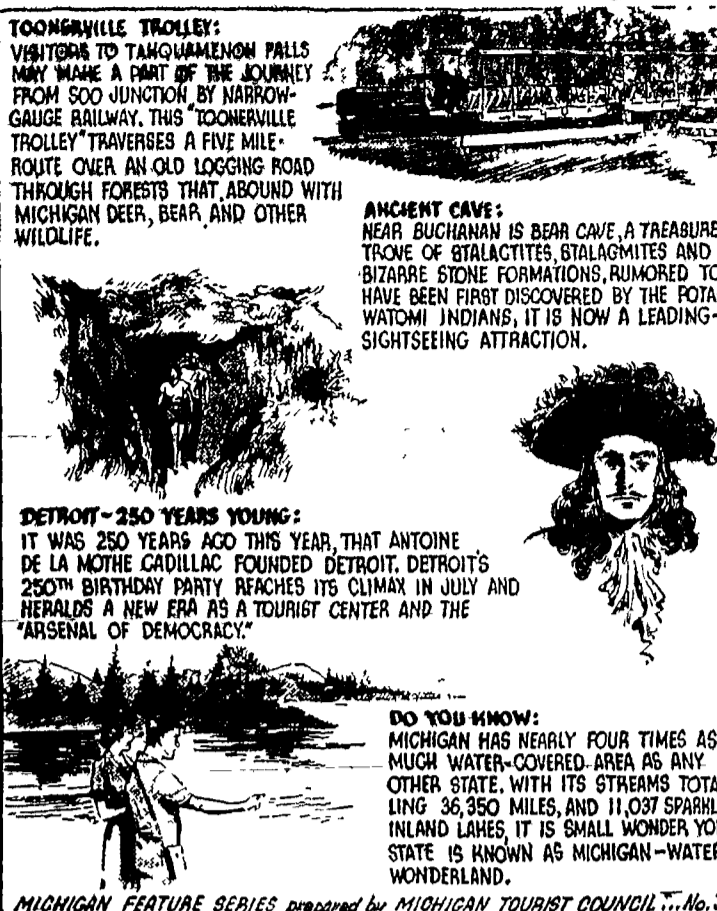

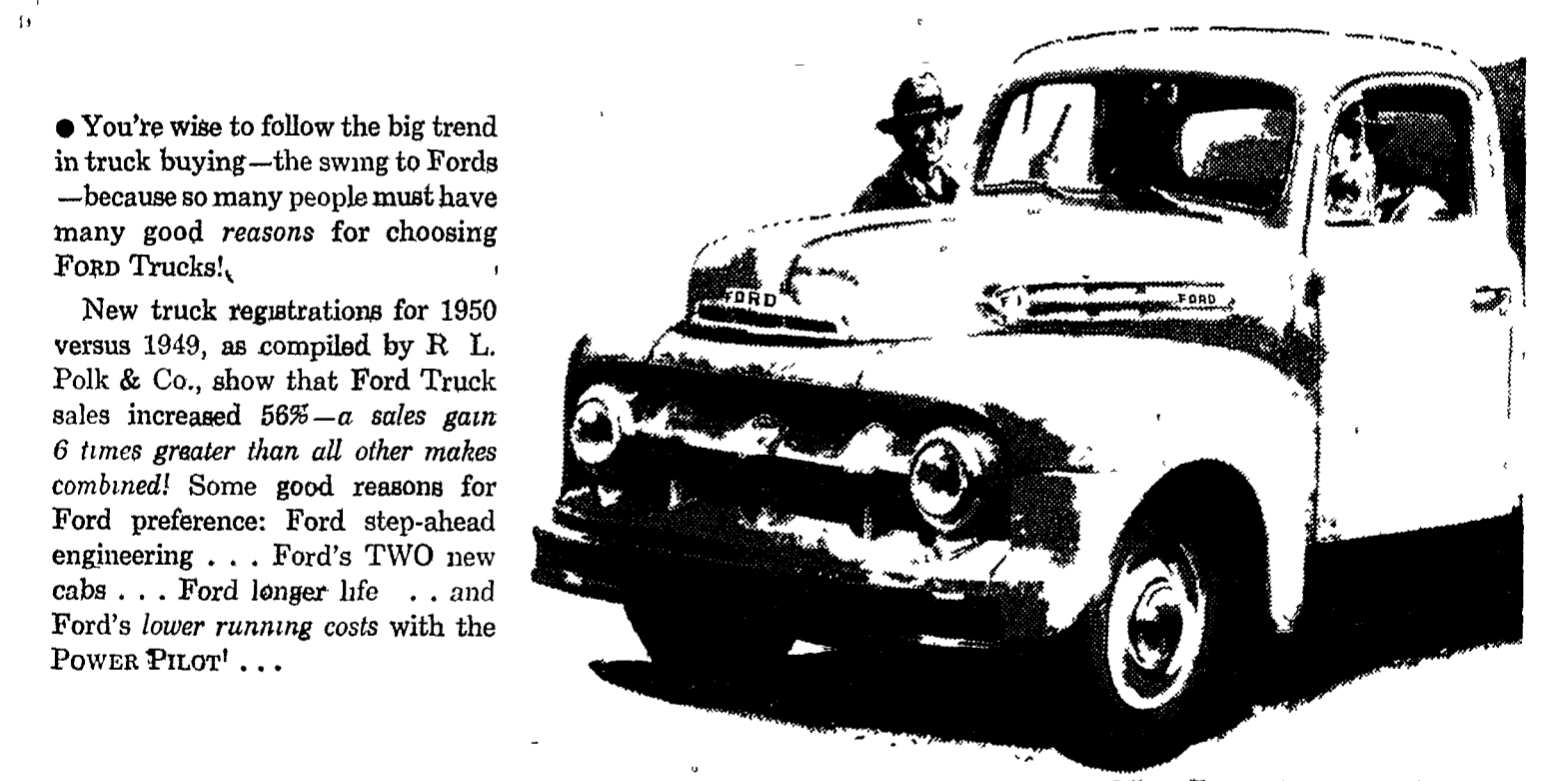

Mich. Growers Vote Against Grading Of Irish Potato Crop

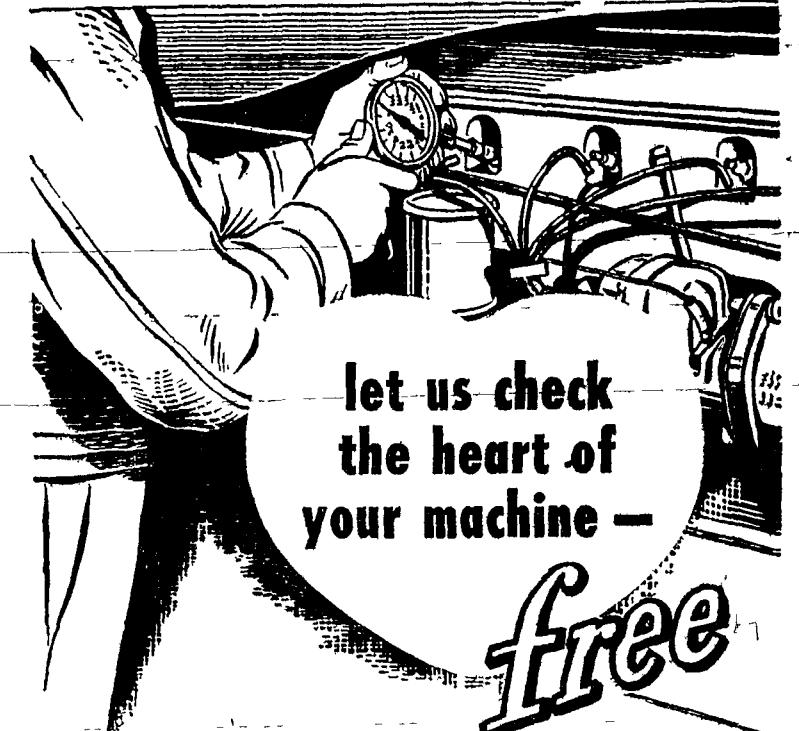

Department of Agriculture announced today that potato growers in the North Central production area (Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, and the commercial producing areas of Iowa and Indiana) favored the termination of Federal Marketing Order No. 60, as amended, in a referendum held in the area during the period of July 9-13.

in mid-August 1941 and a growers' referendum held during the period October 27, through Nov. 8, 1941. Six thousand five hundred fourteen ballots were cast by potato growers in that referendum 79.7% favored issuance of the order. Although the order, which covered Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and North Dakota, was originally issued on Jan. 17, 1942, no regulations were issued under it during the war years.

Background Information

The North Central Potato Marketing Order was originally issued Jan. 17, 1942 following hearings.

The Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937, as amended, requires that the Secretary of Agriculture terminate an order if a majority of the total number of growers in the area covered by such order, who marketed over 50% of the potatoes produced in the area, favor termination in the North Central referendum, less than a majority of the total number of growers in the area voted, but in view of the lack of support for the amended order shown in the referendum, the Secretary has concluded that the order no longer effectuates the purposes of the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act, as amended.

The order will be terminated as of 11:59 p.m. (CST) Aug. 15, 1951.

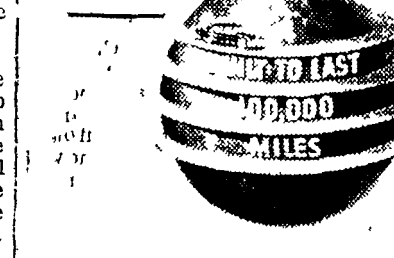

Michigan Traffic Deaths In June Up 16 Pct. Above 1950

Traffic deaths and injuries during June exceeded the record in any previous month this year, it is revealed in the State Police monthly statistical report. There was a daily average of 153 persons killed or injured. Deaths totaled 440 and the injured numbered 4,460. In all, there were 14,403 traffic accidents, an average of 480 per day. Compared with June of last year, deaths increased 16, or 13%, over 125. Injuries increased 512, or 13%, over 3,948, and accidents gained 2,272, or 19%, over 12,131. The death toll was the highest for June since 1941, when 178 were killed. All of the increase occurred on rural trunkline highways.

