Youth Council Members Develop Self Discipline in Recreation Room

JoAnn Goodrich Named President

H. Warner, V.P.; Marlin Eddy, Sec., Elected On Basis Work Record

The Buchanan Youth Council elected its 1953-54 officers Wednesday evening of last week, as follows: president, JoAnn Goodrich, vice-president, Herman Warner, secretary, Marlin Eddy, class representatives, 12th grade Bob Samuel, 11th grade Jim Babbitt, 10th grade Buddy Haermann, 9th grade Marjorie Ditto, 8th grade Edwin Kay, at large Robana Bcard and Joe Letcher.

JoAnn Goodrich, now a junior in high school, has evidenced both ability and responsibility beyond her years since she first entered the organization, when the lower limit was the eighth grade. The price of admission to the Youth Council is five hours of free work and two lessons in at least two games of skill, which include table tennis, pool and badminton. Some members are satisfied when they have paid the 5-hour price of membership. JoAnn wasn't. Near the end of her third year last year she had piled up 100 hours of free labor. She kept on going, now she has 130 hours credited to her and is shooting at 200.

While she was elected on the basis of her demonstration of steady loyalty, she has further assets, a very pleasant appearance and personality. "JoAnn never ducks a responsibility because it is hard," said Miss Slate. "So she gets a lot of that kind." She has another honor in the annual committee chairman line—she is the sole member of the committee for the clean-up after the monthly dances, when they happen to fall on Saturday night. That doesn't mean that she does all the work—she merely takes the responsibility for getting it done, including solicitation of help.

The vice-president is another steady "work horse," Herman Warner. Herman was president last year as a junior. He has been outstanding in patience and ability as an instructor in games. Following along in the same line is Marlin Eddy, a sophomore elected secretary. He is another "doer" as well as a player.

Something else has also happened in the Buchanan Youth Council that took more than a year to develop. The organization has a committee on discipline that co-operates to a large extent in the preservation of good citizenship. They are Jim Letcher (chairman), Herman Warner, Bob Hutchinson, JoAnn Goodrich, Bob Samuel, Marlin Eddy, Jeanne Snyder.

The members of this committee always have Miss Slate in the background as the last word in enforcement, but their word is accepted as authority. Recently one of the boys used what is considered rather offensive language in the playing floor. A boy member of the committee checked with the supervisor. "He's out for a week or two weeks," he asked. "Oh, just one week—for the first time," answered the supervisor. The boy returned and gave the order. That was that. This control by the young people themselves is the fulfillment of the dream of the founders that the development of co-operative self-government and self-control would make the organization a laboratory for the development of good citizens in the future.

Further progress in democratic procedure is shown by the disregard of racial lines in election of officers. Jim Babbitt, a colored boy, represents the 11th grade and Edwin Kay, an Indian boy coming here from the Upper Peninsula, is the representative of the 8th grade. Babbitt is a repeater, having represented his class last year also.

Sitting on either larger or smaller game tables is against the rules. The committee has an effectual reminder. When one of the young people, usually a boy, unconsciously seats himself sideways on a pool or other game tables, one of the committee members gets a pin from the desk of the supervisor and stealing up from a rearward direction, gives the malfactor a gentle pick in a non-violent part. It always gets the desired effect. They also straighten out disputes in precedence in the use of play equipment, and most problems of disorder.

City Board To Hold Pavement, Sewer Hearings

Smith St. Concrete Paving And Liberty Sewer Extension Up

The city commission will hold two final hearings at their session next Monday evening. A final hearing will be held on the sewer extension on Liberty avenue south of Smith street approximately 300 feet. The total cost of the sewer is estimated at \$917.50, plus \$75.25 for each individual extension from the center of the street to the tree lawn. The assessment per each 50-foot lot will be approximately \$170.

A final hearing will also be held on the street improvement on Smith street between the mill race and Oak street. A 33-foot wide concrete pavement is proposed, at a total estimated cost of \$11,589.85, including the cost of widening the culvert across McCoy's creek and changes in the culvert across the mill race.

Clarence Jones Former Postal Clerk Here Dies

Served In Two World Wars; Was Manager Of Hotel In Kalamazoo

Clarence Jones, 55, formerly a clerk in the Buchanan post office many years, died instantly of coronary thrombosis in Kalamazoo about 5 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 6, 1953.

He was born near Buchanan March 13, 1898, the son of Ernest and Rebecca Key Jones. He was a veteran of both World War I and World War II. In the latter war he served in Army post offices, several years at Fairbanks, Alaska, and later in New York City. Following his release from the army he engaged in factory work in Niles several years going from there to Kalamazoo, where he was manager of the Kalamazoo Hotel.

He is not known to have been ill previously. About 5 p.m. he was eating in the hotel restaurant when he suddenly leaned forward laying his head on the counter and apparently died instantly.

He is survived by the following: his father, Ernest Jones, near Barron Lake, the following sisters, Mrs. Irvin Groce and Besie Jones, also of Barron Lake, Mrs. Alexis Brant of East Claire, Mrs. Gladys Traiber, Niles, Chester of Mishawaka, Perry of South Bend, Lawrence of Buchanan.

The funeral will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the Kiger Funeral Home in Niles. Burial will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery, Buchanan.

Whiskey Claimant Is Not Sustained In Right To Cuss Police At Station

City patrolmen Albrecht and Dillavou had a busy evening, what with this and especially that, last Saturday.

At 6:30 p.m. they found Reece Price and Joe Baldwin in a parked car in front of the Gridley residence at 805 Ryeearson Mrs. Gridley complained that Price had been on the front porch and had been impolite when he was asked to leave. A witness in the Gridley home, also Price's companion, Joe Baldwin, corroborated her statement. Price was found to have six bottles of beer and part of a pint of whiskey in his car. He was arrested on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

Later Baldwin went to the home of Mrs. Gridley and warned her that there would be trouble if she pressed the charges against Price. Then Baldwin went to the police station and became abusive to R. Dillavou, greeted him with a couple of epithets not printable in a family newspaper, and demanding the whiskey, which he said was his property. When asked to be quiet he said that he had a right to talk that way, when R. Dillavou covered his mouth with his hand. Baldwin then complained that he had been hit by the police. The two patrolmen present testified he might have been shoved a little but had received no blows. Baldwin was arrested for being disorderly.

Callahan said that he had left his license at home in a billfold which he had forgotten to transfer when he changed coats. The patrolmen said they would accompany him to his place of lodging. Bears were thought by the members of the tribe to be the embodiment of the souls of dead warriors. The effigy represents a bear rising in a semi-crouched position on his hind feet.

Mrs. D. Mitchell Partner In B.I.B. Restaurant Dies

Cerebral Hemorrhage After Long Ill Health Is The Cause Of Death

Dorothy D. Mitchell, co-owner and operator of the B. I. B. restaurant, died at 9:30 a.m. Friday in Pawating hospital, Niles, where she had been entered Sept. 17, following a cerebral hemorrhage. A few days after entrance she sank into a coma, remaining unconscious ten days, until her death.

She was born Jan. 16, 1905, near Rensselaer, Ind., the daughter of John and Anna Holder. She married Francis Mitchell in February, 1923, in East Chicago. She came to Buchanan about 10 years ago from the vicinity of Three Oaks. On Feb. 14, 1953, she and her sister, Blanche Stineback, bought the Francis E. Creamery from Ralph E. DeNard, renaming it the B. I. B. restaurant. Her home was at 113 North Oak street.

She is survived by the following six children: Mrs. Dorothy Clemens and Ida Mae Mitchell, Francis, Jr., Theodore and Robert, all of Buchanan, and Edwin, in the U. S. Navy, stationed at Newport R. I., by seven sisters and brothers, Alice Ramey, Verna Shoemaker, Mildred Holder, all of Rensselaer, Mrs. Etelle Townsend of Pokagon, Mrs. Gladys and Blanche Stineback, both of Buchanan; Roy Holder of Martinsville, Ill.; by five grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Swen Funeral Home at 2 p.m. Monday, with Rev. W. Y. Polby of Berrien Springs, in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Commercial Teacher Former Instructor In Immanuel College

Her husband, a student at Emmanuel Missionary College, is a native of Denmark and before coming to this country was assistant editor of a small publishing house in Copenhagen. Mr. Rasmussen lived in Denmark during the occupation by the Nazis and tells some hair-raising stories about life in occupied Denmark. He plans to stay in this country at least until he completes his master's degree.

R. E. Schwartz, Veteran Mail Carrier, Dies

Was Organizer And Past Commander Of Local Legion Post

Richard E. Schwartz, lifelong resident of Buchanan and a rural mail carrier out of the Buchanan office for 34 years, until his retirement recently, died very suddenly at his home on the Wagner Road, immediately west of the Broceus school, at 9:30 a.m. Friday, Oct. 2, 1953.