During the first six months of 1951 there have been 717 persons killed and 22,155 injured in 85,383 accidents. Compared with the same period last year, deaths increased 56, or 8%, over 661, injuries gained 3,108, or 16%, over 19,047, and accidents were up 14,475, or 20%, over 70,908.

Most of the fatality increase for the six-month period this year is attributed to the sharp upward trend in pedestrian deaths. "Travel during May, the latest month for which figures are available, was 2.3 billion miles, an increase of 12% over the 2.1 billion miles for the same month last year. Mileage for the first months was also up 12%, totalling 9.4 billion as compared with 8.4 billion. The death rate per 100 million miles of travel was 6% below that of 6.4 for the same period a year ago, the second time this year that it was lower than in 1950.

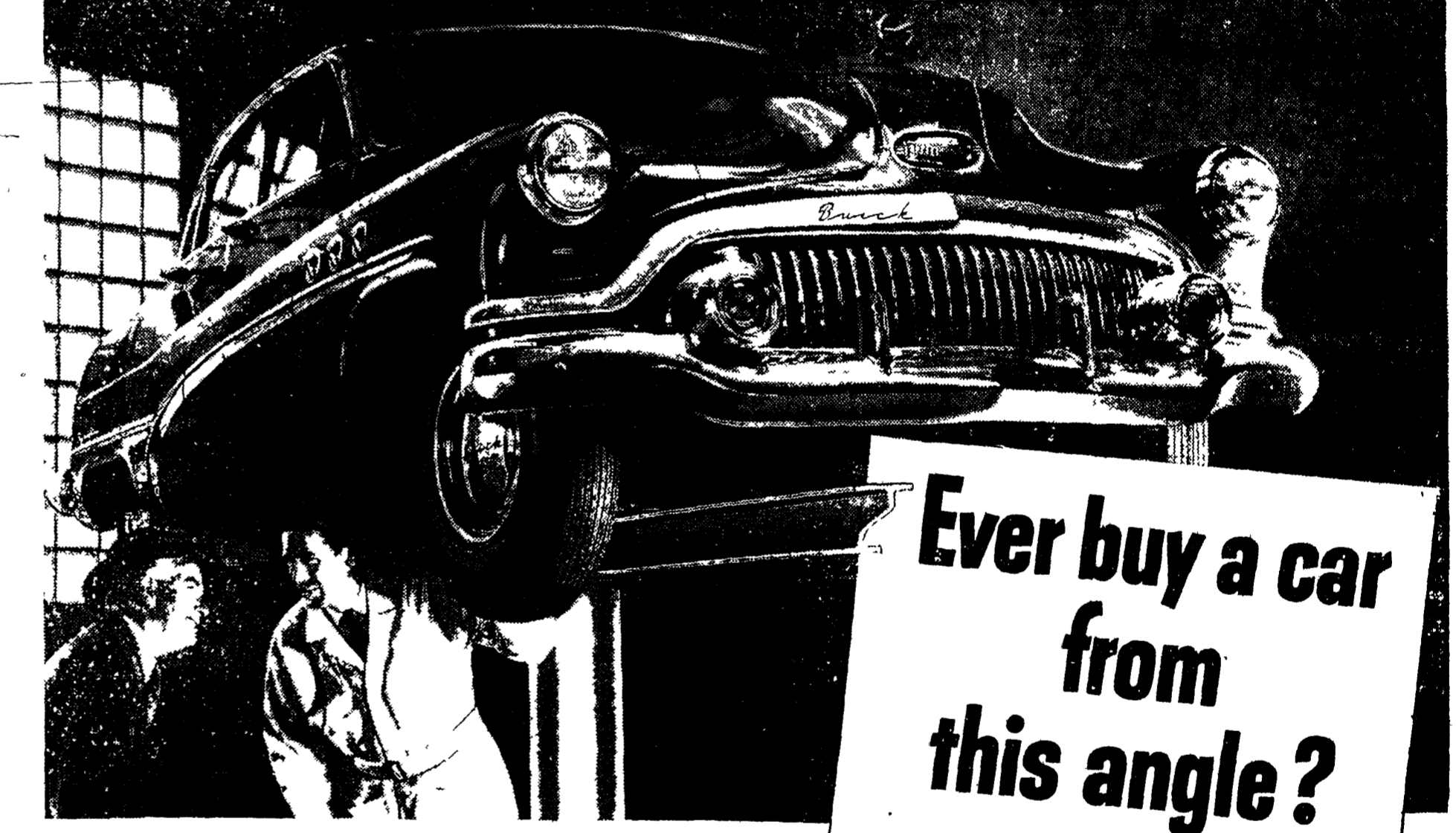