"Red," as he was universally known here, had suffered a long period of ill health, but had apparently improved. He had driven his car to his property about a mile north of Buchanan on Moccasin bluff to supervise some excavations there. He left for home, telling the employees that he was going after a posthole digger. He parked his car at home and went into the house. Mrs. Schwartz called from an adjoining room asking him how the work was coming along. He answered that he had two bulldozers at work. Then Mrs. Schwartz heard a thud on the floor of the kitchen and found him unconscious. A doctor was called but it is believed that he died immediately.

He was born at Buchanan Feb. 4, 1897, the son of David and Ada Schwartz. He was a veteran of World War I. He married Genevieve Steele on June 3, 1918, in South Bend.

"Red" was known for his warm friendliness and his many enthusiasms. A lifelong friend of Jack Knight, famous pioneer of cross-country mail carrying by air, he aided in the compilation of material for a book on his life in 1946. In addition to his mail route he was engaged in farming many years, also in pioneering the use of Dutch Belted dairy cattle in this vicinity.

For several years he was the secretary-treasurer of the National Dutch Belted Cattle Association. He sold his herd and the farm where he had developed it, just west of the Miller school, when a son entered the army.

He lived many years in Buchanan, moving to the farm where he died, known as the old Broceus farm, in 1939. Shortly after the end of World War I he organized the Ralph Rumbaugh Post No. 51 of the American Legion and served as its commander. He also served several years as the American Legion Welfare officer, representing all Legion posts in Berrien county. In late years he had quit farming, his son, Leigh Schwartz, farming the Wagner Road place.

He is survived by his wife; by his mother, Mrs. Ada Schwartz, 411 Moccasin, by two sons, Richard and Leigh of Buchanan and John Newland Schwartz of Berrien Springs, by two sisters, Mrs. Frank Chubb and Mrs. Gertrude Conrad, both of Buchanan by two brothers, Virgil of Elkhardt and Fred of Three Oaks.

Last rites were held at the Swen Funeral Home at 2 p.m. Tuesday, with Rev. E. B. Church, in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

USDA Accepts New
Soil Insecticide
Described as Effective
Against Rootworms

Growers of corn, peanuts, sugar beets, sugar cane, small grains and similar crops may get economical control of soil insects with Aldrin, a new insecticide.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently accepted the new chemical for registration for use against soil insects, grubs, harmful worms and other burrowing pests, following proof of its effectiveness by many experiment stations.

It is described as being particularly effective against rootworms, wireworms, and white grubs — and in far smaller doses than those needed in previously known treatments. Damage to crops by above-ground insects is easily seen, and until recently has been the primary concern of the farmer. But damage to plant roots by soil insects, while not so readily recognized, is often more widespread and serious.

The new insecticide may be applied by any method available to the average farmer, by mixing with starter fertilizer, with manure, or

by broadcasting a mixture on the surface and then discing it in. Treatments vary from a few ounces up to three pounds or so per acre, depending on what pests are being fought, and on other factors. Farmers should obtain competent advice from their dealers before using the new product.

While Aldrin's approval as a soil insecticide is new, it has been known for several years as a highly efficient and inexpensive surface insecticide.

Note the fuller roots, larger ears and straight stalks of the corn grown in soil treated by the new chemical.

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Obliging Man—He Takes Fire To Fire Dept. Front Door

But Russell Dillavou, Buchanan policeman, is more obliging; he takes his fire right to the fire department's front door. The fire seems to have started from the outside of the floor, under the hood, and burned through.

Collection of Leaves Is Starting Today on North Side of City

Leaves Must Be Piled On Parkway

To Collect On North Half Of City Last 3 Days Of Week; On South Side First 3 Days

The fall collection of leaves with the city's collection machine starts today, Oct. 8, in that part of the city north of Front street. It is not expected that the collection will be heavy, but in succeeding weeks the city requests that householders

have the leaves at the curb the night before collection starts on their side of the city.

They are also requested to deposit their leaves on the parkway or tree lawn, as, if placed in the gutters, they may be washed into the storm sewers in the event of heavy rain. The householders are also cautioned not to mix sticks or branches in the leaves, as they will clog the suction pipe which sucks up the leaves. The branches and sticks should be placed in a separate pile for the rubbish collectors. The city leaf collector operators will rake the leaves into the gutters from which they will be carried into the collector by air suction.

The schedule of collection while the leaf fall lasts will be as follows:
North side of Front, Thursday, Friday, Saturday; south side of Front, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday. In each case the leaves should be piled on the parkway by either the evening before or early in the morning of the first day of collection.

World's Fastest Computer Installed At Oak Ridge Plant

To the growing family of man-made electronic superbrains, you can now add Oracle, reportedly the fastest of them all.

The new computer, built at a cost of \$350,000 at the Argonne National Laboratory of the Atomic Energy Commission will be installed at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory of the A. E. C. early this fall. It was previewed for the press recently.

ORACLE (that stands for Oak Ridge Automatic Computer, Logical Engine) comes from a distinguished family. It is a modification of the Avidac, built in 1950 for Argonne, which in turn was a modification of the computer used at the Institute for Advanced Studies at Princeton. However, the new one is twice as fast as its ancestors.

Its internal memory system is said to have the greatest capacity of any high-speed general purpose computer ever built. It can receive, retain and process as many as 2,048 twelve-digit decimal numbers and is provided with a remotely controlled auxiliary memory system (magnetic tape) which permits the memorizing or storing of 4 million such numbers.

A difficult mathematical problem which would take 5 or 6

years for two mathematicians to solve with electric desk-type computers can be handled by Oracle in 20 to 30 minutes.

Whether or not a husband has a long, full life, is to a large measure, up to the wife, claims Dr. Charles E. Dutches, genetics authority. The doctor maintains that despite penicillin, streptomycin and other medical advances, a wife still plays a key role in guarding her mate's health, particularly after 40.

She should make sure that he has a thorough physical check-up at least annually. She should see that he eats sensibly and in moderation.

A prime essential in a man's life is emotional stability. A peaceful home will help a husband forget his irritations—particularly business pressures—and give him an opportunity to relax. She should do everything she can to minimize emotional upsets.

The wife should not plan her husband's hours while he is home if she nags, and is constantly after him to hang the curtains, fix the basin, or clean the stove, she is not helping either of them. She may, in fact, be working toward early widowhood.

Underwater Wings Add Boat Speeds

The Navy disclosed today it was experimenting with boats equipped with "underwater wings." Technically, the wings are known as "hydrofoils." They have surfaces similar to an airplane wing. Fitted to the bottom of small craft, they raise the hull out of water when sufficient speed is attained.

When the boat is thus entirely supported by the hydrofoil, the Navy said, the result is less water friction and more speed. So far, the project is entirely experimental but the Navy said hydrofoils are expected to be applicable to various boats and small craft.

A Swedish ferry equipped with

hydrofoils has a speed of about 35 knots, or 42 miles an hour. An experimental German hydrofoil boat constructed during World War II attained speeds of 50 knots, approximately 60 miles an hour.

Rebreathing Air Into Paper Bag Is Dizziness Remedy

Blowing into a paper bag and then rebreathing the expired air is an effective treatment for dizziness and weakness that sometimes come from lack of enough oxygen in the brain, according to an article in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The air a patient breathes out contains a high concentration of carbon dioxide doctors point out. Rebreathing that air has the same effect in overcoming oxygen deficiency as inhaling five per cent carbon dioxide, a treatment long used to dilate brain arteries.

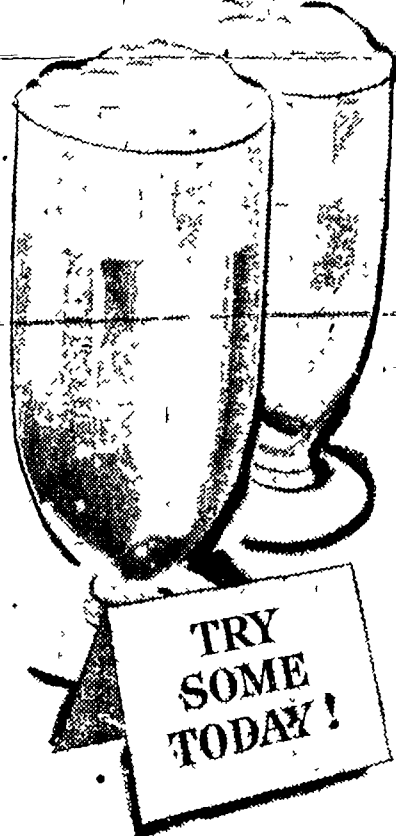
Persons with arteriosclerosis

and high blood pressure have been instructed to carry paper bags with them at all times and to begin breathing their expired air at the first suggestion of dizziness. Five to ten forced breaths in the bag, requiring 15 to 30 seconds, are sufficient to relieve symptoms which otherwise would persist for minutes or hours.
